I'm glad to be back in Chicago, at the very heart of the South Side. You know, back in the 1920s, they used to say "all trains stop here" in Englewood. All the good news we're hearing today, from SB Partners and others, says to me that those trains are moving again; and they're going to carry the people of this neighborhood right into the 21st Century.

It is fitting that you've named a college after Robert Kennedy and Martin Luther King, Jr.; and that a new Kennedy-King could be the spark that lights your whole community. As Robert Kennedy said: "We must turn the power and resources of our private enterprise system to the underdeveloped nation within our midst." That is what we are doing on this tour, from Newark to Hartford, and from the fields of Hermitage, Arkansas to the avenues of Englewood.

If we've ever had a time to fulfill the vision of King and Kennedy, this is it. America's economy is the strongest in a generation. Since I became President, we have created more than 19 million new jobs. We have the lowest unemployment in 30 years, and the highest home ownership ever. Our rising tide has lifted more than 5 million men, women, and children out of poverty.

Still, there are too many places in America where opportunity is too scarce, too many people who are not yet partners in our prosperity. Poverty in Englewood is more than 2½ times the rate in the city of Chicago. The median household income here is barely more than half Chicago's. And I have seen the boarded-up brownstones and shut-down storefronts that tell the story as powerfully as any statistic.

But I see more than poverty here; I see great promise. Later I'll be meeting some of the members of the Women's Self-Employment Project, which has given more than 7,000 women the tools to create their own businesses and shape their own futures. I'll also visit Franz Print Shop, a small business making great strides.

Englewood has more partnerships to build, more success stories to write. Now, government can't do it alone. It works best when it works with business – as a partner for progress. That is what we are seeing here in Englewood, thanks to the efforts of Mayor Daley, who is infusing Englewood with more than \$250 million in public and private investment over the next 4 years... the efforts of Rev. Jackson, who has launched not only a Wall St. Project, but a LaSalle St. Project to bring private capital into our poorest neighborhoods... and the efforts of Rep. Rush, who is working with corporations to forge a new understanding that boosts investment in Englewood.

This approach can energize Englewood with investment and opportunity and hope. It is an approach I have pursued since I first took office, and it is an approach that is working across America. And it wouldn't be working without the strong leadership of the Vice President, and the strategy of Empowerment Zones and Enterprise Communities he has done so much to champion.

I said a moment ago that government can't do it alone. But we sure have to do our part. One of the most crucial things we must do is make sure that business has the same incentives to invest in America's untapped markets as it has to invest in untapped markets overseas. That is the idea behind my New Markets initiative.

When I made that proposal in my State of the Union Address last January, I said I wanted it to be a bipartisan proposal. I wanted it to be above politics. It's just too important. That means that all sides have to work together in good faith. And I am very glad to say that Republicans like J.C. Watts and Jim Talent, have joined with a Democrat who is on this stage today, Danny Davis, to do just that. Their proposal shares many of the goals of my New Markets initiative.

I am pleased to announce that Speaker Hastert and I have come to an agreement. We are going to work together, putting our shared principles above politics, to get this done. We are going to begin the process of merging our proposals – in a historic, bipartisan effort to open new markets and new doors of opportunity for all Americans. Congress has already appropriated initial funding for an important part of my New Markets proposal. Rep. Davis: As a person who has worked on both proposals, you'll be vital to our continued efforts. And Mr. Speaker: If we work together in this bipartisan way, we can ensure that every hardworking family has a share of our prosperity and a stake in our future.

We must also stay committed to community banks and a strong Community Reinvestment Act. Last year alone, CRA helped pump \$88 billion into our communities, helping entrepreneurs start and expand businesses and create new jobs. Rev. Jackson and community leaders around the country have helped to make this happen, ensuring that even as we modernize our banking system, we are strengthening CRA for the 21st Century.

The private sector, too, must do its part. We've already heard about the vital commitment SB Partners has made. Today, I am also pleased to announce, on behalf of the parties represented here, that Allstate Insurance will invest \$5 million in the Illinois Facilities Fund – which will go toward education and child care here in Englewood. And I'm glad that John Liddy has joined us here today. The Community Investment Corporation will also be expanding its efforts into Englewood and the nearby EZ; and, as part of our Welfare to Work Partnership, Alliance Relocation Services is teaming up with Allied and DePaul University to launch a new job training program. I want to add that McDonald's, which is represented here by its CEO, Jack Greenberg, is working to encourage these kind of mentoring relationships – between large companies and small ones – through our BusinessLINC initiative. Investments like these are not only good for this neighborhood. They're good for business; they're good for our economy; and they're the right thing to do.

You know, Englewood High School has an Alumni Hall of Fame that would make any school proud. Poets. Cabinet Secretaries. The first African-American astronaut. And Lorraine Hansberry, the playwright of "A Raisin in the Sun." I've been thinking of that play today, and the character who says: "All God's children got wings." I believe that. I believe all God's children got wings; and if we work together, we can really give them the power to fly. Thank you.

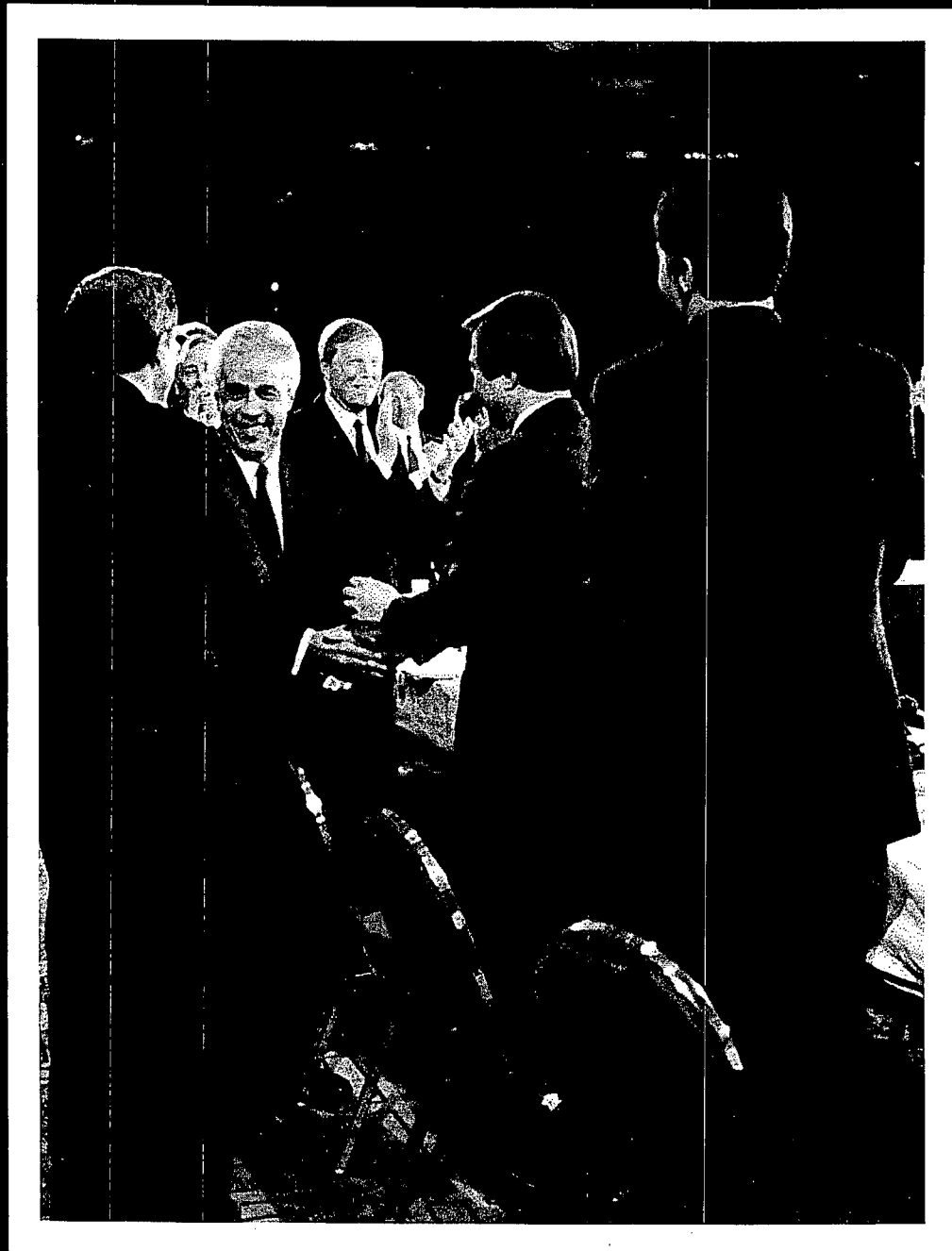
