**President Clinton, Conference Participants, Trustees, Faculty, Students,
And Staff of Princeton University, Honored Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen:**

On behalf of the entire Princeton University community, I warmly welcome you to this keynote session of the American Studies/Woodrow Wilson School conference on "The Progressive Tradition: Politics, Culture and History."

It is more than 104 years since Woodrow Wilson, then a member of the Princeton faculty, gave his great address entitled "Princeton in the Nation's Service."

In that address, Professor Wilson looked back on more than a century of the University's contributions to our national life -- in politics, government, commerce, and the arts.

That tradition, beginning with a shy but brilliant undergraduate named James Madison, has, I am proud to say, continued to the present day -- in no small part thanks to many of you in the audience and on stage. Indeed, we have now expanded Wilson's motto to read, "Princeton in the Nation's Service and in the Service of All Nations."

Our history is long. But thanks to Professor Wilson -- who later became President, first of Princeton and then of the United States -- there has always been a special historical connection between Princeton and the so-called Progressive Era of the first two decades of the twentieth century, a brave reformist era which Wilson did so much to inspire and lead.

It is fitting that we welcome President Clinton back to the Princeton campus to deliver the conference's keynote address.

In 1996, when he spoke at the Commencement exercises held in conjunction with the University's 250th anniversary, he talked of Wilson and the Progressive Era, and of how our nation was poised at the beginning of a new Progressive Era. Four years later, we are honored to have him address us again.

During these past four years, I have had the honor of serving President Clinton's administration as chair of the National Bioethics Advisory Commission. Thus, I am especially pleased to introduce him this afternoon, not only as the keynote speaker of this conference, but as the recipient of the James Madison

Award, presented by the American Whig-Clisophic Society, a student organization that traces its roots all the way back to Madison.

The award will be presented by Katharine Gilbert, Class of 2002 and President of the Society. I would now like to ask Katharine to join me on the stage. [Katharine Gilbert enters and stands next to the podium.]

Ladies and gentlemen, it is a high honor and distinct privilege to introduce today's keynote speaker and Madison Award honoree, the President of the United States, Bill Clinton.

[Clinton joins Shapiro and Gilbert at podium. Clinton shakes Shapiro's hand; Shapiro takes seat on stage. Gilbert, at podium with Clinton, reads citation, presents award, shakes Clinton's hand, and leaves the stage. Clinton, alone at podium, delivers his speech.]

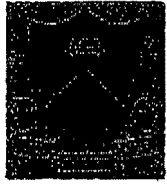

Formerly the dean of the Division of Social Science at the University of California, San Diego, he previously served on the faculties of various universities, including Princeton from 1972 to 1976, as well as Harvard University and the University of Wisconsin, Madison. During his ten-year term as dean at UCSD, he worked to establish a school of international affairs and new departments of cognitive science and ethnic studies within the Division of Social Sciences. Under his leadership, social sciences became the largest division of UCSD in terms of permanent faculty.

An economic theorist, he has written on a wide range of topics, including decision making under uncertainty, investment, taxation, finance, and jury-decision processes. More recently, his research interests have included topics in higher education. He co-authored *Uncertainty in Economics: Readings and Exercises*, and co-edited *Studies of Supply and Demand in Higher Education*. His other publications include numerous articles in journals such as the *Journal of Political Economy*, the *Review of Economic Studies*, the *Journal of Legal Studies*, and the *Journal of Economic Theory*. A fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the Econometric Society, he has held a Guggenheim Fellowship and various research grants from the National Science Foundation. Ph.D. Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

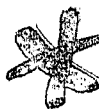

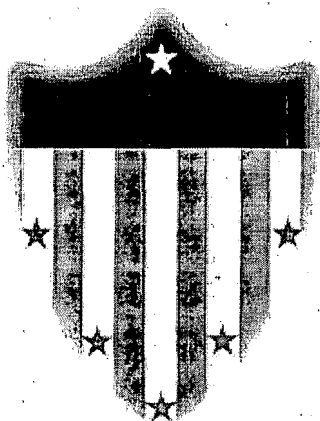

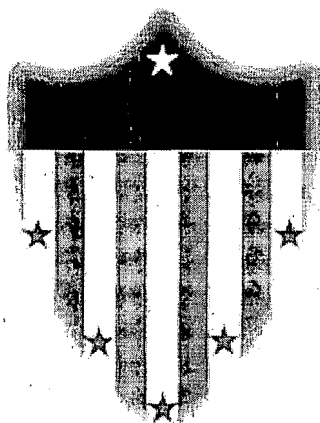
