BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Lester S. Hyman, a Founding Partner of the prominent Washington, D.C. law firm of Swidler & Berlin, specializes in creating and implementing legislative strategies and in resolving international disputes. His clients include Fortune 500 corporations, as well as countries and major companies abroad.

As a protege of John F. Kennedy, he served with the U.S. Securities & Exchange Commission, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and as Secretary of Commerce and later Chairman of the Democratic Party of Massachusetts.

Mr. Hyman has been an advisor to eight U.S. presidential candidates. Following his participation in the Clinton-Gore campaign, he "vetted" candidates for Vice President, the Supreme Court, and the Cabinet and prepared the latter for Senatorial confirmation hearings.

He currently serves as a member of the Board of the Center for National Policy, one of the country's leading political "think tanks" and is a member of the Advisory Board of the International Legal Studies Program of the Washington College of Law (at the American University). He has taught "Decision-making in Politics" at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University.

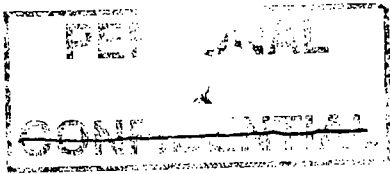
In 1990 he was a member of the International Observer Team, headed by former President Jimmy Carter, which monitored the first democratic election in the history of Haiti.

In 1994, the President of the United States, upon the personal recommendation of Hillary Rodham Clinton, appointed Mr. Hyman to the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial Commission.

In 1995 he was elected to the Board of Trustees of the Norton Simon Museum of Art at Pasadena, California.

He lectures extensively throughout the country and has been described as an informative, entertaining and eloquent public speaker. His biography appears in the current edition of "Who's Who in America." Mr. Hyman has written extensively on U.S. and international issues, with his articles appearing in such publications as "The Los Angeles Times" and "The Boston Globe."

He has a home in the Caribbean (on the island of Tortola) where he is a member of the Board of the British Virgin Islands Community College.

HIGHLIGHTS OF MISSOURI CHILDREN'S IMMUNIZATION REFORM BILL

The purpose of the children's immunization reform legislation is to remove two barriers that hinder Missouri children from being fully immunized on time. The bill is comprised of two central provisions:

1. PARENTAL DELEGATION

Parents may delegate in writing permission to another responsible adult to present their child for immunization when they cannot do so personally. "Responsible Adult" would include such persons as a grandparent, stepparent, aunt or uncle, adult brother or sister, or day care provider.

2. PRIVATE INSURANCE COVERAGE

As a standard provision of private, comprehensive health care coverage offered in Missouri, children, birth to 36 months, would receive routine and necessary childhood immunizations, not subject to deductible, co-payment or co-insurance requirements.

Supporters of the legislation include the Missouri State Medical Association, Missouri Academy of Family Physicians, Greater Kansas City Pediatric Society, Maternal Child Health Coalition of Greater Kansas City, Greater Kansas City Chapter of the National Association of Pediatric Nurse Associates & Practitioners, Springfield Advocates for a Healthy Community, Mid America Immunization Coalition, Citizens for Missouri's Children, Missouri Association of School Nurses, Heart of America United Way, and Parents as Teachers, among others.

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MISSOURI IMMUNIZATION FACT SHEET

- According to the most recent Center for Disease Control study, released August 25, 1995, **Missouri** is tied in the rankings at **49th place among the 50 states** in immunizing its children in the critical age range of 19 to 35 months.
- In 1993 in **Missouri**, only **49 percent** of our kindergartners were fully immunized by age two.
- Twenty-five states have laws governing immunization provisions for private insurance, including Kansas. **The average immunization rate for two year olds in four states (Massachusetts, Minnesota, New York and Virginia) that have statewide coverage standards most similar to the proposed Missouri legislation and for which there exists comparable statistics, is 61.4 percent. The comparison year for Missouri revealed that only 49.3 percent of two year olds were fully immunized.**
- Immunizations are among the most vital and cost-effective medical interventions available. More than \$21 are saved for every \$1 spent on measles/mumps/rubella vaccine; more than \$30 are saved for every \$1 spent on polio vaccine. Therefore, it makes economic and emotional sense to get children immunized as early as possible.
- Ten of the most serious childhood diseases, including polio, measles, and whooping cough, can be prevented through timely immunizations. These diseases can cause severe illness, crippling physical and mental disabilities, and even death.
- According to public health authorities, two years of age is the optimal completion date for immunizations for greatest effectiveness. Epidemics spread quickly among those age two and younger, and diseases like whooping cough and measles can kill the very young. To prevent outbreaks of vaccine-preventable diseases, and protect all children, it is necessary to immunize children at the earliest appropriate age.

- Increasing demands on families add to the barriers that prevent children from being fully immunized on time. Unless parents receive assistance from employers, relatives or neighbors, limited doctor and clinic hours, lack of transportation, or lack of child care for older siblings can prevent a parent or guardian from ensuring that their youngest children are fully immunized on schedule. **With passage of the Missouri children's immunization reform legislation, Missouri parents will be able to give written permission to another responsible adult to take their child for immunizations.**
- All children are behind in receiving their immunizations, regardless of income, race or locality. Nationally, non-poor children accounted for almost three-quarters of the total number of two year olds who were not appropriately immunized in 1992. More than 40 percent of white children, children who live in suburban communities, and children who live above the poverty line are not properly immunized.
- Before the measles vaccine received approval in 1963, an average of over 500,000 cases were reported each year. Measles also killed 400-500 people annually.
- Over the past decade (1981-1991) measles immunization rates for infants in developing countries rose from 18 to 77 percent. In comparison, over the same time period in the United States children became less likely to be protected against vaccine-preventable diseases. Between 1989 and 1991 a measles epidemic struck more than 55,000 Americans, hospitalized more than 11,000, and caused the deaths of 72 children younger than five. Forty-four percent of all cases were in preschool children under five years of age.
- The biggest cause of the measles epidemic was not failure of the vaccine to protect, but failure to get the vaccine to the most susceptible children at an early enough age.

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Missouri's turn

There ought to be a law — one encouraging immunization of very young children in Missouri. There will be soon in Kansas.

The Legislature this year took a giant leap for preventive health care with its Child Immunization Reform Act that's on its way to the governor's desk.

The act does two important things. First, it requires private insurance companies to add to packages currently available first-dollar coverage of immunization for newborns to 3-year-olds. Second, the new law allows parents to give permission to responsible adults to present children for their vaccinations. Working parents might designate a grandparent or day care provider, for example, to take the child for his or her shots.

It's late in the Missouri General Assembly's term. But this issue is important enough to

children to attach it to some bill that appears likely to be passed. The Partnership for Children (842-7643) has ideas and a passion to go to work immediately for new legislation in Missouri. The Partnership will talk about it with any questioner, from Gov. Mel Carnahan or other elected officials on down to interested local taxpayers.

Such a law might prevent an outbreak of measles or whooping cough in Missouri. It might save children the misery of a couple of the so-called childhood diseases. It might save some of those children scars. It certainly will save Missouri money: \$10 in treatment for every \$1 spent on immunizations.

Is there a Kansas City legislator who will step up as a champion for the children in the matter of insurance coverage and parental permission for immunizations?

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Easier immunization

The time is right to look at immunization legislation in Missouri comparable to the progressive law Kansas passed last year to encourage families to vaccinate their children.

Rep. Scott Lakin of Kansas City and Sen. Roseann Bentley, Springfield, already have prefiled a measure — the Missouri Children's Immunization Reform Act — that would promote immunization. The companion proposals would allow parents to designate in writing another responsible adult who could take their child for vaccination. They also would add routine childhood immunizations to the comprehensive coverage package offered by private health insurance firms. Children from birth to 36 months would be eligible for this coverage. Deductibles, co-payments or co-insurance would not apply to such newly covered immunizations.

As it did last year in Kansas, the Partnership for Children has been active in developing the proposed legislation and encouraging lawmakers and other community leaders to get behind the concept. The children's advocacy organization is hosting a breakfast this morning at the Greater Kansas City Community Foundation and Affiliated Trusts, 1055 Broadway, for the Kansas City delegation to the General Assembly and other interested persons.

With a new session of the legislature around the corner in the midst of national turmoil over social service spending, there could scarcely be a better time to focus on a way to dramatically improve the lives of children while saving public money in the long term. Medical finance planners say that for every \$1 spent on immunization, the state will save about \$10 on

treatment. There aren't many safe ways to invest money for a rate of return comparable to what Missouri can save with this preventive health care strategy.

Moreover, sparing babies and children the pain and suffering that might be expected from any of the childhood diseases also is important.

Finally, keeping children healthy simply is not a political issue. Removing barriers to timely and complete immunization of Missouri's children should not be a vehicle to carry other agendas, regardless of how important they might be. When children are in pain, their development is set back regardless of whether they're from Democratic or Republican families, whether they're black or white, whether their parents are in a high tax bracket or a low one.

It's obvious the two lawmakers who are sponsoring immunization reform understand this truth. Lakin is a Democrat, Bentley a Republican. Both deserve praise. It would be encouraging to see the names of other area legislators as co-sponsors on the measures. Sam Leake, the Democrat who expects to become House speaker in January, told *The Star's* Editorial Board this week that he supports the immunization legislation.

Thanks to the child-centered co-operation of many private organizations such as the Partnership for Children, coalitions, medical groups, insurance companies and government agencies, the push to immunize has been successful in the Greater Kansas City area. It ought to be possible to replicate the metropolitan effort across Missouri. The Children's Immunization Reform Act would be a good beginning.

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Immunization leadership

Governor Carnahan summarized the call for child immunization well in his State of the State address earlier this month: "Good preventive health care makes good sense."

He didn't add "and dollars, too," but he could have, in view of estimates long circulated by health officials that every dollar spent on childhood immunization saves \$10 in treatment.

It's gratifying to see elected officials, starting with the governor, assuming a real leadership role in promoting better conditions for Missouri children. Carnahan has directed the Department of Health to implement a plan to get all two-year-olds fully immunized by September, 1997. Moreover, he's pledged his support for a law to help families secure that protection for their children.

Similar measures have been introduced in the House and Senate for practical changes: All proposals would let parents designate another adult who could take a child for his or her shots, and they would add routine childhood vaccination to basic private health insurance coverage. Such immunization coverage would not be included in the family's insurance

deductible or co-payment.

The House Children, Youth and Families Committee heard testimony late Wednesday evening on the bills, including Kansas City Rep. Scott Lakin's Act to Improve Access for Children (HB 904), the original prefilled proposal. A representative of Blue Cross/Blue Shield of St. Louis was among those testifying in favor of HB 904. When one of the state's major health care insurers is a proponent of spending money to add benefits, the message is clear that the change will be cost effective in the long term.

On Monday, the Senate Public Health and Welfare Committee will hold a hearing on comparable child immunization proposals, one sponsored by Sen. Roseann Bentley, Springfield, and the other by Sen. Jet Banks, St. Louis.

In spite of all we know about childhood diseases and how to prevent them, many children remain unprotected. Missouri ranks 49th in the nation in childhood immunization rates. Governor Carnahan has said, "This is not acceptable."

He's absolutely right.

Carnahan proposal would increase immunization of Missouri children

State ranks 49th in vaccinations among 19- to 35-month-olds.

Baby "X" is 22 months old. He's healthy, eager to smile, rambunctious and weighs a ton. If he lives in Missouri, however, Baby "X" may be in mortal danger. There's a fair chance he still hasn't had his immunization shots.

"One out of every three Missouri children under the age of 2 is unprotected from deadly childhood diseases," Missouri Gov. Mel Carnahan said Wednesday in Kansas City.

Speaking at the Francis Child Development Institute at Penn Valley Community College, Carnahan proposed a plan to boost the immunization rate among 19- to 35-month-olds.

According to the federal Center

for Disease Control and Prevention, Missouri ranks 49th among the 50 states in immunizing children in that critical age range.

Carnahan's proposed legislation addresses two barriers that hinder Missouri children from being fully immunized in a timely fashion: time and money.

The proposal would allow parents to give permission for another responsible adult to take their child to be immunized if they cannot. It also would require health insurers to cover childhood immunizations without co-payments or deductibles.

Covering these immunizations would cost insurance companies less than the medical bills that ensue when a child develops a potentially deadly disease such as measles, whooping cough or polio, Carnahan said.

Carnahan also called on local businesses, civic groups and parents to be more committed to getting children immunized.

One local corporation, Hallmark

Cards Inc., already has signed up for the immunization crusade. The company has donated 100,000 greeting cards congratulating all parents of newborns born in the state.

With a diapered teddy bear on the front, the cards will carry a message from the governor and his wife, Jean, reminding parents to get their children immunized. They also will contain a detachable immunization record.

Starting this spring, the cards will be mailed to families of newborns in Missouri within a month or two after birth. Approximately 75,000 babies are born in Missouri yearly.

"My goal is for 90 percent of the 2-year-olds in Missouri to be immunized by the fall of 1997," Carnahan said. "I believe we can give our children the healthy start they deserve through the initiatives I have proposed."

"Missouri children should not be placed in danger of disease any longer."

VACCINE-PREVENT 'ABLE CHILDHOOD DISEASES

Polio

- Serious cases cause paralysis and death
- Mild cases cause fever, sore throat, nausea, headaches, and stomach aches; may also cause neck and back pain or stiffness
- Polio vaccine prevents this disease

Diphtheria

- Respiratory disease spread by coughing and sneezing
- Gradual onset of sore throat, and low-grade fever
- Membrane in throat can interfere with swallowing and cause suffocation
- Heart failure or paralysis can result if disease is not treated
- Diphtheria toxoid (contained in DTP, DT and Td vaccines) prevents this disease

Tetanus

- Neurologic disease also known as lockjaw
- Bacteria enters the body through a break in the skin
- Produces a poison (toxin) that attacks the nervous system
- Early symptoms are headache, irritability and stiffness in the jaw and neck
- Later, causes severe muscle spasms in the jaw, neck, arms, legs, back and abdomen
- May require intensive care in hospital
- In the U.S., most cases are in adults; 4 out of every 10 tetanus cases aged 20 or older will die from the disease
- In developing countries, tetanus frequently affects newborn babies; more than 500,000 babies died from neonatal tetanus in 1993
- Tetanus toxoid (contained in DTP, DT and Td vaccines) prevents this disease

Pertussis

- Highly contagious respiratory disease also known as whooping cough
- Causes severe spasms of coughing that can interfere with eating, drinking and breathing
- Complications include pneumonia, convulsions and encephalitis
- One out of every 3 cases of pertussis encephalitis will die, another 1 of 3 will have permanent brain damage
- In the U.S., about 65% of reported cases are in children under age 5, and half of those are in infants under 1 year of age
- About 3,500 cases are reported in the U.S. each year
- Pertussis vaccine (contained in DTP vaccine) prevents this disease

Measles

- Highly contagious respiratory disease
- Causes rash, high fever, cough, runny nose and red, watery eyes, lasting about a week

- Causes ear infections and pneumonia in 1 out of every 12 to 15 children who get it
- Causes encephalitis that can lead to convulsions, deafness or mental retardation in 1 to 2 of every 2,000 people who get it
- Of every 1,000 people who get measles, 1 to 2 will die
- Measles vaccine (contained in MMR, MR and measles vaccines) prevents this disease

Mumps

- Causes fever, headache and swelling of one or both cheeks or sides of the jaw
- One out of every 10 who get mumps may get meningitis or encephalitis
- Inflammation of the testicles occurs in about 4 of every 10 adult males who get mumps
- May result in hearing loss, which is usually permanent
- Mumps vaccine (contained in MMR vaccine) prevents this disease

Rubella

- Also known as German measles
- Mild disease in children and young adults, causing rash and fever for 2 to 3 days
- Causes devastating birth defects if acquired by a pregnant woman; there is at least a 20% chance of damage to the unborn baby if a woman is infected early in pregnancy
- Rubella vaccine (contained in MMR vaccine) prevents this disease

Haemophilus Influenzae type b (Hib)

- Before the introduction of infant vaccination, 1 child in 200 was affected before age 5
- Causes meningitis, pneumonia, sepsis, arthritis, and skin and throat infections
- More serious in children under age 1; after age 5, there is little risk of getting the disease
- Before 1992, Hib was the most common cause of bacterial meningitis in the U.S.
- One out of 20 children who get Hib meningitis will die and 15 - 30% of survivors will have permanent brain damage
- Hib vaccine prevents this disease

Hepatitis B Virus (HBV)

- Infants born to HBV-infected mothers have up to an 85% chance of getting HBV infection
- HBV infection is spread within families and communities
- Infection at birth or during early childhood can result in long-term chronic illness
- People with chronic infection can develop chronic liver disease and liver cancer
- HBV vaccine prevents this disease

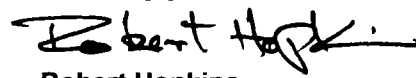

AN INFORMAL SUPPER WITH FDR

I had been in the U.S. Army at Fort Dix, N.J. when, after five weeks of basic training, I got my first 24-hour pass. I arranged to spend it with my father, Harry Hopkins, who was President Roosevelt's close advisor and lived at the White House. I was a buck private in those pre-war days, and received just \$21 a month. With only a \$1.50 in my pocket, I hitch-hiked to Washington in the pouring rain, arriving, several hours later, drenched to the skin.

This was not my first visit to the White House. I had been there several times before for weekends and holidays, having first met the President five years earlier. Dad was waiting for me in the Lincoln Bedroom which served as his living quarters and his office in the White House. Observing my bedraggled state, he ordered me to remove my wet uniform and take a hot bath. He gave my uniform to Arthur Prettyman, the President's valet, and asked him to iron it dry.

As I soaked in the tub, I told him of my experiences in the Army so far, where the tough first sergeant seemed to take special delight in assigning me to garbage detail, kitchen police, fireman and guard duty in addition to the drilling, marching and other duties related to basic training. I rarely met his exacting standard when it came to making my bunk, so he retaliated by "gigging" all 120 men in my barracks, depriving me and them of weekend passes. After a period of tension, they came to my aid and instructed me in making my bunk so the top blanket was as taut as a drum head.

My father looked thin and drawn. He had been operated on for cancer in 1938, when three-quarters of his stomach was removed. The operation was a success, but he never regained the weight he lost. I was concerned about his health, but he assured me that he was all right. He said he was having difficulty assimilating nourishment from his food and had to give himself injections every day.

He told me that Mrs. Roosevelt was away on a trip, but that we would be having cocktails and supper with the President as soon as I got dressed.

The President greeted me cordially in the oval study on the second floor just down the hall from Dad's room. With him was his secretary, Missy Lehand. My father and I completed the group. As the President mixed up a shaker full of dry martinis and served them to us, he asked me about Army life. I told him much the same story I told my father.

The President regaled us with one story after another with great gusto during the cocktail hour and supper. He said that Henry Morgenthau, Jr., the Secretary of the Treasury, visited him that afternoon and expressed his concern for the President's safety in view of the war in Europe, saying that as head of the Secret Service, he was responsible for protecting the President. He proposed, therefore, to put anti-aircraft batteries on the roof of the White House. The President told him he had no intention of turning the White House into an armed camp. "If you want to protect the President," he said, "You can put anti-aircraft guns on the roof of the Treasury".

The President, my father, and Missy worked so closely together every day that they shared a special kind of intimacy and there was much laughter in that relaxed atmosphere.

Suddenly I realized it was well past midnight and I had to get back to Fort Dix before reveille. I knew I couldn't reach the fort if I hitch-hiked at that hour, so I asked my father if he would lend me five dollars so I could take the bus back. He said he didn't have it. The President then said, "I'll lend it to you". I protested, but he insisted. I thanked him and promised to repay him right after payday.

Then, taking a card from the table next to him, he said, "Let me give you this in case you don't arrive in time for reveille". The card bore the seal of the President of the United States, embossed in gold. On it he wrote:

November 30, 1941

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

***Private Robert Hopkins is to be excused from reveille because
he has been in consultation with the Commander-in-Chief.***

Franklin D. Roosevelt

I thanked him for this and for such a special evening with him, Before leaving, I asked him when he and my father would be taking a vacation because I was concerned about Dad's health.

"We'll take a vacation as soon as the aircraft strike is settled in California and the Japanese situation is resolved".

I knew about the strike at the aircraft factories, but I was unaware of any Japanese problem.

I week later, the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor.

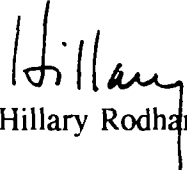

I wish to bring to your attention a national program that I have observed first-hand in our Philadelphia schools that is having a profound effect on many of our neediest students.

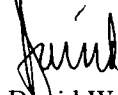
Careers Through Culinary Arts Program (C-CAP) began six years ago in the New York City public schools. The program trains inner-city high school students for meaningful careers in the food service industry through culinary arts education and apprenticeship. It has grown from 600 students in 12 schools to nearly 10,000 students in 200 schools. Scholarships offered to leading culinary schools have increased from \$25,000 in the first year to over \$800,000 this year. These figures take on even more meaning when one realizes that this has been done nearly single-handedly by the program's founder, Richard Grausman.

Despite the annual budget cuts, Mr. Grausman has found a way to make our high school Home Economic and vocational foods programs sources of viable economic opportunity. The program's success had led to its being recreated and replicated in seven major cities/areas (New York, Philadelphia, Washington/Fairfax, Chicago, Norfolk/Virginia Beach, Phoenix and Los Angeles). It is most certainly the kind of exceptional educational model that deserves commendations by the President, as well as support from Secretaries Reich and Riley. Such an endorsement would enable C-CAP to garner financial support from the Hospitality Industry that benefits directly from its work.

It is rare that programs of such quality are developed for the sole purpose of helping our students in need. C-CAP is a classic example of a creative public/private partnership that creates real promise and opportunity for our nation's students.

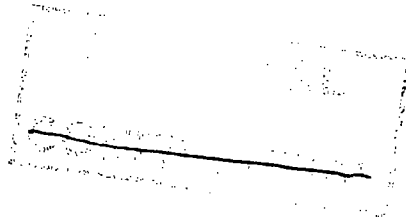

Finally, C-CAP offers talented students scholarships to schools like The Culinary Institute of America and Johnson & Wales.

C-CAP now reaches over 15,000 students in 190 schools in New York, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C./Fairfax County, Norfolk/Virginia Beach, Phoenix, Chicago and Los Angeles. The program is supported primarily by donations from companies like General Mills and Land O'Lakes and private foundations like Newman's Own.

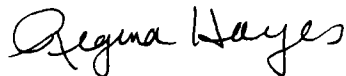

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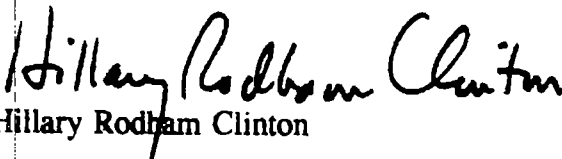

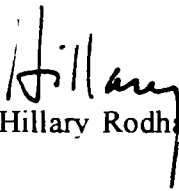
