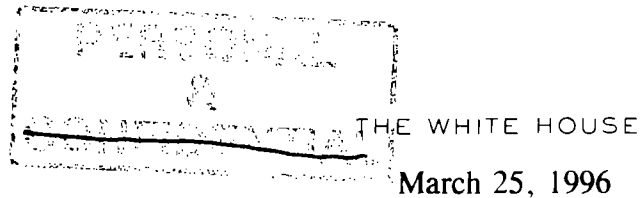

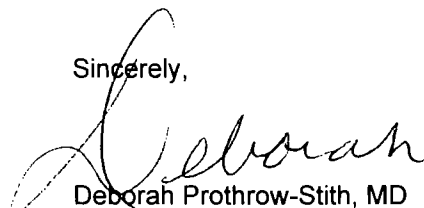
I wanted to keep you abreast of an exciting project that is in line with your efforts. I am hoping that you will honor us by agreeing to be a keynote speaker at this event. The *National Forum for Survivors of Violence* will offer parents and family members, for the first time on a national scale, an opportunity to explore ways of turning personal tragedy into a powerful and positive force to help prevent violence in the United States. The Forum will also recognize citizens who have turned their tragic personal loss into life-affirming action by founding a variety of community-based initiatives. These initiatives perform a variety of services, ranging from helping families cope with the pain, guilt and grief of losing a family member to advocating for more effective crime legislation. Please find enclosed a copy of the proposal describing the Forum in detail for your review.

We expect over 200 survivors to attend the Forum scheduled for June 1, 2, and 3, 1996 at the Wyndham Hotel in Chicago. This event promises to be emotional, challenging and uniquely inspirational as we listen to personal accounts of survivors who despite great despair, grief and anger, recognize that our current legislative response of punishment alone will never bring back their loved ones or stop the violence. Our intent in planning the Forum is to offer survivors technical assistance and support in an effort to form a national organization similar to Mothers Against Drunk Drivers.

In order to facilitate the maximum information dissemination at the Forum, each participant will receive current articles and resources, including copies of several books. We will be including "It Takes a Village" as one of these books. Those who attend will serve as representatives of their communities, taking back knowledge and information to improve and expand violence prevention efforts and initiate public policy reform.

I would welcome the opportunity to speak with you and discuss this event more thoroughly. I will be in Washington to participate in the White House Leadership Conference on Youth, Drug Use, and Violence on March 7th and will be in attendance for the reception preceding the Conference on March 6th. NATIONAL FORUM FOR SURVIVORS OF VIOLENCE

The Community Violence Prevention Project (CVPP), part of the Harvard School of Public Health's Public Health Practice Initiative under the direction of Dr. Deborah Prothrow-Stith, will plan and facilitate the National Forum for Survivors of Violence. This two day Forum will bring together, for the first time on a national level, parents and family members who have lost or had a loved one injured as a result of violence. The Forum will also invite parent-founded organizations and violence prevention programming initiatives to share their experiences and knowledge with Forum participants in order to facilitate discussion and exploration into identified programming and policy needs.

INTRODUCTION

Violence involving young people, both as victims and as perpetrators, has become one of the greatest challenges ever to face the United States. The numbers leave little doubt as to the severity of this crisis – in 1993 alone 8,730 people under the age of 24 were murdered in the United States, a 62 percent increase from the 1985 total of 5,368. Homicide is the tenth leading cause of death in the US. Though the violent crime rate among adults has been declining, this trend has not been reflected in the juvenile population. Homicide is the second leading cause of death for young people between the ages of 15 and 24, and the leading cause of death for African American youth in the same age group. On the international front, the 1991 per capita homicide rate in the US for young men between the ages of 15 and 24 was at least four and at most seventy times greater than that of every other industrialized country.

The data on intentional injuries and death begin to lose their meaning when reported over and over in the media, devoid of names and faces, and often obscured by the overwhelming numbers. These numbers, unfortunately, fail to convey the depth of anguish experienced by family members and friends left behind, who try to make sense out of that which is senseless. It is the survivors who bring meaning to the numbers, and all too often their voices are not heard. Family members are repeatedly left to deal with the barrage of anger, frustration, and sadness and do so with little or no community support.

A NATIONAL FORUM

While several local and national organizations have been founded by grieving parents and family members, there has been relatively little opportunity for substantive dialogue on a national scale. Most available parent/survivor organizations work primarily at the community level to develop ways to deal with the tremendous toll of violence. Families have been left to face the challenges of losing or caring for a child or relative injured as a result of violence, yet they have not been included in developing national strategies for change. The exclusion of families from national debate, even if unintentional, can only intensify their frustration and grief over the senselessness of their loved one's death or injury.

The Forum will give parents and family members an opportunity to help prevent others from experiencing the tragedy of violence. It will offer survivors the chance collectively to use their experiences to call for an effective, national public policy that includes strong support for prevention programs along with more effective criminal justice efforts. The compelling voices of these survivors would provide much-needed momentum to the national movement to prevent violence. Grassroots advocacy groups like Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) have proven how successful a nationwide collaboration of those personally affected by a preventable tragedy can be.

The Forum will also, for the first time, bring together and recognize the accomplishments of existing parent-founded organizations, like Save Our Sons and Daughters (SOSAD) in Michigan, Parents of Murdered Children (POMC) in Ohio, Mothers Against Violence in America (MAVIA) in Washington, and Mad Dads in Nebraska, and many other individuals who have started or work in similar programs. These organizations and individuals work tirelessly in a variety of community-based initiatives ranging from helping families cope with the pain, guilt, and grief to advocating for changes in crime legislation. The Forum will give these unique community leaders the opportunity to articulate their needs, discover resources, and forge new partnerships.

THE PLANNING PROCESS

Significant interest in a national dialogue for survivors has been expressed by a number of individuals and organizations on an informal basis. Dr. Prothrow-Stith continues to garner enthusiastic support for the Forum from other violence prevention experts and program operators, health care professionals, educators, and policy makers as she travels around the country for her speaking engagements.

As a first step in planning this Forum, Dr. Prothrow-Stith and CVPP staff developed a survey to measure the level of interest in convening a Forum for survivors. Groups and individuals who have an intrinsic personal or professional interest in such a Forum were sent the survey and were asked to identify and refer to us parents or guardians of children who were killed or injured as a result of violence, or if appropriate, themselves or a fellow staff member. As a direct result of this initial assessment, 100 percent of those asked about the Forum expressed significant interest and most were willing to serve on its advisory board. We now have a 25 member advisory board representing the wide diversity of survivors nationwide. (See Appendix A.) The advisory board members were selected based on willingness and availability to participate in the planning process. In addition, a resource committee composed of program operators is under development. Two members have agreed to participate thus far. (See Appendix A.) Members will be selected for this committee based on their willingness and experience in the field of survivor services. This committee will serve to provide information during the planning process and will provide assistance in efforts to publicize the Forum.

From the advisory board and resource committee, a working group will be created, consisting of approximately 10 members who will work directly with Dr. Deborah Prothrow-Stith and staff of the CVPP. The working group will be primarily responsible for the substantive planning of the agenda, topics, and format for the Forum. Throughout the planning process for the national Forum, guidance, direction, and support will be sought from the advisory board via fax, mail, and telephone.

FORUM FUNDING STRATEGIES

The National Forum for Survivors of Violence is requesting funding from the Charles Stewart Mott Foundation, the Prudential Foundation, the Smith-Richardson Foundation, and the General Mills Foundation to sponsor the travel and accommodations for 100 survivors. CVPP staff is also employing several other strategies to supplement the cost of the Forum planning, presentation, and follow-up.

LOCAL SPONSORS

The Forum advisory board and resource committee will help the CVPP staff to identify local corporate and community foundation sponsors for an additional 100 Forum attendees. These local sponsors will be responsible for two to five survivors from their area or state who wish, but who may not have the resources, to attend. In addition, the National Funding Collaborative for Violence Prevention will be contacted in order to assess the possibility of recruiting its members as local sponsors.

REGISTRATION FEE

Consideration is being given to including a small registration fee for both attendees and exhibitors to offset the cost of the Forum.

FORUM GOALS

- a. To facilitate the identification of resources, promote networking, assist in information exchange, and promote the discussion of research possibilities, program development, and priorities in policy formulation.**

The National Forum for Survivors of Violence is intended to reflect the needs and concerns of those who know best the toll violence extracts from our communities — parents and families who have suffered the loss or injury of a child or relative due to violence. Through workshops, seminars, and informal meetings, the Forum participants will be given a chance to develop and hone their interests. With such a unique opportunity for discovery, these people who have been most affected by violence can pursue areas of interest, explore the work of others, and develop an agenda of research, program, and policy issues.

During the Forum, participants will be given the opportunity to select a national advisory board and to set an agenda for the future. As a potential part of that agenda, the Forum will facilitate the discussion and possible formation of a national organization, similar to the organization Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD). The primary objective of the newly formed organization would be to reform and create new public policy around the issue of violence.

b. To make the Forum available on video in order to promote the Forum and its results to policy makers and the media.

The two days of proceedings will be videotaped in order to: 1) be offered to attendants as a permanent record of the event, 2) be offered to those persons who were unable to attend and benefit from the Forum, and 3) be distributed to policy makers as a resource and record of this event and its results. All guest speakers and workshops at the Forum will be videotaped. Taping of the exhibits and of individuals participating throughout the event will also be added to the final product.

In addition, a comprehensive media campaign will be undertaken to publicize the Forum and its results. This will include distribution of the Forum videotape, publishing a Forum proceedings document, distribution of press releases utilizing present contacts with violence prevention organizations, and accessing Harvard-based publications. In addition, on-line information regarding the Forum will be available through the Internet via the World Wide Web site for the Community Violence Prevention Project.

c. To conduct a comprehensive evaluation of the Forum as well as evaluations of each workshop

Participants at the Forum will be given an overall evaluation questionnaire to be filled out at the end of the Forum. In addition, each workshop will have a short evaluation questionnaire for participants to complete. The results of these evaluations will be used to assess the success of the Forum and to improve future planning for workshops.

WHY THE HARVARD SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH?

Under the leadership of Dr. Deborah Prothrow-Stith, HSPH is currently making a strong institutional commitment to public health practice. The Public Health Practice Initiative (PHPI) houses several programs and research projects, including the Violence Prevention Programs under the direction of Dr. Prothrow-Stith. The Community Violence Prevention Project is one of the Violence Prevention Programs and will be primarily responsible for the coordination and planning of the Forum.

Dr. Prothrow-Stith is a nationally recognized expert in the field of violence prevention and is author of the *Violence Prevention Curriculum for Adolescents*, which is used in schools in all 50 United States, the book *Deadly Consequences: How Violence is Destroying Our Teenage Population and a Plan to Begin Solving the Problem*, and countless journal articles on violence prevention. She was recently appointed to President Clinton's National Commission on Crime Control and Prevention. Over the past decade, Dr. Prothrow-Stith has traveled around the country speaking to thousands of people, from teachers to health care professionals to government officials. Through her extensive travel, Dr. Prothrow-Stith has had the opportunity to be inspired by and impressed with those who turned personal tragedy into something positive and constructive. Based on those experiences and recognizing that, while there are many national and local conferences on violence each year, none have been designed by survivors for survivors, Dr. Prothrow-Stith conceptualized the two-day Forum. As a neutral convener, the PHPI's Community Violence Prevention Project can host and staff such a meeting, utilizing the expertise, national profile, and contacts of Dr. Prothrow-Stith.

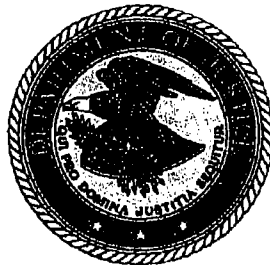
Thanks for your note. Mind if I use the poem from India in my own speeches? I love it.

Dear Mrs. Clinton,

I was touched when I heard about your "Village" book. I have some first hand knowledge of a current project to operationalize the concept of a Village approach to raising children. More specifically it is The Village of Hope Center for Children with Developmental Disabilities here in San Antonio. It is one of many programs started by Dr. Chris Johnson (Peg Anderson's niece). Attached is a letter about her specifically that I hope will impress you and Mr. Clinton.

The Village of Hope is a joint project between the University of Texas Health Science Center and University Hospital. It is on the West Side of San Antonio in a Health care Provider Shortage Area (HPSA). Its mission is to provide a multidisciplinary evaluation setting for children with a variety of developmental disabilities. Clinics include: a Pediatric Rehabilitation Clinic for children with Cerebral Palsy expanded to include any child with significant neuromuscular or orthopedic disability that may actually or potentially affect mobility, a School Function Clinic designed to evaluate medical causes for school performance difficulties including learning disabilities, attentional problems, behavioral, emotional, or cognitive problems that may have an organic, genetic, or environmental or situational etiology. Our Neurodevelopmental clinic is for children five years of age or younger who are suspected of having developmental disabilities (many of these children are diagnosed with autism at younger ages which optimizes their outcomes through early identification and intervention); the early diagnosis and referral to Early Intervention of children with developmental disabilities is an essential step in preventing long-term sequelae for at risk infants and young children. Our two Developmental Pediatricians (Dr. Johnson and Dr. Cathleen Roberts) have individual consult clinics that are available to any child who would ordinarily have to wait many months to be seen in another clinic. We have a multitude of volunteer and a limited paid staff who support our multidisciplinary approach. These include Occupational Therapists, Speech Therapists, Physical Therapists, a graduate student from Trinity University, a Ph.D. student who volunteers educational diagnostic time, and a physician from Mexico waiting for a Pediatric Residency. A Pediatric Orthopedist (Dr. Wilkins) volunteers his time for the Pediatric Rehabilitation clinic. We have a Social worker at most clinics, a Clinical Nurse Specialist at all clinics (our resident angel Vicky Walton RN, MSN), our clinic Nurse (Yolanda Martinez-the glue that holds us all together) and an Audiologist to provide a full range of diagnostic services.

We house the Parent Information Exchange (PIE) and Partners Assisting Texans With Handicaps (PATH), the Children's Habilitation Center (CHC) has an office and provides therapeutic services for children in Early Intervention in our setting, and a budding library for parents and students is also on site to enable and empower all with essential up to date "information and knowledge". Allied Health students, Medical students, Nursing students, Nursing Graduate Students, and area College and University Education Departments send students who are just a few of the people educated in this setting. Pediatric and Family Practice Residents from University Hospital, Wilford Hall Medical Center, and Brooke Army Medical Center, rotate for a month during their training through a comprehensive mini-Fellowship in Developmental Disabilities. The Developmental Disabilities University Affiliated Grant funded Fellowship is one of the few for this subspecialty in the Country. I have the honor of being the second Nurse Practitioner ever to do a Fellowship, creating a new subspecialty for Nurse Practitioners to develop a resource for such an underserved population. We have a Developmental

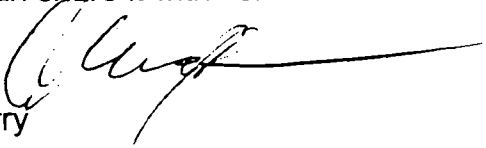
Disabilities Journal Club (DDJC), and a Fellow Discussion Group (FDG) that meet monthly to discuss selected topics in Developmental Disabilities from a clinical and family education standpoint.

We are able to provide a comprehensive multidisciplinary approach to support the family of a child with a disability. We do this by evaluating the whole family's needs and supporting them with services in the community. We make every attempt to assist them with access to these services.

The Village is actually the 32 old adobe cottages originally built by the WPA for families of patients in the old Tuberculosis Hospital that used to be adjacent (it has since been torn down). They were restored by UHS and UTHSCSA and the Developmental Disabilities Program has been there about two years. The families love the setting and the children thrive in this "non hospital, non clinic" appearing little village. Many of the cottages are slated for demolition to make room for a big multi-million dollar diabetes center that is to be built in the next few years. The future of our program is very uncertain for budgetary reasons as a Disabilities Program will always spend more money than it makes. The University has already eliminated one Full Time Developmental Pediatrics position for the 1996-97 academic year leaving us with a Fellow (myself) and a half time Faculty member (Dr. Johnson). Unfortunately this will severely restrict the range of services we are able to provide not only for the children and families but the students and Physicians and Nurses in training. We have been assured that we will be there at least until December 1996.

We would love to welcome you for a visit if you come through San Antonio in this busy coming year. The concept of a Village to raise a child is alive and well (for now) at The Village of Hope. I think seeing your dream a reality is one of the great joys in life, and hope you can share it with us.

Just a little about Dr. Chris Johnson. She is the only person who does not recognize how amazing she is. Besides making the concept of the Village a reality and jumping through constant hoops to save it she has many other projects (stable realities) that all have a similar mission. The oldest and fastest growing is the Children's Association for Maximum Potential C.A.M.P.. C.A.M.P. was started when Chris was a Pediatric Resident in the Airforce at Wilford Hall. She went to medical school originally because the Medical school near where she was studying for her Masters in Special Education would not let her audit a Neurology Course. She wanted to know more about why her "kids" were affected the way they were. They told her if she wanted the course she would have to go to Medical School, so she did.

During her Pediatric Residency one of her patients who was chronically ill and required frequent care wanted to go to summer camp. Unfortunately his medical condition made him ineligible to go to any of the regular summer camps. He was very tearful and Chris, after being angry for him that no one would take him, rallied Medical and Nursing volunteers and trained counselors and rented a summer camp for a week. They took a bunch of kids to camp that no one else would. C.A.M.P. started out in her garage with a budget of less than 10,000 dollars. It is now four programs in two old barracks on Lackland, and a C.A.M.P. CAMP owned camp up in the Texas Hill Country that has six summer sessions a year (3 of which are also Developmental Disabilities Review Course sessions for health and education professionals) and several weekend camps and several respite weekends a year during the school year. All the C.A.M.P. CAMP counselors and health care providers are volunteers. The fees are sliding scale or scholarships, or provided by Non-educational Community Based Support Funds. The other three programs are a Child Care Center The littlest C.A.M.P. (TLC) for military dependent children with Developmental Disabilities or medically fragile conditions that would exclude them from traditional day care settings, a Child Developmental Center (CDC) that provides Early Intervention Services for military dependent children whose parents opt for a center based program with direct therapy in lieu of the San Antonio ECI programs. Both of the latter programs work very closely with the primary Pediatricians and Pediatric subspecialists at Wilford Hall and Brooke Army Medical Center that follow these special children. These two programs are funded by United Way and Champus reimbursement for services, and sliding scale cost share for parents who can afford it (scholarships for those who would be burdened by cost share). The fourth program is the Family Support Services (FSS) Program that provides a multitude of services for civilian and military families of children with disabilities. The camping and family support services programs both serve civilians and military dependents. This program is heavily involved with Americorps and The Community Implementation of the Americans with Disabilities Act Through Volunteerism (CIADAV) and supported by grant funds.

This is only a drop in the bucket about what Chris has started and kept alive. She wakes up every morning and starts work at 2:30 or 3:00 working on C.A.M.P. until 8 or 9, (this is volunteer time by the way) and then starts her real day seeing patients, spending time with her five year old, and writing and preparing articles and lectures for obligations all over the globe. She tries to end her day with her husband (a Cardiologist-Edwin "Eli" Whitney), and her daughter. Her curriculum vitae is somewhere between 20 and 30 pages long. The woman is amazing. She started the spina bifida clinic at Wilford Hall when she was a Resident. This multidisciplinary clinic approach has had an incredible impact on the long-term health and quality of life of children, who many are now 40 year old adults, who still come to clinic. The list goes on and on and on and on. She would be mortified to know that someone would actively draw attention to her but...this is the kind of story that inspires leaders, so check it out if you come this way. C.A.M.P. is just a stone's throw from Kelly AFB. -DP

As we discussed, I am very excited by the data presented at the Nutrition Summit by Dr. William Fair of Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center. As you know, Dr. Fair placed ten of his patients with elevated PSA levels on a 10% fat diet and found that nine of the ten showed reductions in their PSA levels within only three to six months.

Although these patients did not have biopsy-proven prostate cancer, Dr. Fair has other patients who have prostate cancer who have had similar findings. These data are consistent with data from Dr. Fair's study with nude mice showing that the progression of prostate cancer was stopped or reversed when these mice were placed on 10-15% fat diets yet the tumors continued to grow in mice on diets higher in fat.

Because of these data, when combined with what is known about the epidemiology of prostate cancer, I believe that we can demonstrate that the progression of prostate cancer may be reversible. Since the effect on PSA levels was so consistent in Dr. Fair's data, and since the time frame was so short, this study could be accomplished very quickly and relatively inexpensively.

By analogy, my colleagues and I were able to demonstrate— for the first time— in the Lifestyle Heart Trial that the progression of coronary heart disease was reversible with only 48 patients in only one year. Then, as now, the reversibility of heart disease had been shown in animals and in anecdotal case reports from humans, but never before in a randomized controlled trial. The parallels are clear.

The study I am proposing is outlined below. Dr. Fair has agreed to collaborate as senior author and to perform the PSA levels in his research laboratory.

Fifty patients with elevated PSA levels and biopsy-proven prostate cancer would be randomly assigned to an experimental group or to a control group. The ideal patients would be men with prostate cancer who have chosen “watchful waiting” rather than radiation, prostatectomy, and/or hormonal therapy. These patients are (a) highly motivated, since they have no other intervention, (b) they may have a less aggressive form of prostate cancer, and (c) there are no other interventions to confound the interpretation of the results.

Patients who are randomly assigned to the experimental group would enroll in our comprehensive lifestyle change intervention at one of the eight hospitals that we have trained. These eight sites include the Beth Israel Hospital at Harvard Medical School in Boston, Alegant Immanuel Medical Center in Omaha, Mercy Hospital and the Iowa Heart Center in Des Moines, Broward General Hospital in Ft. Lauderdale, Richland Memorial Hospital in Columbia, SC, Scripps Clinic and Hospitals in La Jolla, CA, Mt. Diablo Hospital in Concord, CA (near San Francisco), and the Beth Israel Medical Center in New York.

Having this program infrastructure in place represents a substantial savings in both time and money for the proposed study. This existing network provides significant advantages: (1) immediate enrollment of patients can begin; (2) the effectiveness of adherence to this intervention already has been established; and (3) many of the costs of establishing the hospital sites, administration, staff training, and the development of patient education materials and systems already have been paid, so the proposed study on prostate cancer can be done at a fraction of what it otherwise would cost:

We may be able to recruit all fifty patients from Dr. Fair and his colleagues, in which case the intervention would be delivered only at the Beth Israel Medical Center in New York. “Watchful waiting” patients are more difficult to find, so it may be necessary to recruit from a

wider population. If we recruit in all eight cities, we only need to find six to seven patients per site, so recruitment could occur quickly.

These lifestyle changes include a 10%-fat (vegetarian) diet that is naturally rich in antioxidants, soy, selenium, and carotenoids; stress management techniques, moderate exercise, smoking cessation, and psychosocial support. So far, adherence to our program has been remarkably high. Approximately 90% of patients who were eligible for coronary artery bypass surgery or angioplasty have not needed one when they chose our program as an alternative in these eight hospitals.

We can begin enrolling patients immediately in these eight hospitals once we receive IRB approval, which should be easy since the intervention is harmless. Patients meet three times per week during the first three months. Each session is four hours: one hour of supervised exercise, one hour of stress management training, one hour of a meal together, and one hour of group psychosocial support. Following the first twelve weeks, patients then meet in four-hour sessions once per week for the remaining nine months.

Patients would be tested with PSA levels at baseline and each month for one year. Also, if funds are available, additional tests could include quantitative RTPCR and PET scans of the prostate. PET scans of the prostate could be performed on selected patients at Beth Israel Medical Center in New York to determine tumor size. It would add greater evidence if reductions in PSA levels are accompanied by changes in tumor size as measured by PET.

The cost of the intervention is \$7,500 per patient for one year. Although twenty insurance companies are reimbursing 80-100% of this cost for patients with coronary heart disease, they would not reimburse this cost for patients with prostate cancer since the reversibility of prostate cancer has not yet been demonstrated. If we show that the progression of prostate cancer is reversible, then insurance companies may eventually cover this program, thereby making it more widely available to those who most need it.

The cost of this study would be $\$7,500/\text{patient} \times 25 \text{ patients} = \$187,500$ plus the cost of PSA tests. The PSA is approximately \$70/patient at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center. To perform this test on 50 patients at baseline and once/month for one year would be $\$70 \times 50 \text{ patients} \times 12 \text{ months} = \$42,000$. Also, 15% time would be budgeted for Dr. Fair and for me at \$22,500 each.

Thus, the total direct cost of this study would be \$274,500, plus indirect costs. Optional RTPCR and PET scans could be performed at additional cost if desired.

In summary, we have the opportunity to make medical history by conducting what may be a landmark study—the first to demonstrate that the progression of *any* type of cancer may be reversible. The implications of this finding may extend to other forms of cancer, e.g., breast cancer and colon cancer. This study could begin immediately, and we will begin generating data within only three months. Whatever we find, these data will be of great interest to many people. If we find that PSA levels decrease significantly when

compared with the randomized control group, these findings would give many people new hope and new choices.

This is to confirm that I am enthusiastic about a potential collaboration in patients with prostate cancer to investigate the role of intensive nutritional intervention plus the exercise, meditation and other stress reduction techniques you have found helpful in working with cardiac patients.

The patient population involved will be those men with documented prostate cancer but are untreated by virtue of adopting a "watchful waiting" strategy with monitoring by routine physical examination and serum PSA determinations. Thus, this study will not conflict, in any way, with the PINS study we plan with support from CaP CURE at the "Nutrition Summit" in Santa Monica. The PINS study will utilize patients with recurrent disease following radical prostatectomy.

The end point of the study in the watchful waiting group will be changes in PSA and clinical progression. Additionally, we will measure changes in micro-metastatic disease by quantitative RT-PCR (Reverse Transcriptase Polymerase chain reaction) to detect circulating tumor cells - a technique that enables the detection of 1 cancer cell in 1-10 million blood cells. We can also repeat biopsies in those men who have a significant drop in PSA to study histologic changes in the prostate.

Medical grads reminded to heed the patient's spirit

The Temple was sweltering, but the huge crowd inside barely seemed to notice. Row upon row, the guests and graduates sat serenely in the heat, swelling with pride.

They had come, many from far away, to celebrate what some couldn't believe they would ever live to see. Sons and daughters, sisters and brothers, husbands and wives, had done the impossible. They had completed medical school and earned one of the most coveted titles in America: Doctor.

It was a day for celebration.

But not undiluted celebration. Dr. Dean Ornish, the commencement speaker chosen by the 1996 graduates of the Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine, took care of that.

On the occasion of their graduation from medical school, Ornish figured, CWRU's newest class of doctors just might benefit from thinking about something deeper than the honor of being

doctors in a society that deifies doctors.

Not that Ornish is unacquainted with the flattery and fame and fortune so often bestowed on his profession. He is, after all, a celebrity doctor himself — a best-selling author on alternative approaches to treating heart disease, one of President Clinton's official physicians, and president of a preventive medicine institute in California.

But his achievements were not what Ornish wanted to dwell on Sunday.

What he wanted to talk about was the darkest period of his life — a time when success seemed as remote to him as suicide seemed logical.

It was when he was in college, surrounded by a slew of gifted students who had been No. 1 or No. 2 in their high school classes. Suddenly, while taking a course in organic chemistry with an especially tough professor, Ornish saw his confidence disappear.

He began to fear he would flunk the course, which he had to pass to get into medical school, thus ending his dream of becoming a doctor. Worse, he began to suspect that all of his previous academic successes had been accidents, and that he was really a fraud. Soon, he was sure, everyone would find him out.

And that wasn't all of it. As he grew more miserable and less able to sleep, he began to wonder what the point of life was anyway. He became convinced that even if he did somehow pull through and become a successful doctor with a beautiful wife, he would never really be satisfied. He would always think "Now what?" Or "So what?"

Finally, it occurred to him. If he doubted he would succeed, and was convinced he would be unhappy even if he did succeed, there was no good reason to continue suffering. And so he began making plans to kill himself.

Fortunately for Ornish, he had worked himself into such a state that he was stricken with mononucleosis before he could carry out his plans. By the time he recovered, he had run across a teacher of Eastern religion who had gotten his attention by preaching the virtue of finding happiness by looking inward for direction, instead of outward to other people's expectations. Worth a try, he figured. And it worked for him.

Sure, Ornish told his audience, it all sounds a little "new age," a little cliché. But what happened to him in college, he said, permanently changed his life and his approach to medicine.

What happened to him, he said, has made him notice how many of his patients suffer not only from clogged arteries and high cholesterol, but from something invisible — isolation, depression, loneliness — that contributes to their medical problems.

What happened to him, he said, has made him believe that a doctor's work is not complete if he treats only physical symptoms, without also listening for ailments of the soul that can cause physical symptoms.

A doctor who treats only physical symptoms, he pointed out, can do only so much for a patient who explains that he can't give up cigarettes — even though they're killing his lungs — because cigarettes are his best friend.

"The real epidemic in our culture isn't just physical heart disease," Ornish told the graduates. "It's what I call emotional or spiritual heart disease — the sense of loneliness and isolation and alienation that are so common in our culture. . . .

"So many people don't have a neighborhood that they were born and raised in, and that they still live in — or if they do, their neighbors have gone. They don't have a church or synagogue like this one that people go to regularly — or if they do, their fellow congregants aren't there. They don't have a job that they've been at for very long — or if they have, most of their fellow co-workers have moved on. Most people don't have an extended family, or in many cases even a nuclear family, that they see regularly."

It is no coincidence, Ornish said, that people who are lonely and isolated are three to five times more likely to die prematurely. And the diseases of the spirit that ail so many patients are particularly prevalent among doctors. The medical profession, Ornish noted, claims among the highest rates of divorce, drug addiction and suicide.

Quite a theme for a commencement address. But Ornish apparently knew his audience. Because the Class of '96 seemed to love it.

Like most professions, medicine isn't as secure these days as it used to be. Nor is it as profitable. But if Ornish has his way, the profession will at least have one thing it can always use more of: humility.

JOHN O'LEARY

John O'Leary, a partner with 22 years of experience handling complex litigation, leads the Environmental Litigation Team at Pierce Atwood, Maine's largest law firm.

Mr. O'Leary is a graduate of Yale College, holds a graduate degree from Cambridge University and is a graduate of Yale Law School.

A leader of the American bar, he currently serves, by appointment of the President of the American Bar Association, as Chair of the ABA's eleven member Standing Committee on Environmental Law charged with initiating environmental policy and coordinating environmental activities for the 360,000 member association. He also is Co-Chair of the Section of Litigation's Public Dialogue Task Force and serves as a member of the governing councils of both the Section of Litigation and the Section of Natural Resources, Energy and Environmental Law. He is a past Co-Chair of the Environment Litigation Committee of the ABA's Section of Litigation and is currently President of the Inter-American Bar Association's Committee on Natural Resources and Environmental Protection.

In his work leading the Public Dialogue Task Force, he has played the primary liaison role for the ABA on a joint venture with CBS News to produce an unprecedented documentary, to be aired nationally in a two-hour CBS Reports this fall, on actual jury deliberations in four criminal trials. He also is helping shape a joint ABA/Columbia School of Journalism symposium at the Alfred I du Pont Forum in New York City next winter on common issues of public trust confronting lawyers, journalists and public servants.
