## ***NEW DATA SHOW SMALLEST FIRMS ARE NATION'S GREATEST JOB CREATORS***

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** -- New data from the U.S. Bureau of the Census show that the nation's smallest firms -- with 0 to 4 employees -- created virtually all the new jobs between 1989 and 1991.

Tabulations prepared by the U.S. Small Business Administration's Office of Advocacy, based on the Census data, show that most of these jobs were created through expansions by businesses that are on average at least two years old. Firms were classified by their size in the base year, 1989.

SBA's Chief Counsel for Advocacy Jere Glover said, "These figures clearly show that micro businesses, not large businesses, create the jobs in our economy. And these are businesses that have staying power. They don't just start up and disappear."

The Advocacy analysis of industries -- services, wholesale and retail trade, agricultural services, mining, construction, manufacturing, transportation, and finance, insurance and real estate -- reveals that it was micro businesses that added employees -- 2.6 million -- while firms in most of the larger size categories lost workers (see chart).

Some key findings include:

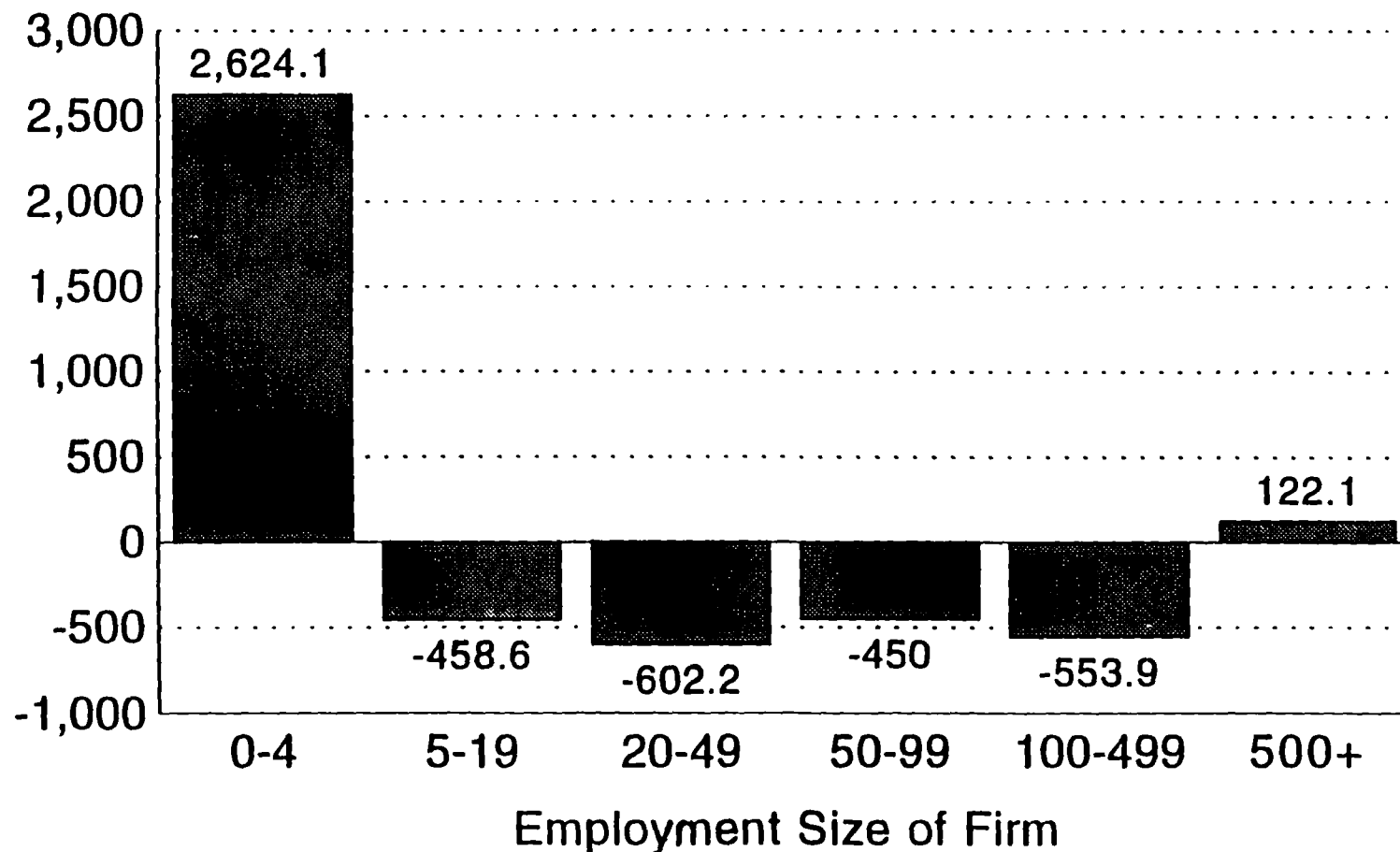
- o The smallest businesses (0-4 employees) created 2.6 million net new jobs. Large companies (500+ employees) created 122,000. All other business size classes lost jobs.
- o In manufacturing, only the smallest businesses (0-4 employees) added jobs.
- o The greatest growth was seen in the services industry. During the 1989-1991 period, the services sector added 1.9 million jobs. All but 475,000 came from small firms (those with fewer than 500 employees). Approximately 1.1 million came from firms with 0-4 employees.

Glover said, "The disturbing aspect of these new data is that all the other small business size categories -- those with between 5 and 499 employees -- showed net job losses during this period. Without the growth and expansion of the firms with 0 to 4 employees, the recession would have been much worse, and there could have been over 2 million more unemployed workers."
