Senator's colorful spouse visits

SUNRIVER — Candidly sharing her impressions of first ladies and queens, Antoinette Hatfield described her life as a U.S. senator's wife during a Sunriver Women's Club luncheon Tuesday.

"This isn't a speech, it's a visit," the wife of Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., told the crowd of about 150 gathered at the Great Hall at Sunriver Resort.

The former teacher, food columnist and cookbook author, who's also a real estate broker and Portland art gallery owner, avoided talking politics.

"There is only one vote on the floor, and it's his," she said of her husband. "I just didn't need to get involved in the issues. That is not politically correct today, but I'm too old to learn new tricks."

Hatfield, 72, a 26-year Senate veteran and former Oregon governor, hasn't announced if he'll run for a sixth term next year.

"You'll know 24 hours after I do," Antoinette Hatfield said. "I guess it's a well-known fact that I hope he doesn't. I think enough is enough. He doesn't have to try to break Strom Thurmond's record."

Thurmond, a Republican from South Carolina, has been a U.S. senator since 1964.

Antoinette Hatfield described presidents' wives she's known, including Barbara Bush — "She and I keep talking about having a chin lift" — and Pat Nixon — "She was very shy and withdrawn, but I think I'd be shy and withdrawn if a person said as many nasty things

about my husband as they said about hers."

Lady Bird Johnson had a "phenomenal memory," Rosalynn Carter was "very shy and mousy" but "blossomed" in the White House, and Nancy Reagan was complex but had "style that wouldn't end," Hatfield said.

She said Hillary Rodham Clinton is "a very bright and charming young woman and very caring and compassionate."

"I think she's at least raised the consciousness level of the United States to a degree that it might not have ever been had it not been for her," Hatfield said. "She is a part of a new generation and a new breed of woman, that she just does things differently."

"I've had a very interesting life with Mark Hatfield," Antoinette Hatfield said. "I've been very fortunate to have been married to a man who's kind and loving and generous, and who's dedicated."

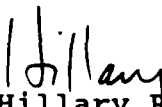

HATFIELD'S MEDICAL RESEARCH TRUST FUND INCORPORATED INTO GOP HEALTH PLAN

WASHINGTON D.C. — Senator Mark O. Hatfield (R-OR) joined a coalition of Senate Republicans today to unveil their health care reform plan and announced the inclusion of his own proposal to create a National Medical Research Trust Fund as part of the package.

Hatfield's victory with the Republicans marks the first formal endorsement of the role of medical research in comprehensive health care reform.

"Medical research is a central mechanism for controlling health care costs. After all, a cure is the ultimate cost control. Any comprehensive health care reform plan must include a strong research component and I am pleased that the Republican package includes such a stunning endorsement of medical research," said Senator Hatfield.

Senator Hatfield and Senator Tom Harkin (D-IA) announced their bipartisan effort to establish a National Medical Research Trust Fund earlier this year and immediately worked to attach it to the Republican package and the Clinton Administration's health care reform package.

Details of the Trust Fund are still evolving, but Hatfield's preference is to generate funds from a federal income tax checkoff option, similar to that which currently exists for the Presidential Campaign Fund.

Public opinion polls have shown massive support for making health research the number one Federal science priority. Polls have shown that Americans favor an investment in medical research by a 30 to 1 ratio when compared to weapons research.

"In the 1980's this country witnessed a massive military defense buildup," Hatfield noted. "In the 1990's, nothing short of a disease defense buildup will yield an improved quality of life for all Americans. As a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee for over twenty years, I know that the stability we need in medical research cannot be accomplished through the federal budget process. A dedicated funding source to increase annual appropriations is essential if we are to fulfill the hopes of millions of Americans suffering from disease and disability."

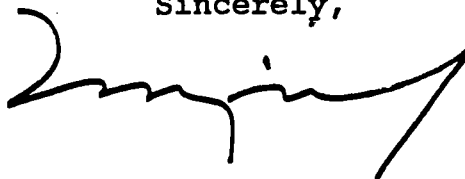

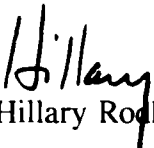
