b. Directors, The White House Endowment Fund. Directors of The Fund are elected for one-year terms by the Board of Directors of the Association. The By-Laws of The Fund authorize the election of not less than three nor more than 25 Directors. There is no provision in the By-Laws for Directors holding over. Customarily, Directors of The Fund are elected from among candidates suggested by the White House. No candidates have been proposed by the White House to date.

At its Annual Meeting in January 1993, the Association elected 19 Directors to the Board of The Endowment Fund. A survey of the current members of that Board made in July 1993 indicated that six of the current Directors are willing to continue to serve. In accordance with the results of that survey, the Nominating Committee nominated the following as Directors of The White House Endowment Fund for one-year terms: Mrs. Earle M. Craig, Jr., Mrs. Graham Gund, George B. Hartzog, Jr., Roger Horchow, Frederick A. Melhado, and Alfred R. Stern.

A motion was made and seconded to elect these six Directors to terms ending January 1995. The motion passed.

SUBJECT: ENDOWMENT FOR JACQUELINE KENNEDY AND PAT NIXON

After meeting with members of the White House Historical Association, I am skeptical that the Appropriations Committee would fund their proposed endowment for Jacqueline Kennedy and Pat Nixon due to the current political climate.

I would advise the White House Historical Association to first seek private funding for this endowment. It would be unlikely for Congress to appropriate funds until it is apparent that this need could not be met with private funds.

If the WH Historical Association does decide to pursue this with the Appropriations Committee, the subcommittee with jurisdiction is Treasury and Postal. In the Senate they should deal with Senator Bond and Senator Bob Kerrey. In the House they should deal with Rep. Lightfoot and Rep. Hoyer. I do not know if any of these Members would be inclined to help on this one.

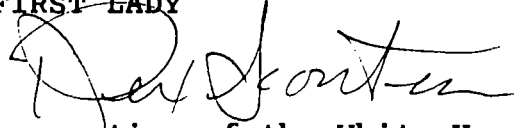

I talked with George Hartzog and he suggested we get together right after the holidays. We can also talk about possible Board nominations at the same time. He was booked up the week of December 19.

We did discuss one matter which relates to Dottie Craig. He said if we hope to have any chance in getting the \$10 million appropriation, Senator Dole will have to be a key player. He was one who said that he could support the idea if the children approved. Of course, things are different in Congress now. George said that the Craigs are very close friends and supporters of Dole. George is right that we would be foolish to ask her to leave if we and the Administration wants the appropriation. She wouldn't have to do anything but make that contact since she feels she has exhausted her funding sources.

Another key player on the House side will be Ralph Regula. Both Rex and I can help with that. Rex is a good friend of his and I am from Regula's district in Ohio. In fact, my mother is an election worker for him. I have dealt with him in environmental matters at Mount Vernon too. Hopefully, he will be the chairman of the House Interior Appropriations Subcommittee.

Do you think you can talk to Maggie about the situation with Dottie? It would be good to know if they would support the appropriation and be flexible enough to let Dottie help out.

I am writing to follow up on our conversation of yesterday regarding the idea of you and Walter hosting a dinner for the First Lady and, possibly the President, some time this winter in Palm Springs.

As I believe I mentioned, the First Lady is very much involved in raising funds for The White House Endowment Fund. RE: Meeting with Rex Scouten about Endowment

Bitsey and I met with Rex to go over several questions about procedures with the White House and recognition of donors.

1. Rex is very happy to give private tours to prospective donors. A small group of four to six is best but he can give tours for up to twenty. Tours have to be given in the afternoon and only when the First Family is not using the public floors.
2. Rex will develop a list of artists or regions of artists not currently represented in the collection. He noted there are no Black artists represented nor Blacks featured in any paintings at this time. The policy about only accepting works of deceased artists can always be waived for situations like this.
3. Every administration usually has a reception each year for donors to the White House. This should include Endowment donors too.
4. Rex thinks it would be fine to plan to have a reception for Endowment Fund donors in conjunction with the completion of the Blue Room. This is important since it will be the first major project using the Fund's contributions.
5. Rex likes the idea of a donors book in the East Wing reception room. He also thought a computer disc would be helpful to assist people wanting to find out about gifts by specific people. This issue needs to be taken up with the First Lady's office.
6. The Committee for the Preservation of the White House gives a certificate signed by the First Lady for gifts to the White House. The same type of thing can be done by the Endowment Fund for its donors.
7. The entire issue of thank you's and recognition for new donors to the Fund needs to be discussed with the First Lady's Office. Rex is willing to arrange such a meeting. Other possible forms of recognition include signed photographs by the President and/or First Lady, thank you letters etc. We need to develop a proposal for what we would like them to do before we meet.

8. Bitsey asked Rex if he could get her a list of the original donors during Mrs. Kennedy's campaign. He said he would.

9. The Blue Room is to be done by late January or early February. It would be smart to wait to print a new brochure until a picture can be taken, again because this is the first tangible results of the Endowment Fund.

10. Bitsey brought up the idea of honoring the memory of Mrs. Kennedy and her involvement in establishing the White House Historical Association and the vision to create a White House collection and preserve the public rooms through a reception. This could provide a link to the original donors and introduce them to the Endowment.

I am so pleased that you and Susan Thomases came to see me Wednesday. It is gratifying to know that you will be our primary contact in the First Lady's office. I know I will enjoy the opportunity to work with you and will call in several weeks to take you up on your offer to meet with others in the office on a quick tour.

I did some research into the status of The White House Endowment Fund after our discussion about its status. Mr. Meyer wrote to Ms. Williams last January before the election of Directors at the Association's Annual Meeting. I have enclosed a copy of that correspondence and the enclosures. At the Annual Meeting, the Board of the Association elected six of the Directors of The Endowment Fund from among those elected in 1993 who indicated a willingness to continue to serve. This election kept in place a constituted Board with Mrs. Craig continuing to serve as Chairman pending selection of a new Chairman. Then in April, Susan Thomases and Paul Prosperi were elected to one-year terms on The Endowment Fund's Board with Susan also being elected for a four-year term as one of the two representatives from The Fund's Board to the Association. The other position will be held for a new Fund Board Chairman.

To make a long story short, The Fund's Board of Directors presently has eight elected members for 1994 with up to seventeen positions available to fill.

Dear Maggie:

This refers to our telephone conversation on Friday, January 7, 1994, with reference to the election of Directors to the Board of The White House Endowment Fund. As I informed you at that time, the Board of The Fund is composed of directors who are elected by the Board of Directors of the Association for terms of one year. The terms of current Fund Board members terminate with the meeting of the Association Board this January 26. The Association's Nominating Committee is chaired by Mr. George Hartzog. That committee should have some indication of any suggestions of your office in this matter in time for the committee to consider nominations and prepare its report prior to the January 26 meeting.

The By-Laws of The Fund provide for a Board composed of no less than three nor more than twenty-five directors. At present the Board has nineteen. There are enclosed for your convenience two lists. One has the names and addresses of the present members of The Fund Board. The other indicates the response of each member with respect to staying on the Board for another term.

Please note that Fund Directors George Hartzog and Alfred Stern are members of the Association's Board and were put on The Fund Board to represent the interests of the Association. By the same token, Fund Directors Dorothy Craig and Roger Horchow were elected to the Association's Board. Their 4-year terms on the Association Board terminate with the Association's January 26 meeting. If they are to be dropped from The Fund's Board, there is little likelihood they will be reelected to the Association's Board since their spots would probably go to two members of the new Fund Board.

I hope it will be helpful if I review some of the points we discussed:

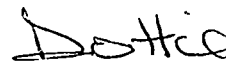
1. Do not delay in initiating the fund-raising - post-election euphoria can be a significant factor.
2. Board composition:
 - a) the chairman should be a person of stature and wealth; it is best if he/she lives within easy access of Washington; he/she should be able to pledge a gift in high six figures or a million dollars;
 - b) members - also persons of stature and wealth - geographic and occupational diversity is helpful;
 - c) a list of suggested new members was sent by our office to your office in May '93;
 - d) it is not essential, but would be good, if the new board composition were truly bipartisan - Ambassador Robert Strauss lent his name to our Board, the only Democrat of those asked who would support the effort (he did not contribute);
3. Of the approximately \$12,500,000 left to be raised, theoretically one-third of the goal should come from within the Board.

4. Paul Reber has been our sole employee-extraordinaire since the establishment of the Endowment Fund (and previously as one of the employees of the original White House Preservation Fund). Paul will be happy to confer with the appropriate individual when Mrs. Clinton organizes her fund-raising effort. I respectfully suggest that his input will be very helpful.
5. If I can be of any help now or in the future, I hope that you will call on me.

My husband and I are looking forward to being at the White House with President and Mrs. Clinton this coming Wednesday, September 29th; perhaps you and I shall have a chance to meet then.

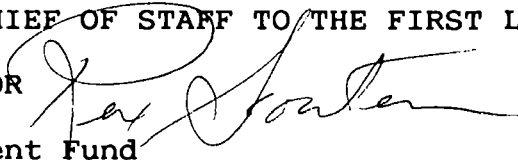

The goal of the Endowment Fund at this stage is to raise approximately \$13,000,000, which combined with the approximate \$12,000,000 already raised would establish a \$25,000,000 Trust. The Endowment Fund Board would then be dissolved and the White House Historical Association would administer the Trust.

Income from the Trust will be used to insure the permanent conservation and preservation of the public rooms of the White House and for acquisitions on behalf of the permanent collection.

The Endowment Fund is currently inactive. The Fund is awaiting a recommendation from the administration (Mrs. Clinton) for the Chairman of the Board position.

I suggest that the nominee for Chairman first meet with George Hartzog and Alfred Stern to insure a full understanding of the Endowment Fund responsibilities.

Messrs. Hartzog and Stern are Board members of the parent organization, the White House Historical Association, who serve on the Endowment Fund where they act as "overseers" of the Endowment Fund activities.

Dear Mrs. Clinton:

As the current Chairman of The White House Endowment Fund, I am pleased to have this opportunity to write to you about the Fund and to request your support of the Fund's program.

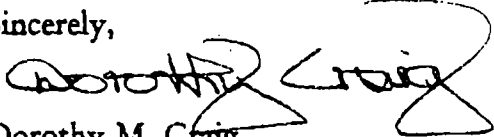
The Endowment Fund was formed in January 1990 as a wholly-owned subsidiary of the White House Historical Association. Its purpose is to raise a \$25 million endowment, the income from which is to be used for the perpetual care of the public rooms of the White House, the conservation of its collection of fine and decorative art, and the acquisition of appropriate additions to the collection. Adequate Federal funding for these purposes has never been available.

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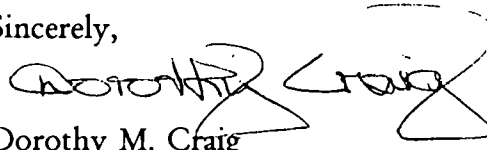
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
