Qs & As on Detroit Newspaper Strikers

Q: What is the Administration's position on the Detroit newspaper strike?

A: First, the President would like the parties to come back to the table and stay there until an agreement is reached. And, most of all, he would like for everyone to get back to work.

I can't comment on the specific issues involved here. I know there are federal mediators who have been involved who are available to continue meeting with the parties to try to bring a resolution to the dispute.

As you know, the President has fought to ban the use of permanent replacement workers -- through supporting legislation and through his executive order on striker replacements. The use of permanent replacement workers prolongs strikes and is counterproductive. That's why the President and his administration will continue to fight against the use of permanent striker replacements.

Q: Why are you meeting with just strikers and not owners?

A: The federal mediators have been meeting with both sides and continue to be available to meet with any of the parties. [I'm participating in this meeting as part of my visit to the Communication Workers of America's Convention.]

Q: Are you taking sides in the dispute?

A: It would not be helpful for the Administration to take sides, but I know the President hopes the dispute is resolved as soon as possible.

Q: Do you support the strike?

A: The President believes that collective bargaining is a right and not a privilege. And that includes the right of workers to strike.

I don't know all the issues involved in this strike. That's why the federal mediators are involved.

Q: What is the White House policy regarding the strike?

A: The White House has a policy of not crossing picket lines. The reason for this is to avoid injecting the federal government into ongoing labor disputes.

[The White House also does not offer exclusive interviews or special access to reporters from the Detroit papers. Reporters from those newspapers are not able to participate in press pools. The administration does, however, answer reporters questions if they call our press office, and we do not attempt to keep them out of open events.]

Some Detroit Media Just Aren't Welcome at the CWA Convention

Here's Who and Here's Why

Fox TV2 -- WJBK Detroit

Some 80 workers at Fox TV2, members of NABET/CWA Local 43, have been trying to get a fair contract since January. But management there doesn't seem interested in fairness; the fact that it brought in union-busting consultant King and Ballou sends that message loud and clear. So far, the station has rejected the union's proposals in just about every area and has mounted an attack on wages and job security.

The station management is demanding a one-sided merit pay system. It would set all the rules for performance evaluations, and none of its decisions could be taken to arbitration. NABET-CWA Local 43 offered an alternative evaluation proposal; management wouldn't consider it.

Fox TV2 wants to take away workers' transfer rights between job groups and also wants to completely eliminate any jurisdiction for a new job in the industry, nonlinear editing. CWA/NABET Local 43 has called for a training program for this new work, as well as additional training for existing jobs. But the company, which has done almost nothing in terms of training, again says no. Fox TV2 is trying to bring in even more part-time workers and believes it can override seniority rights in some areas.

Detroit News and Detroit Free Press

Since July 1995, more than 2,000 workers -- members of CWA, the Newspaper Guild, Graphic Communications Union and the Teamsters -- have been on strike at the papers. Their fight for a fair contract has been taken on by the entire labor movement.

The papers apparently believe they owe more to the scabs brought in for a few months' work as opposed to the dedicated workers who built the papers' readership and reputations. The newspapers and their parent companies, Gannett and Knight-Ridder, are refusing to rehire all the strikers.

CWA members will show their support for their Detroit brothers and sisters in a march and rally on Tuesday, June 11, following the afternoon session, past the Free Press to the front of the News building.

MEETING WITH STRIKING DETROIT NEWSPAPER WORKERS

DATE: June 10, 1996

I. PURPOSE

To meet with striking Detroit newspaper workers to demonstrate the Administration's support for them.

II. BACKGROUND

Since July 13, 1995, approximately 2,000 employees of the *Detroit News* and the *Detroit Free Press* have been on strike. Both papers have continued to publish, using managers, replacement workers, and employees who have crossed the picket line (approximately 500 strikers have returned to work). Knight Ridder, which owns the *Detroit Free Press*, and Gannett, which owns the *Detroit News*, jointly own the Detroit Newspaper Agency, which publishes the two papers under a joint operating agreement.

The unions involved are:

Teamsters: 1,500 drivers and mailroom employees
Newspaper Guild: 600 reporters, editors, and photographers
Graphic Communications Union: 330 pressman and engravers
Communications Workers of America: 110 typographical employees

The owners have announced that the striking workers have been permanently replaced, and this remains the major stumbling block to a settlement.

At its February Executive Council meeting, the AFL-CIO called for a boycott by advertisers, subscribers and distributors of *USA Today* (Gannett) and the *Miami Herald* (Knight Ridder). The unions have also asked Attorney General Reno to revoke the Detroit Newspaper Agency's antitrust immunity.

Contract Issues and Status of Talks

In 1992, when both papers were losing money, the unions agreed to significant job cuts and a three year wage freeze. By 1994, the papers had returned to profitability, posting a joint profit of \$56 million. But in 1995, the companies demanded additional job cuts (30% of the teamster jobs), a 32% increase in health care premiums, and weakened job security and seniority protections.

There have been sporadic talks but no progress has been announced by any of the parties. The company has rejected an offer by the unions to return to work pending binding arbitration of outstanding issues.

On April 11, the NLRB issued a fourth consolidated unfair labor practice complaint against Detroit Newspapers for bad faith bargaining and for making unilateral changes in working conditions. On April 8, the NLRB issued a consolidated complaint against the union for picket line misconduct. On April 19, management declared an impasse and imposed its final contract offer.

The Administration has demonstrated its support of the striking workers by turning down several invitation for interviews with *USA Today* (Gannett) and pulling out of several scheduled interviews with replacement reporters.

Following the convention recess on Tuesday, June 11, CWA members and convention delegates (approximately 3,000 people) will march past the *Detroit Free Press* to a rally in front of the *Detroit News*, standing with some 2,000 union members who have been on strike.

[There will be no press at this meeting. You do not need to make any formal remarks -- just to let them know you and the President support them, to listen, and to promise to report back on your conversation with them to the President.]

- The President and I have great concern for you and your families. I know this strike is taking an enormous toll.
- The President and his Administration firmly support your collective bargaining rights and right to strike. The President has fought for legislation and signed an executive order on this issue. He has directed the Department of Justice to do everything it can to reverse a court case that overturned his executive order.
- The Administration is doing its best to respect your boycott.
