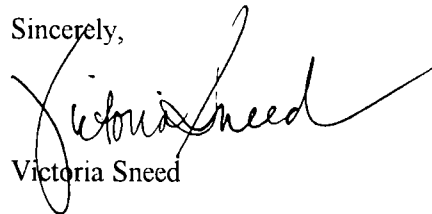
Dear Ms. Williams:

TELEVISION SHOW CHANGES THE IMAGE OF THE HIP HOP GENERATION

Youth of today are often seen wearing the latest rap song or hanging out on the corner sporting the unge look. Well look again: one broadcast is changing all of that—complete with professional attire and articulate language generally associated with young professionals in corporate America.

Excellence By Choice (EBC), a television show for college-bound students, is the half-hour cable television talkshow hosted by a strict of Columbia high school students. The three-year-old program features many of the higher education and career opportunities for our youth today. Their guest list reads like a "Who's Who," including representatives from colleges and universities, federal and local government agencies, corporate and private sectors, and other educational advocates.

EBC's cablecast has achieved

international acclaim and commendations from educators and public officials. Considered by many professionals as a program that exhibits high educational television standards, the production has been shown in New York, Philadelphia, Dallas, and Virginia Beach. The weekly program is produced by volunteers and concerned citizens without funding or media attention.

The project has been done with the cooperation of the District of Columbia Public Schools—Channel 28, National Association for Equal Opportunity in Higher Education, *Black Excellence* Magazine, Washington Parent Group Fund, Executive Office of the Mayor, Office of Policy and Evaluation, and the most recent cosponsor to join forces: The American Council on Education—Office of Minorities in Higher Education.

cluding Georgetown and Howard universities.

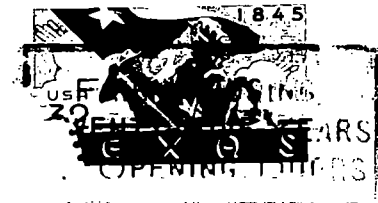

On Tuesday, September 19, I am hosting a private reception for the Women's Leadership Forum (WLF) of the Democratic National Committee. The reception will be held in my home at 2030 16th Street, NW, from 6:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

While at The White House, I had the privilege of serving as an advisor in the formation and development of the group, and now that I have returned to the private sector, have become active in its continued growth.

The WLF is a strong new force within the DNC. Founded in 1993, the group is a program for political activism and fundraising that has created new opportunities for women leaders in business, the arts and community service to participate in the leadership of the Democratic Party at the national level. The result is a new definition of networking and power sharing. The WLF now boasts a membership of over 700 women across the nation and has had tremendous success over the past year establishing task force issue groups, monthly briefings and regional chapters.

Tipper Gore serves as the group's Honorary Chair and has committed an extraordinary amount of time to strengthening the organization. Other notable members include comedian Whoopi Goldberg, Maidenform Chairwoman Elizabeth Coleman, fashion designer Susie Tompkins and fashion model Veronica Webb.

As the 1996 political cycle kicks into gear, it is important that women take a lead role in the election process and in who we send to Washington, DC. The Clinton Administration firmly believes that women will be a key factor in next year's elections and that we will provide the margin of victory. Women and families are in serious risk of losing most of the gains incurred over the last 20 years.
