AIDS activists with ACT UP Washington derided President Clinton's latest

"I feel you pain' announcement for a vaccine to prevent new AIDS

infections as an empty public relations ploy with no funding attached.

Clinton, who promised back in his 1992 campaign an all-out research effort

to find a cure for AIDS based on the Manhattan Project, has come under

fire from AIDS activists for offering only lip-service on his promises to

combat the AIDS epidemic.

Cure for AIDS abandoned!

Vaccines that that stop the progression of the disease, therapeutic

vaccines, and the notion of an AIDS cure have been abandoned by Clinton in

favor of preventive vaccines. "This President have just written off the

lives of those of us already infected,he is abandoning efforts to find an

AIDS cure," states ACT UP Washington spokesperson Steve Michael, who is HIV positive.

More than two million Americans are currently infected with HIV, and AIDS has become America's leading killer among people between the ages of 25-44. Apollo Project for a Cure!!!

States ACT UP New York member Ann Northrop, "This is utter nonsense. It's a smokescreen. Scientists have told us for years that a preventative vaccine is virtually impossible. If Clinton is serious about helping people with AIDS and preventing new infections he should launch an Apollo Project for a Cure and he should release federal funds for needle exchange." Northrop was also the vice-presidential candidate of the AIDS Cure Party in 1996. Bill Clinton has shuffled a couple a dozen employees in his phoney war on AIDS"

"Great American presidents have mobilized resources in times of national crisis. Bill Clinton has shuffled a couple a dozen employees in his phoney war on AIDS" states Wayne Turner, spokesperson with ACT UP Washington.

Adds Steve Michael, "We can't even get protease inhibitors to people with AIDS in DC. How are we ever going to be able to deliver a vaccine world-wide. How are we going to save the lives of those already infected?"

AIDS activists have long demanded a coordinated AIDS research effort to

develop an AIDS cure. Yet there is no coordination among researchers within the agencies at the National Institutes of Health, the Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of Defense, University research centers, and the private sectors.

Notes Michael, "This is nothing more than another 'unfunded mandate.' It takes money to hire researchers and build new labs."

Clinton-era increases do not match the increase in caseload---they don't even match AIDS funding increases in the Bush years.

Concludes Michael, "Clinton claims increases in US AIDS spending. Facts prove him wrong. Clinton-era increases do not match the increase in caseload---they don't even match AIDS funding increases in the Bush years. This president is still playing politics with our lives. He invokes the image of President Kennedy's bold initiative to land a man on the moon, yet refuses to back up his plan with real coordination or money."

Michael was the presidential candidate of the AIDS Cure Party in 1996.

During that election Michael and Northrop ran a series of television commercials including one that focused on the need for an Apollo-style Project to Cure AIDS. The ads challenged Clinton to declare war on AIDS.

The Human Rights Campaign, working with D.C. Lesbian and Gay Parents Coalition, the D.C. Log Cabin Republicans, and the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, have been lobbying hard to fully fund the District of Columbia's domestic partnership law.

The irresponsible and reckless charge -- contained in a recent E-mail sent out by Wayne Turner and Steve Michael -- that HRC tried to convince Sen. Barbara Boxer not to introduce an amendment to fund D.C.'s domestic partnership law is completely false.

As it currently stands, the Senate D.C. Appropriations subcommittee has marked up its bill, and the House D.C. Appropriations subcommittee has marked up its bill. In regard to gay and lesbian issues, the two bills are similar: As in previous years, the D.C. domestic partnership law has not been funded, but efforts to repeal it were not successful either. In addition, HRC, again, working with our partners, headed off mean-spirited attempts to ban lesbian and gay people from adopting children.

HRC will continue to press for full funding of the D.C. domestic partner law and continue to fight legislative attacks against our community. For reasons that are not clear to us, Turner and Michael have misrepresented the truth.

Subject: Response to ACT UP Washington

As president of the Gay and Lesbian Activists Alliance of Washington, DC (GLAA), I would like to respond to the false recent charges made by ACT UP Washington against the Human Rights Campaign (HRC). GLAA actually organized the coalition that successfully pushed Washington D.C.'s Domestic Partnership bill through to passage in 1992, so we know something about it.

ACT UP Washington has charged that HRC did not contact "any of the organizations that are working on this issue at the local, grassroots level." This is not true. HRC has been coordinating its strategy on DC Appropriations issues with local groups for several years, from nonpartisan groups like GLAA to both Democrats and Republicans (and the Capital Area chapter of Log Cabin has been particularly helpful in dealing with congressional Republicans). On the other hand, ACT UP Washington launched its action alert and attack on HRC last week entirely on its own,

without having consulted or coordinated with the local groups who have been working on Domestic Partnerships and DC Appropriations. In other words, ACT UP Washington did not practice what it preached, and rushed into an ill-considered action.

ACT UP Washington claimed that D.C. Congressional Delegate Eleanor Holmes Norton has asked Sen. Barbara Boxer to introduce an amendment to allow the District to use its own funds to implement its Domestic Partnership (DP) law. Norton has in fact done no such thing, because she checked with local groups first, and everyone except ACT UP Washington agrees that no amendment should be sought by our side at this time.

All of us, ACT UP Washington included, are in general agreement on the merits of the issue. Our differences concern strategy. Believe it or not, everyone who disagrees with ACT UP is not a sellout. Some of us, however, do believe in picking our fights a bit more carefully.

This is simply not true, nor does the demagoguery of ACT UP Washington (a latecomer to this issue) make them any more representative of the citizens in question than anyone else. HRC and the local groups that have been working on this issue are in consensus that it makes no sense to push an amendment for which we don't have the votes -- especially when we are trying to stop amendments to appropriations bills, not invite even more from our enemies by introducing our own. With HRC's help, we have had a remarkable degree of success in the past few years in blocking obnoxious amendments (including attempts by Rep. Jay Dickey (R-Arkansas) to prohibit adoptions by unmarried partners); HRC deserves our thanks and respect for this, not denunciations for their failure to fight to the death on DP. If "inside baseball" is not the only valid approach to activism, we should nonetheless be glad that someone is committed to doing it year in and year out as HRC has done.

Second: Before sending one's forces into battle, it's generally a good idea to make sure that they are well prepared (and well coordinated; "every man for himself" is not much of a strategy). To say that we expect to be defeated but that we insist on a vote anyway is self-indulgent and politically naive. In the words of a colleague who is a well-informed, openly gay Hill staffer, "offering an amendment with little support doesn't help us and would in fact kill off any chance of changing this situation on the committee level in future years. Admittedly, changing it in committee is an uphill battle as it is."

It is true that HRC is placing its emphasis -- including with its online action center -- on the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA). While I may disagree at times with their priorities or political judgments, I can only applaud their sustained focus on this pro-gay legislation that is widely considered to have the best chance (such as it is) of passage in the near term. ACT UP Washington's activism-by-press-release, with its almost daily changes in focus and direction, makes one question whether they are more concerned with getting attention than with getting

something done. Of course, even the attention-getting diminishes as more and more people grow tired of the same self-indulgent, disruptive tactics. Yelling in the street and getting arrested may have their place, but they are no substitutes for a practical strategy that includes legislation, litigation, and persuasion. (And by the way, getting attention is not the same as winning people over.)

The struggle here in the District of Columbia for DP and other equal rights is a long-term one, and ACT UP Washington's angry, self-righteous bomb-throwing is only destructive of our coalition efforts. (Speaking of long-term struggles, GLAA's credibility is backed up by a 26-year record of achievement. You can check out GLAA's history online at <http://www.glaa.org/timeline.html>) By all means, let's have constructive criticism where it is due, but let's also keep in mind who our true enemies are. In this case, the charges against HRC are simply not true. If ACT UP Washington wants to know why so many people avoid dealing with them, they should take a good look at their own behavior in this case.

Those in the U.S. who want to help defend the gay men and lesbians of the nation's capital from congressional homophobia should (1) urge their own representatives and senators to oppose congressional interference in purely local D.C. policy matters where there is no compelling federal interest, and to speak out in Congress against the bigotry of Rep. Charles Taylor (R-North Carolina) and others; and (2) work to defeat homophobic members of Congress, whether they be Democrats or Republicans. We hasten to point out, however, that the incompetence of

the District government (under the leadership of Mayor Marion Barry, who was endorsed by the leaders of ACT UP Washington) has been far more disastrous on an ongoing basis for people with AIDS and others in the District than any other single factor. There is nothing more disempowering than to blame one's self-inflicted wounds on others.

CU Rescinds Award Because of Actor's Link to ACT-UP

Action Against TV's Joseph Sicari Stirs Angry Calls From Alumni and Debate
on Campus

After graduating from Catholic University in 1956, Joseph R. Sicari
embarked on an acting career that took him from Broadway to Hollywood,

with roles in such musicals as "Dames at Sea" and appearances on "NYPD Blue," "Seinfeld" and other television shows. This spring, he was thrilled to learn that he had been selected to receive the school's 1997 Alumni Achievement Award in the field of performing arts.

But when the awards are presented tonight, Sicari won't be there. The university rescinded his prize last week, citing his involvement with ACT-UP, a militant AIDS activist group. The withdrawal of the award has sparked a slew of angry phone calls from alumni, prompted Sicari to threaten a lawsuit and renewed debate on campus about social activism, AIDS, homophobia and respect for religion.

After being chosen for the award, Sicari submitted a curriculum vitae so officials could compile a brief biography for the award program. On it, Sicari, 62, said he was a "founding member" of ACT-UP, known for its dogged and some would say combative activism on AIDS issues.

No one objected, Sicari said, until this month, when he was told by Brother Patrick Ellis, president of the university, that ACT-UP and abortion rights protesters had attacked St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York in December 1989, chanting and chaining themselves to pews during Mass. More than 100 demonstrators were arrested.

Sicari, who is gay, said he told Ellis and other school officials that he was not active in the group at that time and that he had never heard of the incident, much less taken part in it. As one of several hundred "founding members" of ACT-UP, he said, he condemned such tactics and had

worked peacefully through the organization to establish hospices, end discrimination and increase AIDS funding.

But Ellis, Sicari said, told him the award was being revoked because Catholic University has benefactors who are very much "to the right" and honoring an ACT-UP supporter might affect contributions. "It's another case of homophobia rearing its ugly head," Sicari said. "But I was taught you stand up for what you believe in. My entire religious upbringing was a call to action."

The award, the school said in a statement, "is not being granted because of the individual's involvement with the founding of and connection to an organization whose actions and activities are inconsistent with the university's mission and sponsorship." John R. Looney, national president of the university's alumni association, said the matter had been referred to attorneys and refused to comment.

Sicari, saying the revocation besmirched his name and cost him travel and other expenses, is demanding reinstatement of the award and a formal apology.

News of the revocation has angered many alumni, who called Ellis's office and the Drama Department to complain.

"We're all upset and hurt. It's just kind of bewildering," said Shannon Randolph, a 1958 graduate who was among a group that had planned to come from New York to see Sicari receive his award. "I spoke with Brother

Patrick. . . . He was very concerned about money being withdrawn."

Gitta Honegger, who heads the university's Drama Department, called it "sad" that Sicari was seen as representing ACT-UP. "To us," she said, "he is a professional and a role model. Our students can learn from him."

Steve Michael, a committee chairman for D.C. ACT-UP, said his group plans to show up at tonight's awards to voice its displeasure.

"The Catholic Church has no room to be critical," Michael said. "The church should be giving us an award. We forced people to think about the church's stance on AIDS."

Gays to march for pride, fight for human rights

The Miami Pride Committee has a message for Dade's gay community and the county's politicians: It's time to wake up. And to try to make that happen, gays, lesbians and bisexuals will march through downtown Miami on Sunday, demanding that Metro-Dade commissioners pass a human-rights ordinance.

"It's my dream that this event is the birth of the revival, a coming together for a first rise," said parade co-organizer Carlos Perez. "Awaken Miami."

Said Miami Pride chairman Howard Whitfield: "The parade will have a tremendous effect on everybody -- show just how many people we are. If politicians want to see votes, they see votes."

Whitfield, Perez and co-organizer Eduardo Aparicio hope thousands rally for the march -- the first in Miami in at least a decade. It begins at noon on Brickell Avenue at Southeast Sixth Street and will head north on Biscayne Boulevard to Bayfront Park, at Northeast Third Street. There, lesbian activist Candace Gingrich (half-sister of Newt) will speak.

"This little parade is important. People will go back to their homes with an energy. They'll bring a pride that goes back to their neighbors, the bosses," said Perez, 31, of Miami. "This is our city. We are full-fledged citizens of this city and county we call home, and we deserve protection under the law."

New vitality

Dade's gay community recently has shown new signs of vitality, said Dennis Delia, president of Broward's GUARD, Gays United Against Repression and Discrimination.

"Ten years ago, nobody around here cared," said Delia, 42. "But a lot of new blood is coming into town. They know what happened here in 1977, but they're not burned out." In 1977, singer Anita Bryant led a vitriolic campaign that rescinded Dade's newly passed gay-rights ordinance, helped birth the nation's conservative Christian movement, and crushed morale for Dade gays and lesbians.

Exactly 20 years later, the Metro-Dade Commission rejected on first reading a new version of the ordinance, infuriating local gays and lesbians and sparking the new activism.

"That was the match," said Delia, whose group is organizing security for Sunday's parade. "They just needed a kick in the butt."

Broward, Palm Beach and Monroe counties have already adopted human-rights ordinances. Whitfield said the key to organizing Dade's gay community is putting together an "inclusive and diverse coalition" that will stand, and march, together.

Unity essential

"All races, all colors," said Whitfield, 40, who is black. Unity is

essential because gays and lesbians, regardless of color or ethnicity, are subject to bigotry, he said.

Four grand marshals will lead the parade: Dennis Leyva, a Cuban American active in gay and Miami Beach politics; Dade County Judge Victoria S. Sigler, a white non-Hispanic who became the county's first openly lesbian judge; the Rev. Marilyn Usher, a nongay black minister from Greater Bethel AME Church; and Terri Over, a white non-Hispanic woman who is youth coordinator for Project Yes, a Dade organization that works with gay teens and young adults.

"I'm glad to be a part of it to represent our youth," Over said. "It's going to give the city and surrounding areas an idea of how many we really are. We're not a 10-person cult trying to take over your kids. We're normal people who have jobs and have pride in themselves."

Parade organizers, who have raised more than \$20,000, hope gays from all over South Florida come out for the event -- literally.

"It's important to participate, so people can see the different faces of gayness," said Manuel Laureano-Vega, 41, of Miami, who plans to march.

"People are stuck on stereotypes . . . the dizzy little queen. But some of the most prominent people in this town are gay."

Group says shop's T-shirts are anti-gay

Pickers marched in front of Fun N Sun carrying signs that read 'Make the

BALBOA PENINSULA -- Protesters picketed a Balboa Peninsula store
Friday, saying T-shirts in a display window are anti-gay and pro-drug.
; ; ; ; ;The group carried signs that read "Make the Fun Zone Hate Free" and
urged customers not to patronize the shop, which they called a blight on
the community. ; ; ; ; ;The most vocal of the protesters was Delores
Cantarella, 48, a Balboa resident and self-described "lesbian feminist
Marxist" who said she sees the T-shirts every time she passes the store,
Fun N Sun. ; ; ; ; ;"Mostly my endeavor here is for education, and a
political exercise in free speech," Barnes said. ; ; ; ; ;The shirts are "not
just smut or filth, [but] political propaganda that promotes hatred of
homosexuals," she said. ; ; ; ; ;Cantarella said she and her partner, Joyce
Barnes, 61, went into the store Thursday and asked manager Richard
Tulsiani to move the T-shirts out of the window and put them inside the
store. ; ; ; ; ;Cantarella and Barnes said Tulsiani used an anti-gay epithet

and kicked them out of the store. ; ; ; ; ;Tulsiani admitted throwing them out of the store but denied using the epithet. ; ; ; ; ;Though the picketers did not seem to number more than four or five at any one time, small crowds gathered to listen periodically as the protest continued through the morning. ; ; ; ; ;Among the T-shirts protesters called offensive was one that displayed a smoking joint alongside the phrase, "Why go to high school when you can go to school high?" "I'd like for him to take several T-shirts out of the window and sell them inside and put out a sign that says, 'Adult T-shirts inside,'" Barnes said. "That's all I'd like him to do." Tulsiani said he has no plans to remove the shirts. ; ; ; ; ;"I'm just a retailer," Tulsiani said. "If they are that much against [the T-shirts], go to the manufacturer. I can't make everybody happy." He added: "I'm just a businessman. Whatever sells, I sell. So far it's legal. ... If you don't like my shirts, don't shop in my store." Dayna Pettit, the founder and past president of the Balboa Merchants/ Owners Association, said she and other locals have tried for years to induce Tulsiani to pull the shirts from the window. ; ; ; ; ;"It's a kind of a sore issue with a lot of people," she said. "There have been people come down and protest, but Richard doesn't mind, because it just helps him to sell more shirts." Deputy City Attorney Daniel Ohl said the T- shirts may be in bad taste, but there is nothing in the city codes to prohibit them. ; ; ; ; ;"They seem to give pretty broad protection under the First Amendment to that stuff," he said.

****Note to the media[from John Riley, ACT UP/NY],** The following is an eye witness account of the the massive political funeral for Matthew Shepard which marched down 5th Avenue in New York City Monday October 19th at 6pm, organized by an ad hoc lesbian and gay activist group. Four to five thousand people participated in the peaceful march but police refused to allow the march and immediatly began arresting the organizers and others (136 people total) and committed dozens of acts of police misconduct including charging peaceful demonstrators with horses. Dozens of members of ACT UP/NY helped organize the march. I merged 2 e-mails from Mark Hannay of ACT UP/NY and slightly edited the piece to integrate the updated information. -John Riley member of ACT UP/NY

Dear fellow activists:

It is with great outrage that I report the following information (based solely on my own eyewitness) re: the Matthew Shepard Political Funeral March Against Hate Crimes held here in New York City this evening: In short, Mayor Giuliani's police state was out in full force, and totally destroyed a peaceful demo, with 136 innocent people arrested and several

people injured, including by horses.

At the start, several thousand people carrying candles and placards, accompanied by hundreds of cops on motorcycles, horses, and riot gear, gathered for the march which started at 59th St. & 5th Ave. just in front of the Plaza Hotel right on Central Park South. When the march stepped off into the street headed down 5th Ave. toward Madison Square Park at 23rd St., all the lead marshalls and the main organizers were promptly arrested.

A legal march then moved down the sidewalk of Fifth Avenue several blocks chanting "Stop the Hate! Stop the Violence!" and when the police line momentarily broke, quickly moved out into the street taking all of 5th Ave. After marching down the Avenue a few blocks, the newly-temporary "organizers" (the side and back marshalls who were not arrested) saw a phalanx of cops a block or two down and promptly turned the march onto a side street marching westward toward 6th Ave. When they got down the street to 6th Ave., the street was totally blocked by the police.

After some negotiating, the crowd was allowed to move out into the intersection at 6th Ave., moving southward (against traffic) one block and moved eastward back toward 5th Ave., but the cops were stymied, not knowing how to respond. As the crowd was filing onto the new side street, the police summarily decided to force people out of the intersection and onto the sidewalk, and literally began to arbitrarily arrest people --just picking them off-- who were simply attempting to peacefully move onto the sidewalk; several people were injured in the process.

The march then proceeded eastward back to 5th Ave. and back down 5th Ave. along the sidewalk. The march paused briefly in front of St. Patrick's Cathedral and the crowd chanted "You're the cause of violence!"

The march then continued down 5th Ave. and at 43rd St. turned west again to march over into Times Square. Again, some marchers were arrested for not following police orders to stay on the sidewalk. Cops were pushing and shoving the marchers. The front of the march was again stopped at 6th Ave. and not allowed to proceed at all this time. The organizers then turned the march around and marched back toward 5th Ave. and back down 5th Ave. on the sidewalk toward Madison Square Park. A group of about 50-100 marchers at the new "end" of the march (formerly the front) were able to break away and continued over to Times Square where they held a legal picket. The rest of the group proceeded peacefully down 5th Ave.

At 34th St., the front of the march again moved into the street and more arrests were made before people continued the march down the sidewalk.

Once they reached Madison Square Park, we were greeted by hundreds of cops in riot gear and scores of paddy wagons. A rally and candlelight vigil was held in the park for about 30 minutes. As the crowd dispersed, the main subway station at the park was closed off by cops in riot gear, and other police in riot gear assembled a phalanx several cops deep not allowing people to cross 23rd St. or to proceed down Broadway. Eventually, the crowd dispersed in other directions, and the subway station was finally re-opened.

The police attempted to hold a impromptu press conference as the rally was dispersing, *the organizers* (who were left not arrested) were observing on the sidelines. They were immediately segregated from the press corps and surrounded by police (in front of/including the press), the area of the sidewalk they were occupying was declared "frozen" by the police, and marked off with red police tape, and those inside the zone were ordered to disperse; when one man exerted his first amendment right to freedom of the press, he was tackled by the cops, with his head bashed into the pavement, and he was arrested and dragged into a police wagon. This is what I've been told by one of the organizers. A snippet of the incident apparently did make it onto some local television broadcasts.

Those arrested were taken to several precinct houses and to "central booking" at Police Headquarters. I have no further information on them at the moment.

There will be a press conference held at City Hall tomorrow (not sure of the time, but probably around late morning/noontime/early afternoon). People who witnessed incidents of police violence and illegal arrest are requested to attend; all other supporters are also invited.

More as soon as I know, but please be assured those of you who may have been seduced by the line that "New York is back", it is only back for those in power who don't want anyone to challenge their sole authority. We New Yorkers are literally living in a police state now where are constitutional rights of free speech and assembly are literally trampled

underfoot (by horses.) If you think Mr. Giuliani is a great guy, think again (very seriously.) And all when all we wanted to do was express our grief and outrage at the death of an innocent young man just because he was gay.

There will be a press conference held by the organizers and other concerned participants in last night's political funeral march for Matthew Shepard today, Tues. Oct. 20th, at 1 p.m., at the Gay and Lesbian Anti-Violence Project, 240 W. 35th St. (bet. 7th & 8th Aves.), 2nd fl.

People who were involved as organizers, marshalls, or who witnessed police misbehavior are asked to arrive slightly early.

In sum, earlier this morning I spoke to Richard McKewen (sp?), the attorney who's coordinating legal support, who informed me that 136 people were arrested in total; 11 were released fairly quickly on technicalities (improperly filled out paperwork), and the rest are "being put through the system" with arraignments starting this afternoon; hopefully all arrested will be out within 24 hours of their arrest. No "desk appearance tickets" have been issued. All are being processed downtown at 100 Centre St.; supporters can gather down there outside and hold vigil as people are released, or go into the court rooms as a member of the public.

There will be a "community meeting" at the Gay & Lesbian Community Center one evening later this week (I've heard rumors of either Wed. or Thurs. eve. at 8 p.m. and am still trying to confirm) to sort out exactly what happened last night and why and where we go from here.

Dear Rex,

I'm just back from an Act Up/New York surgical strike on DuPont and I wanted to write this report for you to circulate. You may also see an AP story this afternoon, with pictures.

At about 10:45am this morning, Thursday, Oct. 29th, four members of ACT UP/New York invaded a DuPont office in midtown Manhattan, demanding DuPont Pharmaceuticals agree to meet with state AIDS Drug Assistance Program directors about the outrageously high price on Sustiva, the new, once-a-day AIDS drug. Four states (New York, California, Pennsylvania and Texas) have refused to put Sustiva in their programs because its enormous cost (c. \$5000/year) could bankrupt their programs. DuPont Pharmaceuticals' president, Nicholas Teti, has previously refused such a meeting.

The AIDS activists walked through the reception area of DuPont's New York operation, into the offices, went right to a bank of windows facing Broadway between 39th and 40th Streets and hung a banner out the window reading "DuPont Pharma: Greed = Death." They also taped posters in the windows facing Broadway. The ACT UP members refused to leave before speaking to Teti and getting his pledge to meet with state ADAP directors.

Office security tried to evict the protesters and called in half a dozen New York City police officers, who threatened arrests. But the activists held their ground and refused to budge. Managers in the New York DuPont office (which works on textile issues, not pharmaceuticals) then got Mr. Teti's office on the phone and negotiations commenced. Teti assistant Bob Perkins talked to the activists. After about twenty minutes of discussion, Perkins made two pledges: 1. DuPont Pharmaceuticals president Nicholas Teti and research director Laurent Fisher will meet with state ADAP directors within two weeks--probably much sooner. 2. Teti and Fisher will meet with ACT UP members next week.

In return, the activists agreed to leave the New York DuPont office peacefully, which we did. DuPont even returned our banner, which they had confiscated.

"This was a big win," said Mark Milano of ACT UP/New York. "Before this, DuPont had lied about its willingness to lower the price of Sustiva, as well as refusing to meet with the state ADAP directors. But this is not the end. ACT UP will continue to demand reasonable pricing and will not go away until DuPont actually lowers the price of Sustiva. We will also monitor Glaxo Wellcome and Agouron Pharmaceuticals, both of which are about to release new AIDS drugs, to make sure those drugs are affordable."

Unlike Medicaid programs, state AIDS Drug Assistance Programs have set

amounts to spend on drugs each year. As more and more people stay alive and have to take multi-drug combinations, overpriced drugs like Sustiva are forcing some states to drop other essential medications or end new patient enrollments entirely.
