BIOGRAPHY

Ricardo Martinez, M.D.

Dr. Ricardo Martinez, 42, is a board-certified emergency physician who has dedicated his career to trauma care and automotive injury prevention. He is a well-known expert on motor vehicle safety and appears frequently on national television and other forums as a commentator on safety and regulatory issues.

Dr. Martinez was sworn in August 29, 1994, to be the 10th Administrator of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). Before joining the U.S. Department of Transportation, Dr. Martinez was associate director of the Center for Injury Control at the Emory University School of Public Health, and associate professor of the Division of Emergency Medicine, Department of Surgery, at the Emory University School of Medicine. He was previously assistant professor of Surgery/Emergency Medicine, and associate director of Trauma Service at Stanford University Hospital, Stanford, California.



Dr. Martinez has been closely involved in automotive injury control programs for the past 8 years and was chairman of the Trauma Care and Injury Control Committee of the American College of Emergency Physicians, and on the board of directors of the Association for the Advancement of Automotive Medicine. He has also worked with the Centers for Disease Control and helped the State of California develop a plan for trauma systems and injury prevention.

Since 1988, Dr. Martinez has been the Super Bowl medical consultant to the National Football League, focusing on emergency services, spectator care, and injury prevention.

Dr. Martinez set four specific goals for NHTSA: (1) Make injury prevention the priority; (2) modernization; (3) science-based decisions; and (4) streamline the rulemaking process. The agency has since increased productivity, overhauled and reinvented programs and services, expanded its constituency, improved internal and external communications, and dramatically shortened the time for processing rulemakings. During his tenure, the agency has issued the two most significant safety rules in a decade and the two largest recalls in history. Under Dr. Martinez's leadership, NHTSA has encouraged international emphasis on crash injury research, established NHTSA as the focal point for motor vehicle injury prevention research, established the National Transportation Biomechanics Center and a Crash Injury Research and Engineering Network to bridge the gap between engineering and medicine, pioneered a concept called "Safe Communities" which works to introduce safety solutions at the community level, and placed a national emphasis on childrens' traffic safety. Of special note is a new regulation for a uniform child safety seat attachment system that will be safer, simpler, and more secure.

A native of (b)(6), Dr. Martinez received his undergraduate degree from Louisiana State University at Baton Rouge and his M.D. from Louisiana State University School of Medicine. He was chief resident of Emergency Medicine at Charity Hospital, New Orleans.

Dr. Martinez resides in Alexandria, Virginia, with his wife, Robin Rosser Martinez, and his daughter.

AILEEN ADAMS

As Director of the Office for Victims of Crime in the Justice Department, Ms. Adams administers over \$500 million in federal funds which support approximately 2,500 victim assistance and state compensation programs around the country.

Prior to her Presidential appointment in 1994, Ms. Adams worked in many different phases of the criminal justice system -- serving as a prosecutor, a police reserve officer, a probation officer, a legal advocate for sexual assault victims, and the director of a children's advocacy center. As the Legal Counsel for the Rape Treatment Center at Santa Monica Hospital for ten years, she co-founded and served as the Director of Stuart House, a nationally recognized interagency center for sexually abused children; played a major role in reforming California's sexual assault laws; and provided legal advocacy to hundreds of sexual assault victims. She co-authored Sexual Assault on Campus: What Colleges Can Do, and she co-produced an award-winning film about campus rape.

Ms. Adams also served for eight years as a Los Angeles City Fire Commissioner, overseeing one of the largest fire and paramedic services in the country.

Biography of Hoover Adger Jr., MD, MPH
Deputy Director, Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP)

Dr. Adger started duties at ONDCP on February 10, 1997. Prior to selection as ONDCP Deputy Director, he was Associate Professor of Pediatrics at The Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, and Deputy Director for Adolescent Medicine at The Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, Maryland.

Dr. Adger was born and spent his early childhood in [REDACTED] (b)(6) before moving to Youngstown, Ohio, where he grew up and attended school. After graduating Cum Laude from Ohio University in 1975 with a B.S. in Zoology, he attended medical school at Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine in Cleveland, Ohio, where he received his M.D. in 1979. After completing his internship and residency in pediatric medicine at the Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center, he concluded a 2-year Fellowship in adolescent medicine at the University of California at San Francisco, School of Medicine. He completed studies for his M.P.H. (Health Policy and Management) in 1989 at The Johns Hopkins University School of Hygiene and Public Health. 2003

His professional experience includes working with teens and adolescents (health care, youth guidance and substance abuse prevention and treatment) for 2 years in San Francisco and for the past 12 years in Baltimore. In 1984 he began his distinguished career and long association with The Johns Hopkins University and Hospital. He has served as Director of the Substance Abuse Assessment/Intervention Team at The Johns Hopkins Hospital Adolescent Program. The major focus of Dr. Adger's research and professional interests has been in the area of substance abuse education for health professionals.

Dr. Adger holds membership and has held leadership positions in numerous professional societies and serves on many and varied health committees. He has served the Baltimore community by contributing his time and expertise to a wide range of community services.

Dr. Adger has published numerous articles and manuals, contributed many book chapters, and co-authored two books. He has become nationally recognized for his work in developing substance abuse curricula and clinical practice standards for health professionals. Most distinguishable has been his role as Director of The Johns Hopkins Substance Abuse Faculty Development Program.

He is married to the former Betty Hodge. They have two children, Justin, 15 and Adrienne, 14.

Re: Briefing for the MADD Board of Directors

For the last two years, the Board of Directors of Mothers Against Drunk Driving has received a briefing from the Clinton Administration during our June Board meeting. Your predecessor, Jeremy Ben-Ami, was instrumental in arranging those meetings.

What has happened in the past has been that Jeremy would reserve a room for us in the Old Executive Office Building; the Indian Treaty Room was used last year; the one next to it the year before. This year we would need a room on Friday June 20 from 10 am to noon.

If possible, we would like to hear from:

- * Attorney General Janet Reno on the Victims of Crime Constitutional Amendment, which the Administration supports.

- * DOT Secretary Rodney Slater on legislation to create a national standard of .08 BAC as the definition of intoxication for drivers over 21 in every state. The Administration has yet to announce a position on this issue. We would also like to hear about other related highway safety issues.

- * General Barry McCaffrey on the inclusion of underage drinking as an element in his approach to decreasing the use of drugs.

- * Are there other people that you would want to appear before the board to deliver a message from the Administration?

Jeremy would leave the inviting of speakers up to MADD, but a suggestion that these high level people appear coming from the White House would certainly help.

I hope we can work together on this again this year. We will have a briefing from Congressional leaders on Thursday June 19. It would be great to follow that with an Administration briefing on Friday morning.

Would you let me know if we can proceed this way by calling me at 638-3735? If I don't hear from you by the end of next week, I will assume this cannot be done and make alternative arrangements.
