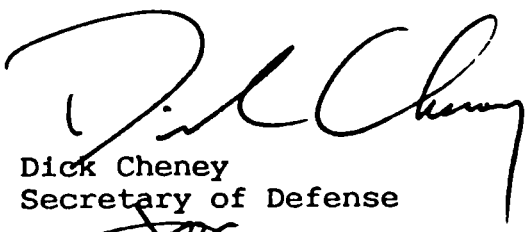

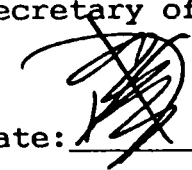

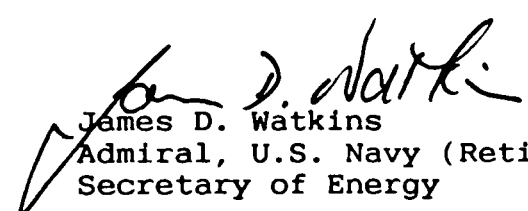
SUBJECT: Joint DOD/DOE Nuclear Weapons Surety Report for 1991

Attached is the Joint Department of Defense/Department of Energy Annual Report to the President on Nuclear Weapons Surety for 1991. It summarizes progress made during 1991 and reports issues where appropriate. The Department of Defense and the Department of Energy will continue to emphasize improvements in safety, security, and control of nuclear weapons.

As we note in the Annual Surety Report, the United States needs to maintain a modest, but effective, nuclear testing program. The FY 1993 Energy and Water Appropriations bill contains provisions that place limits on the numbers and purposes of nuclear tests, which could prevent us from continued certification of the safety and reliability of the nuclear weapons stockpile. These provisions assume that for highly complex weapon systems only three types of older safety technologies are adequate to protect the health and safety of the public. They prevent us from developing newer and markedly improved safety technologies and would even prohibit testing to verify the existence of some safety deficiencies or to confirm corrective actions. We urge your continued support of the nuclear testing program as an indispensable vehicle for improving and maintaining the surety of the nuclear weapons in the United States stockpile.

NUCLEAR WEAPONS SURETY

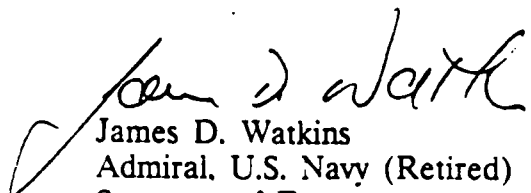
The policy of the Departments of Defense and Energy is to support the national security of the United States through developing and maintaining an effective nuclear deterrent. Nuclear weapons and nuclear weapon systems require special consideration because of their policy implications and military importance, their destructive power, as well as the potential consequences of an accident or unauthorized act. Therefore, safety, security, control, and effectiveness of nuclear weapons are of paramount importance to the security of the United States.

In developing and maintaining the nuclear deterrent, the Departments of Defense and Energy will jointly preserve the public trust by protecting the public health, safety, and the environment. Therefore, nuclear weapon system safety, security, control, and effectiveness will continue to be evaluated throughout the entirety of each nuclear weapon system's life cycle. Our Departments remain dedicated to protecting the security of the Nation in a manner consistent with health, safety, and environmental needs.

CITATION

Thomas P. Stafford

By direction of the President, Lt. General Thomas P. Stafford, USAF (Retired), is awarded the Congressional Space Medal of Honor for exceptional meritorious efforts and contributions to the welfare of the Nation and mankind.

As one of our early pioneers in space, General Stafford flew both the Gemini VI and IX missions during which he developed principles and rendezvous techniques that remain in use today. On Apollo 10, he commanded the first flight of the lunar module to the Moon and performed the first rendezvous in its orbit. In 1975, he commanded the Apollo crew that rendezvoused and docked with the Soviet Soyuz spacecraft. This first meeting in space between astronauts and cosmonauts signaled a major advancement in international cooperative efforts and significantly contributed to improving the relationship and understanding between both nations.

After ____ years of distinguished service, General Stafford completed his Air Force career as Commander of the Air Force Flight Test Center and concurrently, as Deputy Chief of Staff for Research Development and Acquisition where he was instrumental in the development of major weapons systems that remain critical to

our national security. He continues to serve the nation in charting a future vision for our space program.

From the infancy of the United States space program, through its unprecedented achievements, to its extraordinary future potential for mankind, Lieutenant General Thomas P. Stafford, USAF (Retired), has left an enduring legacy.

By direction of the President, Lt. General Thomas P. Stafford, USAF, is awarded the Congressional Space Medal of Honor for exceptional meritorious efforts and contributions to the welfare of the Nation and of mankind.
