Dear Secretary Aspin:

As you know, the Army's Joint Readiness Training Center will move from Fort Chaffee to Fort Polk this July, and Governor Tucker has asked for our support in maintaining Fort Chaffee as a viable training base for the National Guard. I understand that the Army and National Guard Bureau are completing plans to transfer the post from the active to the reserve component this summer. I have assured the Governor of the Administration's support for a continued role for Fort Chaffee and of our commitment to work closely with the Department of Defense on this matter.

The National Guard Bureau and the Arkansas Military Department would like to establish a Battle Training Center at Fort Chaffee, similar to the National Training Center at Fort Irwin. I would be grateful if you can take a close look at this issue and keep me informed of the status and progress of Fort Chaffee as a major training resource for the National Guard.

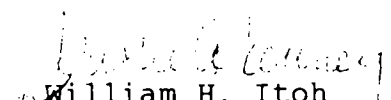

Attached at Tab I is a proposed memorandum to the Executive Secretary, Department of Defense, approving military exercise OCEAN VENTURE 93. At Tab II Defense recommends approval and State concurs.

Your report on the recent work of the National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee (NSTAC) highlights the Committee's outstanding and valuable support of national security and emergency preparedness objectives. SUBJECT: National Security Telecommunications Advisory
Committee Recommendations

The President has reviewed the most recent executive report of the National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee (NSTAC) and the National Communications System (NCS) comments thereon. The following guidance is provided to implement the President's decisions:

a. Network Security. The NSTAC's recommendations are approved. The National Institute for Standards and Technology is directed to serve as the Federal Government's focal point for network security standards issues. The President has asked the telecommunications industry to continue their network security standards efforts through the NSTAC's Network Security Standards Oversight Group. The efforts of the industry and the Government should support the goal of identifying and implementing network security standards initiatives that will benefit the National Security Strategy and protect the Nation's telecommunications resources.

b. Enhanced Call Completion. The NSTAC's recommendations are approved. The Manager, NCS is directed to take steps to provide the means for improving call completion rates for National Security and Emergency Preparedness (NS/EP) users during times requiring NS/EP response actions, when the telecommunications networks are stressed and congested. The Manager, NCS, will investigate the advantages to the Government of enhanced call completion services and features, including Calling Name Delivery Service. The Manager, NCS, will also work with the NSTAC's Funding and Regulatory Working Group to investigate potential regulatory issues arising from the implementation of enhanced call completion attributes for NS/EP activities.

The Office of the Manager, NCS (OMNCS) and NCS members will continue their planning efforts with the NSTAC to identify telecommunications issues for NS/EP activities, rank order those issues, and develop a plan for action for their resolution.

The NSTAC's significant and continuing support for our NS/EP telecommunications policies and programs is highly valued by the President. The NCS will continue to seek the NSTAC's advice and assistance and ensure that NCS views on NS/EP telecommunications are considered by the NSTAC in its deliberations. The Manager, NCS, will continue to support and utilize this valuable resource to achieve our national security goals.

As the President and Vice President map a strategy for developing a National Information Infrastructure, various issues will arise requiring expert advice and cooperation from both industry and Government. The President will continue to rely on the unique planning partnership and leadership that both the NSTAC and NCS have demonstrated in the past to achieve similar goals.

The OMNCS and the NCS member organizations are commended for their continued outstanding support to the President's National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee.

Purpose

To respond to the National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee (NSTAC) Executive Report.

Background

The President's National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee is composed of 26 corporate leaders of our Nation's telecommunications industry. A membership list is provided at Tab B. Their companies build, supply and operate both the government and the private sector information infrastructure. NSTAC is a Federal Advisory Committee whose objective is to provide the President, the Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs, the Secretary of Defense (as the National Communications System Executive Agent) and other Federal Agencies with a source of expertise, knowledge and insight not available within the government on issues and problems related to the implementation of National Security Telecommunications policy.

In the past, this group has been instrumental in coordinating joint industry-government efforts in telecommunications. A primary NSTAC goal is to ensure that U.S. information highways are sufficiently robust to operate before, during and after any local, national or international crisis. Robert E. Allen, Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of AT&T, is the current NSTAC Chairman. Norm Augustine, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Martin Marietta Corporation will be inducted as NSTAC Chairman at the next meeting on May 27.

This year's NSTAC Report provides recommendations for the exchange of sensitive information about hacker attacks on telephone networks and develops guidelines to prevent hackers from disabling individual company and government telephone

systems. The Report also assesses technologies that will allow critical government users to complete telephone calls rapidly, even when telephone networks are stressed from physical damage or extreme network congestion.

Attached at Tab A is a letter from President Clinton responding to the National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee (NSTAC) Executive Report. The recommendations of the report are summarized in the memorandum from you to Secretary Aspin at Tab II, asking him to implement the major recommendations of this report.

For background, the President's National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee is composed of 26 corporate leaders of our Nation's telecommunications industry. A membership list is provided at Tab B. Their companies build, supply and operate both the government and the private sector information infrastructure. NSTAC is a Federal Advisory Committee whose objective is to provide the President, the Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs, the Secretary of Defense (as the National Communications System Executive Agent) and other Federal Agencies with a source of expertise, knowledge and insight not available within the government on issues and problems related to the implementation of the National Security Telecommunications Policy.

In the past, this group has been instrumental in coordinating joint industry-government efforts in telecommunications. President Clinton's proposals for programs such as an "information highway" will make their contributions that much more important in the future. A primary NSTAC goal is to ensure that U.S. information highways are sufficiently robust to operate before, during and after any local, national or international crisis. With the rapid expansion of new telecommunications technologies and with over 95 percent of federal government telecommunications being carried over private networks, joint industry-government telecommunications planning is essential to address issues such as interoperability, network security, crisis management of intelligence networks and priority call processing for critical government users.

The letter from the President at Tab A acknowledges the work this group has done over the past year and notes that the Secretary of Defense, as Executive Agent for the National Communications System, has been directed to implement their recommendations. You will be receiving an invitation to attend part of the next NSTAC meeting scheduled for May 27. The Vice President will also be invited to be the guest speaker. We encourage you to attend this meeting with this important group of U.S. technology leaders.

RECOMMENDATION

That you forward the letter to Robert Allen at Tab A to the President for signature. Also that you sign the memorandum to Secretary Aspin at Tab II, implementing the NSTAC recommendations.

Background

The President's National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee is composed of 26 corporate leaders of our Nation's telecommunications industry. A membership list is provided at Tab B. Their companies build, supply and operate both the government and the private sector information infrastructure. NSTAC is a Federal Advisory Committee whose objective is to provide the President, the Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs, the Secretary of Defense (as the National Communications System Executive Agent) and other Federal Agencies with a source of expertise, knowledge and insight not available within the government on issues and problems related to the implementation of National Security Telecommunications policy.

In the past, this group has been instrumental in coordinating joint industry-government efforts in telecommunications. A primary NSTAC goal is to ensure that U.S. information highways are sufficiently robust to operate before, during and after any local, national or international crisis. Robert E. Allen, Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of AT&T, is the current NSTAC Chairman. Norm Augustine, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Martin Marietta Corporation will be inducted as NSTAC Chairman at the next meeting on May 27.

This year's NSTAC Report provides recommendations for the exchange of sensitive information about hacker attacks on telephone networks and develops guidelines to prevent hackers from disabling individual company and government telephone

systems. The Report also assesses technologies that will allow critical government users to complete telephone calls rapidly, even when telephone networks are stressed from physical damage or extreme network congestion.

At Tab B Congressman Pete Peterson has written the President recommending an approach for addressing the issue of homosexuals in the military. He suggests that, as a first step, the Joint Chiefs of Staff discontinue pre-induction screening for sexual orientation. Then an executive order would be issued which would include the wording that "...failure to meet the professional standards required for individual specialty or for conduct unbecoming as measured by the provisions contained in the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ)" would be grounds for release from military service.

Dear Mr. President:

The emotional and somewhat militant uproar over your proposal to allow homosexuals to serve in the U.S. military seems to be subsiding now. I assume, however, you will soon address this issue again during the House and Senate hearings. I would like to recommend one approach that could potentially take to put this issue behind us.

My recommendation has two parts: one which has essentially been executed and another in the form of a policy statement.

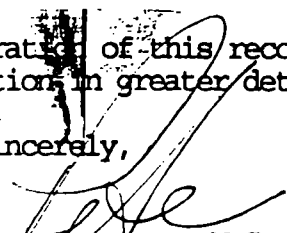
1. The Joint Chiefs of Staff issue an order to permanently discontinue the pre-induction screen for sexual orientation.
2. Issue an executive order containing the following statement:

" No person will be involuntarily released from the military service except as necessary under a general reduction in force; failure to uphold the oath of office taken at enlistment or commission; failure to meet the professional standards required for individual specialty or for conduct unbecoming as measured by the provisions contained in the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ). "

Taking the two actions recommended above would, I believe, address the concerns expressed by the U.S. military leadership. By not specifically listing homosexuals in the action, we do not officially designate that segment of our population a minority group. Furthermore, it directly responds to your initiative to make involuntary release from the service purely a professional or conduct question.

I appreciate your consideration of this recommendation. I would be happy to discuss the recommendation in greater detail should you be interested.

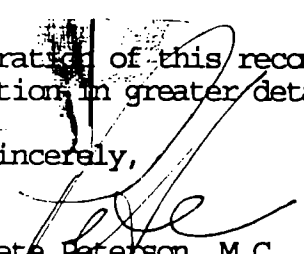

He may be reacting to news reports that we plan to dissolve ACDA and that the State Department will absorb its functions, as necessary.

ACDA's future is now the subject of a Presidential Review Directive. We are in the process of analyzing our best course.

Thank you for sending me your letter on the future of ACDA. I fully share your desire to organize the executive branch in the manner that best serves U.S. interests and allows us to address most effectively the full range of arms control issues. The review is concentrating on ways to restructure the agency's work in order to respond to the high priority that I place on arms control and nonproliferation. Dear Mr. President:

I urge you to preserve and strengthen the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency. ACDA is essential to the implementation of our nation's vital foreign policy objectives.

The agency was created by President John F. Kennedy to meet a need which, in many ways, is greater today than it was in 1962. But twelve years of Republican rule have done to ACDA what they did to the economy. Two recent in-depth reports, one by the State Department Inspector General and one by the Stimson Institute, recommend that ACDA be revitalized. I strongly concur.

While some may think that we have "done" arms control with the signing of the START-II treaty, and that we can therefore dispense with ACDA, I would argue the opposite. With the end of the Cold War, we have a unique opportunity to enhance stability with respect to both nuclear and conventional weapons, and to dramatically reduce the risks of proliferation to less stable Third World nations. With the cooperation of the remnants of the Soviet Union, we can accomplish what those of us in the arms control community only dreamed about for many years: a truly comprehensive, global nuclear test ban; a fissile production ban; enhanced safeguards; elimination of nuclear first-strike potential; the implementation of the Chemical Weapons treaty and, hopefully, restrictions on the global trade in conventional military weapons.

In other words, the arms control plate is full. We need a dynamic, strengthened and independent ACDA to fully exploit these unique opportunities for greater strategic stability.

If, in contrast, ACDA were subsumed into the State Department as recommended by some, there would be no remaining independent voice for arms control. In addition, folding ACDA into State would cost us the career scientists and professionals whose experience and institutional memory is essential to

controlling weapons of mass destruction.

I realize that you must focus most of your attention on urgent domestic problems. But continued rumors of ACDA's possible dismemberment saps its strength and risks losing some of the post Cold War opportunity for dramatic improvements in strategic stability. I therefore respectfully suggest that you take two actions now to begin the process of preserving and strengthening ACDA:

- * Issue a statement of your clear intent to keep ACDA as an independent agency, as intended by Congress and the State Department Inspector General, and
- * Appoint a Director for ACDA at the earliest possible date.

I appreciate your attention to this important matter.

SUBJECT: Defense Draft Bill DOD 103-003, Section 101

Section 101 requests legislative authorization to donate excess machine tools stored at educational institutions directly to those institutions. These tools were originally stockpiled as equipment reserves in the event of general mobilization, but are now largely obsolete. 4,843 items are stored at 671 schools in 45 states. The original acquisition cost of these items was \$35 million. The average current value of each item is \$7,000.

Current law requires that these items be transported to central locations under control of GSA, stored in government warehouses, evaluated for transfer or sale to federal or other government agencies, or sold commercially. In many cases, these tools are already in use as educational aids at their storage sites. Direct transfer as requested in the proposal will relieve the government of administrative costs for preparation, movement, storage and transfer and will directly benefit educational institutions which now house these items.

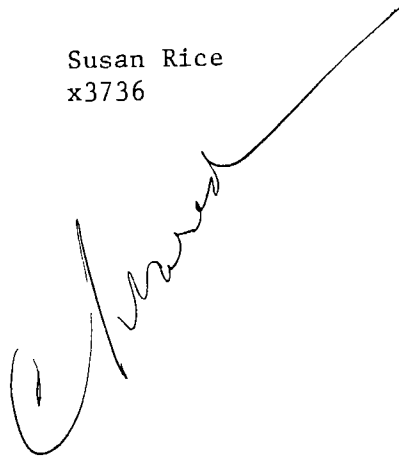
