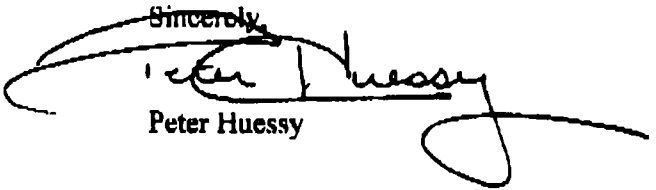
Dear Mr. Poneman:

In December 1992, Senators Nunn and Lugar returned from a trip to the former Soviet Union. They concluded that the danger of an unauthorized or accidental launch of strategic ballistic missiles is greater than at any other time since the August 1991 attempted coup in Moscow, and that there was a growing possibility that weapons of mass destruction are being sold, transferred, or developed by rogue nations such as Iran. This, in turn, could markedly change the nature of future regional conflicts and the appropriate U.S. and allied response.

In light of this emerging security environment, the Institute for Foreign Policy Analysis (IFPA), in association with The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, is again sponsoring a series of National Security Breakfast Seminars for members of Congress and their defense and foreign policy staff to explore the current and changing defense policy toward strategic and tactical missile defense. We hope to contribute to a better understanding of this issue by the U.S. legislative community. IFPA has conducted over 200 such seminars over the past eight years on various key defense policy issues including: airlift, strategic modernization, bombers, Army roles and missions, and missile defense.

Thus it is a pleasure to invite you to speak at our forthcoming IFPA Missile Defense Breakfast Seminars. Specifically, I extend an invitation to you to speak on Proliferation of Weapons of Mass Destruction and U.S. Defense Response. A list of alternative speaking dates is enclosed for your presentation. Attached at Tab I is a proposed memorandum to the Executive Secretary, Department of Defense, approving military exercise NAUTICAL ARTIST 93-2. At Tab II Defense recommends approval and State concurs.

NAUTICAL ARTIST 93-2 is a combined exercise with Saudi Arabia designed to develop formal procedures for air combat training, low level operations, bombing, combined coordinated air-to-ground strikes, war at sea exercises, and combat search and rescue. It will take place May 2-5 in the territorial waters of Saudi Arabia and international waters of the central Arabian Gulf, and will involve elements of the USS Nimitz carrier battle group.

The critical cancellation date is April 26, 1993.

Attached at Tab I is a proposed memorandum to the Executive Secretary, Department of Defense, approving military exercise INITIAL LINK 93. At Tab II Defense recommends approval and State concurs.

INITIAL LINK 93 is a combined trilateral tactical air exercise with the Bahraini Amiri and Royal Saudi Air Forces. This is the first time U.S. air assets have operated together with both Saudi and Bahraini Air Forces. The exercise will focus on tactical air operations, airspace management and air defense. It is scheduled to take place May 15-19 in territorial airspace over both Bahrain and Saudi Arabia.

The critical cancellation date is May 1, 1993.

Submitted herewith is a draft bill, "To authorize appropriations to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration for research and development; space flight, control and data communications; construction of facilities; research and program management; and Inspector General; and for other purposes," together with the sectional analysis thereof.

Section 4 of the Act of June 15, 1959, 73 Stat. 75 (42 U.S.C. 2460), provides that no appropriation may be made to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration unless previously authorized by legislation. It is a purpose of the enclosed bill to provide such requisite authorization in the amounts and for the purposes recommended in the President's budget for FY 1994. For that fiscal year, the bill would authorize appropriations totaling \$15,265,000,000, to be made to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration as follows:

- (1) for "Research and development," amounts totaling \$7,712,300,000;
- (2) for "Space flight, control and data communication," \$5,316,900,000;
- (3) for "Construction of facilities," amounts totaling \$545,300,000;

(4) for Research and program management,"

\$1,675,000,000; and

(5) for "Inspector General," \$15,500,000.

The last section of Title I of the draft bill provides that the bill, upon enactment, may be cited as the "National Aeronautics and Space Administration Authorization Act, 1994."

Where required by Section 102(2)(c) of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as amended (42 U.S.C. 4332(2)(C)), and the implementing regulations of the Council on Environmental Quality, environmental impact statements covering NASA installations and the programs to be funded pursuant to this bill have been or will be furnished to the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology as appropriate.

The Office of Management and Budget advises that there is no objection to the presentation of this proposal to Congress, and its enactment would be in accord with the program of the President.

(f) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection 101(i), appropriations hereby authorized for "Research and development" and "Space flight, control and data communications" may be used (1) for any items of a capital nature (other than acquisition of land) which may be required at locations other than installations of the Administration for the performance of research and development contracts, and (2) for grants to nonprofit institutions of higher education, or to nonprofit organizations whose primary purpose is the conduct of scientific research, for purchase or construction of additional research facilities; and title to such facilities shall be vested in the United States unless the Administrator determines that the national program of aeronautical and space activities will best be served by vesting title in any such grantee institution or organization. Each such grant shall be made under such conditions as the Administrator shall determine to be required to ensure that the United States will receive therefrom benefit adequate to justify the making of that grant.

None of the funds appropriated for "Research and development" and "Space flight, control and data communications" pursuant to this Act may be used in accordance with this subsection for the construction of any major facility, the estimated cost of which, including collateral equipment, exceeds \$750,000, unless the Administrator or the Administrator's designee has notified the Committee on Science, Space and Technology of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation of the Senate, of the nature, location, and estimated cost of such facility.

(g) When so specified and to the extent provided in an appropriation Act, (1) any amount appropriated for "Research and development," for "Space flight, control and data communications" or for "Construction of facilities" may remain available without fiscal year limitation, and (2) contracts may be entered into under "Inspector General" and "Research and program management" for training, investigations, and costs associated with personnel relocation and for other services to be provided, during the next fiscal year.

(h) Appropriations made pursuant to subsection 101(a) may be used, but not to exceed \$35,000, for official reception and representation expenses.

(i)(1) Funds appropriated pursuant to subsections 101(a) and (b) may be used for the construction of new facilities and additions to existing facilities, and for repair, rehabilitation, or modification of facilities, provided the cost of each

such project, including collateral equipment, does not exceed \$200,000.

(2) Funds appropriated pursuant to subsections 101(a) and (b) may be used for unforeseen programmatic facility project needs, provided the cost of each such project, including collateral equipment, does not exceed \$750,000.

(3) Funds appropriated pursuant to subsections 101(a) and (b) may be used for repair, rehabilitation or modification of facilities controlled by the General Services Administration, provided the cost of each project, including collateral equipment, does not exceed \$500,000.

Administrator's Reprogramming Authority

SEC. 102. Authorization is hereby granted whereby any of the amounts prescribed in paragraphs (1) through (35), inclusive, of subsection 101(c) --

(a) at the discretion of the Administrator or the Administrator's designee, may be varied upward 10 percent, or

(b) following a report by the Administrator or the Administrator's designee to the Committee on Science, Space and Technology of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation of the Senate, on the circumstances of such action, may be varied upward 25 percent, to meet unusual cost variations.

The total cost of all work authorized under paragraphs (a) and (b) shall not exceed the total of the amounts specified in Section 101(c).

Special Reprogramming Authority for
Construction of Facilities

SEC. 103. Where the Administrator determines that new developments or scientific or engineering changes in the national program of aeronautical and space activities have occurred; and that such changes require the use of additional funds for the purposes of construction, expansion, or modification of facilities at any location; and that deferral of such action until the enactment of the next authorization Act would be inconsistent with the interest of the Nation in aeronautical and space activities; the Administrator may transfer not to exceed 1/2 of 1 percent of the funds appropriated pursuant to Section 101(a) and 101(b) to the "Construction of facilities" appropriation for such purposes. The Administrator may also use up to \$10,000,000 of the amounts authorized under Section 101(c) for such purposes. The funds so made available pursuant to this section may be expended to acquire, construct, convert, rehabilitate, or install permanent or temporary public works, including land acquisition, site preparation, appurtenances, utilities, and equipment. No such funds may be obligated until a period of 30 days has passed after the Administrator or the Administrator's designee has transmitted to the Committee on Science, Space and Technology

of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation of the Senate a written report describing the nature of the construction, its cost and the reasons therefor.

Limitations on Authority

SEC. 104. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act-

(a) no amount appropriated pursuant to this Act may be used for any program deleted by the Congress from requests as originally made to either the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology or the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation,

(b) no amount appropriated pursuant to this Act may be used for any program in excess of the amount actually authorized for that particular program by subsections 101(a), 101(b) and 101(d),

(c) no amount appropriated pursuant to this Act may be used for any program which has not been presented to either such committee,

unless a period of 30 days has passed after the receipt by each such committee, of notice given by the Administrator or the Administrator's designee containing a full and complete statement of the action proposed to be taken and the facts and circumstances relied upon in support of such proposed action.

SEC. 105. This Act may be cited as the "National Aeronautics and Space Administration Authorization Act, 1994."

TITLE II--AMENDMENT TO THE SPACE ACT ON REPORTS TO
CONGRESS

SEC. 201. Section 206 of the National Aeronautics and Space Act of 1958, as amended, is amended by changing the words "January" to "May," and "calendar" to "fiscal."

TITLE I

FISCAL YEAR 1994 NATIONAL AERONAUTICS AND

SPACE ADMINISTRATION AUTHORIZATION

SECTION 101

Subsections (a), (b), (c), (d), and (e) would authorize to be appropriated to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, funds, in the total amount of \$15,265,000,000 as follows: (a) for "Research and development," a total of 14 program line items aggregating the sum of \$7,712,300,000; (b) for "Space flight, control and data communications," a total of 4 line items aggregating the sum of \$5,316,900,000; (c) for "Construction of facilities," a total of 35 line items aggregating the sum of \$545,300,000; (d) for "Research and program management," \$1,675,000,000; and (e) for "Inspector General," \$15,500,000.

Subsection (f) would authorize the use of appropriations for "Research and development" and "Space flight, control and data communications" without regard to the provisions of subsection 101(i) for: (1) items of a capital nature (other than the acquisition of land) required at locations other than NASA installations for the performance of research and development contracts; and (2) grants to nonprofit institutions of higher

education, or to nonprofit organizations, whose primary purpose is the conduct of scientific research, for purchase or construction of additional research facilities. Title to such facilities shall be vested in the United States unless the Administrator determines that the national program of aeronautical and space activities will best be served by vesting title in any such grantee institution or organization. Moreover, each such grant shall be made under such conditions as the Administrator shall find necessary to ensure that the United States will receive benefit therefrom adequate to justify the making of that grant.

In either case, no funds may be used for construction of a facility in accordance with this subsection, the estimated cost of which, including collateral equipment, exceeds \$750,000, unless the Administrator notifies the specified committees of the Congress of the nature, location, and estimated cost of such facility.

Subsection (g) would provide that, when so specified and to the extent provided in an appropriation Act, any amount appropriated for "Research and development," "Space flight, control and data communications," or for "Construction of facilities" may remain available without fiscal year limitation. Subsection (2) states that amounts appropriated for the "Inspector General" and "Research and program management" are available for training, investigations, and costs associated with personnel relocation and for other services for this fiscal year and for the next fiscal year.

Subsection (h) would authorize the use of not to exceed \$35,000 of the "Research and development" appropriation for official reception and representation expenses.

Subsection (i)(1) would provide that of the funds appropriated for "Research and development, and "Space flight, control and data communications," not in excess of \$200,000 per project (including collateral equipment) may be used for construction of new facilities and additions to existing facilities, and for repair, rehabilitation, or modification of facilities.

Subsection (i)(2) would provide that not to exceed \$750,000 per project of "Research and development" and "Space flight, control and data communications" funds may be used for facility repair or modification due to unforeseen programmatic needs.

Subsection (i)(3) would provide that not in excess of \$500,000 per project (including collateral equipment) of funds appropriated for "Research and development" and "Space flight, control and data communications," may be used for work on facilities owned or leased by the General Services Administration.

SECTION 102 - Administrator's Reprogramming Authority

Section 102 would authorize upward variations of the sums authorized for the "Construction of facilities" line items of 10 percent at the discretion of the Administrator or the Administrator's designee, or of 25 percent following a report by the Administrator or the Administrator's designee to the

Committee on Science, Space and Technology of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation of the Senate on the circumstances of such action, for the purpose of meeting unusual cost variations. However, the total cost of all work authorized under these line items may not exceed the total sum authorized for "Construction of facilities" under subsection 101(c).

SECTION 103 Special Reprogramming Authority for Construction
 of Facilities

Section 103 would provide that not more than 1/2 of 1 percent of the funds appropriated for "Research and development" and "Space flight, control and data communications" may be transferred to and merged with the "Construction of facilities" appropriation, to be available for the construction of facilities and land acquisition at any location if the Administrator determines that new developments or scientific or engineering changes in the national aeronautical and space program have occurred; and that such changes require the use of additional funds for the purpose of construction, expansion, or modification of facilities at any location; and that deferral of such action until the next Authorization Act is enacted would be inconsistent with the interest of the Nation in aeronautical and space activities. Additionally, up to \$10,000,000 of "Construction of facilities" funds may be used for these purposes. However, no such funds may be obligated until 30 days have passed after the Administrator or the Administrator's designee has transmitted to the Committee on

Science, Space and Technology of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation of the Senate a written report containing a description of the construction, its cost, and the reasons therefor.

SECTION 104 Limitations on Authority

Section 104 would provide that, notwithstanding any other provision of this Act --

- (a) no amount appropriated pursuant to this Act may be used for any program deleted by the Congress from requests as originally made to either the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology or the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation,
- (b) no amount appropriated pursuant to this Act may be used for any program in excess of the amount actually authorized for that particular program by subsections 101(a), 101(b) and 101(d), and
- (c) no amount appropriated pursuant to this Act may be used for any program which has not been presented to either such committee,

unless a period of 30 days has passed after the receipt by the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology and the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation of notice given by the Administrator or the Administrator's designee containing a full and complete statement of the action proposed to be taken and the facts and circumstances relied upon in support of such proposed action.

SECTION 105

Section 105 would provide that the Act may be cited as the "National Aeronautics and Space Administration Authorization Act, 1994."

TITLE II

AMENDMENT TO THE SPACE ACT ON

REPORTS TO CONGRESS

The purpose of Section 201 is to amend section 206 of the National Aeronautics and Space Act of 1958, as amended, to authorize NASA to submit the annual Aeronautics and Space Report in May, rather than January, and to submit the report on a fiscal, as opposed to calendar, year basis.

In July of 1990, the Office of Management and Budget directed NASA to publish the Aeronautics and Space Report on a fiscal year basis and on a more timely basis. (The reports were published about two to three years after the year they covered.) Since fiscal year 1990, the reports have been written on a fiscal year basis. In order to conform the language of the law with actual practice, we are proposing to change the word "calendar" to "fiscal." We are also proposing to change the word "January" to "May" in order to give us enough time to prepare the report.

In the Fiscal Year 1991 report, the first page leads off with the following remark:

Note: The National Aeronautics and Space Act of 1958 directed that the annual Aeronautics and Space Report include a "comprehensive description of the programmed activities and the accomplishments of all agencies of the United States in the field of aeronautics and

space activities during the preceding calendar year." This year's report (like last year's) has been prepared on a fiscal year basis, which is consistent with the budget period now used in federal government programs. The Administration will seek to work with Congress to amend the National Aeronautics and Space Act of 1958 accordingly.

The proposed amendment fulfills this pledge.

Per your request, the following information is provided in connection with your appearance at the SOCOM Commanders' Conference today.

SUBJECT: SOCOM Commanders Conference Speech

You are scheduled to address the Special Operations Command (SOCOM) Commanders Conference on Thursday, April 22 at 11:00 a.m. The conference will be held at the Headquarters Conference Center, Building 1535, Andrews Air Force Base. The audience will consist of SOCOM unit commanders from Army, Air Force, Navy and joint units from around the country. General Stiner has asked that you speak for approximately 20 minutes, allowing another 20-30 minutes for questions.

I have talked with both the General's aide and his political advisor about appropriate topics for your presentation. They suggested something along the line of "new emerging military missions as seen by the Clinton Administration." Under Secretary of Defense Wisner will speak the day before, giving a "once around the block" view of security threats in the new international security environment.

At Tab I is a proposed outline for your remarks which focuses on the increasing use of military forces in "non-traditional" activities and how we should go about coordinating our military forces with other U.S. agencies interested in these activities. It draws a parallel between how the Interagency Working Groups coordinate needed skills and resources and how military Joint Force Commanders coordinate the assets from the various Services to meet changing missions.

The Multi-agency Approach to National Security

- New global security environment requires a re-engineering of our nation's defenses.
 - Today's U.S. military must now support our national strategy by promoting stability, peace, prosperity and democracy in an era of political fragmentation and social upheaval.
 - We can't be the world's policeman, but the world needs American leadership.
- Our armed forces military are unmatched in their deterrent, crisis response and war-fighting missions. But we must do more by making the best use of these unmatched military capabilities.
 - We must continue to fully integrate the capabilities of the individual Services into a cohesive joint military task force.
 - We must develop coalition responses to global and regional challenges with our friends and allies.
 - We must further improve military support to, and cooperation with, other agencies and departments.

These remarks will focus on the last point -- the military contributions to the multi-agency environment.

- American government promotes consensus-building as the best way to unify our diverse political landscape.
 - Consensus is important not only for Congress and the electorate, but also among the various government departments.
 - This is sometimes difficult because each agency has one or more unique areas of exclusive jurisdiction or special responsibility. Each agency also has its own internal dynamics and its own core competencies.
- When areas of jurisdiction overlap, the system must promote cooperation. "Tomorrow's policy responses "will almost never fall within the purview of a single department or agency." (Carnegie Report)
 - A seat at the inter-agency table is usually determined by whether the issue has an impacting that agency's franchise, or whether the agency has among its core

competencies the skills or resources needed to achieve the policy goal.

- The changing international security environment and new domestic economic realities focus attention on potential contributions by the U.S. armed forces to the full national agenda.
 - Military's broad range of capabilities allows our national leadership to consider using the military for more than traditional combat roles. This need not dull our military capabilities.
- The political, economic, and military challenges of our new era require the U.S. to look at national security in its totality.
 - The military is now being tasked to accomplish new missions.
 - In some primarily military missions, the military is equipped to act alone.
 - In others it must act in support of, and in concert with, other agencies.
- Interagency coordination is essential. Planned reductions in budgets furthers heightens the need for efficiency.
 - Interagency cooperation works best in an atmosphere which promotes consensus building and empowers inter-agency groups with the level of decision-making authority needed to implement national policy.
 - Multi-agency operations will provide the necessary critical mass of resources and capabilities to achieve national goals.
- We must explore ways to strengthen the process, such as:
 - Innovative joint agency ventures
 - Focused problem-solving teams
 - Improved inter-agency operating mechanisms
- The National Security Council and the National Economic Council were adapted by President Clinton to facilitate policy-making by providing specialized forums for extended examination of cross-cutting issues.
- Below this level is the Interagency Working Groups -- somewhat analogous to military joint task forces in the way

they integrate the efforts of many organizations. These groups seek to ask the following key questions:

- What is the objective?
 - Who should participate in establishing the strategy and who will have the lead?
 - What capabilities, functions, and tasks are required to determine and implement the policy on a cost effective basis?
 - How will implementation be evaluated and lessons be applied?
- It is for the President, his advisors and appointed officials to make key policy decisions. However, on national security issues, the military is a key player at all levels of policy formation -- from the IWG to the NSC itself.
 - For military officers, both in the field and on headquarters staffs, an understanding of the increased emphasis on inter-agency coordination -- especially when faced with "non-traditional" issues -- will enhance the contributions that U.S. military forces can make to our Nation's security.

- The Rand Corporation review is drawing on historians, economists, sociologists, psychologists, anthropologists, doctors and lawyers to determine the possible impact of homosexuals on military organizations. This report is due to be submitted to the Secretary by June 4.

The Senate Armed Services Committee conducted an initial two days of hearings before the Congressional break and is scheduled to reconvene later this month.
