It is a pleasure to appear again before this Committee.

President Clinton honored me when he nominated me for the position of Director of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). This Committee's recommendation resulted in swift confirmation by the Senate, for which I am grateful. Your fast action allowed me to get a quick start on the renewal of FEMA.

In my answers to pre-confirmation hearing questions, and in my oral testimony, I made a number of commitments to this Committee. This morning I would like to give you a progress report on my accomplishments. And, then follow that with a summary of my concerns and plans for the future direction of FEMA.

But first, I would like to tell you about my trip to Dade County, Florida. I want to discuss this with you because it is on my mind. I have been to many disaster sites and have seen more than enough damage and suffering. But, I have never seen anything like the results of Hurricane Andrew in South Florida. During that visit I identified several major problems severely affecting victims and the rebuilding process.

I was most affected by the conditions of the people living in the St. Anne Tent City. These people live in tents that are leaking, and have had to evacuate twice because of storms. I would hate to think of what their life will be like when the rainy season starts in South Florida. There is a day-care center in the Tent City, which is good, but I am concerned about the welfare of those babies in the tents all day.

Another problem that especially concerned me was that debris removal needs to be accelerated. I saw houses that have been rebuilt, but the occupants can not move back in because of piles of debris around the building. Some of these piles are as high as the house and have been there so long that grass is growing out of the debris.

I recognize that some of these problems may not be strictly a FEMA responsibility, however, I am determined to help these victims. Since my return from Florida I have been working with my staff to determine what FEMA can do to assist with these situations as well as other problems I saw during my visit. We are now finalizing several actions to be announced as soon as possible.

One of the first things I did after being sworn-in as Director was to review the statements that I had made during the confirmation process, and then prepare a checklist of actions to be taken on a priority basis. I would like to describe the major activities because they provide a picture of where FEMA is going under my leadership. These activities are grouped according to the five priorities I listed in the answers to my pre-hearing questions:

1. Preparing to effectively respond to any disaster.

2. Revitalizing the Agency and improving employee morale.
3. Creating a national emergency management partnership involving FEMA, other Federal agencies, State and local governments, and private organizations.
4. Establishing mitigation as the foundation of the nation's emergency management system.
5. Examining FEMA's mission and organization.

EFFECTIVE DISASTER RESPONSE

I am determined to be as prepared as possible for the first major disaster that occurs during my administration. I am aware that one could occur any minute. I am conducting a review of our response readiness, to determine what our current capabilities are, and what we need to do to be well prepared. In the mean time, I have met the representatives of other federal agencies involved in the Federal Response Plan, and have written to the State and territorial directors to begin the process of improving coordination and working relationships. In addition, I have asked the FEMA Regional Directors to assign an employee to work with the Governor and emergency management director at the State Emergency Operations Center immediately upon occurrence of a disaster warning or event.

We are also developing plans for prepositioning resources for an anticipated disaster, and for establishing rapid deployment teams for use when the event does occur. I understand that we do have limited authority to take more of these proactive actions than we have in the past, yet, I may need to request additional authority from the Administration and the Congress.

EMPLOYEE MORALE

One of my first acts as Director was to greet each Headquarters FEMA employee as they reported for work the next morning. I wanted to let them know, in the clearest possible way, that I will be listening to them, and including them in the process of rebuilding FEMA. Following those meetings I instituted an "Open Door" policy. I have set aside time each week specifically for FEMA employees to talk with me about their ideas on how we can improve emergency management in this country and make FEMA an agency we can all be proud of. Beyond the assurances I've put in writing, I am meeting with employees at their work places to learn more about their specific functions. Tomorrow I will be meeting with representatives of our union at Headquarters.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT PARTNERSHIP

I have initiated the partnership with State and local agencies, private organizations, and other federal agencies through the following actions:

- a. I have written to each State and territorial emergency management director to state my ideas for a risk-based all hazard emergency management system, based on a foundation of mitigation. To further this partnership, I have invited these directors to meet with me at the Emergency Management Institute in June to help in the development of the partnership and associated emergency management system.
- b. I have met with the Catastrophic Disaster Response Group. This inter-agency group is the focal point for FEMA coordination within the Federal government for planning and responding to a major disaster.
- c. I have initiated the development of a draft Interstate Compact, and will encourage the States and territories to adopt it as a mutual aid agreement. Of course, after the Compact is adopted it will have to be ratified by Congress.
- d. We are preparing a draft model agreement that defines how FEMA and each State and territory will work together in the case of a disaster prediction or actual event. These agreements will then be individually negotiated with each State/territory. The agreements will define how we will work together on major events -- especially during the initial period after the prediction or disaster.
- e. The Task Force reviewing the Federal Response Plan has a special group addressing the problem of initial damage and situation assessment. I have asked that any new assessment process be designed with participation of appropriate State, local, and private organizations. We know that damage and situation assessment has to be fast, accurate, and complete. We can accomplish this by working together through the partnership.
- f. I have initiated a review of the administrative load on State and local agencies receiving FEMA funds. I want to give States the flexibility to develop their own risk-based programs and corresponding priorities without undo restrictions from FEMA. Our requirements should be performance-based and focused on accomplishments. I have also initiated a project to see if we can reduce administrative reporting requirements on the States. We'd rather have a person working on risk mitigation rather than filling out reports to send back to us.
- g. As a general practice, I have asked Headquarters and Regional personnel to spend as much time as possible working with State and local organizations. This practice will enable FEMA personnel to become better acquainted with their counterparts at the State and local level, and to better understand the emergency management organizations, policies and procedures used by these agencies.

MITIGATION

I believe that mitigation must become a recognized national priority. While mitigation makes good sense, it often isn't a priority for communities. We will work to change that mindset and provide solid cost-effective tools and incentives to encourage mitigation actions.

One accomplishment I am most proud of as the Director of the Arkansas Office of Emergency Services was getting the State legislature to pass and fund a State mitigation program.

The entire nation needs to make the commitment now to invest in the long term payoff of mitigation and I plan for FEMA to provide the leadership to accomplish this effort.

To that end, in my letter to State and territorial directors, and to various constituency groups, I announced that mitigation would be the foundation for developing a stronger emergency management system. I have also discussed this issue with members of my staff to begin the process of integrating mitigation into all of our programs. There are several programs at FEMA which currently emphasize mitigation - we need to build on these programs, especially at State and local levels. We know that mitigation at all levels can help reduce disaster assistance costs -- it makes good economic sense.

FEMA MISSION AND ORGANIZATION

I have initiated a project to determine the need to revise FEMA's mission, organization and policies. This is being accomplished in two ways:

- a. First, I am involving FEMA's employees in the process. A letter was sent to all employees informing them of the project and inviting their participation. In addition, we are using several existing ad hoc employee committees to develop ideas and recommendations. Thus, we are using an open approach - FEMA's mission and organization won't come from a select group of people meeting behind closed doors and emerging with "the answer".
- b. We are reviewing all of the recent recommendations concerning FEMA that have been made by various organizations and investigative teams. We will analyze them and develop a plan for implementation. For example, I have recently met with National Academy of Public Administration (NAPA) officials to discuss their recommendations and how they can support us as we go through the review process.

In reviewing FEMA's mission and organization, I have two guiding principles: (1) Nothing will be changed for the sake of change - but only to do what is necessary to achieve our goals; (2) The ideas of State and local government representatives as well as those of the volunteer community will be sought throughout the process.

CONCLUSION

In closing, I again want to thank the Committee for the confidence it has shown in me, and for the opportunity to share with you my recent actions and plans for the renewal of FEMA.

I have described my commitments to this Committee, the Congress, the Administration, the emergency management community and the American public.

However, I cannot meet these commitments alone. I must have the support of FEMA personnel, state, local, and private emergency management officials, and the Administration, and, frankly, the support of Congress. While I willingly make these commitments to you this morning, I challenge each of you to, in turn, make a commitment to support the new FEMA, and the new emergency management partnership.

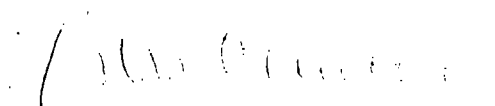
Thank you for your recent letter in which you shared your concerns about the importance of environmental cleanup and reuse of our military bases being closed.

Representative Hamilton of Indiana has forwarded a letter from the Mayor of Mount Vernon, Indiana, regarding the environmental cleanup and reuse of Jefferson Proving Ground. Howard Paster sent Chairman Hamilton an interim reply, indicating that President Clinton would respond directly to the Mayor.

Jefferson Proving Ground is scheduled for closure by September 30, 1995. JPG has been used for munitions testing since May, 1941. Unexploded ordnance cleanup will present a difficult range of tasks and challenges, depending on the reuse options (see Tab B).

Mayor Hall expresses his concern that the military will eventually "walk away" from the environmental cleanup at JPG. He suggests that military personnel might be used in the cleanup and he volunteers to serve on any national committee that may be formed to address military base cleanup.

The proposed response from the President (Tab A) emphasizes this Administration's commitment to the environment and in assisting communities affected by base closure. ~~It describes improvements in the interagency process via the Office on Environmental Policy. Base environmental cleanup will also be addressed in the interagency working groups of the National Economic Council.~~

Finally, ~~The~~ Department of Defense is creating a new ^{DEPT} Under Secretary of Defense for Environmental Security that will look for ways to expedite and improve the efficiency of military base environmental cleanup. I have been contacted by the Director of the National Defense University's Capstone course regarding the continuation of visits by newly selected flag officers to the NSC.

The Goldwater-Nichols DoD Reorganization Act of 1986 mandated that all newly selected general and flag officers of all services attend the Capstone course. The course curriculum examines major issues affecting national security decision making, military strategy, joint/combined doctrine, interoperability and important allied nation issues. Capstone is a six-week course consisting of seminars, case studies, informal discussions, visits to key U.S. military commands within the continental U.S., and overseas field trips.

Capstone classes of up to 35 general/flag officers are conducted four times each year. Routinely, the curriculum has included a 90-minute session on "National Security Strategy Formulation" presented by a senior NSC member (most recently Admiral Jonathan Howe) at the OEOB. They, the National Defense University, would like to continue these sessions and are asking if you would speak at the next course on May 4, and then on a recurring basis.

This is an excellent opportunity for you to meet the soon-to-be leaders of the military in an informal, "not for attribution" session to share your insights and hear their concerns.

Dear Mr. President:

Despite the end of the Cold War, the arms control and nonproliferation agenda continues to grow. Implementation of arms control agreements such as the Chemical Weapons Convention, negotiation of new agreements such as a comprehensive nuclear test ban, and controlling the spread of weapons of mass destruction will pose increasing challenges to the government's leadership and management ability.

Along these lines, we were pleased to note in your budget submission to Congress for fiscal year 1994 the budget request for the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency (ACDA), which will increase with the agency's new responsibilities in implementing the Chemical Weapons Convention.

We strongly hope this is an indication that ACDA will play a key role as an independent agency dedicated to the management and coordination of U.S. arms control and nonproliferation policy. This position is echoed by two recent studies on the management of U.S. government arms control policy. The Office of the State Inspector General (reporting by Congressional request) and the nonprofit, nonpartisan Stimson Center each conclude that the best way to develop a coordinated arms control and nonproliferation policy in the U.S. government is to revitalize the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency.

In our judgement, a strong, independent, and revitalized ACDA and a strong State Department, working in a complementary manner, equal more than the sum of their parts. With ACDA's arms control and nonproliferation expertise and guidance, and the State Department's foreign policy and diplomatic expertise, the arms control priorities that you have outlined have the best chance of being fulfilled.

Finally, we wish to note Congress's efforts over the last twelve years to protect ACDA from the previous administrations' attempt to destroy it. While we succeeded in saving ACDA, the agency's importance in the arms control process was severely limited. We understand that some are using ACDA's reduced status as an argument for eliminating the agency. In our view, it

would be ironic, indeed, if a Democratic President completed the work of destroying ACDA that two Republican Presidents were unable to accomplish. We believe the results of these past conflicts should be reversed, not accelerated.

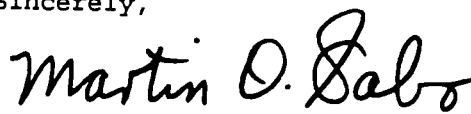
In short, we strongly urge you to maintain ACDA as an independent agency, and to revitalize it as the center of U.S. arms control and nonproliferation policy as soon as possible.

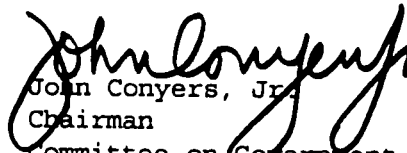

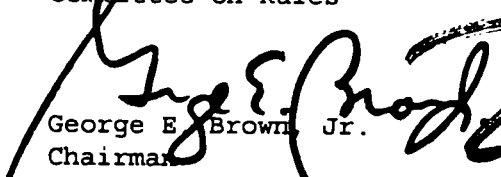

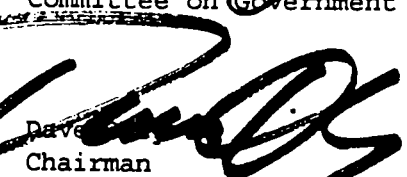

At Tab II is a draft bill to reduce the cost of living increases in the retired pay of members of the uniformed services. It would limit the adjustments in pay to 50 percent or no greater than \$400 dollars a year in FY94.

A couple of things are unusual about how this bill is being submitted. It was drafted by OMB rather than Defense -- the responsible agency. In addition, it is being prepared in the event that HASC might ask for it as part of the reconciliation bill now in work.

The extremely short time-line (received at 3:00 p.m. and due at 5:00 p.m.) suggests that an in-depth review is neither required nor desired. There is no indication of savings that might be realized by adopting these measures. Finally, this bill is being submitted the day after an ABC nightly news feature on the subject of retiree pay. Nonetheless, OMB assures me that this bill is consistent with previous internal discussions on this issue.

To reduce the cost-of-living increases in the retired pay of members of the uniformed services.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of
2 the United States America in Congress assembled, That section
3 1401a(b) of title 10, United States Code, is amended by--

4 (a) inserting after paragraph (2) the following new
5 paragraph:

6 "(3) Members Under Age 62.--(A) In the case of an
7 annuity which is payable to members and former members under
8 age 62, the adjustment shall be limited to 50 percent of
9 that stated in paragraph (2).

10 "(B) Notwithstanding the provisions of this
11 paragraph, in no case shall the adjustment for members
12 under age 62 exceed \$400 in Fiscal Year 1994.

13 "(C) The provisions of this paragraph shall not
14 apply to members or former members receiving retired
15 pay under Chapter 61 of this title nor to persons
16 receiving survivor annuities under Chapter 73 of this
17 title.";

18 (b) redesignating paragraph (3) as paragraph (4);

19 (c) inserting the following new paragraph as (5):

20 "(5) Members Under Age 62.--(A) In the case of an
21 annuity which is payable to members and former members under
22 age 62, the adjustment shall be limited to 50 percent of
23 that stated in paragraph (4).

24 "(B) The provisions of this paragraph shall not
25 apply to members or former members receiving retired

2 receiving survivor annuities under Chapter 73 of this
3 title."; and

4 (d) redesignating paragraphs (4) and (5) as paragraphs (6)
5 and (7), respectively.

6 SEC. 2. AMENDMENTS.--Section 1410 of title 10, United States
7 Code, is amended by--

8 (a) striking "who first became a member of a uniformed
9 service or after August 1, 1986, and";

10 (b) striking in paragraph (1) "(rather than under paragraph
11 (3) of that section)"; and

12 (c) amending the caption to read as follows:

13 "1410. Restoral of full retirement amount at age 62."

14 SEC. 3. CONFORMING AMENDMENTS.--Notwithstanding any other
15 provision of law, the retired pay of other members of the
16 uniformed services, as defined in 10 U.S.C. 101(43), shall be
17 adjusted in the same manner and in the same amount as specified
18 above for members of the armed forces.
