OMB has submitted the NASA comments on the proposed bill S. 419 for NSC comment. The bill, entitled the "Aeronautical Technology Consortium Act of 1993" would establish an Aeronautical Technology Program, consortium, OSTP-led coordinating committee and advisory committee.

The proposed legislation appears to overlap the recently formed national Commission on revitalizing the airline industry. It also duplicates in part the recently initiated OSTP-NEC Technology Policy working group on space and aeronautics.

Given these recent activities, coupled with the President's guidance to reduce the number of federal advisory committees, I concur with the NASA position that while supporting the objectives of S. 419, the proposed consortium and committees should not be formed until the Administration's ongoing initiatives have had a chance to work.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) has reviewed the bill S. 419, the "Aeronautical Technology Consortium Act of 1993," which has been referred to your Committee. I would like to share the results of our review with you so that they may be taken into consideration during the Committee's upcoming deliberations.

S. 419 would require the President to establish an Aeronautical Technology Program, which is to be an interagency effort to coordinate and expand Federal research and development programs relating to aeronautical technologies and related manufacturing technologies. This Program would be implemented and administered by an Aeronautical Technology Coordinating Committee (the Coordinating Committee) composed of the Director of the Office of Science and Technology Policy (who is to be the Chairperson), the Secretaries of Defense, Commerce and Transportation, the Administrator of NASA, and the Director of the National Science Foundation.

One of the purposes of this Program would be to assist the United States' commercial aircraft industry in developing an industry-led Aeronautical Technology Consortium, and to provide Federal assistance to the Consortium and subordinate joint ventures for research and development and commercialization of aeronautical technologies applicable to large civil aircraft. The bill would also establish an Aeronautical Technology Advisory Committee to advise both the Coordinating Committee and the Consortium on the goals, activities and policies of each.

NASA recognizes the critical need to strengthen coordination among Federal agencies involved in aeronautical research and technology development in order to better support the U.S. aeronautical industry, and we strongly support the legislation's objectives in this regard.

As you are aware, the President has expressed his strong support for a healthy and highly competitive U.S. aviation industry. In fact, he has announced his plans to create a "National Commission to Ensure A Strong Competitive Airline Industry" to review all major facets of the aviation industry including tax, trade, regulatory and technology issues. We expect the members of the Commission to be announced shortly with findings and recommendations to be reported in a timely fashion soon after.

We believe that the Commission will address many of the concerns that are raised in the proposed legislation and therefore recommend that you delay action pending the Commission's report.

As for the specifics of this legislation, we are concerned with the following:

(1) Aeronautical Technology Consortium - We believe that creation of a consortium should be decided by industry market needs and not by statute. Although there are clear advantages to creations of consortia in general, to create one large consortium could prove restrictive, inflexible, and may in fact discourage industry participation. Instead, we recommend that consortia be formed on a case by case basis. For example, a team of U.S. companies and universities are currently working together on a NASA materials project for high-speed research.

Second, the bill cites the Sematech consortium as the model for the Aeronautical Technology Consortium. We believe that this comparison misses the distinctive features of the aircraft industry. Aircraft often require over a decade of research and technology development before a product is brought to market, unlike the semiconductor products which can be done in a few years or even months. Moreover, with the longer development horizon, it is significantly more difficult for aircraft

companies to match government funding early in a program as required by the bill.

Finally, the bill's restrictive language regarding non-U.S. companies may unnecessarily inhibit U.S. companies from gaining access to aircraft markets that are controlled by governmental policies.

Therefore, we recommend the requirement for an Aeronautical Technology Consortium be adjusted to allow for industry to decide when to create it, who can participate, and which government programs it will apply to.

(2) Aeronautical Technology Coordinating Committee - The statutory creation of a Coordinating Committee at OSTP is premature and possibly unnecessary. Pending the findings from the Commission, OSTP plans to create an interagency mechanism within its existing mandate to address many of the key issues raised in the proposed legislation. We recommend you allow the OSTP Director the opportunity to create an appropriate coordinating mechanism, as is needed.

(3) Aeronautical Technology Advisory Committee - We agree that industry participation and input for government technology programs is needed to maintain the proper focus; however, we reserve judgement on its creation until the Commission has had

a chance to present its finding. Moreover, we must be cautious about creating new advisory committees since the President has recently directed that the number of federal advisory committees be cut by half.

While NASA supports the objectives of S. 419, there are several areas that we are concerned with. We have also identified some additional problems which should be clarified, and we have outlined them in the enclosure. We believe that these matters can be resolved and look forward to working with your Committee.

The Office of Management and Budget has advised that, from the standpoint of the Administration's program, there is no objection to the submission of this report to the Congress.

SPECIFIC COMMENTS ON S. 419**AERONAUTICAL TECHNOLOGY CONSORTIUM ACT OF 1993**

Section 4(b)(1) proposes a five-year National Aeronautics Strategy, but NASA has a 10-year Strategy enacted under title III of our Fiscal Year 1989 Authorization Act, and the Department of Defense has a six-year strategy. This seems redundant and inconsistent.

Sections 4(b)(1) and (2) duplicate the requirements of the National Aeronautics and Space Act, sections 102(b) and 203(c)(8), regarding coordination of Federal aeronautical research and development, and places the responsibility with the new Coordinating Committee. This seems to create redundant activities.

Section 5(j), dealing with the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), should be deleted. The FOIA already provides protection for the confidential information that this bill seeks to protect. This section would have the FOIA be inapplicable to confidential information obtained from Consortium members; this same information is already protected

by exemption 4 of the FOIA. Perhaps the legislation meant to protect confidential information developed by the Consortium with partial Federal funding. If so, this section should be rewritten.

We recommend that section 5(k), Intellectual Property, be redrafted. Subsection 5(k)(1) broadly groups intellectual property (trade secrets, technical data, etc.) and forbids disclosure of such property. Intellectual property should be carefully defined. Intellectual property includes patents and trademarks, which by definition cannot be held in confidence. To protect against disclosure of important information, the protected intellectual property should be described as "trade secrets or commercial or financial information that is privileged or confidential."

The second sentence of subsection 5(k)(2), reserving a Government purpose license for reprourement, is fairly standard, but the last clause ("but shall not...publicly disclose proprietary information related to the license") would appear to impede the reprourement rights. A Request for Proposals for a reprourement must disclose some proprietary information in order to allow bidders to bid on the reprourement.

Subsection 5(k)(3) needs to be clarified. Contrary to the

language of subsection 5(k)(2), this subsection states that nothing in subsection (k) shall be construed to prohibit the licensing to any company--including foreign companies, presumably--of intellectual property rights resulting from Consortium efforts.

I understand that the National Security Council staff will be presenting you with options this month regarding the future of the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency.

I support a strengthened and rejuvenated Agency -- an approach taken in a draft bill I sent to your National Security Advisor, Anthony Lake, for his information and review.

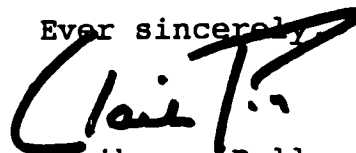
At a time when international tensions have dramatically increased along with the world-wide threat posed by the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction, I conclude that we would be unwise to dismantle an agency with a proven track record that specializes in promoting arms control and deterring weapons proliferation.

It is true that the Agency has not reached the full potential envisioned by President John F. Kennedy and the Congress when it was created in 1961. Nonetheless, its accomplishments are major. The Agency was the driving force behind the 1968 Non-Proliferation Treaty, U.S. renunciation of biological weapons, and negotiation of the 1992 Chemical Weapons Convention. Moreover, Agency officials were of crucial importance ensuring the preservation of the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty against the onslaught of Star Wars proponents. With proper guidance and direction, the Agency should have a very bright and productive future.

Should you decide to retain and strengthen the Agency, I would be delighted to work closely with Mr. Lake and other in your Administration to agree upon legislation that enhances both the Agency and the ability of the United States to meet the arms control and non-proliferation challenges facing us.

Subject: Proposed Memorial Day Activities

Based upon our conversations at the White House on May 6, the following proposal is submitted for your consideration. It recommends several positive events on May 31, Memorial Day, which would involve the President.

The first is a breakfast hosted by the President and Mrs. Clinton for leaders of the major veterans organizations, accompanied by their spouses. Invitees to the breakfast would include National Commanders (or Presidents) and Executive Directors of those groups. A recommended invitation list is attached at Tab A. There would be no more than 65-70 people in the entire group (including spouses and a limited number of VA officials). The breakfast should be scheduled to begin at 8:30 AM. Secretary Jesse Brown and Mrs. Brown would attend each of the recommended events during the day.

The second event, a Rose Garden ceremony, would include the signing of a proclamation regarding the 50th anniversary of World War II and the issuance of a commemorative stamp sheet. We recommend that the Rose Garden ceremony be set for 9:30 AM. We also recommend that the veterans organization group (attached list) be invited to the ceremony. Of course, that group would be in addition to others who may be involved in the ceremony (World War II Commemorative Committee members, etc.).

Immediately following the ceremony (approximately 10:00 AM), the group of veterans organization leaders and spouses would be transported by bus to Arlington National Cemetery so they can be seated prior to the President's arrival for the traditional Memorial Day ceremonies (which begin at 11:00 AM). We recommend that the group be provided reserved seating at the Amphitheater.

The President, as we understand it, will be involved in the wreath-laying, and he will deliver remarks at Arlington. Following the Arlington ceremonies, the veterans organization leaders and spouses would be transported by bus back to the White House. From there, they would depart the White House to participate in any activities that they have individually planned.

Details pertaining to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial ceremony are included in the attached (Tab B) letter of invitation dated March 16, 1993. We recommend that the President accept the invitation. Secretary Brown, of course, would join him there.

The final recommended event would be an open house for veterans and their families on the White House lawn during the afternoon. We believe that patients from the three local military hospitals and the Washington VA Medical Center should be invited. Transportation for them can be arranged by the various military branches and VA.

The open house would have a reception-type environment. The President and Mrs. Clinton could be present for whatever portion of the event they felt was appropriate. The President may decide to make brief remarks, but the principal purpose would be to make it an informal gathering and an expression of the President's thanks to veterans and active duty personnel.

We believe that the entire series of events would be a classic example of the President's policy of inclusion. Also, the day's activities would send a reassuring message to the nation's veterans and military communities.

2- A visit to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial during Memorial Day weekend.

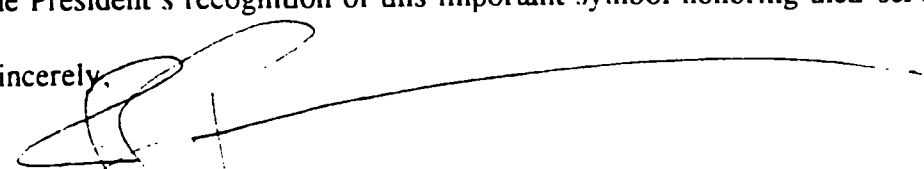
