ANALYSIS

There are presently no authorizations of appropriations beyond fiscal year 1993 to implement the Federal Civil Defense Act of 1950, as amended. This bill would authorize appropriations of \$146,391,000 for direct program and salaries and expenses for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1994. The total authorization is comprised of \$123,826,000 for direct program, and \$22,565,000 for salaries and expenses. These amounts are needed to ensure a basic infrastructure for the protection of life and property in the United States from natural, technological, and any other disasters, and to mitigate, prepare for, respond to, and recover from any such hazard, regardless of cause.

ULCHI FOCUS LENS 93 is a major joint and combined exercise which focuses on the strategic, operational, tactical and logistics aspects of general military operations on the Korean peninsula. It is designed to exercise plans and procedures associated with the execution of OPLAN 5027 -- the Defense of the Republic of Korea. It is scheduled to take place August 1 - September 15 in the contiguous waters of South Korea and will involve approximately 13,000 U.S. and 18,000 Republic of Korea armed forces.

The critical cancellation date is July 15, 1993.

Thanks for your letter regarding the Air Force training site to be located near Harrison, Arkansas.

The Air Force selected the site near Harrison for its radar bomb scoring site for several reasons. The primary factor is that it is located 3 to 6 miles from two Air Force controlled Instrument Flight Rules Military Training Routes (IR), which permit high speed military aircraft training for bombers and other military aircraft. The Delta area has no Air Force controlled IRs and development of new routes would require a time consuming and costly environmental process. In addition, the Harrison site is equidistant between the primary users, B-2As from Whiteman AFB, Missouri, and B-52s from Barksdale AFB, Louisiana.

Harrison 'thrilled' to get radar center

Air Force training site to pump \$5 million into city

HARRISON — A Harrison official said Friday he was "elated" an Air Force radar training center for B-1B Lancer bomber training missions will be locating in the city.

"It's just like locating a new industry, but without any of the environmental problems," said Brent Stevenson, executive vice president of the Harrison Chamber of Commerce.

Stevenson estimated that the 67 airmen scheduled to move to the city will have an annual payroll of about \$1.3 million.

"Each one of those dollars will turn over in the community five or six times," Stevenson said. "That means the economic impact to the area is about

\$5 million to \$6 million. We're thrilled to get them."

The Department of the Air Force announced plans for the center Thursday along with scores of other changes that will be made at Air Force bases across the United States as the Air Force tries to reorganize with a shrinking budget.

The radar center will be used to track and monitor the bombers as they perform training operations over Northwest Arkansas. The B-1B is a long-range bomber capable of carrying multiple nuclear weapons.

The bombers will fly over the Ozark Mountains to check their equipment and find mock bombing targets. The radar center will track the planes and

monitor the effectiveness of the practice runs.

About 65 servicemen and two civilians are scheduled to work at the center.

Stevenson said the Chamber of Commerce would be working with the Air Force "to help make the transition into Harrison as smooth as possible."

"There is a small housing crunch here," Stevenson said. "Trying to house 65 people at one time could exacerbate things if we don't work on it ahead of time."

Stevenson said that while he did not know the radar-center was coming to Harrison until the announcement was made Thursday, he did know the Air Force was looking at the area.

"I'm not sure why they picked us. Geography probably had a lot to do with it and along with what their mission is," he said.

"Also, I know they were very impressed with our medical facilities."

Harrison has a hospital, the North Arkansas Medical Center.

Stevenson said the radar center would be located about six miles southeast of Harrison just off of U.S. 65.

"They've leased about six acres out there. I don't think they're going to build any kind of housing, probably just some administrative offices. We really won't know that until we talk to them."

SUBJECT: Hawaii Briefing Points

In preparation for your visit to military installations in Hawaii on Sunday, July 11, at Tab A is a briefing paper with background material on Pearl Harbor, the Arizona Memorial, the organization and mission of the Pacific Command and the Joint Task Force for Full Accounting (of POW/MIAs).

You will begin the day with breakfast with military personnel from all Services at an Enlisted dining facility at Hickam Air Force Base where you will arrive in Hawaii. After breakfast you will take a 10-15 minute boat ride to the Arizona Memorial for a wreath laying ceremony. You will then return by boat to Pearl Harbor and travel by car to Camp H.M. Smith, the headquarters for the Commander-in-Chief, Pacific. You will be briefed on Pacific military issues by CINCPAC, Admiral Charles ("Chuck") Larson. Finally, you will be briefed on the progress of efforts to determine the fate of Vietnam-era American POW/MIAs still unaccounted for by the Joint Task Force - Full Accounting.

Hawaii Background Information

USS Arizona Memorial: At 7:55 a.m. on December 7, 1941 the Imperial Japanese Navy attacked Pearl Harbor where some 96 warships of the U.S. Pacific Fleet, including eight battleships, eight cruisers, 29 destroyers, five submarines and assorted minecraft, tenders and auxiliaries were berthed. In the next 60 seconds the battleship WEST VIRGINIA was holed by the first of six or seven torpedoes (especially designed and adjusted for the short, shallow runs required in Pearl Harbor), the battleship ARIZONA was blown apart by a bomb that hit her forward magazine and the battleship OKLAHOMA took three torpedoes and began to capsize. But only during the first few seconds of the attack were the Japanese bombers unopposed. Fleet doctrine in effect at the time called for a quarter of each ship's anti-aircraft batteries to be manned and ready with ammunition at hand. As a result, the machine gun batteries opened up almost at once and within four minutes the first five-inch gun round was fired.

By 8:25, when the first attack was over, ARIZONA was a burning wreck, OKLAHOMA had capsized, WEST VIRGINIA had sunk, CALIFORNIA was going down and every other battleship (except PENNSYLVANIA in drydock) had been badly damaged. From 8:25 to 8:40 there was a lull in the action. At 8:40 high level bombers began dropping bombs from 10-12 thousand feet altitude on the remaining ships in port. But after 8:40 the battle was not as one-sided as before. NEVADA shot down two torpedo bombers and got underway despite a large hole in her bow. The destroyer MONOGHAN got underway and rammed, depth-charged and sank a midget submarine which had penetrated the harbor. The light cruiser ST. LOUIS got underway at 9:31 and, just inside the harbor entrance, dodged two torpedoes and probably sank the midget sub from which they were fired. There were many other minor successes for the U.S. defenders, but at the end of the attack four U.S. battleships had been sunk, three more badly damaged and an eighth hit several times.

In ARIZONA's blasted hulk, 1,177 officers and men still lay where they fell that morning. In all, 2,113 Navy men and Marines were dead and another 987 wounded in the attack on Pearl Harbor. The United States Navy, in two hours and four minutes, had lost three times as many men as it had lost by enemy action in the Spanish-American War and World War I combined.

U.S. Pacific Command: The headquarters of the Commander-in-Chief, U.S. Pacific Command (USCINCPAC) is located at Camp H.M. Smith, Hawaii. Admiral Charles R. Larson, USCINCPAC, is the senior U.S. military commander in the Pacific and Indian Ocean area. The headquarters staff consists of about 600 Army, Navy, Air force and Marine Corps officers and enlisted personnel, plus about 110 civil service employees. About 1,450 people belong to additional support units, such as the Information Systems Support Group, the Joint Intelligence Center Pacific and the Joint Task Force - Full Accounting.

USCINCPAC's area of responsibility is geographically the largest of the U.S. unified commands. It stretches from the west coast

of the United States mainland to the east coast of Africa; from the Arctic to the Antarctic; and includes the states of Alaska and Hawaii. It includes about 50 percent of the earth's surface and more than 100 million square miles. It also encompasses 45 countries, 10 territories of other countries and 8 U.S. territories.

376,000 military personnel from the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines (about 20 percent of all active duty U.S. military forces) are assigned to USCINCPAC. The command structure consists of the following major components:

- U.S. Army Pacific:
 - 25th Infantry Division (Light)/U.S. Army Hawaii
 - U.S. Army Japan/IX Corps
 - U.S. Army Chemical Activity Pacific (Johnston Island)
 - 6th Infantry Division (Light)/U.S. Army Garrison - Alaska
 - IX Corps (Reinforcement)/9th Army Reserve Command
- U.S. Pacific Fleet:
 - THIRD and SEVENTH Fleets - whose resources include approximately 235 ships; 1,900 Navy and Marine Corps aircraft; 280,000 Navy and Marine Corps personnel; and 38 shore installations.
- Marine Forces Pacific:
 - I Marine Expeditionary Force (California)
 - III Marine Expeditionary Force (Japan)
- Pacific Air Forces:
 - 5th Air Force (Japan)
 - 7th Air Force (Korea)
 - 11th Air Force (Alaska)
 - 13th Air Force (Guam)

Joint Task Force - Full Accounting: The Joint Task Force - Full Accounting (JTF-FA) was established on January 23, 1992 to resolve the cases of Americans still unaccounted for as a result of the war in Vietnam. JTF-FA operations include investigations of live sighting reports, surveys of incident-of-loss locations, crash site excavations and remains-recovery operations. The task force grew out of the previously established Joint Casualty Resolution Center, which had spearheaded the POW/MIA effort since 1973.

JTF-FA consists of 182 investigators, analysts, linguists and other specialists representing all four Services and the Department of Defense. Its headquarters is at Camp H.M. Smith, Hawaii, with detachments located in Bangkok, Hanoi, Vietiane and Phnom Penh.

As of 1973, there were roughly 1500 Americans unaccounted for in Vietnam, more than 500 in Laos, and perhaps another 80 in Cambodia. Another 425 were lost over water off the Vietnamese coast. However, not since the release of American prisoners of war during "Operation Homecoming" in 1973 has an MIA whose fate was unknown to the U.S. returned alive. Over the years, numerous first-hand reports have surfaced concerning Americans alleged to be alive in Southeast Asia. Intelligence organizations have resolved most of these reports through correlation with accounted-for personnel; others have proven to be fabrications. About 100 cases are still unresolved and are under priority investigation and analysis. Live sighting investigation and resolution is JTF-FA's first priority.

JTF-FA personnel also survey incident-of-loss sites. JTF-FA investigators and linguists examine areas determined to be the position where Americans were last known to be alive. They interview area residents and village or provincial officials to determine if witnesses are available. Task force specialists then locate and examine crash sites. Many of the unaccounted for personnel were aircrew members who crashed or were shot down. These searches often require excavations which are much like archeological digs; their aim is to recover any material evidence which can help determine the fate of the aircraft occupants.

JTF-FA also conducts operations to recover the remains of U.S. servicemen. The remains are transported to the Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii (CIL-HI) where they are examined. Positive identification through anthropological and pathological analysis are made whenever possible.



BIOGRAPHY

ADMIRAL CHARLES R. LARSON **Commander in Chief, U.S. Pacific Command**

Admiral Charles R. Larson is the fifteenth U.S. Naval Officer to hold the position of Commander in Chief, U.S. Pacific Command (USPACOM), Camp H.M. Smith, Hawaii. As the senior U.S. military commander in the Pacific and Indian Ocean areas, he leads the largest of the unified commands and directs Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force operations across more than 100 million square miles -- more than 50 percent of the Earth's surface. He is responsible to the President and the Secretary of Defense through the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff. He is the U.S. Military representative for collective defense arrangements in the Pacific.



Admiral Larson was born in Sioux Falls, S.D. A graduate of North High School in Omaha, Neb., he graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy with distinction in 1958. After graduation, he reported to flight training in Pensacola, Fla., and was designated a Naval aviator in May 1960. He then reported to Attack Squadron 176 for flight duties on board the aircraft carrier USS SHANGRI-LA (CVA 38).

In April 1963, he volunteered and was accepted for nuclear power training. Upon completion, he served in two fleet ballistic submarines, USS NATHAN HALE (SSBN 623) and USS NATHANAEAL GREENE (SSBN 636), before reporting as executive officer of the nuclear submarine USS BERGAL (SSN 677).

As the first Naval officer selected as a White House Fellow, he served his fellowship in 1968 as Special Assistant to the Secretary of the Interior. From January 1969 to April 1971, he served as Naval Aide to the President of the United States. He reported back to sea duty as executive officer of the nuclear attack submarine USS SCULPIN (SSN 590). From August 1973 to July 1976, he served as commanding officer of the nuclear attack submarine USS HALIBUT (SSN 587).

Admiral Larson assumed duties as Commander Submarine Development Group One in San Diego in August 1976. In this position, he served as operational commander responsible for the United States Navy's world-wide deep submergence program, commanding a variety of submarines, surface ships, deep submersibles and diving systems. Promoted to Rear Admiral in March 1979, he was appointed Director of the Strategic Submarine Division and Trident Coordinator on the staff of the Chief of Naval Operations. In January 1980, he assumed duties as Director, Long Range

Planning Group, an organization he established to assist the Chief of Naval Operations in identifying and prioritizing long-range Naval objectives for planning the Navy of the early 21st century.

In August 1982, he reported to Naples, Italy where he served as Commander Submarine Group EIGHT, Commander Area Anti-Submarine Warfare Forces, SIXTH Fleet and Commander Submarines Mediterranean (NATO). From August 1983 to August 1986, he served as the 51st Superintendent of the U.S. Naval Academy. He was promoted to Vice Admiral prior to reporting as Commander Striking Fleet Atlantic/Commander SECOND Fleet in August 1986. In August 1988, he reported as Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Plans, Policy and Operations.

Admiral Larson received his fourth star in February 1990 upon being assigned as Commander in Chief, U.S. Pacific Fleet. He assumed his present assignment as Commander in Chief, U.S. Pacific Command on 1 March 1991.

Admiral Larson's decorations include six Distinguished Service Medals, three Legions of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, Navy Commendation Medal, and the Navy Achievement Medal.
