SUBJECT: Article in the New York Times about Representative Bacchus

Purpose

To advise Representative Jim Bacchus of Florida about steps that the Army has taken to improve living conditions for U.S. service members assigned to Somalia.

Background

At Tab B you asked that we help Representative Jim Bacchus on an issue that was raised by one of his constituents, Mr. Richard Rivers, regarding the living conditions his son, Sergeant Frank Rivers, was encountering in Somalia. Robert Bell, of my staff, called Congressman Bacchus for further details and spoke at length by phone with Mr. Rivers. During the conversation, Mr. Rivers reported that his son had recently advised him that he was now receiving adequate food and shelter. In addition, we asked the Department of Defense to look discreetly into the complaints that were in the New York Times article. The letter to Representative Bacchus at Tab A describes the steps that have been taken to improve food and accommodations for our Armed Forces in Somalia and thanks him for his outstanding support.

Dear Jim:

I read the December 7 New York Times article on your meetings with your constituents with particular interest. I cannot begin to express my admiration for your strong support for NAFTA and my legislative program notwithstanding the political demographics highlighted in the article.

The article mentioned that one of your constituents, Mr. Richard B. Rivers, was concerned about the living conditions of his son who is serving with the Army in Somalia. Following his conversation with you, Robert Bell, my Special Assistant for Defense Policy, spoke at length by phone with Mr. Rivers. During the course of their conversation, Mr. Rivers informed Mr. Bell that his son had recently reported that he was now receiving adequate food and shelter. In addition, I asked the Secretary of Defense to look discreetly into the food and lodging concerns that Mr. Rivers had raised with you.

Mr. Rivers' son, Sergeant First Class Frank J. Rivers, is serving with D Company, 3rd Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, of the 24th Infantry Division which deployed to Somalia in October and is currently attached to the U.S. armored battalion task force in Mogadishu. He is serving as the acting Platoon Leader of a mechanized infantry platoon, a position normally held by a Second Lieutenant. He is performing his duties very well and his chain of command has noted his strong tactical, technical and leadership skills.

Mr. Rivers can be assured that we are providing all the members of our Armed Forces with adequate rest and provisions. Sergeant Rivers' ration schedule provides for a hot breakfast, a combat ration ("Meal Ready to Eat" or MRE) for lunch and a hot dinner. Operational requirements may cause a unit to be temporarily issued more MREs than hot meals, but this is the exception. As our logistical support structure in Somalia has improved over time, we have been able to increase the proportion of hot meals prepared with fresh ingredients.

Likewise, the billeting accommodations for our troops have improved over time. Sergeant Rivers' unit initially relied upon lean-tos constructed with tarps for shelter and canvas cots. Over time, they have moved into large canvas tents with wood

frames, flooring and electricity. As with the ration schedule, operational needs may require soldiers to temporarily endure more austere sleeping arrangements. Our service members in Somalia currently have access to air conditioned dining facilities, athletic facilities and hot showers.

Please convey to Mr. Rivers my sincere appreciation for his and his son's service in the defense of our great Nation. And, again, thank you for your steadfast support. As I said in my speech Tuesday, we have replaced drift and deadlock with renewal and reforms, and given the American people the most successful teamwork between a President and a Congress in 30 years.

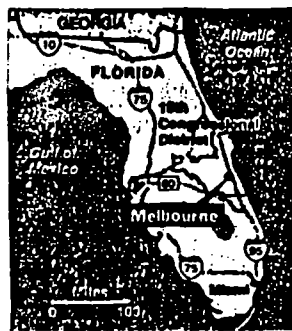

This is particularly true for Mr. Bacchus, a second-term Congressman who supported President Clinton on the budget and the North American Free Trade Agreement despite overwhelming mail and phone calls urging him to vote the other way.

One by One

"The campaign never ends," said the 44-year-old Congressman, who came to politics as a political reporter for the Orlando Sentinel. "I'm in the district in which Bill Clinton got the lowest percentage of the vote of any Democrat in Congress. I win by reaching out to people one by one, through relentless retail politics."

In other words, Mr. Bacchus is betting his congressional career on the adage that all politics is local.

Mr. Bacchus won re-election in 1992 by a mere 3,555 votes even though he had spent three times more on his campaign than his Republican opponent. Local Republicans and support-

ers of Ross Perot say they will not let Mr. Bacchus escape from their cross hairs next time, and they hope Mr. Bacchus's vote in support of the free trade agreement will drain him of at least some of the campaign money donated by big labor.

Popularity in Dispute

"There's not much chance at all he will be re-elected," predicted Dennis Walter, district director of Mr. Perot's party, United We Stand America, noting that Mr. Perot won 26 percent of the vote here in the 1992 Presidential election, his largest share in any Florida district. "The 100 or so members I've spoken to in the last two weeks are very upset with him."

But Mr. Bacchus carries on.

A nonpolitician might have desisted politely after Mr. Quint's less-than-enthusiastic welcome. But Mr. Bacchus is a schmoozer, and before long the two headed for the garage, where Mr. Quint showed off three antique automobiles that he is sanding down and patching into shape.

Mr. Quint did not bend on the trade agreement, but his wife filled two bags with corn flakes, bread and cans of fruit cocktail for the food drive. The Congressman thanked the couple and told them to call him whenever they needed help.

Down the street, Mr. Bacchus encountered Dick Rivers, a retired Air Force officer, who was angry about the Clinton Administration's handling of the United Nations-sponsored relief mission in Somalia. Mr. Rivers complained that his son, an Army platoon sergeant stationed in Mogadishu, gets only one hot meal a day and must sleep in his armored personnel carrier while Mr. Rivers believes, the Somalis are being catered to.

"It's a waste of money," Mr. Rivers concluded.

Mr. Bacchus nodded sympathetical-

ly and pledged to make inquiries about the son's living conditions. An aide immediately followed up on the conversation and learned that Mr. Rivers was also having trouble with the Veterans Administration, which he said owed him a payment for a costly prescription. The aide promised he would do what he could.

Political opponents deride such efforts as meaningless political gimmickry.

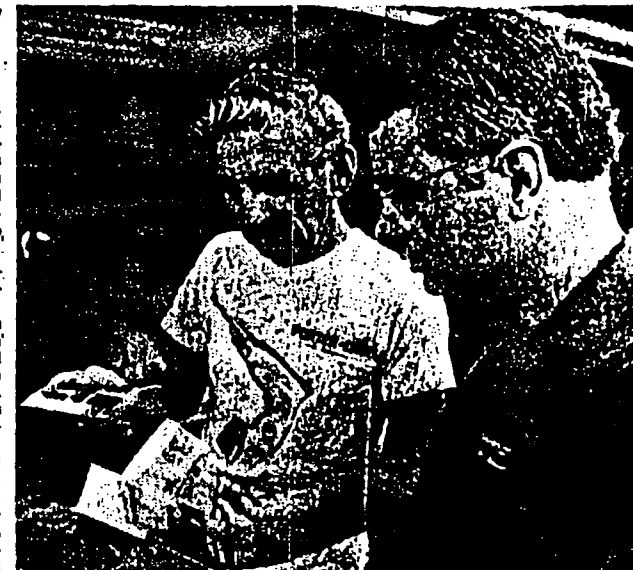
"It's all part of the media perception he is trying to produce that shows him as a neighbor who thinks like you and acts like you," said William R. Tolley, a business consultant who lost to Mr. Bacchus in the last two elections and is favored to win the Republican nomination again.

Mr. Bacchus countered that he voted for the trade agreement because it would create many jobs for the high-tech manufacturing industries like the Harris Corporation that are situated in his district. And, he said, side agreements that he insisted on will protect citrus and vegetable growers in the area from surges in Mexican imports.

"I'll win my usual 51-point landslide," he predicted with a faint smile.

During two days of traveling up and down his Atlantic coastal district, Mr. Bacchus also conducted a jobs workshop that brought together business people and local and Federal officials, visited the home of a family whose son is recovering from brain surgery and needs Social Security disability assistance, and met with a local space contractor seeking a contract for a \$17 million contract to build a minority-owned business.

While executives of the contractor, Analox Space, looked on, Mr. Bacchus called a small Business Administration's regional liaison in Washington to expedite consideration of the company's bid. As

he left the office, the Congressman asked the company's executives to let their employees know of his effort.

Between stops, Mr. Bacchus worked his car phone to nudge the Federal Aviation Administration to remove a huge radar station that his constituents around Patrick Air Force Base believe is the cause of a recent upsurge in cancer cases.

The Congressman then called to thank David Hinson, the administrator of the aviation agency, for agreeing to move the radar station in November

1993 — and to ask that the date be moved up at least a year.

When Mr. Hinson agreed to look into the matter, Mr. Bacchus asked if he would mind if he told reporters about it's conversation.

Mr. Hinson saw no problem. "Anytime I can do anything for the F.A.A., let me know," the appreciative Congressman said. "I'm on the Science Committee."

As he hung up the phone, Mr. Bacchus mused, "I wouldn't mind if it were moved before the election."

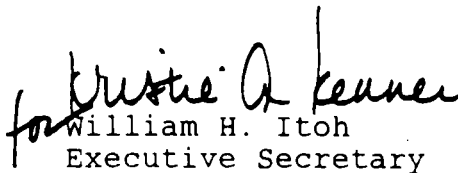

SUBJECT: Trip to Review IBM Electronic Packaging

You requested justification of the national security interests involved with the proposed February 2 trip to IBM.

As a follow-up to a recent Commerce Department investigation into the U.S. ceramic packaging industry under Section 232 of the Trade Expansion Act, the Administration found that although import penetration in this industry did not threaten national security the Administration should develop a plan to improve the competitiveness of the domestic electronic packaging industry. Along with flat panel displays, electronic packaging is one of the most important defense dual-use electronics technologies, central to virtually every military system.

On October 29 the President approved the formation of an NEC (led)/NSC interagency group to develop a strategy to improve the competitiveness of the ceramic and other electronic packaging industries. This IWG, which John Goodman of the NEC and I direct, will hold a series of meetings in February. The IBM trip will provide critical background information for these meetings. IBM is the largest domestic producer of ceramic and other electronic devices.

In a January 7 memo (Tab A) John Goodman requested that I, along with our two DAS co-chairmen from Defense and Commerce, visit IBM's packaging facility in Fishkill, New York. We plan to receive a briefing on IBM's electronic packaging roadmap from senior executives in IBM's packaging and microelectronic group and tour their packaging facilities.
