SUBJECT: Commerce Proposed Testimony RE Law of the Sea Convention

Tab II provides the proposed testimony of Dr. David Evans, Senior Scientist of the Commerce Department's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration before the Subcommittee on Oceanography, Gulf of Mexico and the Outer Continental Shelf scheduled for April 26. The bracketed testimony contains language that is changed from earlier (November 4, 1993) hearings before the Senate to bring it up-to-date with the progress that has been made by NOAA in determining the environmental damage that might result from the use of 1980 deep sea-bed mining technology. Dr. Evans acknowledges that this technology is not currently commercially feasible and that NOAA must continue to review relevant technologies as they are developed. NOAA defers to State regarding changes that must be made to the Law of the Sea Convention before the U.S. is prepared to ratify it.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Subcommittee:

I am David Evans, Senior Scientist of the National Ocean Service,
National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, U.S. Department
of Commerce.

I am pleased to appear before this Subcommittee to address the
role of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration
(NOAA) as defined by the Deep Seabed Hard Mineral Resources Act
(the ^{DSHARA} "Act"), how NOAA has been implementing these
responsibilities and how NOAA views its future activities under
the ^{DSHARA} Act. I will also address how recent efforts to resolve
objections by the United States and other industrialized nations
to the deep seabed mining provisions of the United Nations
Convention on the Law of the Sea may affect the ^{DSHARA} Act.

The Deep Seabed Hard Mineral Resources Act, ^(DSHARA) was enacted, during
1980, to achieve three major objectives. The first was to create
a stable domestic legal regime under which U.S. citizens could
continue to conduct seabed mining development and exploration

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activities, consistent with environmental and other relevant concerns. The second was to encourage negotiation of a broadly acceptable Law of the Sea (LOS) Treaty, [and the third was to provide a smooth transition from the domestic regime to an acceptable international regime.] Under the Deep Seabed Hard Mineral Resources Act, NOAA is responsible for:

- issuing licenses for exploration (which includes further at-sea research and development) with appropriate terms, conditions and restrictions.
- issuing permits for commercial recovery with appropriate terms, conditions and restrictions.
- monitoring the diligence and activities of licensees and permittees, including suspending activities if necessary to prevent a significant adverse effect on the environment or to preserve life and property at sea.
- conducting a continuing program of environmental research to provide assessments of potential impacts, the results of which are needed for future regulatory terms and decisions.
- designating, in consultation with the Secretary of

State, as reciprocating states foreign nations with compatible domestic regimes for mutual recognition of licenses and permits.

- participating in efforts leading to and implementing an acceptable international legal regime for seabed mining.

During 1984, NOAA issued exploration licenses to four U.S.-based, multi-national consortia for sites in the Clarion-Clipperton Fracture Zone area of the near-Equatorial North Pacific Ocean. The area of greatest commercial interest is about 1,500 nautical miles southwest of San Diego and about 1,000 miles south of Hawaii. The four consortia, namely the Kennecott Consortium (KCON), Ocean Management, Inc. (OMI), Ocean Minerals Company (OMCO), and Ocean Mining Associates (OMA), had performed considerable research and development on the technologies needed to recover manganese nodules from water depths of 4,000 to 5,000 meters and to process them into economically important products. OMI, OMCO and OMA all tested integrated module collector and lift systems at sea during the late 1970's and KCON tested components. All developed processing techniques to recover copper, nickel and cobalt and some or all of the manganese. During May 1991, the KCON surrendered its license to NOAA, because of a change in business strategy and concerns over the future legal regime for

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commercial operations.] During June 1993, OMCO applied for a license for the Kennecott area.

Currently, the efforts of the licensees have been scaled back until there are indications that metal markets, particularly for nickel, are recovering. When markets are sufficiently recovered, the licensees may engage in further, larger scale R&D or build truncated systems of commercial-scale components which will be expanded into a full commercial system as the components are perfected. [At the present time, there are no good estimates of when development efforts will resume.]

[NOAA has been at the forefront of deep seabed environmental research since as early as 1972.] (Shoreland) Probably NOAA's most visible seabed mining environmental research effort was the Deep Ocean Mining Environmental Studies (DOMES) Project which formally began during 1975 [and continued through 1980.] The research was conducted in the Clarion-Clipperton Fracture Zone area [the area which contains the areas of initial commercial interest.] This is also the area where the United States, China, France, Germany, Japan, Russia, the United Kingdom and an eastern European consortium, InterOceanmetal, have signed agreements to respect each other's minesites.

NOAA's research included monitoring OMI's, OMCO's and OMA's at-sea tests. [NOAA also conducted, in cooperation with other

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agencies and the State of Hawaii, research into the possible onshore impacts of manganese nodule processing and associated activities.] Although there are still uncertainties regarding potential effects on tuna larvae, the overall significance of upper water column effects was considered low in NOAA's 1991 Final Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement. The major uncertainties remaining were associated with the effects of the near bottom sediment plume [which will be generated by the device which collects the nodules.]

Because the sediment is so fine, the plume's effects, such as covering food supplies, or clogging respiratory surfaces of filter feeders, could be wide-spread. Thus, NOAA began investigating the effects of this plume in a multi-year, multi-national Benthic Impact Experiment (BIE) in cooperation with Russia's Ministry of Geology. In the BIE, NOAA is using a Deep Seabed Sediment Resuspension System, which is called the "Disturber." The Disturber is basically a deep-water, remotely controlled sled, which uses pumps to resuspend sediments in a manner which simulates the plume that would be generated by the nodule collector.

The BIE formally began during 1991 when the Russian research ship YUKHNOGEOLAZIYA was used to first test the Disturber and then to recover and deploy instrumentation moorings in the research area, collect additional baseline data, and tow the Disturber to

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blanket the study area with sediment. Technical problems, first with a key winch on the ship during 1991 and then with the Disturber during 1992, resulted in inadequate blanketing. During early 1993, the Disturber was reconfigured and used during August and early September of 1993 to generate the sediment plume in the research area. Preliminary results indicate that the operation was successful.

NOAA's plan is to return to the research area during June 1994 to measure the pattern and depth of the burial achieved and to take biological samples in the impact area and a nearby control area. NOAA will also be sending an observer for a similar Japanese experiment being performed with NOAA's Disturber from the Russian research ship. Beyond this, NOAA plans to have a thorough scientific review of the research before deciding its future. While the direction and content of the research was endorsed at a January 19, 1994 Deep Seabed Mining Program Review Workshop held here in Washington, D.C., it is believed from the discussions, and because of the costs involved, that a more focused review of the research objectives and plan would be worthwhile. We expect to complete this review by the end of the summer.

NOAA is being cautious because it is faced with many competing demands for resources and has concerns that various technologies could change enough between now and when commercial operations are feasible that the results of research performed now would be

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rendered obsolete. NOAA will be reviewing relevant technologies and will reconsider its environmental research program based on this and when the future of industrial development is clearer.

Under the DSEMA, NOAA has continuing authority to process the exploration license application from OMCO and to monitor the activities of licensees. NOAA intends to continue conducting these activities using base resources, without further appropriations under the Act.

With respect to an international regime, for over three years now NOAA has supported the DSEMA's goal of achieving a universally acceptable Law of the Sea Convention by participating in efforts, under the auspices of the Secretary-General of the United Nations, to resolve objections of the United States and other industrialized nations to the deep seabed mining provisions of the 1982 United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (LOS). The DSEMA itself indicates Congressional views regarding elements of an acceptable seabed mining regime. The existing LOS Convention's provisions were seen to be limiting to private enterprise and free market principles as well as not assuring that the views of affected interests, such as those of the United States, would be taken into account. NOAA defers to the Department of State to describe the status of these negotiations and to the mining industry witnesses to describe the industry's views on the treaty and the renegotiation effort. NOAA will

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limit its comments to the relationship of the Deep Seabed Hard Mineral Resources Act to any agreement which is reached regarding modification of the Convention.

In the Act's statement of findings and purposes and again in Title II, it is clear that the Act was designed as an interim measure which would serve both as a secure basis for continuing activities and a "bridge" for smooth transition to a broadly acceptable international agreement covering deep seabed mining. If the current negotiations are successful, the United States will still need this "bridge" until the modified Convention is ratified and enters into force with respect to the United States.

In reviewing the Act, it appears that no near-term changes would be required if an acceptable agreement was to be concluded. Working with the State Department, industry and other interested and affected parties, NOAA would review the potential new international regime as well as the projected international start-up actions to determine how the Act should be modified for the long run. If an agreement on modifications to the LOS Convention is reached, it could still be two or three years before the United States would make a definitive decision on participation in the Convention regime.

As noted previously, NOAA has continuing authority under the Act

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to conduct necessary activities, and intends to do so using base resources. In response to the subcommittee's question about potential authorization funding levels and time periods, NOAA cannot at this time take a position on funding levels beyond FY 1995.

Mr. Chairman, this concludes my testimony. I thank you for this opportunity to address NOAA's role and activities in the area of deep seabed mining. I would be pleased to respond to any questions you or other members of the Subcommittee may have.

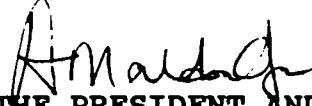

Forwarded for your approval and signature is the nomination of Major General Edward D. Baca, Adjutant General of New Mexico, for appointment to the grade of lieutenant general and a recommendation for his assignment as Chief of the National Guard Bureau.

SUBJECT: General Officer Nomination

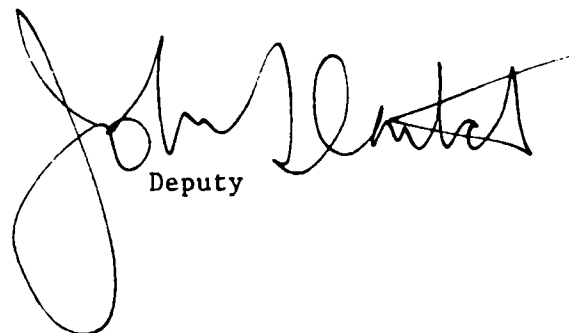
I recommend you nominate Major General Edward D. Baca, Adjutant General of New Mexico, for appointment as Chief of the National Guard Bureau, an authorized lieutenant general position, and for appointment to the grade of lieutenant general. General Baca, age 55, will succeed Lieutenant General John F. Conaway, who retired. I base my recommendation on the results of a Joint Advisory Board, composed of Army and Air Force officers.

In order to carry out the duties and responsibilities of the proposed assignment, a general officer must have demonstrated highly effective performance in a variety of command and staff positions in the National Guard. He must thoroughly understand the diverse organizational structure of the National Guard. He must be able to manage the development, training, maintenance, security and mobilization of the National Guard. General Baca meets these requirements.

I have personally reviewed adverse information concerning General Baca and will provide the information to the White House Military Office separately. Should you approve this nomination recommendation, I will provide the same information to the Senate Armed Services Committee.

This action will not cause the Army to exceed the number of officers authorized to be serving in the grade of lieutenant general. General Baca's qualifications for promotion are based upon his service in the National Guard. Therefore, the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff did not render an evaluation of General Baca's performance in joint duty assignments.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

I am writing in reference to the nomination of Major General Edward D. Baca, Adjutant General of New Mexico, for appointment to the grade of lieutenant general, which the President recently forwarded to the Senate.

A 1993 United States Army Inspector General Agency inquiry revealed that General Baca's official military personnel records contained a letter dated January 23, 1984, authorizing his wear of the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal. Based on that letter, General Baca wore the medal. In 1990, he asked for confirmation of the authority for the medal and learned the medal had been erroneously awarded. General Baca immediately took action to correct his uniform, records, official photo, and career resume.

The inquiry also found that General Baca's wear of the Meritorious Unit Commendation Award for assignment to the 85th Maintenance Company in Vietnam in 1965-66 was not supported by proper authorization. In the opinion of the investigating officer, the error was not intentional, nor was there evidence of malfeasance or intent to mislead. The evidence reflected that General Baca had acted in good faith to determine whether he was authorized to wear the award. General Baca acknowledged the discrepancies and agreed to not wear the award until proper documentation was evident.

We have carefully considered this information; it should not preclude favorable consideration of the nomination. When considered in light of his past performance and future potential, proceeding with the nomination is clearly in the best interests of the National Guard Bureau, the Army, and the Department of Defense.

Donald J. Atwood was nominated by President Bush to be Deputy Secretary of Defense on January 29, 1989, was confirmed on April 19, 1989, and took the oath of office on April 24, 1989.

Before his nomination to be Deputy Secretary of Defense, Mr. Atwood was Vice Chairman of the Board of General Motors and President, Delco Electronics Corporation and GM Hughes Electronics.



Mr. Atwood was born May 25, 1924, in Haverhill, Massachusetts. He attended the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and was awarded Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Electrical Engineering. While at MIT, he was associated with the research work which pioneered the development of inertial guidance systems. In 1978 Mr. Atwood was named Vice President and General Manager of Detroit Diesel Allison Division. Three years later he was named Vice President and group Executive in Charge of the Electrical Components Group, and in November 1981, he was given responsibility for the worldwide Truck and Bus Group. In 1984 he was named Executive Vice President of the Corporation, and was elevated to the position of Vice Chairman of the Board in 1987.

Mr. Atwood has been active in many community and industry related organizations. These include: the Board of Directors of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology; the Board of Directors of the Charles Stark Draper Laboratory, Inc.; the National Academy of Engineering; the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics; the Board of Directors of the Michigan Opera Theatre; and the National Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America.

Mr. Atwood is married to the former Sue Harlan, and has two children: Susan Atwood Lavoie and Donald J. Atwood III.

OMB has requested NSC views on the DoD proposed report regarding S.1551. This proposed bill provides "for the use of Department of Defense golf courses by the general public, and for other purposes." It would limit military golf course income to 10 percent of gross revenues for expenses and support of other Morale, Welfare and Recreation (MWR) programs and use the remaining 90 percent to reduce the Federal deficit.

The NSC should strongly support DoD opposition to this proposed bill. It sends a message to Service members and their families that their non-pay compensation continues to be eroded. The 10 percent of gross revenues will not cover military golf course operating expenses and therefore will allow no extra revenue to support other MWR activities, so important for the morale and well-being of our troops and their families. This bill would likely create a funding shortfall for both operating expenses of the military golf courses and for other MWR programs.

The end result of this bill would most likely be degradation of the golf recreation facilities, potential compromise of security at some bases, closing and underfunding of other MWR activities, and justifiable dissatisfaction among our service members and their families. While perhaps attractive to some as cutting back on an unneeded luxury in a time of fiscal constraint for our defenses, this proposal is a bad idea that has dangerous and unwanted consequences in many other areas regarding the morale and welfare of our military forces.

If enacted, this legislation would in effect convert the millions of dollars invested by Service members and their families in building, improving and operating military golf courses and apply those funds for use in a speculative effort to generate funds for the U.S. Treasury. The legislation would also substantially reduce Service members' capability to generate additional revenue to support other "Quality of Life" programs that would therefore require increased tax support.

S.1551 would open military golf courses to the general public and limit income to not more than 10 percent of gross revenues for expenses and support to other programs. The remaining revenue, about 90 percent, would be used to reduce the Federal deficit.

This legislation would reduce the Service members' own revenue generating capability. It would also increase funding requirements by over \$100 million to offset golf expenses that would no longer be covered by drastically reduced income. The funding shortfall on MWR programs that rely on golf course profits would increase the tax support requirements (which are currently underfunded) by the same amount that would go to the Treasury.

This legislation would also send a strong signal to Service members and their families that their non-pay compensation benefits are being eroded. Military golf courses are played at or near capacity. The average rounds of play exceed those of semi-private and even municipal courses. The majority of players and those who will be most impacted by the legislation are active duty enlisted members.

The average municipal course requires about 70 percent of its gross revenue to meet operating expenses. Military courses require an even higher percentage due to a reduced fee benefit that would probably no longer be tenable. This legislation only allows up to 10 percent of gross revenue to be used for operating expenses. Although this bill authorizes the Secretary of Defense to subsidize golf fees for active and retired military members, the only authorized source for the subsidy would be the military members' own (non-appropriated) funds.

Beyond erosion of benefits to Service members and loss of revenue for "Quality of Life" programs, other problems would arise if the proposed bill was enacted. In some cases, opening golf courses to the public would compromise base security. Additionally, we know from experience there would be complaints of unfair competition from public and private golf course operators who are trying to make ends meet. MWR programs are not intended to compete with or duplicate like businesses outside the installation, but to complement them. Communities' needs for more golf courses ought to be addressed by the normal public and private processes

open to them rather than by degrading a benefit that Service members themselves have bought and paid for.

This legislation could ultimately result in the closure of MWR golf courses and would certainly not be in the best interest of the military, the government or the general public.

The Office of Management and Budget advises that, from the standpoint of the Administration's program, there is no objection to the presentation of this report for the consideration of the Committee.

At Tab I is a proposed memorandum to the Executive Secretary, Department of Defense, approving military exercise INSPIRED ALERT 94-2. At Tab II Defense recommends approval and State concurs with provisos.

INSPIRED ALERT 94-2 is a combined U.S./Pakistan naval air exercise. The exercise is designed to enhance military-to-military cooperation between Pakistan and U.S. forces. State concurs in the exercise provided that the Department of Defense takes "all necessary measures to ensure strict compliance with the prohibitions of in the Pressler Amendment." The Pressler Amendment precludes training assistance to Pakistan, sales or transfers of U.S. military equipment or technology to Pakistan and funding of expenses or provision of commodities, services, or other assistance to benefit Pakistan or Pakistani participants in connection with this exercise. This exercise will take place in vicinity of North Arabian Sea and Pakistani territorial airspace.

The critical cancellation date is May 7, 1994.
