Forwarded for your approval and signature is the recommendation for assignment of Major General Richard M. Scofield, as Commander, Aeronautical Systems Center, Air Force Materiel Command.

SUBJECT: General Officer Nomination

I recommend you assign Major General Richard M. Scofield as Commander, Aeronautical Systems Center, Air Force Materiel Command, an authorized lieutenant general position. General Scofield, age 56, currently serves as Program Executive Officer, Strategic Systems, Air Force Program Executive Office, Office of the Secretary of the Air Force. He will succeed Lieutenant General James A. Fain, Jr., United States Air Force, who I am nominating for another appointment.

In my September 21, 1993 memorandum, I recommended that you assign General Scofield as Commander, Space and Missile Systems Center, Air Force Materiel Command, and nominate him for appointment to the grade of lieutenant general. The nomination for appointment to lieutenant general is pending Senate confirmation. I recommend you continue to support the appointment to the grade of lieutenant general. If you approve the change in assignment, I will notify the Senate Armed Services Committee. Your signature on this memorandum will indicate your approval.

In order to carry out the duties and responsibilities of the proposed assignment, a general officer must have demonstrated effective performance in senior leadership positions involving the acquisition of aeronautical systems, subsystems, and related equipment. He must be able to plan and manage advanced engineering development projects. General Scofield meets these requirements.

Because General Scofield's selection for promotion to brigadier general was based primarily on scientific and technical qualifications, he has not served in a joint duty assignment. Therefore, the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff did not provide a joint duty evaluation. This action will not cause the Air Force to exceed the number of officers authorized to be serving in the grade of lieutenant general.

S. 2182 - National Defense Authorization Act
for Fiscal Year 1995
(Nunn (D) GA)

The Administration supports S. 2182, but has serious reservations regarding certain provision of the bill. The Administration will work with Congress to resolve its concerns and other issues that the Administration may identify during its further review of the bill.

S. 2182 provides for many of the Administration's key national security programs, including: (1) readiness (including funding for the Defense Business Operations Fund); (2) the proposed C-17 airlifter settlement between the United States and McDonnell Douglas; (3) the CVN-76 and other shipbuilding programs; (4) the B-2 Bomber, F/A-18 E/F, F-22, V-22, and E-8C Joint Stars aircraft programs; (5) defense reinvestment; (6) payments to the United Nations for peacekeeping activities; (7) Cooperative Threat Reductions (Nunn-Lugar); (8) military-to-military contacts; (9) environmental restoration programs; (10) NATO infrastructure; (11) industrial mobilization authorities; and (12) certain military construction programs.

S. 2182, however, contains several provisions that are inconsistent with the President's FY 1995 Budget request. The Administration urges the Senate to amend these provisions to make them consistent with the President's request. These provisions would:

- Reduce funding for high priority programs, including:
 - (1) procurement of F/A-18 C/D aircraft by \$250 million; (2) construction of two chemical demilitarization facilities by \$261 million; and
 - (3) the relocatable-over-the-horizon radar by \$13.8 million.
- Divert \$601 million that is needed for sealift ships to fund amphibious assault ship (LHD-7) that will not be required for several years.

- Divert \$43.0 million from the National Defense Sealift Fund to establish a National Defense Features program, sacrificing needed sealift for the Ready Reserve Force.
- Authorize more than \$1.5 billion for unrequested acquisition programs, including: (1) bomber industrial base preservation, (2) National Guard and Reserve equipment, (3) M1A2 tank upgrades, (4) Army tactical missiles (Javelin, Hellfire, and Stinger), (5) Marine Corps prepositioning ships, (6) precision guided munitions, (7) limited reactivation of SR-71 surveillance aircraft, and (8) other miscellaneous programs.
- Authorize a 2.6 percent pay raise for military personnel beginning January 1, 1995. The President's Budget requested a 1.6 percent pay raise for civilian and military personnel. The 2.6 percent pay raise for military personnel would cost an additional \$0.4 billion in FY 1995 and an additional \$2.8 billion during FYs 1995-1999.
- Authorize unrequested military construction projects for the National Guard and Reserve.
- Authorize Reserve end strengths of 9,290 more than requested. The potential annual cost of the additional personnel is over \$100 million.
- Prevent closure of the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences (USUHS), as recommended by the National Performance Review. Failure to close the USUHS would increase Department of Defense spending by \$286 million between FYs 1995 and 1999 and by over \$60 million annually thereafter.

In addition, the Administration opposes these following provisions that would:

- Require 15-day advance reporting before initial deployment of U.S. combat forces. This is inconsistent with the President's constitutional prerogatives and responsibilities.
- Reauthorize a joint committee to review U.S. counterproliferation programs. The National Security Council is leading a review of the coordination of research and development in the nonproliferation, counterproliferation, and arms control areas. The proposed committee could prejudice the outcome of this review.

- Transfer responsibility for tritium production from the Department of Energy to the Department of Defense. This function should remain with the Department of Energy, which has cradle-to-grave responsibility for the maintenance and reliability of nuclear warheads.
- Assign the Secretary of Defense responsibility for: (1) reporting on reforming multilateral peace operations; (2) providing certain humanitarian assistance; and (3) reviewing compliance with the ABM Treaty. Such authorities should be vested in the President.
- Create new exemptions from various labor laws and authorize the military departments to use inmates of State and local correctional facilities to perform certain labor on military installations. This provision could easily displace gainfully employed workers and disrupt local economies.

Finally, the Administration would strongly oppose amendments that would fund entitlement programs (retiree COLAs) with discretionary funds. This would undermine the principle that new mandatory spending should be offset by reductions to existing mandatory spending and would establish an undesirable precedent for future funding of entitlement programs.

Pay-As-You-Go Scoring

S. 2182 would increase direct spending and receipts; it is, therefore, subject to the pay-as-you-go requirement of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990. OMB's preliminary scoring estimates of this bill are presented in the table below.

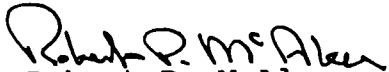

REMARKS BY THE PRESIDENT
AT
RAMSTEIN AIR BASE, GERMANY

July 11, 1994

Thank you, General Oakes (Commander, USAF Europe, with HQ at Ramstein). Chancellor Kohl, General Joulwan, General Oakes, Colonel _____ (86th Wing Commander): it is a great pleasure for me to be with you this evening at Ramstein and to have the opportunity to greet the men, women and families of the magnificent 86th Wing.

As I look out at all of you and hear your enthusiasm and your strength, I am reminded that for all of our incredible technological advances, the strength of our military is not really in our fighter planes, our ships, or our tanks, it is in you -- the dedicated professionalism of the men and women of the United States Armed Forces.

You are beyond question the best trained, the best equipped fighting force the world has ever known. And I want you to know that I am committed unequivocally, absolutely, to ensuring that you continue to have what you need to do your job. You deserve it. Our security demands it.

Last month, I came to Europe to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Italian and Normandy campaigns and to honor the brave soldiers, sailors and airmen who fought and who died in those battles. As we pay tribute to them and in the months ahead to those who served in other campaigns of World War II, we must also honor those of you who serve now, who are continuing the legacy they left us. For if we learned any lesson from the magnificent, heroic, almost unbelievable endeavor of D-Day, it was that if the allies would stay together and stay strong, we would never need another D-Day. That is what you are guaranteeing. And your country is deeply in your debt.

D-Day was the pivot point of the 20th century. It began Europe's liberation. In ways great and small, the Allied victory proved how democracy's faith in the individual saved democracy itself. Our victory proved what free nations can accomplish when they unite behind a great and noble cause.

The remarkable unity among the Allies during World War II -- let us face it -- reflected the life-or-death threat facing freedom. Democracies of free and often unruly people are more likely to rally in the face of that kind of danger. But our challenge now is to unite our people -- Americans, Germans, Britons, French and all the peoples of our great alliance -- to unite them all around the opportunities of peace as those who went before us united against the dangers of war.

Fifty years later, what a different world we live in. Germany, Japan and Italy, liberated by our victory, now stand among our closest Allies and the staunchest defenders of freedom. Russia, decimated during the war and frozen afterward in communism and Cold War, has been reborn in democracy. And as freedom rings from Prague to Kiev, the liberation of this continent is nearly complete.

Even though the Cold War is over, we are still on the eve of great endeavors -- not to turn back armies of oppression that threaten our very existence, but to protect our safety and security and to expand the blessings of liberty. This work will not be done in a day or year. It will not be finished during the term of your service. It may not be finished in the life of this great nation, but it must continue.

The question for this generation of leaders is whether we have the will, the vision and, yes, the patience to do it. Let me state clearly where the United States stands. America will remain engaged in Europe. On Tuesday, I will take part in a solemn and historic ceremony: the deactivation of the U.S. brigade in Berlin. That event will provide a vivid reminder of the extent to which we have succeeded in moving away from the hostility and confrontation of the Cold War. But let no one - no one - assume or read into this event any intent on the part of my Administration to withdraw all our forces from Europe or otherwise disengage our military presence on the Continent.

The entire transatlantic alliance benefits when we, Europe and America, are both strong and engaged. My Administration has concluded that that means maintaining roughly 100,000 U.S. troops in Europe, and I will strongly oppose efforts by those in Congress who want to force us to go below this level. I believe America wishes a strong Europe, and Europe should wish a strong America, working together.

You - the dedicated servicemen and servicewomen at Ramstein -- have shown what the U.S. Armed Forces can accomplish when they work together. From 1991 through 1993, your splendid F-16 fighter squadrons, the 512th and the 526th, flew nearly 5,000 combat air patrol and armed reconnaissance sorties over Northern Iraq as part of Operation Provide Comfort. Since 1993, Ramstein F-16s flying out of Aviano Air Base, Italy, have flown almost 2,000 combat air patrol and close air support missions over the former Yugoslavia as part of Operation Deny Flight. And, on February 28th of this year, it was F-16s from the 526th that shot down four Bosnian Serb Air Force fighters that had violated the No-Fly Zone and were bombing a munitions factory.

In closing, I want to pay special tribute to those here at Ramstein and over at Rhein Main who have been engaged in the humanitarian airlift mission into Bosnia. Later tonight I will depart for Berlin. All Americans of an older generation as well as millions around the world remember the Berlin Airlift in 1949 (check) and how the U.S. Air Force came to the rescue of that beleaguered city. Yet, I suspect, few Americans realize that this generation's United States Air Force, operating out of Rhein Main and Ramstein and other bases in Europe has now carried on an airlift operation into Bosnia that has surpassed the Berlin Airlift both in missions flown and duration. I salute you. America salutes you. And most important, the men and women and children of Bosnia who otherwise might have perished salute you.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

I understand that an amendment may be offered during Senate consideration of the FY 1995 Defense Authorization Bill that would seriously damage our critical submarine industrial capabilities. This amendment would prohibit the authorization of funds for construction of the third, and final, SEAWOLF submarine.

Your assistance in ensuring that the Senate understands that I strongly oppose any such amendment would be important to me. The United States simply cannot afford to lose our technical edge in submarine construction and the individual skills that have been developed over decades. As validated by the Bottom Up Review, authorizing SSN-23 in FY 1996 is the most economical and low risk option for preserving the submarine industrial base until the new nuclear attack submarine (NSSN) begins construction later this decade.

I look forward to working with you on this crucial national security program.

Purpose

To express to Senator Nunn, who is managing the Senate floor debate on the FY 1995 Defense Authorization Bill this week and next week, your support for funding the third, and last, SEAWOLF class submarine (SSN-23).

Background

Senator McCain will most likely table an amendment to the FY 1995 Defense Authorization Bill that would prohibit funding for the construction of any SEAWOLF class submarines beyond the two currently authorized -- SSN-21 and SSN-22. Long lead funding for the third submarine of this class, SSN-23, is included in this year's Administration budget proposal to maintain the industrial base until the follow-on or "new" SSN class (NSSN) is ready to begin construction at the end of this decade.

Opponents of the SEAWOLF submarine argue that it was designed for an open-ocean Soviet threat that no longer exists. Furthermore, they argue that we cannot afford the cost of SSN-23 in the current budgetary environment. However, the Bottom Up Review confirmed that the best way to maintain critical industrial skills until the NSSN begins production four or five years from now is to build the third SEAWOLF.

RECOMMENDATION

That you sign the letter at Tab A indicating your support for SSN-23.

Senator McCain will most likely soon table an amendment that would prohibit funding for the third, and last, SEAWOLF class submarine. This submarine, SSN-23, is needed to maintain the shipbuilding industrial base until the "new" class of nuclear attack submarines (known as the NSSN or the "Centurion" class) is ready to begin construction at the end of this decade.

Senator McCain argues that the SEAWOLF was designed for an open-ocean Soviet submarine threat that no longer exists. He further argues that the price of SSN-23 makes it an unaffordable program regardless of industrial base issues. I understand that an amendment may be offered during Senate consideration of the FY 1995 Defense Authorization Bill that would seriously damage our critical submarine industrial capabilities. This amendment would prohibit the authorization of funds for construction of the third, and final, SEAWOLF submarine.

Your assistance in ensuring that the Senate understands that I strongly oppose any such amendment would be important to me. The United States simply cannot afford to lose our technical edge in submarine construction and the individual skills that have been developed over decades. As validated by the Bottom Up Review, authorizing SSN-23 in FY 1996 is the most economical and low risk option for preserving the submarine industrial base until the new nuclear attack submarine (NSSN) begins construction later this decade.

I look forward to working with you on this crucial national security program.

Purpose

To express to Senator Nunn, who is managing the Senate floor debate on the FY 1995 Defense Authorization Bill this week and next week, your support for funding the third, and last, SEAWOLF class submarine (SSN-23).

Background

Senator McCain will most likely table an amendment to the FY 1995 Defense Authorization Bill that would prohibit funding for the construction of any SEAWOLF class submarines beyond the two currently authorized -- SSN-21 and SSN-22. Long lead funding for the third submarine of this class, SSN-23, is included in this year's Administration budget proposal to maintain the industrial base until the follow-on or "new" SSN class (NSSN) is ready to begin construction at the end of this decade.

Opponents of the SEAWOLF submarine argue that it was designed for an open-ocean Soviet threat that no longer exists. Furthermore, they argue that we cannot afford the cost of SSN-23 in the current budgetary environment. However, the Bottom Up Review confirmed that the best way to maintain critical industrial skills until the NSSN begins production four or five years from now is to build the third SEAWOLF.

RECOMMENDATION

That you sign the letter at Tab A indicating your support for SSN-23.

This submarine, SSN-23, is needed to maintain the shipbuilding industrial base until the "new" class of nuclear attack submarines (known as the NSSN or the "Centurion" class) is ready to begin construction at the end of this decade.

Senator McCain argues that the SEAWOLF was designed for an open-ocean Soviet submarine threat that no longer exists. He further argues that the price of SSN-23 makes it an unaffordable program regardless of industrial base issues. The Bottom Up Review confirmed, however, that it would be less economical and more risky to shut down and then restart a submarine construction industrial base in four or five years. These considerations justify our support of funding the SSN-23 as the best way to "bridge" the gap until production of the NSSN begins.
