On another note, Larry, I wanted to let you know that I have been in touch with the 10th Mountain Division at Fort Drum and spoke to its Commander, Major General Meade, and the commander of the company to which Sergeant Houston was attached. Both officers confirm that Sergeant Houston was in stable condition when he was air evacuated to Germany and was under the constant medical care of U.S. Army personnel during the hours following his being seriously wounded, including the time he spent at the Pakistani compound.

I might mention that on June 30, the 10th Mountain Division held a very dignified and moving memorial service in honor of Sergeant Houston, which was attended by his widow, Carmen, his children and other immediate family members. Lieutenant General Williams, the head of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, delivered the principal tribute and the base named its engineering building in Sergeant Houston's honor.

Mr. Don Cox, President of Interactive Marketing, Inc. of Waltham, Massachusetts, has written to you about expanding cooperative manufacturing extension programs in western Massachusetts to include software firms.

Mr. Cox's idea appears to have merit, and the Administration's concept of fostering dual-use technology clusters should be broad enough to include software manufacturers.

ARPA's Technology Reinvestment Project (TRP) is putting greater emphasis this year on Regional Technology Alliances, designed to foster regional clusters of firms developing dual-use technologies. I have discussed Mr. Cox's approach with Dorothy Robyn of the NEC, who has the TRP lead, and she agrees that the Regional Technology Alliances program should be applicable. She is also willing to meet with Mr. Cox to discuss his ideas in more detail.

If you wish, I will be happy to serve as a point of contact for Mr. Cox and provide him with additional information and references.

Dear Tony:

Congratulations on your progress regarding the talks with North Korea. I know it has been a long and winding road.

Tony, I am writing to seek your guidance, and perhaps help. As you most likely are aware, there is a major statewide initiative to create "extension" programs utilizing ARPA funding for the support of various industry sectors throughout Massachusetts. The approach is to establish cooperatives that jointly determine various industry segments in terms of technical and capital assistance for the ultimate goal of increased job formation.

Currently this program in Western Mass. excludes software firms because they are not "manufacturers". I feel that this is much too narrow a definition, and am proposing to both the Bay State Skills Corp. and the Mass. Department of Economic Affairs, under Gloria Larson, to have such software industries considered "manufacturers", and thus allow them to participate in this program, if they so desire.

Such a program would rely extensively on the support of the UMASS Computer Science Department, as the enclosed proposal indicates. Furthermore, it appears as though some of the software-based firms I have been in discussions with play quite a factor in national defense, including the Kollmorgen, the VI Corporation, Black Board Technology and the newly formed Ameritext Corporation out of UMASS. Through a radically expanded cooperative effort such as I propose, these firms could benefit the region in creating new jobs, and perhaps the national security effort through further developments of their products (Please see enclosures).

Several rather low technology "manufacturing" cooperatives such as paper manufacturers and machine shops are including in this program Western Mass. But this effort will not take the region into the next millennium, let alone the next decade, because it excludes such software knowledge workers, which currently account for over 400 such jobs in Western Mass. to date. For myself this is a frustration personally because I would like to move back to Cummington and participate in what is desperately trying to become a growth industry in the area.

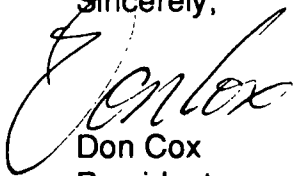

OVERVIEW

There has recently been a superb initiative in establishing "extension" programs in five regions of the state to help spur economic growth and jobs formation, as outlined in the recent report by Linda Melconian's Senate Committee on Science and Technology's report, "Meeting The Bay State Challenge."

In Western Mass. a great deal of focus has been placed on the re-vitalization of the manufacturing sector, via cooperatives such as the Berkshire Plastics Network, the association of machine shops that previously thrived on demand from United Technologies, and of course the paper industry. In all these cases the recipients of this support all fall under the realm of what many consider classic manufacturing firms, i.e. they have a production line and make a tangible product.

The thrust of this proposal is that computer software firms should also be considered "manufacturing" firms in order that they qualify for "network funding" to organize and identify common problems and to locate the solutions they need.

In particular, the extension program out of the University of Mass at Amherst has focused to a large extent on the vital need to resuscitate the industrial base, which was the engine for jobs formation throughout the twentieth century. This incubation program is a vital effort in terms of stemming the flow of jobs to other regions of the country, but it does not take into account the fact that, in the words of Michael K. Hooker, President of the University of Mass., "The Twentieth Century ended in 1988." What we also need is a program to take Western Mass. into the twenty-first century by incubating firms that "manufacture" knowledge based products.

OVERVIEW (Cont.)

This proposal outlines the manner in which such a program could be developed in Western Mass., targeting the vital and growing base of software companies through the adoption of an industry driven non-profit cooperative centered around the UMASS at Amherst's Computer Science Department.

In an effort to establish such a network for incubating these firms I have surveyed this growing industry and have developed a preliminary list of 20 software firms operating in Western Mass.. Surprisingly, this preliminary list, which doesn't even take into account individual computer consultants, accounts for the full time employment of over 481 individuals. These firms produce products that cover an incredible range of products from custom based payroll systems, to laser printer software, to advanced vision and voice recognition systems (See Attachment One).

PROPOSAL

I propose to establish and administer a non-profit cooperative, tentatively called the Western Massachusetts Software Alliance (WMSA), to facilitate the coming together of these firms, in much the same way as other cooperatives in the region have done. The purpose of this alliance is to determine the various means by which their current growth can be rapidly accelerated based on their identification of common needs.

My preliminary discussions with the presidents many of these firms indicates that they all could greatly increase their growth, both in terms of taxable revenue and jobs formation, through the guidance and support of the UMASS at Amherst in terms of the following deliverables:

- * Provision of enhanced programming tools to increase productivity.
- * Access and guidance in the adoption of evolving ISO 9002 software quality control standards.

- * Guidance as to the use of evolving user interface technologies such as voice and visual recognition technologies.
- * A linkage with Dynamics Research of Andover that is exploring the commercial applications of learning systems based on simulation technologies.
- * Marketing assistance in determining viable domestic and international long term horizontal and vertical markets, as well as a guidance in the evolution of new distribution techniques such as easy access to internet and other on-line services.

In particular the cooperative could act as a liaison to such groups as the ISP for marketing assistance, as well as the UMASS Computer Science Department, which is a major node on Internet.

- * Access to enhanced large scale data base retrieval methods as may be available though the University's Center For Intelligent Information Retrieval, currently funded by the National Science Foundation.

I propose to establish and facilitate the cooperative, in order to bring an industry, rather than purely academic framework to this incubation effort. I am convinced my skills in bringing new high technology products to market can provide a real contribution (See Attachment Two).

However, to make this happen the industry needs a minimal amount of "networking funds" from the Bay State Skills Corp. to first form the association and create the inertia needed to "sell" it to the participating companies through topical forums, secondly to ensure that the ultimate delivery of solutions is provided through rigorous project management.

DISCUSSION

Traditional manufacturing firms are very different from software "manufacturers" in a variety of aspects. We have seen the case where extensive efforts on the part of the university to provide prototype factories for traditional manufacturers often do not ensure local jobs formation.

In truth this is regrettably understandable because, once a traditional manufacturer considers its overall burden rate in terms of taxes, capital formation for full scale production facilities, and costs for an acknowledged high priced labor force, they often consider an attempt to extract further public support in term of massive concessions, or they look to relocate in order to be a world class competitor in terms of price.

The story of Millitech alone makes this process clear, and explains why many project the traditional manufacturing base in Western Mass. will decline from 27% to 17% over the next several years. A sharp contrast to the growth of the software manufacturers in the region.

Why The Software Industry In Western Mass. Defies This Model

The software manufacturers in the region represents a growing sector of the economy that generally enjoys a reduced burden rate, can take advantage of the lower cost labor of software "engineers" flowing from the five college area and does have the potential to create an overall environment that would make both their firms and their workers want to stay in the region. Indeed one could easily understand why a software industry is more likely to stay near its incubator environment because:

- * A knowledge-based industry does not need the same capital expenditures on plant and equipment that traditional manufacturing firms do.

Why The Software Industry In Western Mass. Defies This Model (Cont.)

- * Many such knowledge-based workers are sensitive to the quality of life issues that are so prominent in Western Mass., as best evidenced by the analogous success of Microsoft Corporation, which intentionally located in a high quality of life setting in Seattle, Washington.
- * The UMASS at Amherst Computer Science Department is considered by many to be a world class facility with a full node to the internet, a fiber optic linkage to Boston and a track record of spawning commercially viable enterprises as Amerinex Artificial Intelligence, The Blackboard Technology Group, HBO & Company, VI Corporation and Specular International.
- * Additionally, many universities have gained international reputations and have grown their faculty considerably based on specialization around key software technologies, in concert with the Internet node status.

This has been the case for such institutions as the University of California in statistics, the University of Minnesota in providing internet access through Gopher and the University of Arizona through internet central access to advanced education systems.

Thus such cooperation between the local software community and the university can lead to economies of scale to both grow the local industry while growing the population of faculty and graduate students at the incubating university - as a result these host universities have a track record of attracting additional federal funding.

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSION

In summary, it is proposed that, based on the number of jobs already formed in this region by the software industry, funding for the cooperative network be undertaken as a first step, and that ultimately consideration should be given to the potential for matching grants and technical assistance such as are now being undertaken under the MMP program.

Tab II is a proposed report, prepared by the Department of Defense, explaining DoD opposition to S-34, a bill to provide relief for Randall G. Hain. The bill would pay Mr. Hain \$50,000 as damages for alleged improprieties regarding his induction into the United States Army. Mr. Hain claims that the Army wrongfully inducted him into service in 1966 despite the metal plate in his leg, a result of a non-service related fracture in 1963. He further claims to be suffering from ailments related to the aggravation of this injury while in the service.

The DoD notes that Mr. Hain's case has received several extensive hearings already: two unsuccessful suits in Federal district court, three petitions before the Army Board for Correction of Military records and numerous claims before the Veterans Administration. Mr. Hain has lost each of these appeals on substantive grounds.

Senator Heflin requested that the Department of Defense respond directly to you with its views of Randall G. Hain's allegations of improprieties regarding his induction into the United States Army. As a result of Mr. Hain's allegations, Senator Durenburger has introduced a private relief bill, S. 34, 103d Congress, on Mr. Hain's behalf.

The Secretary of the Army, on behalf of the Department of Defense, opposes this bill, which would pay Mr. Hain \$50,000 for any damages incurred as the result of his induction into and service in the United States Army from October 13, 1966, to August 23, 1968. The bill would also deem Mr. Hain to have a 50 percent service-connected disability arising from that service.

In two unsuccessful suits in Federal District Court, in three unsuccessful petitions before the Army Board for Correction of Military Records (1984, 1985, and 1990), and in numerous claims with the Veterans Administration, Mr. Hain has alleged that he was wrongfully inducted into the United States Army in violation of applicable medical induction standards and subsequently should have been discharged with some degree of disability rating. He now blames his present poor physical and mental health on his military service.

In 1963 Mr. Hain fractured his leg in a traffic accident. He required several permanent screws and a metal plate. A 10 December 1965 Standard Form (SF) 89, Report of Medical History, prepared during a preinduction physical noted the fractures (left femur and left tibia) and that a non-union of the left femur was corrected with a bone graft and plate. It also noted some pain on exertion and some flexion limitation. The SF 89 found Mr. Hain qualified for induction.

On his DD Form 398, Statement of Personal History, Mr. Hain indicated he wanted to attend school in the clerical field while in the service. He also indicated that "because of [his] leg injury, [he] wanted to stay out of the infantry."

2

The Army honored Mr. Hain's request. He was inducted on 13 October 1966, and after attending basic training, he trained as a clerk-typist. He served in that capacity or as a personnel specialist for 22 months, including six months in Vietnam. He was discharged honorably from the Army in August 1968.

Mr. Hain's 1963 fractures did not adversely affect his service. His medical records indicate that once in October 1966 and apparently twice in November 1966, he sought treatment for soreness and pain in his leg "while walking, running and standing." He was given medication and told to apply heat. His medical records describe no additional complaints about his leg during the last 20 months of his service. In medical records documenting a 1988 examination by Veterans Administration doctors, Mr. Hain stated that his back pain and leg pain actually got better in basic training and did not give him much of a problem until around 1977.

This is consistent with Mr. Hain's service record. He was promoted to pay grade E-5, and his DD Form 20 characterized his efficiency and conduct as excellent.

Mr. Hain was separated from active duty on 20 August 1968 to attend school. His separation physical found him medically fit for separation, noting a bilateral hearing loss as the only change to his physical profile. When Mr. Hain was asked to fill in block 17 of the SF 89 for his preinduction physical, he characterized his health as "bad." When asked to fill in the same block on his separation physical, he wrote only "Loss of Hearing."

Army Regulation (AR) 40-501, change 15, 11 March 1966, established the medical standards under which Mr. Hain's condition was evaluated. Chapter 2 listed the medical conditions which, absent a waiver, were the basis for rejection for military service in 1966. Mr. Hain argued in his 1990 petition (his third) to the Army Board for Correction of Military Records (ABCMR) that based on chapter 2, paragraph 2-11g, he was medically unfit for induction. In October 1966 paragraph 2-11g read in relevant part as follows:

Fractures

(3) Any old or recent fracture in which a plate, pin or screws were used for fixation and left in place and which may be subject to easy trauma, i.e., as a plate tibia, etc.

The doctor who conducted Mr. Hain's preinduction physical noted the fracture and plate. By finding Mr. Hain fit for induction into the service, the doctor implicitly concluded that the injury was not subject to "easy trauma."

In 1985 the ABCMR informally requested that the Office of the Surgeon General review Mr. Hain's case. The Chief of the Evaluation and Inquiries Branch examined the report from Mr. Hain's 1963 operation and also concluded that Mr. Hain was fit for induction. The Chief who performed this review specifically referred to change 15 of AR 40-501, which was in effect on the date of Mr. Hain's induction.

In 1990, also at the request of the ABCMR, the Orthopaedic Consultant to The Surgeon General, Colonel Jack K. Tippens, examined Mr. Hain's records. He concluded that Mr. Hain was not fit for induction. Colonel Tippens, however, also noted that the injury "exist[ed] prior to term of service" and was not significantly aggravated by service. Thus, Mr. Hain would have been ineligible for medical disability payments even if he had been given a medical separation during basic training after he complained of leg and back pain.

Colonel Tippens was contacted at his present duty station in conjunction with the preparation of this report on 8. 34. He stated that when he reviewed Mr. Hain's case in 1990, he used the regulatory standard for induction in effect in 1990. Colonel Tippens reviewed AR 40-501, paragraph 2-11g, change 15, 11 March 1966, and concluded that on 13 October 1966, Mr. Hain was medically fit for induction into the service.

In his 1990 petition to the ABCMR, Mr. Hain argued that not only was he medically ineligible for induction, but that a board should have assessed his medical condition before he was separated in August 1968. The ABCMR correctly noted that even if Mr. Hain did not meet induction standards, he was not necessarily entitled to a board upon separation.

Army Regulation 40-501, change 22, 19 June 1968, effective on the date of Mr. Hain's separation, noted that the performance of duty despite an impairment was presumptive evidence of physical fitness. As indicated above, Mr. Hain's fracture and plate did not interfere with his duty performance. Consequently, because he fractured his leg before he was inducted and because his military service did not aggravate that fracture, Mr. Hain was not entitled to any medical processing upon separation.

The many Veterans Administration reviews of Mr. Hain's medical condition since his separation confirm that his present medical problems (except his hearing loss) either existed prior to his term of service or were simply not service connected. Accordingly, Mr. Hain is not entitled to any monetary compensation based on his induction into and his service in the United States Army.

damages incurred by that individual (including any injury or
aggravation of any injury relating to or arising from a leg injury

of that individual) as a result of

- (1) the induction of that individual into the United States Army; and
- (2) the service of that individual in the United States Army during the period from October 13, 1966, to August 23, 1968.

(b) **CONDITION OF PAYMENT.**--The payment of the sum referred to in subsection (a) shall be in full satisfaction of any claim of the individual referred to in that subsection against the United States arising out of the induction and service described in that subsection.

!!SEC. 2. DISABILITY RATING.!!

(a) **IN GENERAL.**--Notwithstanding any other provision of law, Randall G. Hain of Eden Prairie, Minnesota, shall be deemed to have a service-connected disability rated at 50 percent for the purposes of chapter 11, title 38, United States Code, as a result of injuries of that individual incurred during or aggravated by the service referred to in section 1(a)(2).

(b) **PROHIBITION ON RETROACTIVE BENEFITS.**--Benefits may not be paid under chapter 11 of title 38, United States Code, to Randall G. Hain as a result of the enactment of this Act for any period before the date of the enactment of this Act.

!!SEC. 3. LIMITATION ON ATTORNEY AND AGENT FEES.!!

(a) **IN GENERAL.**--Not more than 10 percent of the amount appropriated pursuant to section 1 to the individual referred to in that section shall be paid by or on behalf of that individual to any agent or attorney or received by any agent or attorney from or on behalf of that individual for services rendered in connection with the claim described in that section.

(b) **ENFORCEMENT.**--Any person who violates the provisions of this section shall be fined not more than \$1,000.
