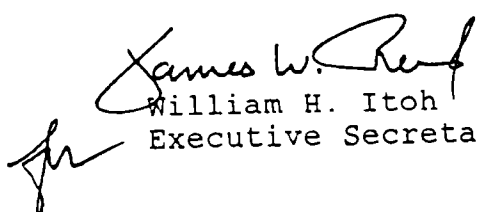

SUBJECT: Request for Special Air Mission

In furtherance of the President's foreign policy and national defense objectives with regard to the Anti-Ballistic Missile (ABM) Treaty and Theater Missile Defense (TMD) Demarcation, the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency (ACDA) requests that a special air mission aircraft be made available to the ACDA Director, John D. Holum, and the senior interagency delegation that he has been asked by the National Security Advisor and OSD to lead to Russia, Ukraine, and Belarus. The purpose of this mission is to convey the President's recent ABM/TMD Demarcation decisions in order to maximize the opportunity for success in upcoming negotiations in the Standing Consultative Commission (SCC) to the ABM Treaty.

ACDA has evaluated commercial travel options for this trip and has determined that it would not be feasible to reliably complete visits to the three capitals in order to conduct the high level consultations in advance of the upcoming negotiations in the SCC which begin on July 25 (and which will be based on the results of this trip). In addition, the necessity for maintaining confidentiality in our sensitive negotiations is better served by a dedicated air mission.

A tentative itinerary for this trip is as follows:

- July 12: A.M. Departure by Delegation from Andrews AFB enroute to Moscow. RON.
- July 13: Consultations with high level MFA and MOD officials. RON.
- July 14: A.M. Departure enroute to Kiev. Consultations with Ukrainian MFA and MOD officials. Mid-day Departure enroute to Minsk. Consultations with Belarusian MFA and MOD Officials. P.M. Departure enroute to Andrews AFB.

ACDA requests that this mission be designated as a Presidential Mission and that the aircraft be made available on a non-reimbursable basis. ACDA further requests that the NSC Executive Secretary affect the necessary coordination within the White House, the NSC, and DOD for this special air mission request. The ACDA General Counsel has cleared this request.

Thank you for your consideration. Please contact me if there is any additional information required to support this request or any further actions in which we can properly assist.

PRESIDENT WILLIAM JEFFERSON CLINTON
REMARKS AT RAMSTEIN AFB, GERMANY
JULY 11, 1994

Thank you, General Oakes (Commander, USAF Europe, with HQ at Ramstein), Chancellor Kohl, General Joulwan, Colonel _____ (86th Wing Commander), it is a great pleasure for me to be at Ramstein this evening and to have the opportunity to greet the men, women and families of the magnificent 86th Wing.

You remind Americans back home that for all of our incredible technology, the strength of our military is not simply a matter of fighter planes, ships or tanks. Our strength comes from you, the dedicated professionals of the United States Armed Forces.

Last month, I came to Europe to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Italian and Normandy campaigns and to honor the brave soldiers, sailors and airmen who fought and who died then. Tonight, I honor you who serve now, who continue the legacy they left us. The lesson of their sacrifice was that if the allies would stay together and stay strong, we would never need another D-Day. You guarantee that, and your country and the world are deeply in your debt.

The world we live in is different from the one we were born into. Last week, I became the first American President ever to step foot on free Baltic soil. Tomorrow, I will be the first American President to walk into what we used to know as East Berlin. The walls between nations are coming down. The bridges between nations are going up. And the long awaited liberation of Europe is nearly complete.

You have been the front line in America's mission to keep peace and expand freedom all over the world. From 1991 through 1993, your distinguished F-16 fighter squadrons flew nearly 5,000 combat air patrol and armed reconnaissance sorties over Northern Iraq as part of Operation Provide Comfort.

Since 1993, Ramstein F-16s flying out of Aviano Air Base, Italy, have flown almost 2,000 combat air patrol and close air support missions over the former Yugoslavia as part of Operation Deny Flight. And, on February 28th of this year, your F-16s shot down the four Bosnian Serb Air Force fighters that had violated the No-Fly Zone and were bombing a munitions factory.

When we remember the Berlin Airlift of 1948 and '49, we are still justly proud of how the United States Air Force came to the rescue of that beleaguered city during one of the most trying standoffs against Communism. Yet, few know that our airlift into Bosnia has now surpassed the Berlin Airlift, both in duration and in missions flown. To the operation participants at Ramstein and Rhein Main, I salute you. Your country salutes you. We are thankful that you are out here, doing freedom's hard work.

PHOTOCOPY PRESERVATION

Tomorrow, the United States will deactivate our brigade in Berlin. This solemn ceremony will remind us of the peace we now enjoy in Europe. But let no one - no one - think that my administration will withdraw all forces from this Continent. Though the Cold War is over, dangers still exist in the world. America must and will remain engaged in Europe.

The entire transatlantic alliance benefits when we are strong and engaged. To stay this way, America must maintain roughly 100,000 U.S. troops in Europe. I will oppose anyone who wants to force America below this level. A more secure Europe means a more secure America.

As long as I am President, you will remain the best-trained, best-equipped fighting force in the world. You must continue to have what you need to do your job. You deserve it. Our security demands it. And I will do my best to see to it. Thank you, and God bless you all.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

The Frank-Shays amendment on reduction of United States military forces in Europe, adopted by the House on May 19, would seriously undermine our national security policy; it should therefore be struck from the FY 95 National Defense Authorization Act. Although United States forces in Europe, now reduced to approximately one-third of their earlier strength, no longer face a monolithic military and political threat from the East, this does not mean that a substantial United States troop presence is not required.

Our troop presence is the basis on which the NATO alliance is built and the linchpin of our contribution to the only effective and enduring self-defense pact in the post-Cold War era. Our ability to influence Allied policies and to formulate coordinated approaches on key security issues is enhanced by maintaining a strong military presence in Europe. That presence gives us a decisive voice in important decisions critical to guaranteeing our own security, such as obtaining support for the Gulf War or NATO's political and military outreach to the East. Reducing that presence would reduce our influence. Our troop presence is a key element in promoting stability and security in Europe, East and West, and is essential to democracy, economic prosperity, and trade.

In addition, a significant American military presence through NATO is the only currently available insurance against revival of a military threat to Western Europe. The new threat of instability is the residue of oppressive and ineffective communist rule. In the face of that insecurity, potential military missions are more varied and more difficult to predict. United States troops in Europe project a United States forward presence, deter aggression, and participate in the burgeoning number of military-to-military and outreach programs to the East that are integral to our efforts to maintain the peace. The Partnership for Peace, which attempts to extend a sense of security toward the East, is ensured through United States leadership and underwritten by the presence of United States forces in Europe.

The sharing of responsibilities in Europe is a continuing subject of consultation with our Allies. We do not ignore the importance of burdensharing. But cost sharing should be placed in a broader context of responsibility sharing, which much more accurately reflects the United States security relationship with Europe. We have recently tabled host nation support proposals with the Federal Republic of Germany and the United Kingdom, and the Department of State will continue to push vigorously for the lowest possible overseas stationing costs. However, we must not unnecessarily place at risk our enduring interests in Europe. A dramatic reduction in our force levels will be viewed by our Allies -- and the Central and Eastern Europeans -- as a lessening of the United States commitment to Europe.

The contributions of the NATO Allies to our collective interests cannot be measured only by their contributions to the cost of stationing United States troops in Europe. The Europeans in concert with the United States commit resources to ensure stability and order -- as demonstrated by their efforts in the Gulf War and Bosnia -- and to assist the countries of Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. It is to our NATO Allies that we turn in a crisis, and it is their support and cooperation we seek in promoting and projecting United States interests globally.

The United States presence in Europe enhances our ability to protect the United States national interest and contributes to world peace and security, the advancement of democratic values and human rights, and access to open markets and economic opportunities. We should not forget that the United States tried twice in this century to disengage from Europe. Both times, history proved it to be a terrible and costly mistake.

The Office of Management and Budget advises that from the standpoint of the Administration's program there is no objection to the submission of this report.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

The Fiscal Year (FY) 1995 Defense authorization bill reported by your committee supports the President's request in many important ways. Now as you prepare for the authorization conference, I want to convey to you my views on several major issues to be resolved.

The House bill's deep Operation and Maintenance (O&M) cuts will seriously damage the combat readiness of U.S. forces, which President Clinton and I have stressed must be our top priority. Readiness will suffer severely from the cumulative effect of several billion dollars in reductions associated with a dozen different proposals, none of which can be achieved or should be accepted, and all of which will mean immediate damage to the ability of our combat forces to respond to crises.

The damage from deep O&M cuts would not be lessened by a provision requiring the Administration to extract greater contributions to shared security burdens from allied nations. In my view it is highly unrealistic to expect that our allies can be convinced to increase Host Nation Support and other contributions above the levels in our budget. Such provisions most likely would have to be absorbed by drawing down already constrained overseas funding, markedly damaging the readiness of America's forward-deployed forces. Similarly damaging is the House provision requiring cuts to U.S. troop levels in Europe if our allies' contributions fall short of congressional goals, as well as inadequate House funding for NATO infrastructure.

Readiness would likewise suffer from the House's recommended transfer of \$1 billion from the Defense Business Operations Fund (DBOF) and its \$.5 billion reduction in the DBOF capital purchase program. If these funds are not reinstated, we certainly would need to continue the advance billing of customer accounts beyond FY 1995, and yet the House legislation prohibits that. Also of concern is the Senate's \$380 million cut to our DBOF request. Reductions of this magnitude risk dropping FY 1995 DBOF cash below the minimum levels required for adequate depot maintenance, supply, transportation, and other support of force readiness.

The House O&M reductions of \$680 million for information technology and \$350 million for contractor/consulting services may have been made with the belief that they might not hurt U.S. forces excessively. However, these cuts in fact threaten force readiness significantly. Also damaging to readiness, and to morale, would be the Senate's \$200 million cut for PCS moves.

I am troubled by the House's restrictions for the Cooperative Threat Reduction (Nunn-Lugar) and military-to-military contacts programs. These efforts advance critical foreign policy objectives with the states of the Former Soviet Union. We need full funding of these programs and the flexibility to execute them most wisely.

I urge your approval of the \$300 million requested for payments to the United Nations for peacekeeping activities. Failure to do so could doom the President's very important shared responsibility policy for peace operations, which calls on the State Department and DoD to share responsibility for management and funding of peace operations according to the respective strengths of each. DoD funding of the relevant portion of our UN peacekeeping assessments ensures that military expertise is brought to bear on peace operations that have a significant military component.

I urge the conferees to omit the House provision requiring the President to terminate the U.S. arms embargo of Bosnia. Our nation is actively engaged in complex and delicate diplomacy to achieve a peaceful solution to the war in Bosnia, and passage of this provision could seriously undermine our efforts.

The acquisition of advanced defense systems remains important, and our budget reflects that. To move toward achievement of an efficient production rate for the C-17, we need the higher of the two authorizations and support of our comprehensive settlement with McDonnell Douglas. Our forces also need the budgeted amounts for other investment programs, especially those seriously underfunded in one of the bills, such as AVENGER, Biological Defense, F/A-18 C/D, Joint STARS, and TESAM. Regarding the CVN-76 aircraft carrier, I urge support of the Senate's funding approach.

Funds taken from these and other essential programs went to various unrequested uses, including: Army tactical missiles, bomber industrial base preservation, M1A2 tank upgrades, Marine Corps prepositioning ships, National Guard and Reserve equipment, Army and Navy helicopters, new space launch vehicle, SR-71, and unrequested military construction. This added spending should be redirected to our underfunded requests.

On Selected Reserve activation authority, DoD must have access to certain Reserve capabilities to support important operational missions, especially during the earliest stages of a developing crisis. The House bill approved much of the change we requested, and I urge your support of its provisions.

One of our very top DoD priorities is to streamline our infrastructure, which would be undermined by House provisions that would limit DoD's ability to contract for depot maintenance activities and require us to retain unneeded depot capacity. We simply cannot afford to shelter any element of our support structure, as we downsize and seek the best return for every DoD budget dollar. I strongly recommend that the conferees reject Sections 304, 322, 323, and 325 of the House bill and instead support the Department's plan to retain only as much depot maintenance capacity as needed for our reduced force structure.

I am also troubled by the House prohibition of DoD payments of any costs associated with a merger or acquisition that are incurred by Defense contractor. Many defense contractors are restructuring to become more cost-efficient and competitive. Some are acquiring parts or all of other companies--then restructuring for the same reasons. Whether the restructuring occurs coincident to an acquisition/merger or not, it is in the Government's best interest to allow these costs in order to motivate cost-efficient downsizing. If this House provision is enacted, the price DoD pays for goods and services can only increase.

Mr. Chairman, I urge you to consider the above concerns, as well as our detailed appeal documents being forwarded to your committee separately.

DRAFT STATEMENT BY PRESIDENT

REPORT ON SHOOTDOWN OF U.S. HELICOPTERS OVER IRAQ

I have been briefed by Secretary Perry on the report prepared by Major General Andrus of 3rd Air Force on the accidental downing on April 14 of two U.S. Army helicopters that were flying over Iraq as part of Operation Provide Comfort. I commend Secretary Perry, General Shalikashvili and General Andrus for producing a thorough and objective analysis of what went wrong on that fateful day and for ordering a sensible program of corrective actions to ensure it is never repeated. I shall look forward to receiving progress reports from Secretary Perry and General Shalikashvili as these measures are implemented.

In considering this report, we are inevitably drawn to specific issues related to errors of commission and omission, to equipment that failed and to procedures that were not followed. But we must also keep in mind that Operation Provide Comfort has been a very successful coalition effort. Because of Operation Provide Comfort, Iraq has effectively been deterred from disrupting peace and order in the UN-established security zone. Because of Operation Provide Comfort, human rights abuses against the Kurdish population of northern Iraq have been curtailed.

On the day of the shootdown, I said that the 26 brave American, allied and Kurdish personnel who died in the crashes were part of a mission of mercy. They served with courage and professionalism, and they lost their lives trying to save the lives of others. I said then, and I say again today, the important work they were doing must, and will, continue.

Some days later, in remarks at the Memorial Service for the victims of this tragedy, I noted that these 15 Americans represented the best in our country. Today, as on that day, the hearts of all Americans go out to their families. On that sad occasion, I said that it is our duty to find the answers to this tragedy that these families rightfully seek. The report Secretary Perry is releasing today fulfills that pledge.

PROVIDE COMFORT ACCIDENT INVESTIGATION

Proposed Questions and Answers

Q: Why did this tragedy occur? What was the primary cause of the accident?

A: There was no single, primary cause of the accident. It was an avoidable tragedy. The accident occurred as a result of a series of events. The investigation found that there were deficiencies in command guidance and direction as well as human failure.

Q: What is being done to correct the problems revealed as the result of the accident investigation?

- Comprehensive actions have been taken, are underway or will be taken to correct the institutional deficiencies and individual error revealed in the accident investigation.
- Rules of engagement for the "No-Fly Zone" have been modified to reduce the likelihood of future inadvertent shoot-downs. Clear directions have been provided for the supervision of helicopter operations and for coordinating them with fixed-wing operations. And improvement and standardization has been made in flight crew indoctrination and training in important mission areas.

Q: The victims of this tragedy included U.S. Army and Air Force personnel, as well as citizens of United Kingdom, France and Turkey and Kurdish representatives. Were all of these countries and organizations included in the investigation?

A: The investigation board was made up of pilots, aircrew members and maintenance personnel from the Air Force and the Army, electronic warfare analysts, medical and psychological experts, and computer analysts. There were also associate members of the board from France, Turkey and the United Kingdom.

Q: Have the next-of-kin of the deceased, both here in the U.S. and abroad, been notified of the findings of the Accident Investigation?

A: We have sent people to each of the next-of-kin to individually brief them on the findings and to provide them with a copy of the full report. We have also briefed the British, French and Turkish governments on the findings and sent representatives to the next-of-kin of the deceased from those countries.

- Q: You said that this investigation indicated deficiencies in command guidance and direction and human failure. What human failures do you believe contributed to the accident?
- A: In view of the need to avoid even the perception of improper command influence as it relates to possible military administrative or legal proceedings, I will not address any specific human failures. Responsible commanders will determine what actions are appropriate for each case based on their review of the investigation.
- Q: What AWACS and F-15 squadrons were involved in the accident?
- A: The report does not identify individual units or personnel directly associated with the accident. This is consistent with Department of Defense policy not to disclose information which might reveal the personal identities of aircrew members and others immediately involved with friendly fire incidents.
- Q: The investigation states that under U.S. Code any opinion of the accident investigators as to the cause of, or the factors contributing to an accident set forth in the Accident Investigation Report, may not be considered as evidence in any civil or criminal proceedings arising from the aircraft accident. What does this mean?
- A: It means that the opinions of the Board cannot be used in any way in civil or criminal actions arising from the accident, or as an admission of liability against the United States or any individual. Facts and evidence gathered by the Board may be used for any purpose; the Board's opinion, expressed after that cautionary language, may not.

On April 14, two Air Force F-15 fighters under the control of an Air Force airborne control plane (AWACS) accidentally shot down two Army Black Hawk helicopters in northern Iraq, resulting in the loss of 26 lives. The accident was the result of errors, omissions and failures in the procedures of Operation PROVIDE COMFORT, the performance of air units involved, and the operation of equipment used:

- The Combined Task Force failed to integrate helicopter operations with other air operations in the "no fly zone." Consequently, on April 14, the F-15 pilots were not made aware of the Black Hawk flight prior to takeoff, the Black Hawks were allowed to enter the "no fly zone" before the F-15s, and the aircraft were not all communicating on the same radio frequencies.
- Although the Black Hawks checked in with the AWACS twice, no one effectively monitored the flight while in the "no fly zone" or told the F-15 pilots that there were Black Hawks in the area. Then, even though the AWACS's Identification-Friend-or-Foe system indicated that friendly aircraft were in the vicinity of the F-15s' engagement, no one advised the F-15 pilots, warned the Black Hawks or otherwise tried to stop the engagement.
- The F-15s' Identification-Friend-or-Foe systems did not effectively alert the F-15 pilots that the helicopters were friendly aircraft.
- The F-15 pilots did not correctly identify the helicopters after one visual identification pass each and proceeded to shoot them down. The flight lead misidentified them as Iraqi Hind helicopters; the wingman was unable to make a positive identification.

I also direct that the flag shall be flown at half-staff for the same length of time at all United States embassies, legations, consular offices, and other facilities abroad, including all military facilities and naval vessels and stations.

THE PRESIDENT: On behalf of the American people, I want to begin by expressing my deep sorrow at the tragedy this morning in Iraq, and to extend my personal condolences to the families and the loved ones of all those who lost their lives.

Three years ago, our Armed Forces joined in a multinational mission to provide humanitarian relief to the oppressed Kurdish minority civilians in northern Iraq. Those who died today were a part of that mission of mercy. They served with courage and professionalism, and they lost their lives while trying to save the lives of others. The important work they were doing must, and will continue.

According to initial reports, two American helicopters were mistakenly identified as Iraqi helicopters and shot down by United States aircraft. I have met with Secretary Perry this morning; I have talked with him and with General Shalikashvili, and have instructed him to lead a full inquiry into the circumstances of this terrible incident. We will get the facts. And when we get the facts, we will make them available to the American people and to the people of Britain, France, and Turkey, our partners in Operation Provide Comfort.

Later today, Secretary Perry and General Shalikashvili will be providing further briefings to you as we know more and more facts. The facts are still coming in and we will give them to you just as soon as we have verified exactly what occurred.

At this moment, let me close by saying that we should join together in terrible sorrow, and also in honoring the high purpose for which these individuals served and in which they lost their lives. The nation and the world should remember them in gratitude. Thank you.

Q Mr. President, what's your preliminary assessment though? What are you being told of how this could have happened? And is there any suggestion that the troops there are on too fine a hair trigger?

THE PRESIDENT: Well, all that will have to be, obviously, evaluated in light of the real facts here. There are at least three points of inquiry involving, first, the actions of the American jets; second, the AWACS and their actions and, third, the actions of the helicopters themselves. And, again, I will tell you we will give you as much information as we can. I just am very reluctant to say anything until we're absolutely sure. I want you to have good information, and we will be doing continuous briefings and updates all day long as we know more.

Q Do you know anything, Mr. President, about the numbers of people that might be involved, and whether they were all American?

THE PRESIDENT: I've not thought through your first question; I don't know the answer to that. We have generally quite good relations with Singapore. They have a different culture, a different view, a different set of laws.

As you know, I have not objected to the young man's being punished. I have not even objected to the young man's being incarcerated. I have objected to this caning. I think many Americans who have expressed sympathy with it do not understand exactly what it involves, how it is going to be administered, and that he is going to bleed considerably and may have permanent scars. And I think it is a mistake.

President Bush will have to decide for himself what he wishes to say, but I would -- if he decides to say something supportive of the absence of caning, I would certainly be grateful for that. But that -- it will be a decision for him to decide what he wants to say.

THE PRESIDENT: Today in this chapel built for heroes, we come to mourn the lives and to celebrate the lives of those who died on April 14th. To all the families who are here present and the families who are not here, I think it should be clear that in addition to the distinguished leaders of our military, the clergy and the friends, the spirit of all Americans is in this chapel today. The hearts of all Americans have gone out to these families.

When we joined three years ago with Britain and France and Turkey to protect the Kurds of Northern Iraq, to shelter them from air attacks, to sustain them with shoes and coats and food and fuel and medicine, the world took note of something continually special about our great nation and what drives us.

The lives of the Americans and their 11 compatriots who were lost reflected that spirit, those values, that heart, that hope that brought us to protect the Kurds in the first place. They were literally part of a mission to provide comfort. They have honored us all with their compassion and courage and, ultimately, with their sacrifice.

We know, as has already been said, that those who enter the military understand clearly that they assume great risks; that even though the world has changed, that the specter of the Cold War is fading, the way of life we cherish as Americans and our hopes for the rest of the world still depends upon their skills, their sacrifice, their courage and their clear willingness to undertake those risks.

And yet I have to say that as President and as an American, when it becomes the job of those of us in positions of responsibility, to explain loss to these wonderful families, that came about through about through a terrible accident, the burden of reminding all of us that all who served undertook those risks is still very great.

We must remember not only those who died for their service to their country but for how they were loved. We must all rest of us in America pray for these families -- for the husband and the father whose young child will now have to learn about him through photographs and stories; for the family of an ambitious young man who wished to go to college and become an artist; for a distinguished American veteran of more than two decades whose soldiers loved him for his steel and his heart; for the wonderful daughter and sister who lifted those around her with her vigor and promise; or the young pilot who grew up with his heart set on the skies, and for all the others.

Their lives were suddenly taken from their beloved families and from our nation and our service and their important mission. No one's words can wipe away the grief, the pain, the

Q: The United States has lost many servicemen and women in peacekeeping operations. How important is the Provide Comfort mission today?

A: This tragic accident should be viewed in the context of three years of safe and highly successful operations in deterring aggressive Iraqi behavior and assisting the people of northern Iraq. Together with our coalition partners, the men and women of the Provide Comfort Task Force have served a noble cause in the conduct of their mission. They have provided critical humanitarian support to people in desperate need and, through the use of measured force, established essential security safeguards for the more than three million people in northern Iraq who need our help.

Q: Some observers have suggested that this accident indicates that U.S. forces might be returning to the "Hollow Forces" of the late 1970s and early 1980s as a result of insufficient funding for military programs or an overextension of our military personnel. Was lack of training or inadequate funds a factor in the accident?

A: The investigation did not reveal any indications of a lack of readiness or training that could be tied to a shortfall in military funding or overextending our military personnel.

Q: What disciplinary action will be taken against those responsible for this tragedy?

A: This investigation indicates that there were a number of causal factors. Given the gravity of results, care must be taken to avoid improperly influencing future determinations of culpability. Secretary Perry will forward the report of this investigation to appropriate commanders -- without recommendation or suggestion regarding disposition in any particular case -- and request that they review the report to determine what, if any, action is appropriate in individual cases. I will not attempt, nor even appear to attempt, to influence subordinate commanders in this process and their decisions.

Q: What are the possible administrative and/or legal actions that might be taken?

A: There are a broad range of possibilities, but it would not be appropriate to speculate at this time. It will be the decision of the responsible commanders to determine what, if any, actions are appropriate for each individual case based on their review of the investigation.

In remarks at the Memorial Service for the victims, I said that it is our duty to find the answers to this tragedy that these families rightfully seek. The report Secretary Perry is releasing today is an important step toward fulfilling that pledge.
