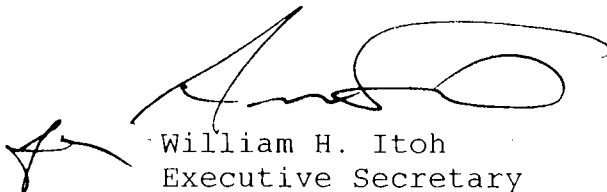

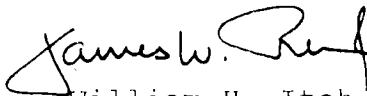

Attached at Tab I is a proposed memorandum to the Executive Secretary, Department of Defense, concurring in the military exercise EAGER MACE 95-1. At Tab II Defense recommends approval and State concurs.

EAGER MACE 95-1 is slated to occur in numerous locations throughout the territorial waters, airspace, and land mass of Kuwait from December 15 - 23, 1994. It is primarily intended to exercise amphibious assault capabilities of a forward deployed Amphibious Ready Group/Marine Expeditionary Unit and to reinforce American regional security commitments. Some U.S. elements will train with Kuwaiti forces. Approximately 4,350 U.S. troops are involved in the exercise.

The critical cancellation date is December 8, 1994.

At Tab A is Congressman Vento's request to the Superintendent of Arlington Cemetery for an exception to the eligibility requirements for burial at the Cemetery for SGT Daly. Sgt Daly was killed in the line of duty yesterday in the Washington Police Station House and was the husband of a staff member of Congressman Vento. A former Marine, SGT Daly is not eligible for ground burial because he is not a career veteran nor a winner of the Silver Star or Purple Heart (he is eligible for inurnment).

The Secretary of the Army or the President may waive the eligibility requirements. The White House Military Liaison Office's only concern relates to any precedent being set. 140 persons have been waived since 1967, and most were extended family of those already buried in the Cemetery. Tab B is a list of the 28 who were waived and were not extended family.

A waiver of the eligibility requirements would not only honor this Vietnam veteran who was honorably discharged in 1966, but it would also speak to the Administration's complete support for those engaged in crime prevention.

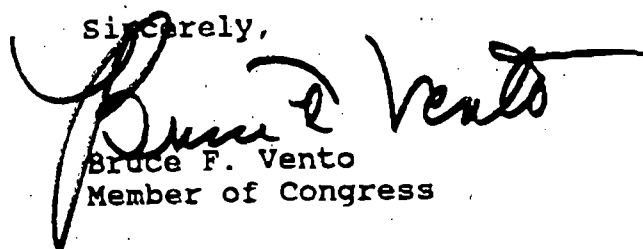
I am contacting you regarding the tragic death of SGT Henry Daly of the Washington Police Department and his burial arrangements.

SGT Daly, killed in the line of duty yesterday in the Washington station house, was the husband of my long-time staff assistance, Mrs. Mary Ann Daly. SGT Daly was a veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps, born 10-15-43, honorably discharged from service in 1966. SGT Daly's Social Security Number is 122-34-4557.

As far as can be determined, SGT Daly is not eligible for burial in Arlington National Cemetery under traditional guidelines. However, given the circumstances of his death and his family's strong desire he be interred in Arlington, I am asking for immediate action to provide an exception and allow SGT Daly's family to bury him in Arlington. I understand your recommendation in this matter will be forward to Acting Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil Works, Dr. Zirschky. I will of course provide any further information necessary to assure the prompt and favorable disposition of this request. At Tab A is an article that appeared in a Huntsville, Alabama newspaper which highlights one soldier's exuberant reaction to news of your November 22 signing of an Executive Order expediting naturalization for noncitizens who served in the U.S. Armed Forces during the Persian Gulf Conflict. In an interview with a Huntsville News reporter, Army Sergeant Manuel Bojorquez-Pico mentioned how this affirmed his faith in our system of government and made numerous grateful comments, chief among these comments was:

"I cannot find the words to express my gratitude. I'm speechless. This is the end of a story that has gone on for so long. Thank the Lord and thank my commander-in-chief."

This morning Bob Bell talked to Sgt. Bojorquez-Pico and congratulated him on his diligence and perseverance in seeking American citizenship, for Sgt. Bojorquez-Pico was the soldier who first wrote requesting this Executive Order. One of his final comments to Bob was that "the President will be in our prayers on Thanksgiving Day."

Clinton issues executive order for Gulf War veterans

"We did it! We did it!"

A Redstone Arsenal soldier could not contain his joy Tuesday night when he learned President Clinton was giving him a very happy Thanksgiving.

Sgt. Manuel Bojorquez-Pico, a Mexi-

can native who has lived in the United States for half his life, has been under the cloud of possible deportation. Months ago he wrote to Clinton, asking him to make him who served in the U.S. military during the Persian Gulf War eligible for citizenship.

On Tuesday, Clinton granted that request.

The Associated Press moved the following brief story last night:

"Clinton orders citizenship fast track for Gulf War veterans (headline).

"WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton ordered Tuesday that foreigners who served with the armed forces during the Persian Gulf War be made eligible for naturalization as U.S. citizens on

an expedited basis.

"In an executive order, Clinton said the speedier process will apply to aliens and non-citizen nationals who served on active duty during the Persian Gulf hostilities between Aug. 2, 1990 and April 11, 1991."

After a Huntsville News reporter read the story over the phone to Bojor-

quez-Pico, there was a moment of silence.

Then he shouted: "Do you know what that means? We did it! We did it! My God! You just gave me the best Thanksgiving call I could ever get."

"This is great! You don't know what

this me to me."

The soldier said he had a call recently from a "highly reliable source" who told him an executive order was on the way. But he didn't want to get his hopes too high.

"This is the greatest moral victory you could think of," he said. "This means I will be naturalized as soon as possible."

"I cannot find the words to express my gratitude. I'm speechless. This is the end of a story that has gone on for so long. Thank the Lord and thank my commander-in-chief."

Bojorquez-Pico said he plans to be naturalized in Atlanta at the first opportunity.

He said many people have worked behind the scenes for months to make his victory possible, including U.S. Rep. Bud Cramer, D-Ala., and U.S. Sen. Richard Shelby, R-Ala. Their work on his behalf "maintained my attitude, my faith that this would work."

In September, Clinton sent a letter to Cramer stating that he had directed Attorney General Janet Reno and Secretary of Defense William Perry to investigate Bojorquez-Pico's case and prepare a report.

Born in Mexico, Bojorquez-Pico lived in the United States as a boy and returned to Mexico for a few years. He then came back to the states and enlisted in the Army.

After years of exemplary service (according to the testimony of his superiors), the Immigration and Naturalization Service

claimed he gave up his permanent residency status when he returned briefly to Mexico.

When he contacted the *News*, several months ago, he said he was in danger of being deported at any time.

Cramer and Shelby both wrote to Clinton asking the president to grant the soldier's request to natu-

ralize resident aliens who served in the military during the Gulf War. Shelby also contacted Department of Defense officials seeking their help.

Although Bojorquez-Pico did not take part in combat, he was on active duty during the 1990-91 conflict and could have been sent overseas. Copies of *News* articles about the case were also sent to the White House.

The 32-year-old sergeant has lived in Huntsville for the last two-and-a-half years. His wife, Ruby, was also born in Mexico, but their two sons were born in the United States.

Bojorquez-Pico said he visited the Mexican Consulate in Atlanta last Friday and was told he gave

up his Mexican citizenship when he joined the U.S. Army: "When I raised my hand and took the oath, I was no longer a Mexican. Since then, I've been living in no man's land."

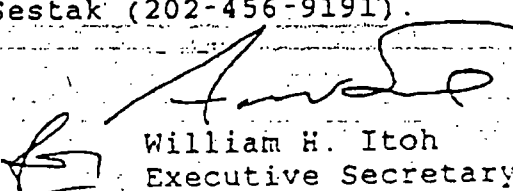

SUBJECT: Freedom of Navigation Program (U)

United States security and commerce depend upon the internationally recognized freedoms of navigation and overflight of the seas. Since 1979, the United States has successfully conducted a Freedom of Navigation (FON) Program to protect U.S. navigation, overflight, and related interests on, under, and over the seas against excessive maritime claims. The purpose of the FON program is to preserve the global mobility of U.S. forces by avoiding acquiescence in excessive maritime claims of other nations. (U)

This directive provides current guidance for the management and organization of the FON program and supersedes National Security Decision Directive 265. (C)

Policy

While not a signatory to the 1982 Convention on the Law of the Sea (LOS Convention), the United States considers the Convention to accurately reflect the customary rules of international law concerning maritime navigation and overflight freedoms. (U)

General U.S. policy on the Law of the Sea is contained in NSDD-83 (U.S. Oceans Policy, Law of the Sea, and Exclusive Economic Zone) and the President's Oceans Policy statement of March 10, 1983. (C)

This policy provides that the United States will respect those maritime claims that are consistent with the navigational

provisions of the LOS Convention. Additionally, the United States will exercise and assert its navigation and overflight rights on a worldwide basis in a manner consistent with the LOS Convention. The United States will not acquiesce in unilateral acts of other states designed to restrict the rights and freedoms of the international community in navigation and overflight and other traditional uses of the high seas. (U)

The Freedom of Navigation Program combines diplomatic action and operational assertions of our navigation and overflight rights to encourage modification of, and to demonstrate nonacquiescence in, maritime claims that are inconsistent with the customary rules of international law pertaining to maritime navigation and overflight freedoms. (U)

Categories of Excessive Maritime Claims

U.S. interests are to be protected against the following categories of excessive maritime claims:

1. Historic bay/historic water claims not recognized by the United States. (U)
2. Territorial sea baseline claims not drawn in conformance with the customary international law reflected in the LOS Convention. (U)
3. Territorial sea claims not exceeding twelve nautical miles in breadth that:
 - a. overlap straits used for international navigation and do not permit transit passage in conformance with the customary international law reflected in the LOS Convention, including submerged transit of submarines, overflight of military aircraft, and surface transit of warships/naval auxiliaries, without prior notification or authorization, and including transit in a manner of deployment consistent with the security of the forces involved; or
 - b. contain requirements for advance notification or authorization for innocent passage of all vessels, including warships/naval auxiliaries, or apply discriminatory requirements to such vessels; or
 - c. apply special requirements, not recognized by international law, for innocent passage based on means of propulsion, armament, or cargo. (U)

4. Territorial sea claims in excess of twelve nautical miles. (U)
5. Other claims to jurisdiction over maritime areas in excess of twelve nautical miles, such as security zones, that purport to restrict non-resource related high seas freedoms. (U)
6. Archipelagic claims that either:
 - a. do not permit archipelagic sea lanes passage in conformance with customary international law reflected in the LOS Convention, including submerged passage of submarines, overflight of military aircraft, and surface transit of warships/naval auxiliaries, without prior notification or authorization, and including transit in a manner of deployment consistent with the security of the forces involved; or
 - b. are otherwise not in conformance with customary international law reflected in the LOS Convention. (U)

Program Guidance

1. The Department of State shall act assertively to preserve U.S. navigation and overflight rights under international law. The Department of State shall use its facilities, here and abroad, to encourage each state with excessive maritime claims to conform its laws and/or conduct with customary international law concerning maritime navigation and overflight freedoms. The Department of State shall protest excessive maritime claims to avoid legal acquiescence. (C)
2. The Department of Defense will plan and administer the operational assertion portion of the FON Program under the following procedures:

Criteria for the selection of an excessive maritime claim for the annual list will include, but are not limited to, the following:

-- territorial sea claims (of 12 nautical miles or less) that include: unlawful restrictions or requirements relating to innocent passage (paragraph 3b, above); or that apply unlawful discriminatory restrictions or requirements based on means of propulsion, armament, or cargo (paragraph 3c, above);

-- other claims to jurisdiction over maritime areas in excess of twelve nautical miles, such as security zones, that purport to restrict non-resource related high seas freedoms (paragraph 5, above) (b)(1)

11. The Department of Defense will provide to the Department of State and the National Security Advisor a semiannual list of operational assertions conducted under the FON Program. The Department of State shall, when appropriate, use the semiannual list of operational assertions in its diplomatic efforts to preserve United States navigation and overflight rights under international law. The Department of State will publish an annual unclassified summary of the diplomatic activities under the FON Program. (U)

12. On an annual basis, the Department of Defense will incorporate into an already existing report an unclassified listing of FON operational assertions conducted during the previous year. The listing will specify the country and excessive claim, but not the date or frequency of the assertion. Assertions specified in the annual list will become unclassified upon incorporation into the report. (U)
