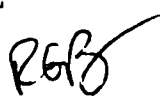

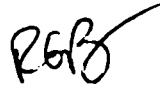

I. PURPOSE

To thank Lieutenant Shelton and Servicemembers for their contributions as part of the Multinational Force in Haiti by presenting the Army Distinguished Service Medal to the General and personal decorations to representatives of each of the Services. - 2:15 p.m. (Invited guests arrive at the West Lobby and are escorted into the Roosevelt Room.)
- 2:20 p.m. Secretary Perry, Admiral Owens, General Sullivan, along with Lieutenant General Shelton (Commander of U.S. troops in Haiti) and his family arrive at the West Lobby and are escorted to the Cabinet Room.
- 2:30 p.m. Secretary Perry, Admiral Owens and General Sullivan escort General Shelton and family into the Oval Office, via the hallway entrance. Introductions are made. White House Photographers/TV enter the Oval for brief photos (approximately 3 minutes), then depart via the Hallway door.

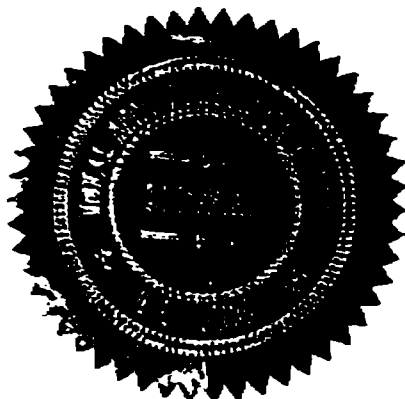

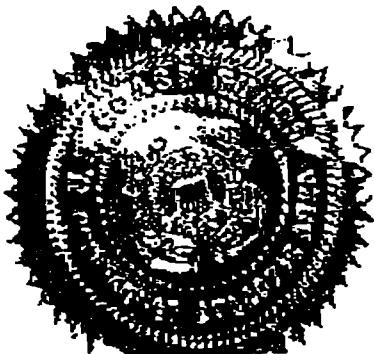

Petty Officer BROWN is cited for outstanding achievement while serving as an Operations Center watchstander, Harbor Defense Command, Port au Prince, Haiti, from 9 September to 1 November 1994. Due to his professionalism and initiative, Petty Officer BROWN was selected as a member of the Harbor Defense Command (HDC) Initial Response Team that deployed to Port au Prince, Haiti. The HDC Initial Response Team was based on board USCGC CHASE (WHEC 718) where Petty Officer BROWN singlehandedly supervised his watch section in the direction of security in the harbor, vessel traffic control, and cargo offload operations. He was directly responsible for the rapid opening of Port au Prince Harbor on D-Day and for supervising the smooth offload of the critical cargo to support U.S. Army operations ashore. Because of his efforts, the transition of the Harbor Defense Command from USCGC CHASE to ashore went smoothly. Once ashore, Petty Officer BROWN was instrumental in the establishment of a highly effective command center where he assisted in the coordination of numerous medical evacuations, vessel assistance, Search and Rescue operations, and the control of an enormous volume of vessel traffic without a single accident or life lost. Petty Officer BROWN's contributions in support of Operation UPHOLD DEMOCRACY helped set the standard for future Harbor Defense Command operations. 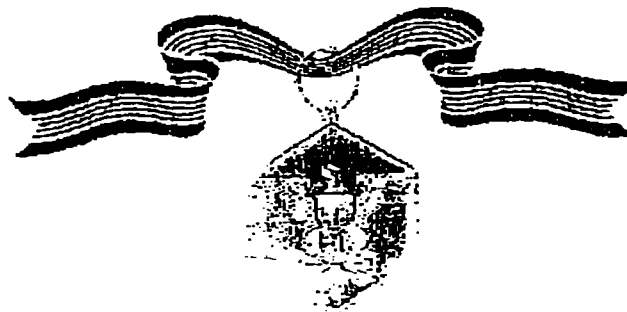

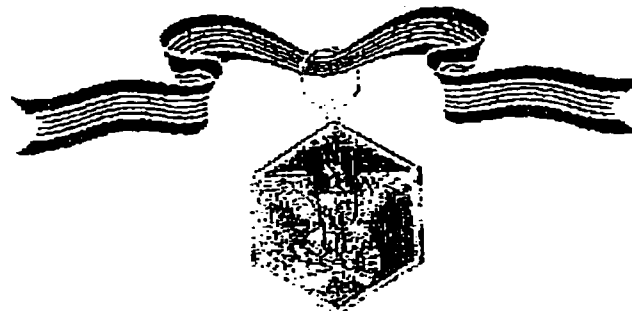

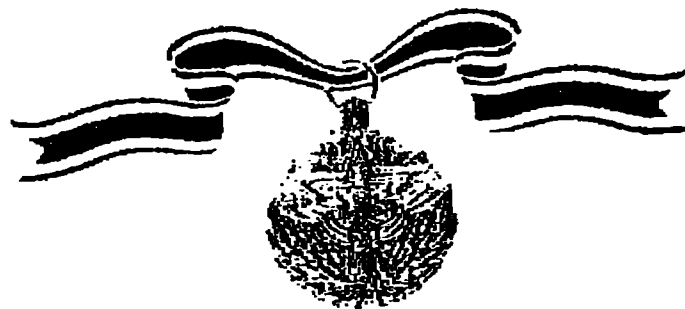

On December 14 the Air Force Chief of Staff, General Ronald Fogleman, briefed the Roles and Missions Commission on what he labeled "the corporate Air Force position." In most cases, this varied little from General McPeak's views. But, because Fogleman's style and presentation was less provocative than his predecessor's, the current Air Force position is likely more palatable in tenor, if not substance, to the other Services.

CORE COMPETENCIES AS CENTRAL ARGUMENT

McPeak wrapped his arguments in fiscal savings and limiting or eliminating redundancies. Fogleman, however, ignored the fiscal restraint argument and instead limited his comments to redundancy issues, saying, that because the Services have a tendency to try and carve out as much turf as possible, they have created redundant capabilities. The Air Force, he explained, already has existing capabilities that other Services are trying to replicate. Thus, it is essential that future decisions recognize and build on Service core competencies. This is really the heart of the largely unchanged Air Force position.

Air forces, explained Fogleman, create options for all U.S. Armed Forces. From an airman's perspective, air normally arrives on-scene first, is highly flexible and can respond to a wide-ranging set of missions. Air and space superiority, theater-based precision long-range attack, and global and theater mobility are Air Force core competencies, explained Fogleman. While some duplication is desirable, the Air Force view is that the land forces (Army and Marine Corps) are trying to get involved in the deep battle. Not only is this unnecessary, but it relates to traditional Service component desires for component self-sufficiency--a practice that provides unneeded duplication, according to General Fogleman.

Building from these enduring core competencies are a set of fundamental Air Force roles. These roles include aerospace control (air superiority), force application (strategic attack, interdiction, close-air support), force enhancement (airlift, space employment, aerial refueling, special operations, surveillance, etc.), and force support (infrastructure support for the Service). These "roles" differ slightly from General McPeak's brief. General Fogleman explicitly include "orphan roles" such as the strategic and theater airlift role (something his predecessor neglected) and retracted the earlier Air Force proposal to turn the CAS role over to the Army.

Fogleman explained that the Air Force is still prepared to provide fixed-wing CAS, although its value and viability IS declining relative to maturing integrated JSTARS and rotary-wing CAS capabilities. Over time, he explained, fixed-wing CAS may grow apart from other forms of CAS but they cannot be divorced; therefore, the Air Force must remain in the CAS business. [This point will likely still remain quite controversial with the other Services on various grounds: JSTARS is not effective in all types of terrain, there is a measure of economic inefficiency in just developing single-purpose (fighter) rather than multi-purpose (fighter-attack) technologies, and there is a risk of a future technological development antiquating a single-purpose weapons system--such as might occur, for instance, if there was a total reliance on helicopters for CAS.]

INTERPRETING THE AIR FORCE POSITION

The corporate Air Force views have changed little under its new Chief of Staff. This should be expected, though, because the views are based on an ingrained Service culture--something all the Services bring to the roles and missions table.

Most contentious issues in the current roles and missions debate revolve around differing conceptions of joint warfighting. As I mentioned in a previous memo, ground commanders view airpower as a supporting arm--as something that shapes the battlefield in order to help influence conditions that are exploitable by the ground commander. Airpower theorists, however, see airpower as a decisive force in its own right. Even though air forces are generally employed jointly with other Services, they can perform key roles independent of other forces. This is at the heart of Air Force culture and it is not readily understood or accepted by the other Services--even by the other Services' air elements which are employed as supporting arms. [General Fogleman recognizes this and even mentioned it in his brief.]

The Air Force was not interested in discussing the battlespace terms used in the previous presentation--a situation that saw a division of the battlefield into four distinct battle areas. Instead, Fogleman mentioned that this conceptual battlefield framework was not meant to be restrictive in nature, but to provide a way of thinking. Based on his remarks and his vague response to one of the commissioners regarding the characteristics of deep battle, it is apparent the Air Force recognizes that their strongest position lies in emphasizing their core competencies rather than basing arguments on clearly differentiated battlespaces (although there is still a concerted effort to deny the deep battle to the land forces).

Publicly, the Air Force has "fallen in line" with the other Services in the roles and missions battle. None of the Services are pushing for anything really revolutionary and this is acceptable and desirable to the Service Chiefs. In fact, there is likely some comfort in this latest Air Force presentation to the Commission. For example, though General Fogleman retracted the earlier Air Force proposal to jettison the CAS role, his response merely reflected the traditional Air Force view of close-air support as something that is necessary, but for the most part is an undesirable mission requirement. This is a view the other Services understand and, paradoxically, are possibly more comfortable with.

The Air Force leadership is currently involved in trying to achieve greater inter-service understanding--"to blend Service cultures" was Fogleman's terms. Last week General Fogleman met in Carlisle, Pennsylvania, with Army three and four stars and he will meet with the senior Marine Corps leadership for two days next week and senior Navy admiral in January. This appears to be, in part, a deliberate effort to align the Services and reverse open slits created by General McPeak.

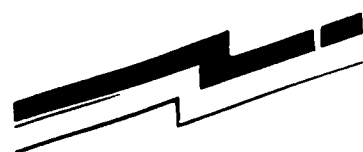

FACT SHEET

The President's National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee (NSTAC)

PURPOSE: The NSTAC provides advice and information, from the industry perspective, to the President and the Executive Branch regarding policy and enhancements to national security and emergency preparedness (NS/EP) telecommunications.

BACKGROUND: The President created the NSTAC by Executive Order 12382 in September 1982 to advise him on matters regarding NS/EP telecommunications. Four issues provided impetus for the establishment of the NSTAC: (1) The divestiture of AT&T, (2) Increased Government reliance on commercial communications (95% of Government communications travels over the Public Switched Network (PSN)), (3) Potential impact of new technologies on NS/EP telecommunications, and (4) Growing importance of command, control, and communications (C3) to military and disaster response modernization. The NSTAC has been validated biennially, most recently by E.O. 12869, September 30, 1993. Membership is limited to 30 presidentially-appointed industry leaders. Currently, there are 27 senior executives (see reverse) representing major carriers, information system providers, manufacturers, electronics firms, and aerospace firms. Having first met in December 1982, the NSTAC meets approximately every 9 months to report on its activities and provide recommendations to the President. Its most recent meeting was held March 2, 1994; NSTAC XVII will be on January 12, 1995.

LEADERSHIP: Assisting the President in NSTAC matters are: Vice President Gore; the National Security Advisor, Mr. Anthony Lake; the Secretary of Defense, William J. Perry [also designated as the Executive Agent, National Communications System (NCS)]; the Assistant to the President for Science and Technology, John H. Gibbons; and the NSTAC's Designated Federal Official, LtGen Albert J. Edmonds, Manager, NCS, and Director, Defense Information Systems Agency (DISA). The NSTAC chairmanship, a rotating position, is currently held by Norman R. Augustine, Chairman and CEO of Martin Marietta Corporation. The vice chairman is William T. Esrey, Chairman and CEO of Sprint Corporation.

INDUSTRY EXECUTIVE SUBCOMMITTEE (IES): The principal working body of the NSTAC is the IES, which consists of representatives appointed by each NSTAC Principal and meets at least twice between each NSTAC meeting. The IES is comprised of the Operations Working Group (OWG), the Plans Working Group (PWG), the Funding and Regulatory Working Group (FRWG), and the Network Security Steering Committee (NSSC). The OWG directs and oversees active subgroups; the PWG plans and defines issues for subgroups to address; the FRWG examines funding and regulatory issues; and the NSSC oversees all network security activities. The majority of the NSTAC's work is done by the Panels, Ad Hoc Groups, and Task Forces that address issues brought to the NSTAC from the President, his staff, or the NCS through the Office of the Manager, NCS (OMNCS).

NATIONAL COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM: The NCS is an interagency group of 23 Federal departments and agencies, charged to coordinate the planning of NS/EP telecommunications to support any crisis or disaster. Originally created with five members in 1963 as a result of C3 failures during the Cuban Missile Crisis, the NCS was expanded by E.O. 12472, to the current 23 members: Departments of Agriculture, Commerce, Defense, Energy, Health and Human Services, Interior, Justice, State, Transportation, Treasury, and Veterans Affairs; Central Intelligence Agency, Federal Communications Commission, Federal Emergency Management Agency, Federal Reserve Board, General Services Administration, The Joint Staff, National Aeronautics and Space Administration, National Security Agency, National Telecommunications and Information Administration, Nuclear

Regulatory Commission, U.S. Information Agency, and U.S. Postal Service. Each NCS member organization is represented on the NCS Committee of Principals (COP) and its subordinate Council of Representatives (COR). The COP and the COR meet to provide advice and recommendations to the NCS on NS/EP telecommunication and participate in joint industry-Government planning, and request advice and information from the NSTAC through the OMNCS. The OMNCS Joint Secretariat provides the means for joint industry-Government planning through technical and executive support of the NCS COP and COR, as well as the President's NSTAC and its subordinate groups.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND ACTIVITIES: Many activities of the NSTAC's subordinate groups result in technical reports, recommendations to the President, and operational programs. For example, the National Coordinating Center for Telecommunications (NCC), a joint industry-government operations center for day-to-day planning, coordination, and exercise of NS/EP telecommunications, is the direct result of an NSTAC recommendation. Also, the Telecommunications Service Priority (TSP) System and the National Telecommunications Management Structure (NTMS), once NSTAC issues, are now operational programs. Much of the Government's National Level Program (NLP) for survivable and robust NS/EP telecommunications is a result of the President's NSTAC actions and recommendations. Separate industry and Government Network Security Information Exchange (NSIE) groups have been created and meet regularly to counter the threat of hackers and software disturbance on the PSN. A network security symposium was held in February 1994 and was considered a great success by both industry and Government attendees. The NSTAC's NII Task Force is currently addressing a broad-based agenda through three subgroups, (1) Applications, (2) Policy, and (3) Future Commercial Systems and Architecture. Assessing NII implications for NS/EP telecommunications, the task force is preparing a report with recommendations to the President, while building cooperative relationships with Government entities responsible for planning and implementing the Administration's initiative. An NII Symposium, held in October 1994, was a collaborative forum in which senior Government and industry executives candidly discussed key NS/EP issues related to the NII.

As Chairman of your National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee (NSTAC), I am writing to invite you to participate in our 17th meeting of the NSTAC (NSTAC XVII). Several activities are scheduled, including a 6:30 p.m. reception and 7:15 p.m. dinner in the Willard Hotel on January 11, 1995. We especially recommend that you attend our 12:30 p.m. Executive Luncheon and 1:45 p.m. Executive Session in the Indian Treaty Room of the Old Executive Office Building, on January 12, 1995. I am hopeful that you can attend and will agree to speak with our members, 29 senior corporate leaders of the Nation's telecommunications, information systems, and aerospace industries. We would appreciate hearing your thoughts on America's telecommunications policy, particularly with regard to the evolving National Information Infrastructure (NII) and how the Committee can assist you in your efforts.

As soon as the NII was announced as a goal, your NSTAC established an NII Task Force to help foster its growth and ensure that national security and emergency preparedness (NS/EP) considerations are part and parcel of NII development. Initial investigations and discussions with the Government's Information Infrastructure Task Force clearly indicate that security of the NII is of extreme importance to meet NS/EP requirements as well as the public's needs. In addition to security, foundations for the NII development must also include survivability, reliability, privacy, and universal access. We will advise you on this effort, bringing the experience the Committee has gained from many years of operating and protecting the public switched networks. We also look forward to reporting on other issues we have addressed since the last NSTAC meeting, such as Network Security and Wireless Services.

NSTAC XVII will be my last meeting as Chairman, as I will be passing the gavel to your newly appointed Chairman. I can assure you that the Committee will continue to support you with the quality advice and information you need to prepare our Nation's infrastructure for the 21st Century. We sincerely hope your schedule will permit you to take part in at least some portion of our meeting on January 12, 1995.

I. PURPOSE

To thank Lieutenant Shelton and Servicemembers for their contributions as part of the Multinational Force in Haiti by presenting the Army Distinguished Service Medal to the General and personal decorations to representatives of each of the Services. Each awardee also will be presented the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal on behalf of the troops in OPERATION RESTORE/UPHOLD DEMOCRACY.

II. BACKGROUND

LTG Shelton, Commander of the XVIII Airborne Corps based at FT. Bragg, N.C., was Commander of the Haiti operation. He was relieved by Major General Meade on October 24, 1994. 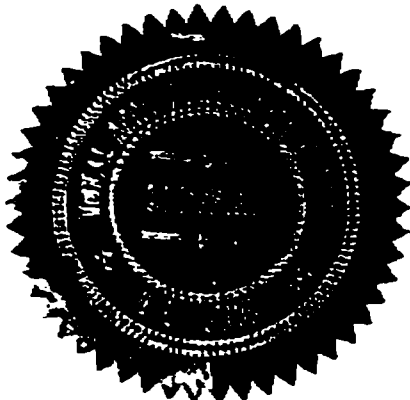

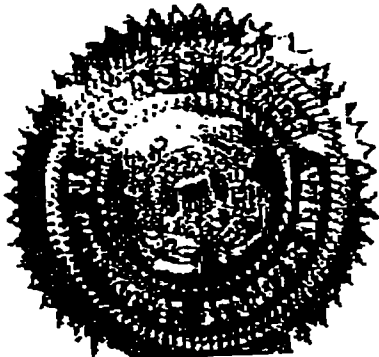

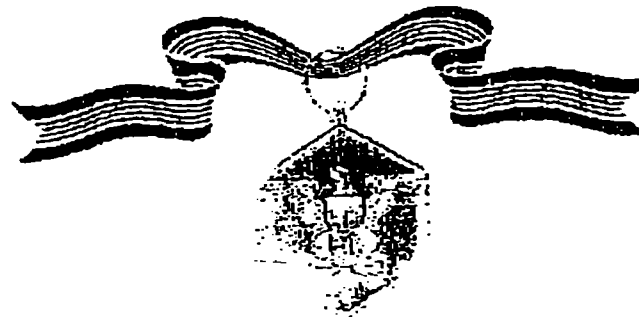

The HDC Initial Response Team was based on board USCGC CHASE (WHEC 718) where Petty Officer BROWN singlehandedly supervised his watch section in the direction of security in the harbor, vessel traffic control, and cargo offload operations. 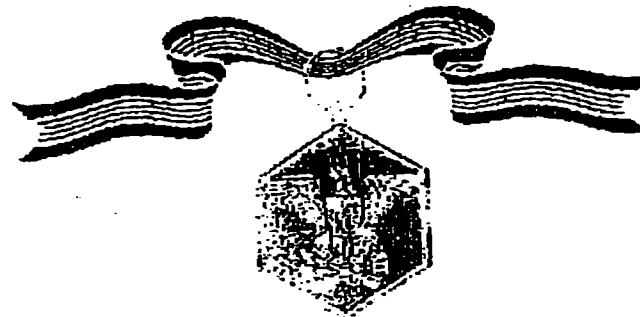

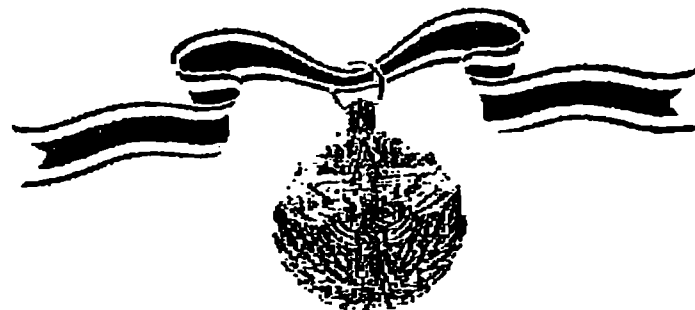

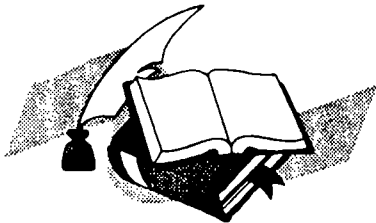
