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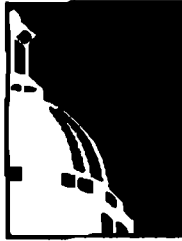

RE: Minimum Wage and Other Matters

The Senate has passed an increase in the minimum wage. The final vote was 74 to 24. The important vote was on the Bond amendment. The Bond amendment would have 1) delayed the effective date, 2) allowed for a "subminimum" wage period, and 3) exempted firms with sales of less than \$500,000 from the increase. The amendment failed by a 46-52 margin. The Bond amendment was the "poison pill," the adoption of which would have triggered a veto by the President.

Since there are some differences between the Senate and House bills, a conference committee is still necessary. One school of thought is this could be wrapped up quickly and a minimum wage increase in effect very soon. The House bill, and at least as we understand it, the Senate bill as well, calls for an effective date of July 1st. I suspect what you read in the paper today will tell you more about the fate of the effective date than I can at this time.

Another school of thought suggests some more horse trading may occur before this goes to conference committee. For example, Senator Kennedy has been blocking the appointment of Senate conferees to the health care bill because the appointments were stacked to guarantee the Senate capitulated to the House on the subject of Medical Savings Accounts, the result of which would be to include them in the final package. It is very possible, a Senator just might object to the appointment of conferees on the minimum wage bill until Senator Kennedy releases his hold on the health care conferees. As you know, a single Senator can object to a unanimous consent agreement to proceed, thereby tying the Senate in knots. Cloture votes are then needed, with 60-vote margins, in order to proceed.

The good news is, if the minimum wage increase is enacted, it appears that several positive tax incentives will go along with it. The Senate added tax provisions to the bill, just as the House had done before it. There is a \$4 billion difference in the two versions, with the Senate carrying a higher price tag. An increase in direct expensing to \$25,000, as well as pension system reforms and S Corporation rule reforms are almost "sure" things. Those items are in both versions.

In addition, the Senate adopted the Finance Committee's recommendations on Section 530.

BOND SAYS DEFEAT PRESIDENT'S FAULT; "BILL CLINTON IS NO FRIEND OF SMALL BUSINESS"

Senator Christopher S. "Kit" Bond issued the following statement to reporters after his amendment exempting very small businesses from the \$.90 per hour minimum wage increase failed to pass the Senate.

"I am very disappointed in the outcome of this vote. This was a common sense amendment that would have protected jobs in the smallest of small businesses across America," Bond said.

"The defeat of my amendment was orchestrated and led by the President, who through a public relations blitz convinced a majority of Senators that this was a 'poison pill'. President Clinton has shown that on this issue, as on many others, he says one thing and does another.

"The President goes to meetings of small business owners and entrepreneurs and says he wants to encourage job growth in this sector. Then, when he has the opportunity to make good on that promise, he instead leads the effort to kill jobs. Make no mistake about it, a vote against my amendment is a vote to kill jobs, because that is exactly what will happen in the small business sector when this new mandate goes into effect.

"I have to conclude by his actions that Bill Clinton is no friend of small business," Bond said.

You should be aware that, even though many small businesses will not be pleased with the increase in the minimum wage, there are about 1.9 million S corporations who will benefit greatly from other provisions in the bill. As you know, I am the Chairman and President of the S Corporation Association, which lobbied hard and successfully to have S corporation reform included in the minimum wage bill. Virtually all S corporations are small businesses, and the bill makes 17 changes in the tax code that will improve their access to capital, make it easier to keep these businesses in the family, and provide new growth and job-creation opportunities.

We would be pleased to identify for you the presidents of several small, family-owned businesses who could appear with me at the signing ceremony for the minimum wage bill and voice their support of the President's pro-small business actions. For example, we have been working with the president of a small check-printing company who has been involved in S Corporation Reform so that he can form an ESOP for his employees -- which this bill finally allows him to do. There are many others like him, whose presence at a signing ceremony could be advantageous to the President -- and it also would provide the basis for a surrogate speaker for the President to begin a speech with the statement, "On August __, I stood with the President as he signed into law a bill that will help my business and 1.9 million other small businesses across America..."

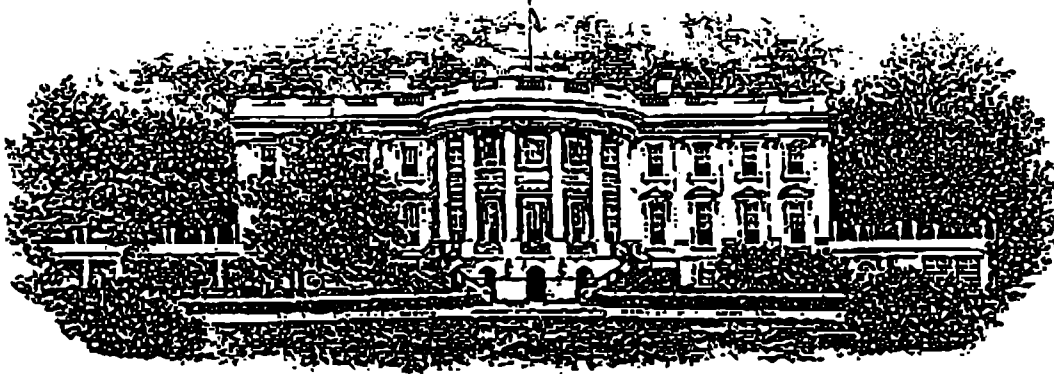

Dear Miss Herman:

On behalf of the National Association of Part-Time and Temporary Employees (NAPTE) I want to commend the President for his efforts to push for a minimum wage increase from \$4.25 to \$5.15 per hour. Nearly **six million** part-time and temporary workers will receive a pay increase when the bill goes into effect. I am excited for the millions of workers waiting for this raise.

There is an estimated **22 million** part-time workers, **2 million** temporaries, and **another million** independent contractors which sums to 25 million working Americans. At NAPTE we seek to represent their socioeconomic interests through lobbying and member discounts. NAPTE *Tempo*- our national news magazine- informs contingent workers about career, economic, and technological issues of relevance to them. NAPTE is a voluntary non-union membership association that focuses on the special needs and interests of contingent workers. **This segment has 57 percent of the minimum wage workers.**

At NAPTE we are excited about the minimum wage increase. The National Association of Part-Time and Temporary Employees has played a valuable role in getting the legislation to the White House. Our activities have included:

- Since last summer NAPTE has lobbied to raise the minimum wage. It was discussed in *Tempo* - our national news magazine- plus details have remained on our internet home page since last September for the public to read any time of day at their convenience. A number of news reporters and writers have consulted that internet site and as a result interviews and stories on the minimum wage resulted.
- As the President of NAPTE I have written editorials for consideration to 50 major regional newspapers on the importance of a higher minimum wage. This writing was intended to help sway public opinion.
- Faxed about 40 Republican senators some details on the value of a higher minimum wage. This was intended to get cross over votes like in the House.

- Faxed over 50 news syndicates on July 4th and 5th details on the adverse consequences of the Bond Amendments and how it would not benefit 7.5 million workers.
- Held a press conference on Monday, July 8, 1996, in Kansas City with local television present. Almost 60 percent of the area's market lives in Missouri- Senator Bond's state.
- Invited to participated at the Senate rally on Tuesday, July 9th, in front of the Hart Senate Building to protest the impact of the Bond amendments. Unable to attend that day.
- July 9th faxed 30 news releases to the Washington news bureaus of the major regional newspapers to put pressure on senators to defeat the Bond Amendments. Done.
- Planned a House-sponsored press conference on the minimum wage on Thursday, July 11, 1996 in the Gold Room of the Rayburn House Office Building. Representative Sabo was a House sponsor. Planned before the bill got moved up under Lott for consideration.
- Talked with reporters and writers on the need to raise the minimum wage. One interview should have been reported on Sunday, July 7th in Columbia, SC.
- Communicated weekly with the offices of Sabo, E. Kennedy, Gephardt, or Daschle on the progress of the minimum wage bill in reconciliation. Debra Silimeo of the Senate Democratic Leadership Office has been very kind in informing me on the bill's progress. In fact Daschle's office shared with us the terms of the President's veto.
- Talked a time or two recently with staff in John Hilley's office at the White House on the minimum wage bill's progress.
- Offered any assistance NAPTE could provide to the President, John Hilley in Legislative Affairs at the White House, Secretary Robert Reich in Labor, and his Legislative Director Angela Jackson via Fed Ex's on July 16th to offer any assistance to move this legislation forward for signing before Labor Day.

NAPTE understands that passage of this bill is paramount to millions of voting workers. NAPTE has consistently communicated with the media and legislators on the need to raise the living standards of millions of working Americans.

For your staff's consideration I wanted to go ahead and share with you my prepared comments for NAPTE's press conference on July 8, 1996. The theme was entitled "Holding American Workers Hostage." NAPTE is a proven crusader for low wage workers.

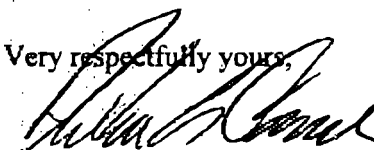

Wage bill eases saving for retirement

The minimum wage bill
passed by the Senate Tuesday
reaches far beyond workers
earning \$4.25 an hour.

Besides raising the wage to
\$5.15, the bill would make it
easier for millions of Ameri-
cans to save for retirement.

Many of the bill's retirement
provisions also are in the
House version passed last
spring. So they're likely to sur-
vive the House-Senate commit-
tee that now must resolve dif-
ferences between the two bills.
President Clinton is expected
to sign the final version.

It's been a long road for the
retirement provisions. Though
not controversial, they've been
vetoed three times — twice by
President Bush and once by
Clinton — because they were
part of budget bills. The provi-
sions would:

- ▶ Let workers earn \$80,000
a year, up from \$66,000 now,
before the IRS considers them
"highly compensated" and lim-
its their 401(k) savings plan
contributions. The IRS wants to
make sure that higher income
workers don't get more tax
benefits from 401(k) plans
than their lower paid co-work-
ers. So contributions by highly
compensated employees are
based on the average amount
contributed by the company's
employees who earn less.

- ▶ Eliminate the above test,

and lots of administrative costs,
if companies make generous
contributions to employees'
401(k) accounts. Companies
would have two choices: Con-
tribute 3% of pay for all em-
ployees whether or not they
participate in the 401(k), or
match employees' contribu-
tions dollar for dollar on the
first 3% of pay and then 50
cents per \$1 on the next 2%.

- ▶ Extend 401(k) plans to
nonprofit groups.

- ▶ Let spouses who don't
have earned income make
contributions of up to \$2,000 a
year to individual retirement
accounts. Now, they and their
spouse combined can contribu-
te no more than \$2,250.

- ▶ Establish simplified
401(k)-type plans for business-
es with 100 or fewer workers.
Employees could contribute up
to \$6,000 a year; employers
would match up to 3% of pay.

Other provisions the House
and Senate generally agree on:

- ▶ Reinstate a tax deduction
for workers whose continuing
education is paid for by their
employer. Those payments are
considered income by the IRS.
Workers would be able to sub-
tract up to \$5,250 of such assis-
tance from taxable income.

- ▶ Increase the tax write-off
small businesses get for new
equipment to \$25,000 a year by
2003 from \$17,500 now.

Wage bill expands homemaker IRAs

NEW YORK — Buried in the minimum wage bill that looks increasingly likely to get to President Clinton this summer is a provision that, at long last, recognizes the value of work performed in the home.

The homemaker IRA is "neither complicated nor controversial but makes a helluva lot of sense," says Miss Tessler, press secretary for Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, who along with just about every other woman in the Senate co-sponsored the legislation. The provision will allow roughly 10 million spouses who work at home to increase their tax-deductible individual retirement account (IRA) contributions from \$250 to \$2,000 a year. It also throws an unintentional bone to the wealthy. More on that later.

First, a brief look at how IRA rules have discriminated against homemakers from the start. When IRAs came into being in 1974, the idea was to promote savings by allowing a tax deduction for long-term investments up to \$2,000 a year. Originally, it was envisioned that nearly all adults would be eligible. But lawmakers backtracked, fearful that the government would lose too much tax revenue. So they allowed the \$2,000 IRA contribution for wage earners only.

That was fine for two-earner families, which could contribute \$4,000 a year, tax-deductible, to their IRAs. But it penalized families with only one earner. In a feeble nod to that inequity, lawmakers allowed a \$250 contribution for spouses at home, bringing the total one-earner household to \$2,250 a year in eligible tax-deductible IRA contributions. The difference never sat well with those mostly women spouses, whose work in the home was belittled. There have been IRA changes over the years, including major limitations on deductions. But the premise that homemakers aren't as valuable as wage earners has endured.

That will change if the current minimum wage bill is signed into law (stories, 1A, 1B). It provides that married couples with at least one wage earner are eligible for an annual \$4,000 IRA contribution, effectively granting the at-home spouse equal IRA status. "It's very significant," says Bruce Thompson, political analyst at Merrill Lynch. "We're having a savings crisis generally, and for women it's even worse." On average, women earn less, have fewer pension benefits, and live longer than men, Thompson says. So it's critical that those at home be allowed to deduct savings for retirement in at least equal numbers to wage earners.

Currently, only households with annual incomes under \$40,000 can be considered for full tax deductions on IRA contributions. That threshold wouldn't change, and it poses an interesting question: Can the 10 million households that would be newly eligible to beef up deductible IRA savings afford to do so? An extra \$1,750 a year can be tough to find, especially way below that \$40,000 mark. "In reality," says financial planner Stephen Mintz in Monroe, La., "a lot of people won't have the money. They're just fighting to live."

And that brings me back to the bone for the wealthy. You can bet well-to-do professionals with at-home spouses will find the money. Such couples have been limited to the same \$2,250 annual IRA contributions all along — albeit non-deductible because of income limits. But even after-tax IRAs have the advantage of compounding tax-free until retirement. After stuffing money in tax-favored things like municipal bonds, 401(k) plans and Keoghs, the wealthy can now put another \$1,750 a year in tax-deferred IRAs. "About half my clients will take advantage of this — the doctors and their wives," Mintz says.

Speaking for Sen. Hutchison, Tessler says that's fine with her. "We're in favor of everyone saving more," she says. "Our goal is to level the playing field for spouses at home." Households that take full advantage of the homemaker IRA by contributing \$4,000 a year and earning, say 6% a year, will have a nest egg of \$335,000 after 30 years. That compares with \$188,000 by investing only \$2,250 a year.

Wall Street heard a s Tuesday.

Shares of athletic-shoe Nike surged 4 1/2% to \$108 after the company said earnings jumped 38% in its fiscal quarter. Revenue from athletic shoes and clothing in USA alone topped \$1 billion the first time in any quarter.

"This is a quarter that knocked everyone's socks off," says Smith I analyst Faye Landes.

The company earned \$1 million, or \$1.06 per share, the three months ended 31 vs. \$113.4 million, cents a share, a year ago. Revenue climbed to \$1.1 billion, up 36% from \$1.41 billion in the year-ago quarter.

Marketing experts attributed the revenue jump to big sales of women's athletic shoes, the company's growth
