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Toward that end, the appointment of Guarione Diaz as the base's first civilian administrator is both fitting and timely. Born in Cuba, Mr. Diaz is a highly respected South Floridian. As head of the Cuban American National Council, he accumulated 12 years of experience dealing with refugee problems and needs.

In the swelling refugee camps, the U.S. needed a compassionate liaison. It needed Guarione Diaz.

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our years of acquaintance with him, Mr. Diaz always has been refreshingly apolitical.

Mr. Diaz's appointment comes in time to ease escalating tensions between detainees and U.S. military authorities at Guantanamo. These tensions have already caused violent confrontations that left one person dead — a Cuban refugee who took his own life — and several injured. By taking this step, Washington is showing that it is sensitive to repeated calls, by human rights groups and others, to improve camp conditions.

Notwithstanding his solid credentials, though, Mr. Diaz will face an extremely difficult task in Guantanamo. As a Cuban American, he can be expected to show compassion toward his fellow Cubans. But he must — and we're sure he will — avoid seeming to favor them over Haitians.

Guarione Diaz is the right person for this job, chosen at just the right time. We wish him the best of luck in his daunting new mission.

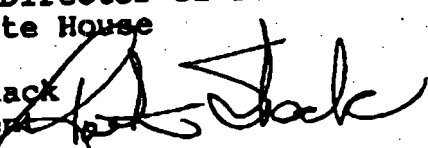

Re: Provision of Health and Social Services
to Refugees at Guantanamo

We appreciate the opportunity to assist you in coordinating the provision of health and social services to the refugees at Guantanamo.

In order to ensure that services are appropriate and timely, we recommend sending an initial team of six to seven people for a two-day needs assessment mission. The professionals on this team would represent the various areas of services that will probably be needed and would also have access to a volunteer workforce once needs are determined.

I would recommend Dr. Ana A. Rivas-Vazquez to lead this team of professionals. She not only has extensive experience in the mental health and social services fields, but also valuable experience with other refugees, including the Mariel entrants and the children who came to the United States through Operation Pedro Pan. A clinical psychologist, Dr. Rivas-Vazquez is immediate past president of Dade County Psychological Association and currently on the Florida Board of Psychological Examiners. As a consultant to the National Institute of Mental Health for the Mariel entrants, she visited the refugee camps in Indiantown, Madison and Fort Chaffee, and developed numerous mental health programs for the Mariel refugees.

Manuel Alzugaray, MD
an orthopedic surgeon, who is director of the Miami Medical Team, a voluntary medical organization that provides services in emergency situations. He has led teams to various countries in South and Central American as well as Africa and Afghanistan.

a nurse to be selected by the team

Father Felipe Estevez
a priest at a local Catholic church, he came via Operation Pedro Pan (the Archdiocese of Miami program that brought unaccompanied minors from Cuba in the early 1960s)

We anticipate that this team could assess the need for services and for volunteers, and then coordinate the volunteer efforts.

Dear Attorney General Reno:

I wish to bring to your attention the cases of five Cuban refugee families in Guantanamo which merit special consideration on humanitarian grounds.

CASE #1: Barbara Ferrer Sanchez (35-years-old) left Cuba recently on a raft with her children: Alexis Garcia Ferrer (14-years-old), Yahima Garcia Ferrer (15-years-old) and Mileidis Martin Ferrer (3 1/2-years-old), (b)(6)

(b)(6) needs immediate special medical attention. Somehow, the children became separated from their mother during the odyssey to freedom. Two of them, Mileidis and Alexis, are presently in Guantanamo. One of the children, Yahima, and the mother, Barbara, are unaccounted for.

Mileidis is in Camp #10 under the care of a young woman of no relation by the name of Alina Perez Vazquez. Alexis is in the camp known as "Golf". The mother of Barbara Ferrer Sanchez, Mercedes Sanchez Arias, and her sister, Guadalupe Dueñas, live in Miami and have the legal status of "Resident."

Given these trying circumstances, we wish to request that 1) your department conduct an investigation into this matter in an attempt to identify the whereabouts of the two missing family members: the mother, Barbara Ferrer Sanchez, and the daughter, Yahima Garcia Ferrer, as they could very well be in Guantanamo; and 2) (b)(6) 3 1/2-year-old Mileidis Martin Ferrer, please consider reunification with relatives in Miami.

CASE #2: Manuel Gregorio Torres Hernandez, born (b)(6), is presently detained in Guantanamo. He is the father of 18-year-old Julian Torres Perez, 16-year-old Manuel Torres Perez, and 13-year-old Yuleydis Torres Perez, all of whom reside in Miami. Mr. Torres Hernandez suffers (b)(6) a diagnosis he received prior to escaping from Castro's

CASE #3: Yameli Carbot Martinez is a 9-year-old girl detained at Guantanamo (b)(6). Accompanying Yameli at Guantanamo are her father Filiberto J. Carbot de la Guardia, a doctor, her mother Maria A. Martinez Gutierrez, a dentist, and her 17-year-old sister, Amely Carbot Martinez.

Eva M. Carbot de la Guardia, sister of Filiberto, the father, is an American citizen residing in Miami.

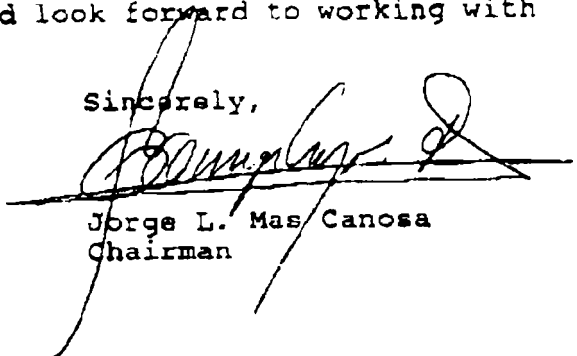
CASE #4: Medardo Ramon Marrero Candales, born (b)(6), is presently detained in Guantanamo and suffers from a (b)(6) problem requiring immediate medical attention. He has relatives in Miami who are U.S. residents: his sister, 30-year-old Blanca Lleo, and his grandmother Zulima Montes de Oca, who is bedridden and terminally ill with cancer.

CASE #5: Gretel Aleman Rodriguez is a 12-year-old girl who is (b)(6). (b)(6) requires immediate special medical attention. Her grandmother Ritela Niurka Rodriguez resides in Miami.

In addition to these cases, we have learned of the case of a 15-day old baby that was born at Guantanamo in detention and is in a precarious situation. We are attempting to find out her name in order to contact family in Miami.

We are enclosing herewith further documentation regarding each of the above cases and appeal to you in hopes that special consideration be given to them and that humanitarian visas to the U.S. can be granted immediately based on their urgent nature. The families in Miami, along with the Cuban American National Foundation, would sponsor these families in the U.S. We thank you for your attention to this matter and look forward to working with you on this matter.

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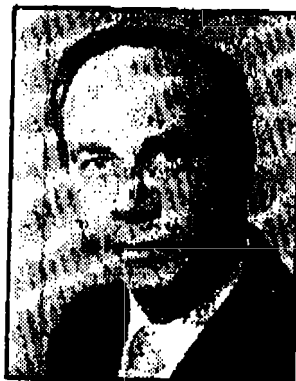

Ellos están buscando la manera de crear también un vehículo de cooperación voluntaria con ellos por parte de la comunidad cubano-americana.
