The following is a summary of major points concerning the special needs of our communities and challenges for health reform for President and Mrs. Clinton.

The Hispanic Medical Association is the first national group of U.S. trained Hispanic physicians in the United States.

The Latino Coalition on Health represents 25 national and regional organizations that was established to support the Congressional Hispanic Caucus in their efforts to address our issues of concern through the Congress.

The groups have decided that they cannot support the current health reform plan until our concerns are adequately addressed. We have met and will continue to meet with Ira Magaziner to provide input into the current process of revising the proposed "American Health Security Act of 1993" document. BACKGROUND

Latinos total 22 million and make-up 20% of the population. Between 1980 and 1990, the group grew by 53%, and by the year 2010, they will be the largest ethnic group in the country.

Latinos are a heterogeneous group, with 63% being Mexican American, and the remainder being Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central and South American. They are concentrated in nine states - Arizona, California, Colorado, Florida, Illinois, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, and Texas. The majority live in urban areas.

An estimated 67% of Latinos are born in the United States. As a group, compared to the non-Hispanic US population, they are younger with one-third being children, they have the highest birth rates and they have larger families.

Latinos have the lowest levels of educational attainment of any major population group in the country. Only one half are high school graduates and fewer than one in ten have completed college. In the health professions, they total about 4% of the medical students, residents, physicians, and nurses and 2% of the dentists, and less than 1% of the medical faculty in the country.

The major socio-economic problem affecting the health care of the group include the lack of health insurance. Indeed, they are the largest group without this benefit. Other important socio-economic factors that limit access to health care are poor education, poverty, low income occupations (often part-time or seasonal), poor english language competency, lack of access to institutional programs, and lack of Hispanic or culturally competent physicians ←

and other health providers. According to the Census Bureau, 29% of Hispanic households are below poverty. In low income areas, there are few hospitals, medical practices and clinics that provide health services and those that do are considered "safety net" providers.

Latino populations are exposed to high levels of stress within their communities. Latino communities are exposed to violence, gangs, drugs as well as occupational and environmental hazards. Latinos also suffer from low-levels of self-esteem and depression.

The problem of the undocumented must also not be forgotten as a problem peculiar to the group.

CURRENT HEALTH SYSTEM ISSUES

The major health system issues that impact upon Latinos are related to the limited resources available for health care services - the lack of prevention and health education; lack of information about maternal and child health disease and health programs such as family planning; lack of adequate mental health services; lack of health care that is community oriented; lack of school involvement in health care; lack of adequate manpower development; lack of research and data on Hispanics; and lack of coordinated policies targeted at the underserved.

HEALTH CARE UNIVERSAL ACCESS

Universal access to health care implies access to physicians and other health providers and health facilities in all communities that are subject to cultural competency measures. In addition, outreach to the population to educate them about services is essential through FAMILY-based networks - churches, schools, community groups, as well as through media campaigns. For Latinos, the group has traditionally lacked access and will need increased services to assist them in reaching the point of entry into the health system - child care, transportation, information, etc.

UNDOCUMENTED POPULATION

Latinos recognize that health policy-makers have a special challenge to face in the health system design in order that resources reach the providers in our high impact communities. We support the development of health policy that incorporates eligibility based on residency and not on citizenship. There are various mechanisms that need to be scrutinized closely, in terms

HEALTH PROFESSIONS DEVELOPMENT

Latinos make-up only 4-5 % of physicians, nurses, dentists across the country. Indeed, Latino numbers are very small within health professions at all levels in this country. We recognize the crisis for the New System and for our communities because of the lack of Latino health professionals. We support the Hispanic Centers of Excellence that will develop the Hispanic research and faculty for health professional institutions and call for monitoring of federal health professional development programs aimed at minority students.

We also support the development of INCENTIVES for the system to promote health providers who work in underserved areas. Our Latino physicians, especially, have a heavier burden of medical school debts compared to the non-Latino physicians, because they tend to come from lower income families.

MANAGED CARE PARTICIPATION

The New Health System structures that are created and the new managed care institutions that are supported should have input from Latinos in order to promote systems that effectively target our group.

It is extremely important to our community to build health plans that provide comprehensive services based on federal cultural and linguistic guidelines for both physical and mental health for the whole family. Services should be linked to the community through case management systems.

The Essential Community Providers- disproportionate share hospitals, the community clinics, the private practice physicians - must be preserved in the low income areas through a system of federal entitlement funding. They will need support in start-up and infrastructure funding to be able to integrate or to develop their own health plans.

of costs and benefits to our society. We encourage the development of a non-discriminatory eligibility ID Card for the New Health System that is used for health care purposes only.

If the undocumented are to be ineligible for the Health Plans, then the question becomes where do they seek healthcare? According to the Plan, the contradiction exists that the clinics would be encouraged to be used by this group... and simultaneously, the intent is to phase them out within the Transition Period of five years.

PREVENTION/EDUCATION

Since our communities have lacked access to health care, it is critical to develop and expand the health promotion and disease prevention programs targeting to Latinas and their families. We support the comprehensive benefits package that will include these programs. In addition, we strongly support increased funds necessary for infrastructure, enabling services and providers in our communities.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

The Latino communities and other underserved communities are especially in need of mental health program development. We support the integration of mental health services within the New Health System and the funding of increased education for the community on the need to utilize mental health services.

RESEARCH

There needs to be ethnic identifiers in all the New Health System's databases that will be created for an accountable system. Research on the Latina health issues and on health services delivery are vital to understanding how to build a more affordable and efficient health care system for the underserved.

In addition, Latina students need to be supported to become researchers to add our perspectives to the research agenda, especially at the NIH and academic health center levels.

Goals and Objectives

NACAW's goals and objectives are inspired by its philosophy of promoting excellence and achievement for the Cuban American woman. The principal goals of NACAW are:

Past and Present Activities

Educational Opportunities for Minority Women. NACAW's Educational Opportunities Center in Fort Wayne, Indiana, disseminates information about post-secondary programs, scholarships and financial aid sources. The center assists and encourages disadvantaged students to attend post-secondary school.

To maintain alive the tradition of celebrating the "Dia de los Reyes Magos" (Feast of the Epiphany), NACAW has sponsored a number of toy collection campaigns for disadvantaged children. The annual event has been held in Union City, New Jersey on January 6, for the last eight years.

Publication of *A Road Well Traveled*. This book is a tribute to the struggles and achievements of twelve Cuban American women living in the United States over the past three decades. It was conceived and directed by Dr. Graciela Beecher, national President of NACAW.

Women's Equity. NACAW in cooperation with the National League of Cuban American Community Based Centers has produced monographs, radio and TV shows addressing barriers to educational equity of women, especially non-English speaking women.

Bilingual Programs. In Fort Wayne, Indiana, NACAW broadcasts "Fiesta," a bilingual program shown every other Sunday evening from 7:30 to 8:30 P.M. In collaboration with the National League of Cuban-American Community Based Centers, NACAW also produced 24 TV programs dealing with policies and cultural issues affecting Hispanics in the United States. The series was broadcast in Fort Wayne, Indiana on Channel 10.

Educational Programs. English as a Second Language (ESL) is an on-going activity. For many years, NACAW has conducted skills classes for non-English speaking people at NACAW's centers, including GES and Adult Education.

Funding

NACAW relies on membership dues and individual as well as corporate donations as its primary funding sources. Through the years, NACAW has also received many federal, state, and local grants to conduct programs for Cuban American women and members of other minority groups.

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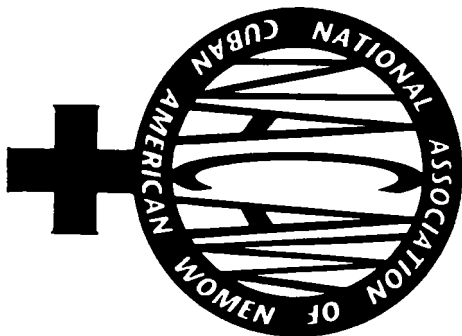

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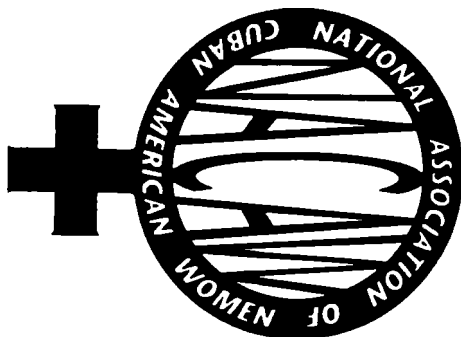
