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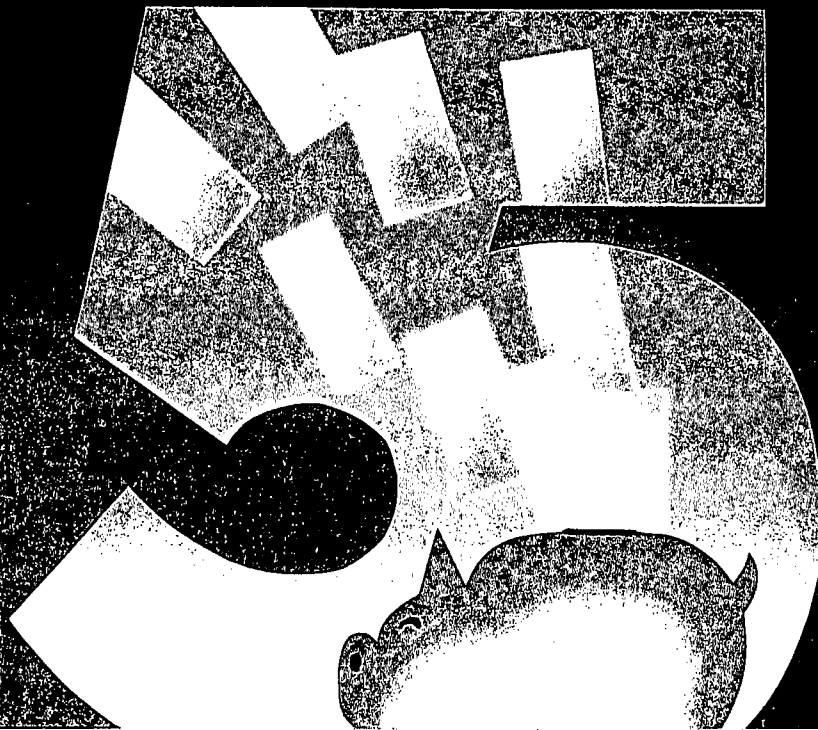

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U.S. DEFENSE COMMITMENT

BACKGROUND:

-- (U) U.S. defense commitment to Republic of Korea (ROK) is based on ROK/US Mutual Defense Treaty which was signed in November 1953 and ratified in October 1954.

-- (U) Since 1953 all U.S. administrations have reaffirmed the U.S. commitment to the defense of the ROK.

-- (U) The U.S. presence and readiness to reinforce, if necessary, have deterred North Korean aggression since 1953.

-- (U) Combined ROK/US exercises have played a major role in ensuring the combined readiness of the combined forces defending against possible North Korean attack.

-- (U) In 1976, the U.S. began an annual exercise called TEAM SPIRIT.

-- (U) TEAM SPIRIT demonstrated the U.S. ability to deploy forces and materiel. Conduct a tactical defense of the ROK, and then redeploy the units and their equipment.

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COST SHARING

BACKGROUND:

- Under the cost sharing program the ROK has provided the following level of support since 1989.

1989 - \$45M

1990 - 70M

1991 - 150M

1992 - 180M

1993 - 220M

1994 - 260M Objective

1995 - 300M Objective of Won based costs.

- Support is provided in following areas:
 - Indigenous Labor Cost
 - ROK Funded Construction
 - Combined Defense Improvement Project
 - Combined Activities
 - Depot Maintenance
 - War Reserves

- US has proposed to ROK:
 - That a substantial portion of the funding in future years be in cash.
 - We look to establishing a new objective after 1995 for the ROK's assuming a greater share of US Won based costs for maintaining forces on the peninsula.
- ROK have played up in their press a statement by Secretary Aspin that the ROK pays 78 percent of the cost of stationing US forces on the Korean peninsula.
- The 78 percent level was arrived at by adding up the ROK's direct and indirect contributions to defray US defense costs.

- Indirect costs include land for bases and training, forgiven taxes, and assistance provided in form of Korean Augmentation to US Army (KATUSA). Problem is in verifying the value of these contributions, we have no system in being to do this.
- Direct costs are local currency or out of pocket costs. Currently these costs by 1995 are projected at \$900M annually. The ROK has agreed to pay 1/3 of these cost by 1995, this translates to a target of \$300M.
- Note Congressional interest in transferring an increased percentage of out of pocket costs to the ROK.

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JOINT STATEMENT
OF THE DEMOCRATIC PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF KOREA
AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

New York, June 11, 1993

The Democratic People's Republic of Korea and the United States of America held government-level talks in New York from the 2nd through the 11th of June, 1993. Present at the talks were the delegation of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea headed by First Vice Minister of Foreign Affairs Kang Sok Ju and the delegation of the United States of America led by Assistant Secretary of State Robert L. Gallucci, both representing their respective Governments. At the talks, both sides discussed policy matters with a view to a fundamental solution of the nuclear issue on the Korean Peninsula. Both sides expressed support for the North-South Joint Declaration on the Denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula in the interest of nuclear non-proliferation goals.

The Democratic People's Republic of Korea and the United States have agreed to principles of:

- assurances against the threat and use of force, including nuclear weapons;
- peace and security in a nuclear-free Korean Peninsula, including impartial application of fullscope safeguards, mutual respect for each other's sovereignty, and non-interference in each other's internal affairs; and
- support for the peaceful reunification of Korea.

In this context, the two Governments have agreed to continue dialogue on an equal and unprejudiced basis. In this respect, the Government of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea has decided unilaterally to suspend as long as it considers necessary the effectuation of its withdrawal from the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons.

Press Statement on U.S.-DPRK Joint Public Statement

The United States and Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) have reached agreement on a joint public statement concerning our discussions on the nuclear issue. We regard this statement as a positive step toward achievement of a nuclear-free Korean peninsula and a strong international non-proliferation regime.

The DPRK has agreed to suspend its withdrawal from the Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) and has accepted the principle of impartial application of fullscope safeguards. During this period of suspension, we intend to continue our discussions with the DPRK to resolve the nuclear issue, including DPRK commitment to remain in the NPT and to accept full implementation of International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) safeguards, including inspections of any sites deemed necessary by the IAEA.

We have made clear to the DPRK that certain steps must be avoided if our discussions are to continue in this period. In particular, we would regard additional reprocessing, any break in the continuity of IAEA safeguards, or a withdrawal from the NPT as harmful and inconsistent with our efforts to resolve the nuclear issue through dialogue. We expect the DPRK to cooperate with the IAEA by continuing current inspections and safeguards under the DPRK's fullscope safeguards agreement with the IAEA, which, remains in full force under the NPT. We believe the DPRK understands the critical importance of avoiding any actions which would jeopardize international efforts to resolve the nuclear

issue.

As an additional step to achieve a nuclear-free Korean peninsula, both the U.S. and DPRK have expressed support for the North-South Denuclearization Declaration, which bans the possession of reprocessing and enrichment facilities in the peninsula. We hope that the DPRK and the Republic of Korea (ROK) will be able to reach agreement soon on an effective bilateral inspection regime to implement this important declaration.

Both the U.S. and DPRK are committed to peace and security on the Korean peninsula. In this respect, both governments have agreed to principles of peace and security, including assurances against the threat or use of force, mutual respect of each other's sovereignty, non-interference in each other's internal affairs, and support for the peaceful unification of Korea. These principles are consistent with and supportive of our obligations under the UN Charter, the U.S. negative security assurances to NPT parties, and our security commitments to the ROK. We regard these principles as firm and clear, as long as the DPRK and U.S. continue efforts to resolve the nuclear issue.

Finally, we will be holding further discussions with North Korea in the near future. In seeking an early resolution of this issue, we are committed to continue these efforts while they are productive. The joint U.S.-DPRK statement represents an important start in resolving the nuclear issue, and we believe that through sincere efforts and hard work we can achieve a comprehensive solution, involving DPRK adherence to the NPT, acceptance of fullscope safeguards, and implementation of the North-South Denuclearization Agreement.

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APPOINTMENT OF AMERICAN AS SENIOR MEMBER, UNCMAC

BACKGROUND:

- Until March 1991, an American two-star served as Senior Member, United Nations Command Military Armistice Commission (UNCMAC).
- The appointment of a ROK Army Major General in March 1991 as Senior Member UNCMAC was the first step in implementing Phase I of the East Asia Strategy Initiative (EASI).
- The objectives of the EASI strategy include:
 - Transitioning the US from a leading role in ROK defense matters to a supporting role.
 - Placing ROK flag officers in highly visible positions of responsibility.
- The North Koreans have refused to meet with the South Korean Senior Member.
- UNCMAC business is being carried out at the O-6 or Colonel (Secretary) level.
- Both MGEN Hwang, the ROK Senior Member and Colonel O'Dowd, the UNCMAC Secretary are due to be replaced this summer.
- General RisCassi, former CINCUNC and CINCCFC, and reportedly Defense Minister Kwon, have recommended an American two-star be appointed to replace MGEN Hwang.
- The North Koreans have let it be known they want an American appointed and that they may no longer accept the credentials of an American O-6 as the Senior American contact. We believe the O-6 credential issue can be solved by having CINCUNC certify the Secretary's credentials.

If the US agrees to the ROK MND/General RisCassi recommendation it is feared it will:

- Start the unraveling of the EASI process.
- Give the North a major propaganda victory.
- An inter-agency group is being formed to review the MND/RisCassi recommendation. It includes the Joint Staff, State, NSC, and Defense.

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Yongsan Relocation

BACKGROUND:

- In June 1988, at the 20th Security Consultative Meeting, President Roh asked Secy Carlucci if the US would be willing to relocate its military forces out of Seoul.
- Mr. Carlucci said we would if the ROKG paid all costs, provided equal or better facilities to include quality of life, and combat readiness was maintained.
- Cost of relocating applicable facilities out of Seoul was originally estimated at \$2-3 B. This has now risen to \$9-10 B. Some reports indicate \$14-15 B is more realistic.
- There are fourteen facilities in Seoul under the umbrella organization of Yongsan Garrison.
- Because of cost and the need to use military funds to meet urgent requirements Minister Kwon may inform the US that he is, postponing further action on this plan.

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
