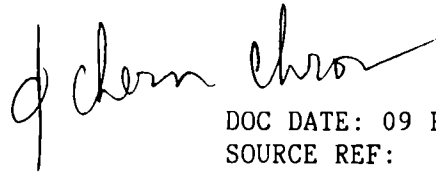

SUBJECT: Carter Letter on North Korea

Jimmy Carter wrote the President urging sensitivity in dealing with the North Korea nuclear issue and, in particular, suggesting we avoid making public demands that will prevent the North from accepting a compromise.

The proposed reply thanks President Carter for his ideas and assures him our policy toward North Korea recognizes the need to avoid backing the North into a corner which could trigger unpredictable results.

Purpose

To reply to Jimmy Carter's concern that our approach to North Korea avoid making public demands that will prevent the North from accepting a compromise to the nuclear issue.

Background

Jimmy Carter wrote you urging our policy with North Korea take into account the need for the North to avoid a public loss of face in its negotiations with us.

The proposed reply notes the situation with North Korea requires firmness and reaffirms our willingness to resolve the nuclear issue through dialogue with the North.

Dear President Carter:

Thank you for sharing your thoughts on resolving the North Korean nuclear issue. I agree that we should seek a thorough, broad approach to resolving the impasse, through dialogue if possible. North Korea must also understand, however, that dialogue will not be possible if it fails to live up to its obligations to the International Atomic Energy Agency and to address the nuclear issue in discussions with South Korea.

I am firmly committed to advancing our goals of preserving a safe and secure nonnuclear peninsula and promoting a strong nonproliferation regime. Your discussions with Chris and Tony have been most helpful and I hope you will keep us apprised of any further news you receive from the North as well as your insights regarding this critical national security challenge.

To President Bill Clinton

I presume you have received a copy of the pro-NAFTA letter that we prepared yesterday and are delivering today from all five of your predecessors. From my more recent phone calls, the move seems to be in our favor. I wish you -- and our nation -- well on the upcoming vote.

I am writing you because of my deep concern about the North Korea issue. Last week I shared my concerns with Boutros-Ghali and with both Warren Christopher and Tony Lake, but, since you will be making the final decision on what to do, I also want you to have my opinion.

Unless resolved successfully, this problem in the Korean peninsula could become a much greater international crisis than any that you inherited in Somalia, Haiti, or Bosnia. For the past two years, we at The Carter Center have spent a great deal of time addressing the disputes, mostly attempting to learn how the North Korean leaders think and feel.

Because of many continuing importunities from them for me to visit North Korea, I received encouragement from the State Department early last year and sent an advance team to both Koreas. Before I made my own plans to go, however, Secretary Baker informed me that the talks were going exceedingly well on the nuclear issue and between Pyongyang and Seoul and that there was no need for me to make a visit.

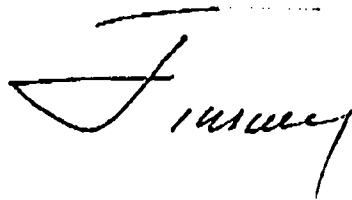
I understand the reluctance to visit with top leaders in North Korea, and I would never do anything to interfere with a promising negotiation path. However, now there is every possibility that the isolated and paranoid leaders will be forced into making decisions that will be very difficult if not impossible to reverse. It will not hurt to treat them with respect and to permit a comprehensive agreement to be worked out that might lead to peace and reconciliation on the peninsula and remove the threat of their final rejection of IAEA inspections. If we continue to make public demands or seek U.N. sanctions (provided China will agree to abstain), it will no longer allow the North Koreans to save face and to seek a compromise.

As you know, we do not need the Team Spirit exercises in any case, and haven't even included it in next year's budget, but now it has become something of a face saving issue for us, if we give it up as part of a public quid pro quo. Only in a privately negotiated comprehensive agreement can both we and they avoid boxing ourselves into a corner.

In closing, let me urge you to treat this developing crisis with extreme sensitivity, giving the North Koreans every chance to feel respected and to save face. My opinion is that they want to work out a solution, but not as a result of public pressure.

NORTH KOREA
December 9, 1993

Q: Do the President's remarks on North Korea yesterday indicate a shift in his assessment of the situation?

A: -- No. The President has consistently said that North Korea's refusal to comply with its nonproliferation obligations is a very serious matter.

-- We continue to hope that North Korea will take the necessary steps to resolve this issue.

-- We remain fully committed to our objectives of a nuclear-free Korean peninsula and a strong international nonproliferation regime.

Q: What's your view of the Boutros Ghali trip to North Korea?

A: -- The Secretary General's planned trip to North Korea is an indication of the strong concerns felt throughout the international community about North Korea's actions in the nuclear area.

-- We expect that he will convey these concerns to the North Koreans and urge them to fulfill their nonproliferation commitments, as the UN Security Council has already urged.

(If asked)

-- The Secretary General is not carrying any message from the U.S. to North Korea.

Q: What do you think about leadership changes in North Korea?

A: -- North Korea is facing serious economic problems. I wouldn't want to speculate, however, on what lies behind the changes just announced in North Korea's government.

SUBJECT: Korea guidance

Q: What is going on with the North Koreans?

A: -- As you know we received a response yesterday from the North Koreans to our December 10 proposal.

-- We are now proceeding with consultations with South Korea and our allies.

-- Discussions with North Korea are continuing.

Q: Did the North Koreans give you enough to discuss?

A: -- If not, then discussions with the North would not be continuing.

Any other questions should be used to segue back into our overall guidance, i.e. two goals of nonnuclear peninsula and strong nonproliferation regime; meeting goals through full compliance with international obligations to IAEA and under North-South denuclearization accord; strong commitment to ROK allies; US continues to work with entire international community to achieve objectives; seeking resolution diplomatically but if continuity of safeguards broken the issue will return to the UN Security Council.

Q: What's your view of the Boutros Ghali trip to North Korea?

A: -- The Secretary General was invited by the North Koreans and accepted the invitation.

-- The UN Security Council and General Assembly are both on record calling for North Korea to comply with its nonproliferation obligations and cooperate fully with the IAEA.

-- We would expect that the Secretary General would convey these concerns to the North Koreans and urge them to fulfill their nonproliferation commitments.

-- The Secretary General is not carrying any message from the U.S. to North Korea.

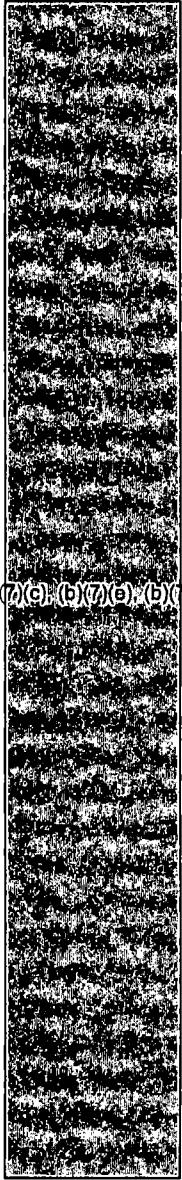

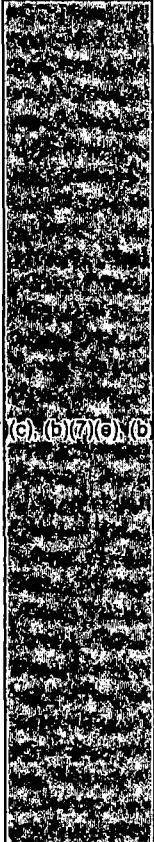
