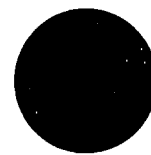

SUBJECT: Your Meeting with Pac Dunton and Korean Cold War
Families Association Members

Ms. Dunton met with you last summer and secured your agreement to a private meeting, now scheduled for May 9 at 3:00 p.m. The principal purpose of her delegation, in my view, is to ensure that the Administration keeps this issue alive now that it has been raised in a public way. They have been patient for many years, and now hope the process can move forward more quickly. They have some ideas on how negotiations might proceed and some issues they would like raised, but I believe they are coming principally to listen.

In that regard, you can report briefly on the most recent negotiations in New York.

- This is the second formal negotiation between the DPRK and the United States (Defense POW-MIA Office) on the issue of repatriating remains of POW-MIAs lost in the Korean War.
- The first meeting was held in January in Honolulu, and included a visit by the Korean delegation to the Central Identification Laboratory (CILHI).
- There are two issues under discussion:
 1. Compensation for the 172 sets of remains already turned over in 1992-93. The U.S. is offering \$2 million, the DPRK wants more.
 2. Joint recovery operations. The U.S. has told the North that the remains turned over were not satisfactorily catalogued or prepared, and want to ensure that the process actually contributes to identification. We have therefore proposed joint recovery operations between U.S. specialists and North Korean military units. North Korea has balked at this.

- We believe DPMO is the organization best-equipped to deal with this problem, and will continue to have it in the lead position.
- We are hopeful that the North will eventually accept the principle of joint recovery operations and that we can begin the real work soon. But we must be careful not to allow the North to use this issue, with its heavy emotional content, to influence other negotiations.

You may also indicate the extent to which some Members of Congress are involved in the issue.

Ms. Dunton may raise the issue of live-sightings of U.S. POWs in North Korea. DPMO has prepared a paper, which is attached at Tab A, that discusses this issue. We believe the paper is premature and not well-researched. News reports also indicate the possibility that some were actually transferred to Russia.

- We will do our best to follow up on all live-sighting reports once we have established a set of procedures with the North. This is an important issue for us.
- At this point, however, it is premature to speculate about the possibilities, and we would be irresponsible if we took hearsay stories completely at face value.
- We will be consulting with your organizations as soon as we have completed preliminary arrangements and are moving into an implementation phase.
- We hope you will be patient, and realize that we are serious and will pursue this issue until we are satisfied that the problem has been resolved.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

This is in response to your request for the views of the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) on H.R. 3084, 104th Congress, a bill "[t]o provide for the furnishing of medical care and disability benefits for former civilian prisoners of war." Section 2(a) of H.R. 3084 would create entitlement to medical care and disability benefits for former civilian prisoners of war (POWs) for injury or disability resulting from a period of internment or hiding. However, the bill does not specify who will provide the medical care or reimbursement for the care or who will pay the disability benefits authorized under the bill. In section 2(c)(1), the bill provides that the Secretary of Labor "shall facilitate" reimbursement, but the bill does not authorize any Federal department to actually provide medical care or reimbursement or to pay benefits.

It appears that the sponsor of H.R. 3084 may intend that the Secretary of Labor administer the program to provide medical care and disability benefits for eligible former civilian POWs. Thus, we defer to the Department of Labor as to whether former civilian POWs should be provided medical care or reimbursement for medical care and disability compensation under the program contemplated by H.R. 3084. However, if former civilian POWs are to be provided or reimbursed for medical care and provided disability compensation, VA should not be responsible for providing these services or benefits since the provision of services and benefits to individuals based on their civilian activities would represent a major departure from VA's mission.

The following technical comments on H.R. 3084 are provided for your consideration.

Section 2(a) of H.R. 3084, by using the terms "injury or disability," appears to create entitlement to medical care for injuries which are not disabling, but not for diseases which are not disabling. It is not clear whether this apparent inconsistency is intended. In addition, section 2(a) provides entitlement only on the basis of injuries or disabilities "resulting from" a period of internment, while the presumption created by section 2(b) applies to conditions "incurred in or aggravated by" a period of internment. The bill should clarify whether section 2(a) also covers aggravation of pre-existing conditions.

Section 2(b) of H.R. 3084 provides in pertinent part that, "[a]ny presumptive . . . condition . . . that is provided for former military prisoners of war . . . shall be applicable to . . . former civilian prisoners of war." Section 1112(b) of title 38, United States Code, does not "provide" "presumptive conditions" for former POWs; rather, it provides presumptions of service connection for diseases incurred by veterans who are former POWs. Section 2(b) should be amended, consistent with the apparent intention of the drafters, to indicate that the conditions listed in section 1112(b) which appear in former civilian POWs shall be presumed to be related to their period of internment or hiding.

Also with regard to section 2(b), we note that dental conditions, which are referenced in that provision, are not listed in section 1112(b) of title 38, although they may occur as a result of certain of the listed conditions. Further, we recommend substituting "disease" for "injury" in section 2(b), since the conditions listed in section 1112(b) are referred to in that section as diseases rather than injuries. In addition, we recommend adding "during the period of internment or hiding" at the end of that section. Otherwise, the provision would appear to require application of the presumption even in the absence of any current record that a condition exists.

Section 2(f) of H.R. 3084 would provide that benefits received under the bill would be reduced "to the extent such

benefits are provided under title XVIII of the Social Security Act, or any private insurance, for the same medical condition or disability." In order to avoid duplication of benefits, to the extent that the bill is intended to provide benefits for aggravation of pre-existing conditions during periods of internment, the bill should provide that benefits will be reduced by the amount of disability compensation paid under title 38 for aggravation of the same medical condition where a preexisting disability incurred in military service is aggravated by a period of internment or hiding as a civilian.

Section 7(1)(B)(ii)(III) would exclude from the term "former civilian prisoner of war" for purposes of determining entitlement to benefits under H.R. 3084 persons "regularly appointed, enrolled, enlisted, or inducted" as members of "any military or naval force." A variety of persons not falling within the scope of this provision may be entitled to benefits under title 38, United States Code, for disabilities incurred while POWs. See 38 C.F.R. § 3.7. To avoid duplication of benefits, section 7(1)(B) should be amended to exclude such persons from entitlement to benefits under H.R. 3084.

Finally, we note certain differences in the scope of H.R. 3084 in comparison to the statutes authorizing benefits for former military POWs under title 38, United States Code. First, the term "former prisoner of war," as defined in 38 U.S.C. § 101(32), does not include a person who "went into hiding in order to avoid capture." Such a person is included in the term "former civilian prisoner of war," as defined in section 7(1)(A) of H.R. 3084. Second, H.R. 3084 limits its coverage to persons interned or forced into hiding by "an enemy government or its agents, or a hostile force." See section 7(1)(A). "Hostile force" is defined in section 7(2) as a nation or its nationals or servants engaged in war or armed conflict against the United States or its allies. The title 38 provisions regarding former military POWs are broader, extending former POW status to persons detained or interned by "a foreign government or its agents" under circumstances comparable to those under which persons have generally been forcibly detained or interned

during wartime. Under this definition, for example, the active-duty personnel held at the United States Embassy in Iran from 1979 to 1981 were determined for VA purposes to be former POWs for purposes of title 38. It is not clear that the civilians held hostage under the same conditions could be considered "former civilian prisoners of war" under section 7 of H.R. 3084.

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Former Civilian Pris-
5 oners of War Benefits Act of 1996".

6 SEC. 2. MEDICAL CARE AND DISABILITY BENEFITS.

7 (a) ELIGIBILITY.—A former civilian prisoner of war
8 is entitled to receive necessary medical care and is entitled
9 to receive disability benefits under this Act for any injury

1 or disability resulting from the period of internment or
2 hiding.

3 (b) PRESUMPTIVE MEDICAL CONDITIONS.—Any pro-
4 sumptive medical or dental condition related to a period
5 of internment that is provided for former military pris-
6 oners of war under section 1112(b) of title 38, United
7 States Code, shall be applicable under this Act to former
8 civilian prisoners of war and shall be considered for such
9 purposes to have been incurred in or aggravated by such
10 period of internment or hiding, without regard to the ab-
11 sence of any record of such injury.

12 (c) PAYMENT OF MEDICAL BENEFITS.—(1) The Sec-
13 retary of Labor shall facilitate the prompt payment or re-
14 imbursement for reasonable and necessary expenditures
15 for all medical treatment, including rehabilitation, mental
16 health services, and dental care, provided under this sec-
17 tion for which a claim and any documentation determined
18 necessary by the Secretary is filed with the Secretary.

19 (2) The rate of payment for such medical treatment
20 shall be as provided in the schedule of payments in effect
21 at the time of such treatment for payments made under
22 workers' compensation programs administered by the Sec-
23 retary of Labor. To the extent a particular treatment is
24 not covered by such schedule, or as otherwise determined
25 necessary by the Secretary, the Secretary may establish

1 a schedule of payments for purposes of this subsection.
2 Any such schedule shall be established in consultation with
3 the Secretary of Veterans Affairs.

4 (d) WAIVER OF LIMITATIONS.—There shall be no
5 limitation on the total medical or disability benefits that
6 a former civilian prisoner of war may receive under this
7 Act for any injury or disability resulting from a period
8 of internment or hiding.

9 (e) RATE OF COMPENSATION.—Compensation for a
10 disability referred to in subsection (a) shall be at the rate

13 5, United States Code, as computed under section 8112(a)
14 of that title.

16 RITY ACT.—The benefits provided by this section to any
17 person shall be reduced to the extent such benefits are
18 provided under title XVIII of the Social Security Act, or
19 any private insurance, for the same medical condition or
20 disability.

21 SEC. 3. ADVISORY COMMITTEE

22 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary of Labor shall
23 establish an advisory committee to be known as the
24 Former Civilian Prisoner of War Advisory Committee.
25 The Secretary shall consult with and seek the advice of

1 the advisory committee with respect to the administration
2 of benefits under this Act.

3 (b) MEMBERS.—The members of the advisory com-
4 mittee shall be appointed by the Secretary from the gen-
5 eral public and shall include appropriate representatives
6 of former civilian prisoners of war and individuals who are
7 recognized authorities in fields pertinent to the injuries
8 and disabilities prevalent among former civilian prisoners
9 of war. The Secretary shall determine the number, terms
10 of service, and pay and allowances of members of the advi-
11 sory committee.

12 SEC. 4. REPORT TO CONGRESS.

13 Not later than March 1 of each year, the Secretary
14 of Labor shall submit to Congress a report on the pro-
15 grams and activities of the Department of Labor that per-
16 tain to former civilian prisoners of war. The Secretary
17 shall include in the report—

18 (1) an assessment of the needs of such civilian
19 prisoners of war with respect to health and disability
20 benefits;

21 (2) a review of the programs and activities of
22 the Office of Workers' Compensation Program de-
23 signed to meet such needs; and

24 (3) a summary of recommendations made by
25 the advisory committee under section 3 and a de-

1 scription of actions taken by the Secretary arising
2 from those recommendations.

3 SEC. 5. INFORMATION ON BENEFITS.

4 Not later than 90 days after the date of the enact-
5 ment of this Act, and at appropriate times thereafter, the
6 Secretary of Labor shall seek out former civilian prisoners
7 of war and provide them with information regarding appli-
8 cable changes in law, regulations, and services to which
9 they are entitled under this Act.

10 SEC. 6. REGULATIONS.

11 The Secretary of Labor shall prescribe regulations to
12 ensure that benefits provided to former civilian prisoners
13 of war under this Act are coordinated with, and do not
14 duplicate any benefits provided to such persons under, the
15 War Claims Act of 1948 (50 U.S.C. App. 2001 et seq.).

16 SEC. 7. DEFINITIONS.

17 For purposes of this Act:

18 (1)(A) Except as provided in subparagraph (B),
19 the term "former civilian prisoner of war" means a
20 person determined by the Secretary of Labor, in
21 consultation with the Secretary of State and the
22 Secretary of Defense, as being someone who, before
23 the date of enactment of this Act and being then a
24 citizen of the United States, was forcibly interned by
25 an enemy government or its agents, or a hostile

1 force, or went into hiding in order to avoid capture
2 by such government, its agents, or hostile force, dur-
3 ing a period of war, or other period for at least 30
4 days, including those interned or who went into hid-
5 ing—

6 (i) in the Asian-Pacific Theater or the Eu-
7 ropean Theater of World War II during the pe-
8 riod beginning on September 1, 1939, and end-
9 ing on December 31, 1946;

10 (ii) in Korea during the period beginning
11 on June 25, 1950, and ending on July 1, 1955;
12 or

13 (iii) in Vietnam during the period begin-
14 ning on February 28, 1961, and ending on May
15 7, 1975.

16 (B) Such term does not apply to—

17 (i) a person who at any time voluntarily
18 gave aid to, collaborated with, or in any manner
19 served such government, or

20 (ii) a person who at the time of capture or
21 entrance into hiding was—

22 (I) a person within the purview of the
23 Act entitled "An Act to provide compensa-
24 tion for employees of the United States
25 suffering injuries while in the performance

1 of their duties, and for other purposes",
2 approved September 7, 1916;

3 (II) a person within the purview of
4 the Act entitled "An Act to provide bene-
5 fits for the injury, disability, death, or
6 enemy detention of employees of contrac-
7 tors with the United States, and for other
8 purposes", approved December 2, 1942; or

9 (III) a regularly appointed, enrolled,
10 enlisted, or inducted member of any mili-
11 tary or naval force.

12 (2) The term "hostile force" means any nation,
13 or any national thereof, or any other person serving
14 a foreign nation—

15 (A) engaged in war against the United
16 States or any of its allies; or

17 (B) engaged in armed conflict, whether or
18 not war has been declared, against the United
19 States or any of its allies.

20 SEC. 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.

21 (a) MEDICAL CARE.—This Act shall apply only with
22 respect to medical care provided on or after the date of
23 the enactment of this Act.

1 (b) DISABILITY BENEFITS.—No disability benefits
2 may be paid under this Act with respect to any period
3 before the date of the enactment of this Act.

THE WHITE HOUSE
SEPTEMBER 18, 1996**

- Delighted to welcome you to the White House.

U.S. as Pacific Power

- President Clinton recognizes that with end of Cold War, Asia-Pacific more important to American interests than ever before. Know our security depends on maintaining stability and prosperity in world's most dynamic region. Unprecedented emphasis on protecting strategic and economic interests and strengthening relations with allies and partners.
- Demonstrated commitment to remain Pacific power by keeping 100,000 troops in region, revitalizing five treaty alliances, building new architecture for security cooperation and economic growth and integration.

Strong U.S.-ROK Partnership

- As rock-solid treaty ally, important trading partner, and fellow democracy, South Korea essential to sustaining American engagement in Pacific. Historic progress in deepening cooperation over last three years.
- U.S. has maintained strong security ties, including forward deployment of 38,000 U.S. troops on last fault line of Cold War. Now renewing Status of Forces Agreement that provides for Korean support of U.S. military presence on peninsula.
- In last three years we have worked with South Korea and other nations to reduce dramatically threat posed by North Korea's nuclear program. October 1994 U.S.-D.P.R.K. Framework freezes and eventually eliminates existing DPRK nuclear facilities. Freeze holding under international supervision, canning of spent fuel rods continues under international safeguards, and KEDO consortium which will implement accord is moving ahead.
- As part of Framework, U.S. also committed to seek more normal relations with North Korea. Engaging in bilateral missile talks, and in first joint efforts to account for POW/MIAs from Korean War. While almost total embargo remains on trade and investment with North Korea, U.S. contributed \$6 million to international appeal for carefully monitored humanitarian assistance to address severe food shortages caused by flooding.
- Building on Framework, President Clinton and President Kim met last spring to propose talks among North and South Korea, China and United States to reduce tensions on peninsula and

replace armistice agreement with permanent peace. U.S. continues to see proposal as best vehicle for developing process for peace.

- While future of peninsula lies in hands of Korean people, U.S. determined to help promote reconciliation. Share the desire of all Korean people for peaceful reunification. Strongly believe resumption of North-South dialogue essential to that process, and to stability on peninsula.
- Continued stability will promote greater prosperity throughout region and further deepen U.S.-ROK economic ties. U.S. remains biggest trading partner and export market, while ROK now our seventh largest export market. Trade balance actually shifted to U.S. surplus of \$1.2 billion.
- Deregulation of ROK economy essential to spurring growth, and to resolving trade disputes between U.S. and ROK in areas such as autos and agriculture. For example, tariffs and regulations in ROK help limit U.S. auto exports to ROK to roughly one-one hundredth of number of autos that ROK exports to U.S.
- ROK's commitment to deregulation sign of its willingness to assume leadership responsibilities of developed nation. U.S. enthusiastic supporter of ROK's admittance into Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development this year. Working together through WTO, whose deputy head is Korean, and APEC to promote global and regional free trade and investment. Also working together through UN Security Council to promote peace and prosperity around world.
- South Korea's emergence as world's 11th biggest economy and respected actor on world stage tribute to energy of Korean people. Our two countries now full partners.
- But for partnership to be successful, must be two-way street. Press criticism of U.S. military presence, U.S. pressure to open markets, and U.S. requests for support to advance shared goals is not helpful to sustaining support for the alliance here in the United States. For almost half-century, American people have proved willingness to support Korea. Most Americans expect Korea would return that support.
- Our nations must both shoulder responsibility of affirming long-term interests we share. Count on you to help keep partnership strong by helping to dispel misperceptions on both sides.

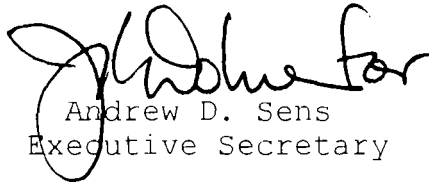

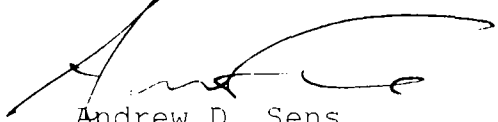
