Dear Mr. Pappas:

Thank you for your recent letter concerning an issue of high priority to the Clinton Administration and me personally: achieving the fullest possible accounting for our missing-in-action in Korea.

As you indicated in your letter, when I met earlier this year with representatives from a number of different veterans and family groups, I stated that the Administration would use the soon to be opened liaison office in Pyongyang as a new channel in which to discuss POW-MIA issues with North Korea.

Unfortunately, unanticipated delays by North Korea have prevented the opening of this liaison office. In view of the current uncertainty surrounding the opening of this office, I agree with your basic point that a different mechanism should be established to seek progress on this issue.

The Department of Defense has been authorized to invite a North Korean delegation to the CILHI laboratory in Hawaii in order to improve North Korean knowledge about various technical aspects involved in the recovery of remains. While this visit has been envisioned for some time, the scope of the proposed mission will be broadened to include policy issues. Specifically, the letter of invitation to the North Koreans will advise them that Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense Jim Wold will be their host in Honolulu and will be prepared to discuss both issues and all policy matters relating to the MIA issue.

If the North Koreans accept the invitation, Mr. Wold will seek to impress upon them the humanitarian nature of this issue and emphasize our desire to achieve progress quickly.

Given the North's previous history of delay on this issue, it is difficult to assess whether this new initiative will bear fruit. But as someone who strongly supports President Clinton's goal of achieving the fullest possible accounting, I believe that the United States has everything to gain, and nothing to lose, by making this new offer.

I will, of course, keep you informed about the North Korean response.

Dear Mr. Lake,

It has been over three months since representatives of The Chosin Few, VFW, American Legion, KWVA, Amvets, DAV and Korea Cold War Family Assn. of the Missing were given the opportunity to meet with you at the White House. The purpose of that meeting was to discuss Government policy on how to approach North Korea regarding the return of remains and to obtain the fullest possible accounting of our missing from the Korean War.

You stated that the Government wanted to use the exchange of liaisons, provided for in the "Nuclear Accord", as the venue to resolve this issue. To date, we have not exchanged liaisons and we do not see it happening in the immediate future. Therefore we are requesting that the Government adopt the position taken by the veterans group in attendance at the July 26th meeting.

We requested that the President organize an inter-agency working group lead by Tom Hubbard, Asst. Deputy Secretary of State, General Jim Wold, Asst. Deputy Secretary of Defense, and the necessary support personnel from CILHI to meet directly with representatives of North Korea. This bilateral working group should have the funding and authority to resolve all questions relating to POW/MIA issues only (joint operations, etc.). These bilateral talks should once and for all find out if North Korea wants to resolve these issues.

There are approximately 2,000 documented grave sites in North Korea plus remains at former POW camp sites. The revised MIA figure now stands at approximately 8,700 (new study by DOD). The time has come to directly engage the North Koreans in a significant way. We owe this to the men who paid the ultimate sacrifice for their country and still lie in the cold and desolate ground of North Korea.

As President Clinton said on July 27 at the Dedication of the Korean War Veterans Memorial, "Thousands of Americans who were lost in Korea to this day have never been accounted for...We have not forgotten our debt to them or to their families and we will never stop working for the day when they can be brought home."

It has long been the U.S. Government policy to get back remains from foreign wars along with the fullest possible accounting of MIAs. We feel it is time our government did the same for the POW/MIA's from the Korean War. We urge you to move on this issue as quickly as possible. We are like the "dinosaurs", slowly becoming "extinct". The KWVA wants to be sure that everything can be done for the return of those POW/MIAs before the "Ice Age" catches up to us too. After the Korean War Veterans are gone, who will carry that "torch"? Will they be "forgotten" again? Only action on this and similar requests will remedy that.

Dear Mr. Lake:

It has been over three months since I attended a meeting with you at the White House concerning Clinton administration policy regarding North Korea and accounting for United States service personnel missing in the Korean War.

To date, none of the administration's plans, which you outlined that day, have taken place with the exception of one. The Clinton administration continues to, as you expressed it, "not upset the South Koreans" by refusing to seek bilateral accounting efforts with the North Koreans. Additionally, through non-compliance with the 1995 Defense Authorization Act, the administration's actions are diametrically opposed to President Clinton's public statement on July 27, 1995, "Thousands of Americans who were lost in Korea to this day have never been accounted for...We have not forgotten our debt to them or their families and we will never stop working for the day when they can be brought home." I believe it would well have been within President Clinton's prerogative to have stated that his administration would begin the accounting that all previous administrations had neglected, that his administration would be the one to remember the men and their families.

On behalf of the Korean/Cold War Family Association of the Missing, I request that President Clinton direct the Department of State to

begin bilateral negotiations with North Korea regarding the missing from the Korean War, that this issue be approached separately from any other United States or United Nations/North Korea negotiations. I also request that the Department of Defense be removed from any role in negotiation efforts with the exception of qualified CILHI professionals. Simply stated, the North Koreans want recognition by the United States government and the American people want an accounting of their missing from the Korean War. This could be a win/win situation if approached on an humanitarian basis.

Please be the first administration to seriously attempt an accounting for Korean War missing. Assign professionals to the task, make a plan and execute it. Forty plus years of rhetoric from both Democratic and Republican administrations has accomplished very little on this issue and is damnably boring. Please choose to be proactive and attempt an honorable accounting solution.

You stated at the July meeting the intention of future meetings with those of us in attendance to discuss administration progress on Korean War accounting efforts. I believe another meeting should be scheduled in the near future so that we may discuss current administration policy and plans regarding this issue.

As National Commander of the more than one million members of the Disabled American Veterans (DAV), I write to you to request that President Clinton organize an interagency working group with sufficient funding and authority to conduct bilateral meetings with representatives of the government of North Korea to resolve the issue of our POW/MIAs from the Korean War.

At our last national convention in Las Vegas, Nevada in July 1995, DAV National Delegates again passed a resolution seeking the fullest possible accounting of our POW/MIAs from World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. A copy of this resolution is attached. The DAV believes our government and the government of North Korea should immediately and directly engage in bilateral talks to resolve the issue of our POW/MIAs unaccounted for from the Korean War.

In less than five years, we will be commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the sacrifices made by Korean War veterans. The time has come to take significant measures to provide closure for the families who have loved ones unaccounted for from that war. We owe no less to the men who paid the ultimate price and to their families.

Again, we request that the President organize an interagency working group to proceed with bilateral talks with representatives of the government of North Korea to account for our POW/MIAs from the Korean War. I look forward to your early reply on when we can expect the President to move forward on this request.

LEGISLATIVE**

**SEEKING THE IMMEDIATE RELEASE OF ANY AMERICANS WHO
MAY STILL BE HELD CAPTIVE FOLLOWING WORLD WAR II, THE
KOREAN WAR AND VIETNAM WAR AND THE RETURN OF THE
REMAINS OF ANY AMERICANS WHO DIED DURING THESE WARS**

**WHEREAS, the members of the Disabled American Veterans
are deeply concerned for the thousands of American
servicemen still unaccounted for in the aftermath of World
War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War; and**

**WHEREAS, numerous efforts by high level American
delegations including members of Congress have visited
Southeast Asia in continuing efforts to solve the mystery
of the whereabouts and fate of these brave men without
success; and**

**WHEREAS, the brave families of these missing Americans
continue to live in uncertainty and anguish regarding their
missing sons and husbands; and**

**WHEREAS, there are still today more than seventy-eight
thousand unaccounted for following World War II, some eight
thousand from the Korean War and over two thousand two
hundred in Southeast Asia from the Vietnam War who have not
been forgotten; and**

**WHEREAS, the DAV was extremely disappointed with the
timing of President Clinton's decision to normalize
relations with the government of the Socialist Republic of
Vietnam, prior to a fullest possible accounting of our
POW/MIAs from Southeast Asia; NOW**

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Disabled American
Veterans in National Convention assembled in Las Vegas,
Nevada, July 23-27, 1995, urges the U.S. government to
ensure that this issue be considered as one of America's
highest priorities, accelerating efforts to obtain the
release of any American who still may be held captive and
obtain the fullest possible accounting of those still
missing and the repatriation of the remains of those who
died while serving our nation; AND**

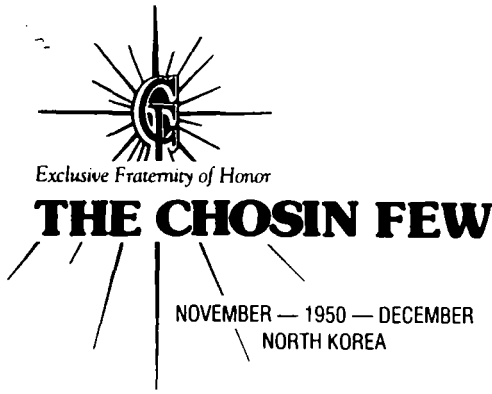
**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we urge passage of

SUBJECT: Requirement for Unclassified DIA Publication on North Korea

Your memorandum of 14 April, addressed to Kent Wiedemann, questioned the necessity of having DIA prepare a new report on North Korea for public dissemination. The May 1994 House Armed Services Committee report on the mark-up of the Defense Authorization Bill contained language requesting an update of the 1991 DIA publication entitled, "North Korea: The Foundations of Military Strength." Committee Report language of this nature is non-binding, and the new Congress has not indicated an interest in the DIA publication.

Nevertheless, our view is that an updated version of the publication would be worthwhile. There are very few copies of the original publication available and a number of changes have occurred in North Korea (including the death of Kim Il-sung). An updated publication would be helpful in providing reliable information about North Korea at a time when public debate is raging about that country's motives and capabilities. We understand your concern that analysts working on North Korea are burdened by increasing requirements at this time, and also take the point that the situation in the DPRK is fluid and difficult to describe. The Administration's efforts to explain the benefits of the Agreed Framework, however, would be enhanced by public dissemination of an authoritative source of information on the DPRK's political stability and military capabilities.

Accordingly, we request that you develop a work plan for the publication of an update and keep us and the Congress informed of your plans.

SUBJECT: Congressional Requirement for Unclassified Korea Publication

1. In May 1994, the House Armed Services Committee unclassified report on its mark-up of the Defense Authorization Bill noted that the October 1991 DIA unclassified publication, "North Korea: The Foundations of Military Strength", provided a significant amount of political, military and security information on that country. The report continued "The committee finds that an update of that publication would prove useful given the current tensions on the Korean peninsula and, therefore, directs the Secretary of Defense to task the DIA Director to prepare such an unclassified report for release no later than January 1, 1995."

2. DIA was never tasked formally by OSD to prepare an updated study, and--in the absence of such direct tasking--has taken no action to accomplish it. My Congressional Liaison staff has contacted OSD/LL on several occasions in recent months to ascertain OSD's views on whether DIA must proceed with this publication. We have been unable to obtain clarification regarding how binding such a mark-up is or how OSD wants to respond to it.

3. With the Committee's deadline of 1 January now well past, I am concerned that the lack of any formal OSD or DIA response to this tasking could produce misperceptions or other negative repercussions. Accordingly, I request that your office review the Congressional tasking and provide formal guidance to DIA regarding the course of action OSD desires.

4. As you weigh this matter, I need not belabor an obvious political consideration: the sensitivity of the nuclear framework agreement with North Korea, and the attendant implications and impact that publication for public consumption of an updated DIA intelligence compendium on North Korean forces might have. Other relevant factors I would urge you to consider are:

-- While some very obvious and important changes have occurred in North Korea since 1991, the basic data and information (the "foundations of military power") as portrayed in the 1991 DIA publication have not changed appreciably. To the extent changes have occurred--especially in the nuclear arena--they have been thoroughly documented elsewhere, and a DIA treatment would add nothing new to the public record.

-- DIA's resources, increasingly constrained by staff reductions, have been prioritized to address a broad range of manpower intensive Korea requirements involving critical direct support both to warfighters and the policy community.

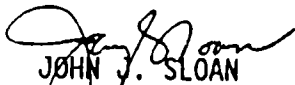

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ARMISTICE AGREEMENT

VOLUME I

Text of Agreement

e. Direct the operations of the Joint Observer Teams.

f. Settle through negotiations any violations of this Armistice Agreement.

g. Transmit immediately to the Commanders of the opposing sides all reports of investigations of violations of this Armistice Agreement and all other reports and records of proceedings received from the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission.

h. Give general supervision and direction to the activities of the Committee for Repatriation of Prisoners of War and the Committee for Assisting the Return of Displaced Civilians, hereinafter established.

i. Act as an intermediary in transmitting communications between the Commanders of the opposing sides; provided, however, that the foregoing shall not be construed to preclude the Commanders of both sides from communicating with each other by any other means which they may desire to employ.

j. Provide credentials and distinctive insignia for its staff and its Joint Observer Teams, and a distinctive marking for all vehicles, aircraft, and vessels, used in the performance of its mission.

26. The mission of the Joint Observer Teams shall be to assist the Military Armistice Commission in supervising the carrying out of the provisions of this Armistice Agreement pertaining to the Demilitarized Zone and to the Han River Estuary.

27. The Military Armistice Commission, or the senior member of either side thereof, is authorized to dispatch Joint Observer Teams to investigate violations of this Armistice Agreement reported to have occurred in the Demilitarized Zone or in the Han River Estuary; provided, however, that not more than one half of the Joint Observer Teams which have not been dispatched by the Military Armistice Commission may be dispatched at any one time by the senior member of either side on the Commission.

ARTICLE V

MISCELLANEOUS

61. Amendments and additions to this Armistice Agreement must be mutually agreed to by the Commanders of the opposing sides.

62. The Articles and Paragraphs of this Armistice Agreement shall remain in effect until expressly superseded either by mutually acceptable amendments and additions or by provision in an appropriate agreement for a peaceful settlement at a political level between both sides.

63. All of the provisions of this Armistice Agreement, other than Paragraph 12, shall become effective at 2200 hours on 27 JULY 1953.

Done at Panmunjom, Korea, at 1000 hours on the 27th day of JULY, 1953, in English, Korean, and Chinese, all texts being equally authentic.
