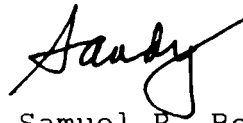

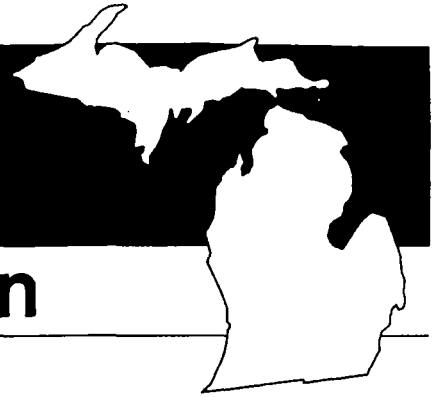

**TRIP REPORT OF SENATOR CARL LEVIN (D-MI)
VISIT TO NORTH AND SOUTH KOREA
January 15-19, 1998**

I visited North Korea from January 15-18, and from there went to South Korea from January 18-19. A complete list of my meetings and site visits in both North and South Korea is included at the end of this report.

The purpose of my trip was to:

- visit the site of the North Korean nuclear facility at Yongbyon and observe first-hand the canning of the spent nuclear fuel;
- review the implementation of the Agreed Framework between the U.S. and North Korea that freezes the North Korean plutonium production program at the Yongbyon site;
- visit the area where the U.S. military will conduct joint recovery operations with the North Korean military to search for remains of U.S. soldiers missing from the Korean War; and
- discuss other bilateral issues between the U.S. and North Korea, including the ongoing missile proliferation talks and the U.S. response to the World Food Program appeal for food assistance to North Korea.

NORTH KOREA

The border between North and South Korea remains one of the most heavily armed and dangerous regions of the world. There are major obstacles to peace on the Korean peninsula, including the threatening forward deployments of the North Korean military; the serious problem of North Korean missile proliferation; and the continued reluctance of North Korea to engage in meaningful dialogue with South Korea to reduce tensions on the peninsula.

In my discussions with North Korean civilian and military officials, I stressed that the

U.S. alliance with South Korea remains strong. Within this context, the U.S. wants to see a reduction of tensions on the Korean peninsula, better relations between North and South Korea, and better relations between the U.S. and North Korea. These goals can be achieved through the current 4-Party Talks, which are scheduled to resume in March; full implementation of the Agreed Framework; the ongoing missile proliferation talks between the U.S. and North Korea; and direct, meaningful dialogue between North and South Korea.

In 1994, former President Jimmy Carter and then-North Korean President Kim Il Sung agreed to a series of proposals to reduce tensions on the Korean peninsula. These proposals included the implementation of confidence building and tension reduction measures as well as direct dialogue between the North and South. Prior to his death in July, 1994, President Kim Il Sung had agreed to a summit meeting with President Kim Young Sam of South Korea.

North Korean leaders continue to express unwavering allegiance to the policies and direction of their former President Kim Il Sung. I stressed to them that was a reason for them to carry out the proposals developed by our respective former Presidents to reduce tensions on the Korean peninsula.

Without diminishing the major obstacles to peace in the Korea, I found during my visit to North Korea a few modestly hopeful signs for potential progress in an otherwise generally bleak environment:

- For the first time, the North Koreans opened up the Yongbyon nuclear facility to a U.S. elected official.
- The Agreed Framework is being successfully implemented by both sides. Canning and sealing of the spent fuel rods at the Yongbyon nuclear facility under the supervision of the International Atomic Energy Agency is almost completed. Construction has begun on the light water reactor project, and deliveries of heavy fuel oil to the North Koreans have been fulfilled for the last three years.
- The 4-Party Talks are proceeding, although North Korean officials claimed to be suspicious that the U.S. was using these talks as a ruse to force North Korea to deal directly with South Korea.
- North Korean officials indicated their intention to continue bilateral talks with the U.S. on missile proliferation, although they did not indicate when they would be willing to schedule the next round of talks, nor when they would respond to the U.S. offer made during the last session of these talks in June, 1997.
- U.S. and North Korean Joint Recovery Operations of the remains of U.S. soldiers missing from the Korean War are increasing, and will provide some opportunity for direct U.S.-North Korean military contacts.

- The tone of North Korean Major General Li Chan Bok seemed less strident in my discussions than in his discussions with Senator Sam Nunn and former U.S. Ambassador to South Korea James Laney in July of 1997. For example, General Li's comment that the continued state of belligerency on the Korean peninsula was "our joint fault" -- referring to the U.S. and North Korea -- seemed a departure from the usual harsh attacks by the North Koreans on the U.S., although General Li then proceeded to recite a long litany of U.S. "faults" without mentioning any by North Korea.
- North Korea has granted foreign aid workers and food monitors access to large portions of their country, permitting direct contact with North Korean citizens. Local representatives of the international relief agencies involved in food distribution in North Korea say they have confidence that their food aid is going where it is intended for the people who need it, and not being diverted to the military.
- Anecdotal reports indicate that more bicycles are seen on the streets than in the past, suggesting perhaps an easing of restrictions on the movement of people.

I don't want to make too much of what I have called these modestly hopeful signs. The situation on the Korean peninsula remains tense and dangerous. In cold meeting rooms in cities with little electricity where people walk miles for food, the North Koreans still profess unwavering allegiance to their political and economic system, and a fierce determination not to let outside forces change that system.

Under any circumstances, significant improvements in the situation on the Korean peninsula will only come after a long and difficult process, and only after direct and meaningful dialogue between North and South Korea.

Food Aid

The issue of food aid dominated every discussion I had in North Korea.

The November, 1997 Report of the Food and Agriculture Organization/World Food Program Crop and Food Supply Assessment Mission to North Korea documented the severity of the food shortage in North Korea and the underlying structural problems in the country's agricultural sector. In Pyongyang I met with representatives of the World Food Program, the International Red Cross, the United Nations Development Program and UNICEF, all of whom confirmed the conclusions of the FAO/WFP assessment.

North Korean officials acknowledge the severity of the problem, but insist the current food shortage in their country is only the temporary result of natural disasters. Although the World Food Program food appeal for North Korea for 1998 is twice the size of the 1997 appeal, North Korean officials indicated they felt it was only half their need. Even so, they expressed the hope that they would not have to ask for any food assistance next year.

While North Korean officials expressed gratitude for past U.S. contributions of food aid, they were disappointed that the U.S. has not yet responded to the January 6 World Food Program appeal for North Korea. I indicated that, based on discussions with White House officials before my trip, I was confident that the U.S. response to this appeal would be substantial, just as it was in 1997.

I also indicated that the U.S. considered food aid to be a humanitarian issue that was not linked to any other issue between our countries. North Korean officials strongly agreed with this position, urging that the U.S. continue to treat food aid as a humanitarian issue and not use it as a "political weapon."

At the end of our discussions, however, one senior North Korean official indicated that North Korea would gauge its response to the 4-Party Talks by the U.S. response to the latest World Food Program food appeal. That the North Koreans would link food aid to other issues, holding out the carrot of greater progress in the 4-Party Talks in exchange for more food aid after decrying any such linkage by the U.S., underscores the desperation of their situation.

Election of Kim Dae-Jung as President of South Korea

In discussions with Senator Nunn and Ambassador Laney last summer, North Korean officials indicated that when there was a new South Korean President, they would consider having a dialogue with him.

I repeatedly pressed the North Koreans on whether they viewed the election of Kim Dae-Jung in South Korea as an opportunity for a new dialogue with South Korea. Their response was studiously non-committal. Despite their support for Kim Dae-Jung when he opposed the South Korean government, the North Koreans refused to make any commitment to a dialogue with him now that he has been elected President, saying they were interested in "policies, not personalities." The North Koreans indicated only that they were "following closely" the policies of the new South Korean President-elect.

SOUTH KOREA

In South Korea, I briefed General Tilelli, Commander in Chief of United Nations Command/Combined Forces Command and of U.S. Forces Korea, and his staff, President-elect Kim Dae-Jung and Foreign Minister Yoo Chang-Ha on my visit to North Korea.

In my discussions with President-elect Kim, I told him that I had urged the North to accept his offer of dialogue with the South; described North Korea's cautious "wait and see" approach to his election; indicated that North Korea placed great importance on the food aid issue, particularly South Korea's response to the North's food problems; and stressed the importance of continuing the implementation of the Agreed Framework and the funding of the light water reactor project in North Korea.

President-elect Kim indicated that his Administration's policy toward North Korea would be based on three principles. First, South Korea would not tolerate any military threats from North Korea. Second, the South had no intention of overturning the North Korean government by force. Third, South Korea was ready for open dialogue with North Korea to implement the 1991/1992 Basic Agreement between the two countries.

The President-elect indicated that meaningful North-South dialogue will require a great deal of patience. He understands the North has adopted a "wait and see" approach to his Administration. While President-elect Kim indicated that he is open to any dialogue with North Korea, he does not believe in forcing the issue now, particularly with South Korea's pressing need to address its economic problems. He also indicated that he believes that North Korea may be waiting to see the impact of his Administration's economic policies over the next several months before making any decision on a meaningful dialogue with South Korea.

I was particularly pleased that the President-elect reiterated his Administration's intention to continue the 4-Party Talks and to honor South Korea's commitment to the construction of the light water reactors in North Korea. I was also pleased that outgoing Foreign Minister Yoo Chang-Ha indicated that he understood the importance of South Korea's participation in food aid to North Korea.

Conclusion

North Korea wants very much to improve relations with the United States. They desperately need food assistance from the U.S. to feed their population. They also claimed repeatedly that U.S. sanctions are "strangling" their country, and that U.S.-South Korean military forces -- particularly military exercises -- pose an unacceptable threat to North Korea.

As anxious as the North Koreans are to improve relations with the U.S., I did not detect a willingness on their part to take the most important step necessary to reduce tensions and bring lasting peace to the Korean peninsula: direct, meaningful talks with South Korea. President-elect Kim Dae-Jung indicated he believes that North Korean's strategy continues to be to "drive a wedge" between South Korea and the U.S. The U.S. cannot allow the North Koreans to succeed in this effort.

Through the 4-Party Talks; the implementation of the Agreed Framework; the U.S.-North Korean talks on missile proliferation; and the Joint Recovery Operations of U.S. soldiers missing from the Korean War, the U.S. is engaged with North Korea on a multilateral and bilateral basis. The U.S. should continue to engage North Korea on these and other issues, although it will take considerable persistence and patience.

In all of these efforts, we should continue to make clear to the North Koreans that their goal of improving relations with the U.S. and their own long-term self-interests are best served by bringing peace and stability to the Korean peninsula. The only way to achieve that goal is for North Korea to deal directly with South Korea.

I enjoyed and appreciated my visit with you, Secretary Albright, and Vice-President Gore on January 23rd. I am greatly honored by having the next Seawolf class submarine named for me, and I look forward to its construction and commissioning.

I want to follow up on the primary issue we discussed, my interest in exploring possibilities for resolving some of the remaining issues in Korea. This is based on some special relationships I have with key leaders. As you will remember, Kim il Sung made a number of significant commitments to me in June 1994, which he then confirmed in writing to you. One of the most important was willingness to meet directly with President Kim Young Sam. Both sides subsequently confirmed this, but all arrangements were aborted by the unexpected death of Kim il Sung a few days before the scheduled summit meeting.

Since then, on several occasions and on his own initiative, Kim Jong Il has sent me word that he intends to fulfill all the promises his father made to me. Also, the North Koreans have issued press releases and confirmed this with direct messages to me that I have an invitation to return to Pyongyang "at an appropriate time."

The other pertinent factor is my own long-standing personal relationship with President-elect Kim Dae Jung, whose death sentence was commuted after we interceded strongly with President Chun in 1980. Kim called me after his recent election and asked me to come to Seoul to discuss relations between North and South Korea.

To take advantage of what might be a real opportunity for progress, I need your approval. I will be very careful to coordinate each step of my efforts with your designated NSC and State Department officials.

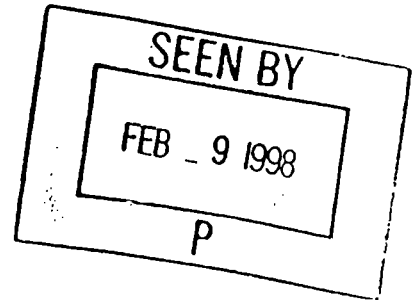
