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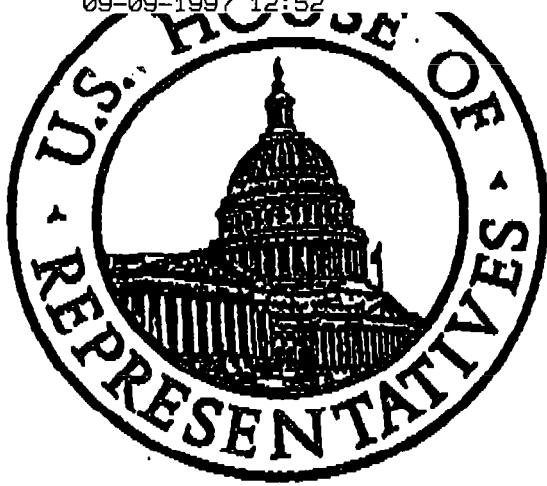

Dear Secretary Glickman:

I am respectfully writing to follow up conversations between our staffs to invite you to come to my district in the Central Coast of California for a public appearance later this Fall.

As you may know, I was elected to Congress in 1996 with 49% of the vote and I am the first Democrat to represent this district in 50 years. I am working hard to reach out to many constituents in my district, but one community on which I have focussed particular attention is agriculture. I am pleased to have made significant progress with the agriculture community, but a visit from you would be extremely helpful and greatly appreciated by the many farmers and ranchers in my district. Agriculture is critical to both the economy and community of California's Central Coast, and is one of the top revenue sources in both San Luis Obispo and Santa Barbara Counties.

My proposal is to conduct two or three events during the day, depending on your schedule. Ideally we would begin with a small meeting of key agriculture leaders in the district followed by a quick media tour of some farmlands, and finally a larger "Town Hall" forum with you as the keynote speaker. I expect the latter meeting to attract hundreds of farmers and ranchers in the area. This would be an opportunity for them to discuss their concerns and ideas, and for you to shed some light on the relevant programs at the Department of Agriculture. A few subjects that could be discussed include the preservation of the family farm, the conservation reserve program, and the nexus between agriculture and trade.

I realize you have an extremely busy schedule, which I certainly will do everything I can to accommodate. Of course, while Congress is in session, a Monday, Friday, or weekend day would be best. Upon adjournment, the schedule is more flexible. I sincerely hope that you will give this request your most sympathetic consideration. Please have your staff contact my Chief of Staff, Jeremy Rabinovitz at 202-225-3601 if we can provide additional information. Thank you very much. I look forward to hearing from you.

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STATEMENT OF REPRESENTATIVE WALTER CAPPS ON FAST TRACK LEGISLATION

September 10, 1997

Today I am announcing my opposition to the Fast Track legislation that will be considered by the Congress this fall.

I take this step with some reluctance because, in principle, I am someone who favors free and fair trade. I supported the extension of Most Favored Nation trading status to China because I believe expansion of trading opportunities can be economically advantageous for America. In addition, I favor granting Fast Track authority to the President in some cases, however, in this case it is clear that Fast Track will be used to extend NAFTA. In effect, voting for Fast Track would be tantamount to voting for NAFTA extension to Chile and perhaps all of Latin America. Given the disappointing results of the agreement to date, I have grave reservations about extending it to other countries.

In addition to the well known concerns that have been raised regarding environmental and job loss issues, I am also deeply concerned about the effect that NAFTA has had, and extension would have, on the agriculture industry in my district. In particular, I am very worried about how extension of NAFTA would affect our dynamic wine industry and farms that grow specialty crops such as avocados and cut flowers.

I feel strongly that trade expansion is a goal this country should pursue, but we must not sacrifice our critical indigenous industries in pursuit of that goal. I pride myself on my support for the business community at large and expanded trade in general, however, I am first and foremost a supporter of the local business community in my district. I strongly believe that opposition to an expanded NAFTA is in the best economic interests of my district.

I stand willing to work with the Administration and members of both party to ensure that we expand our trading opportunities in a way that is fair for both our trading partners and ourselves.

Dear Mr. President:

First, let me thank you for listening to what Members are saying about trying to build a broad base and for taking time to address the kinds of concerns about fast track that have given many Members misgivings.

As you make final changes to draft legislation to extend "fast track" negotiating authority, I urge you to consider the importance of environmental and labor standards in trade agreements.

Trade is beneficial to the U.S. economy. I have voted for fast track extension, NAFTA, and GATT, despite significant constituent opposition.

I have had many discussions with other Democratic Members on all sides of this issue. Even among those inclined to support fast track, like myself, there is a concern that any legislation must enable the Administration to address environmental and workforce standards in bilateral agreements.

One way to address this concern may be to bifurcate the discussion of fast track. Without affecting the broad "fast track" negotiating authority, we may want to distinguish between global and sectoral agreements and bilateral ones. Since we have a better understanding in bilateral discussions of what is likely to be achievable in terms of labor and environmental changes, it may make sense to include such issues in the body of negotiated bilateral agreements, rather than in side-agreements.

I believe that fast track legislation that reflects the need to address these issues could unite our party and reassert our leadership on trade issues.

Thank you for your attention on this matter. I look forward to our continued work together.

Dear Mr. President:

We appreciate the time and effort that Ambassador Barshefsky and Secretaries Rubin, Glickman and Daley dedicated last week to meeting with Senate Democrats to listen to our concerns and hear our recommendations with respect to the fast track legislative proposal that will soon come before the Congress. We thought it would be useful at this point to articulate what appears to be an emerging consensus among our colleagues as to the issues that ought to be addressed when you present your fast track proposal.

At the outset, there is widespread recognition that export expansion will be key to continued economic growth, and broad support for the aggressive market-opening initiatives that you and your economic team have undertaken. At the same time, our colleagues share the conviction that we must address ourselves as well to the very real human costs of globalization, as American workers compete with low-wage labor in countries with weak labor laws, minimally enforced. We also have a common concern that our efforts to harmonize worldwide environmental, health and safety standards in an effort to facilitate trade should not in any measure erode our own standards. Instead, global standards must move in our direction -- to safeguard the world's human and natural resources and ensure that American producers are not unfairly disadvantaged by competitors required to meet much less rigorous requirements, or none at all.

With respect to the fast track process itself, we are agreed that the new legislation must forge a more effective trade agreements partnership, one that safeguards the respective constitutional roles of the Congress in regulating foreign commerce and of the President in negotiating with foreign governments. Members of Congress must be guaranteed a meaningful role in trade negotiations, from beginning to end.

If a fast track proposal is to gain the support of Senate Democrats, it must address the objectives discussed below. This list is not exhaustive, but represents some of the concerns that we and our colleagues believe deserve top priority in our international economic policy.

Labor.--We are convinced that promoting respect for workers' rights worldwide remains a legitimate and important objective of our trade policy, and, as has long been recognized, an appropriate subject for trade negotiations. A decision to enter into free trade agreements with our trading partners ought, therefore, to be based on a thorough assessment of the labor (as well as environmental) laws and enforcement practices of those countries with which the United States proposes to negotiate. With respect to the

North American Free Trade Agreement, we commend you for insisting upon a separate side agreement on labor as a condition for completing those negotiations. After three years, however, its shortcomings are apparent, and we urge you to pledge to make it a more effective tool to address North American labor problems.

The United States should also move aggressively in the International Labor Organization to renew a global commitment to such core labor standards as freedom of association, the right to organize and bargain collectively, and prohibitions on exploitative child labor, employment discrimination and forced labor. The ILO should be given the tools to hold its members accountable, through periodic inspection and review, for compliance with these core standards. The disgrace of child labor must be given top priority.

Environment.--Despite some assertions to the contrary, there is in U.S. law a well-established linkage between trade and the environment: we have long relied on our trade laws to enforce environmental objectives. Internationally, we are convinced that upgrading worldwide environmental standards ought to remain an important goal of our economic policy. There is a growing belief, however, that current global trade rules do not sufficiently accommodate these legitimate concerns. The complex technical, scientific and legal issues involved ought to be examined, and with urgency.

As a procedural matter, the United States ought to insist that environmental experts and non-governmental organizations have the greatest possible access to the World Trade Organization and other international fora, particularly when disputes involving environmental laws and regulations are pending. And, as is the case with the NAFTA side agreement on labor, we are convinced that significant improvements ought to be made to the NAFTA side agreement on the environment to ensure, for example, that additional resources are made available, promptly, for border clean-up efforts.

Agriculture.--Despite progress made in the Uruguay Round negotiations, agricultural trade barriers remain significant in many foreign markets, distorting international trade and reducing farm income in the United States. While the follow-on negotiations in the World Trade Organization, scheduled to begin by the end of December 1999, will provide an opportunity to resolve many of these problems, many others cannot wait. We must move aggressively to enforce previously negotiated trade agreements, and we must make every effort to improve these accords where they have fallen short. In general, the competitiveness of American farm products and the wide range of foreign agricultural trade barriers justify making agriculture a top priority of U.S. trade policy in the coming years.

Economic security.--The process of economic globalization is already far advanced. That does not mean, however, that we can turn our backs on those workers who lose their jobs because a factory moves its operations abroad, or dismantles a production line because of stiff competition from imports. We must improve upon our current trade adjustment assistance programs, to provide workers the most effective support, education

and training available and to give firms the resources to position themselves in a highly competitive global economy.

You have presided over an economic expansion that is approaching record length. For some, the rewards have been great; for others, uneven at best. Our international economic policy ought to be shaped by one overriding goal -- a sustained, across-the-board improvement in living standards for all Americans.

Negotiations.--The procedures we have historically used to consider trade agreements -- the so-called "fast track" procedures -- short-circuit the normal legislative process to guarantee an up-or-down vote, within a time certain, on legislation implementing such agreements. In exchange, the Congress has demanded that it be closely consulted throughout. Many of our colleagues believe that the past fast track procedural requirements have fallen short, making Congress less than a true partner in the negotiations.

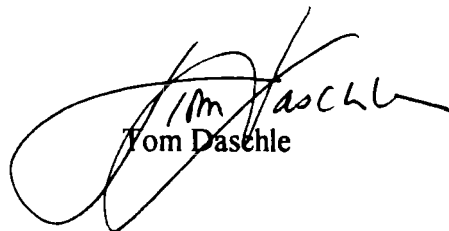
The new authority must mandate a more direct role for the Congress. Congress must have the opportunity to review and consider, on a case-by-case basis, the specific negotiations into which you propose to enter. Particular attention ought to be paid to the unfinished business of the Uruguay Round -- including agriculture, intellectual property rights protection, and services trade, as well as sectoral market access negotiations. At the same time, we must preserve the effectiveness of our domestic laws against unfair foreign trade practices. A means must also be found to address the consequences of exchange rate fluctuations that can void the benefits of negotiated tariff cuts.

Congress must be closely involved throughout the course of the negotiations, particularly as the final deals are made. And long after the negotiations are over, there must be a real determination, backed by sufficient resources, to enforce the agreements we reach and remedy any deficiencies that may emerge as they are implemented.

Some of our suggestions will require legislative action; many will not. We urge you, Mr. President, in the strongest possible terms, to commit to a package of initiatives with respect to these matters that we may consider as we take up the fast track legislation.

Dear Mr. President:

In your radio address on August 23, 1997 you stated that you intended to ask Congress to renew presidential expedited or "fast-track" authority and that you looked forward to working closely with Congress on this important issue. I would like to take you up on that invitation, and work closely with you for the prosperity of the American people.

We face a new century of unprecedented growth in overseas markets. Overseas markets, which contain the vast majority of the world's consumers, may together to grow over the next decade at three times the rate of our own economy. U.S. companies, with the world's most productive labor force, stand to gain from such robust overseas growth. But U.S. workers and consumers will benefit most if the United States regains its traditional leadership as the champion of open-market competition. Securing fast-track authority is the way to re-take such leadership.

Open markets will benefit U.S. consumers and U.S. workers. Export-related jobs pay more on average than those that produce for the U.S. market alone. The best way to achieve open markets and the benefits to U.S. citizens they bring is through trade agreements that further reduce foreign barriers to American goods and services. If drafted appropriately, fast-track authority will facilitate such market-opening agreements.

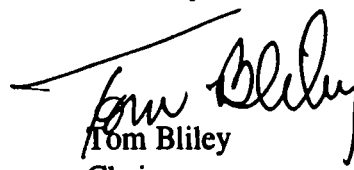
I urge you to limit your proposal for fast track authority to issues relating to market access and non-discriminatory treatment. Environmental and labor policy decisions can best be made through the appropriate legislative processes that allow all parties the opportunity to participate, not through international trade negotiations with foreign governments. Moreover, fast track authority should be broad -- there are a number of important regions around the world

improved access to which could benefit the American people. We should pursue all opportunities to further open foreign markets to American goods and services through trade-liberalizing agreements.

Mr. President, the right course is to move ahead on fast-track. I urge you to push forward a fast-track proposal that does not include labor and environmental issues better resolved elsewhere, but one that is broad and of sufficient duration to give the American people the opportunity to receive the full benefits of free and fair trade.

Finally, I would like to urge you to work closely with the Commerce Committee, which is charged with jurisdiction over interstate and foreign commerce. It is important that any fast track proposal contain appropriate provisions for consultation with committees of jurisdiction. I hope to work closely with you and your team in this regard. Fast track may be a tough fight. If we work together, we can win.

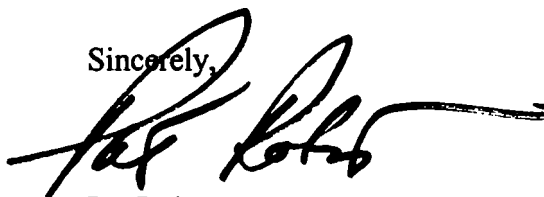

As the President and his Administration make final decisions on a fast track proposal, I thought I should share with you my current thinking about this issue in light of recent intense public and Congressional debate. As you know, there are many Democratic Members who are extremely concerned about how the President's fast track proposal addresses labor and environmental issues. Indeed, the votes of many Democrats on fast track hinge in large part on how these issues are handled. In light of these Democratic concerns, I am now considering introducing a fast track proposal of my own that would address these concerns in a way that could garner broad Democratic support.

While labor and environmental issues are important, I believe, unfortunately, that in the debate on fast track inadequate attention has been given to how we as a nation can ensure that good, productive jobs are available for all Americans. While expanding international trade is one part of the solution to creating good jobs in this country, it is not enough since not all Americans will have the opportunity or the skills to benefit from the new jobs created by more trade. At the same time, other Americans will lose their jobs because of such trade.

In light of this, it is my personal view that we should do all we can to provide the President with the authority he needs to increase our trading opportunities, provided that this is accompanied by a domestic jobs initiative that reaches out to all Americans. Such a jobs initiative should be targeted initially on rebuilding our nation's infrastructure, particularly in urban

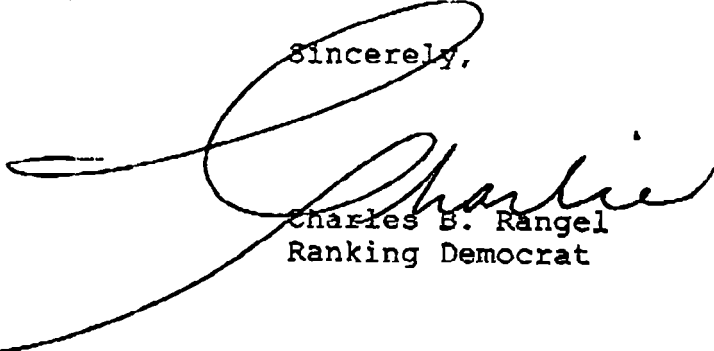
areas. A sound infrastructure in our cities can provide an anchor for, and is indeed essential to, expanding international trade.

I previously have discussed these ideas with you, Jay Berman, and John Hilley, but wanted to draw them to your attention again because I feel so strongly about them. I believe that incorporating a vision on jobs for all Americans into fast track proposals moving through Congress is essential for building strong bipartisan support on fast track. Such support, particularly on the Democratic side, appears to be lacking at this time.

I intend to raise these matters in a Ways and Means Democratic caucus on Tuesday and will also be discussing them with the House Democratic leadership to seek their views and guidance before proceeding further. I would hope that the Administration could give additional attention to these ideas in the days ahead.

I would be pleased to discuss these matters with you at any time.

Dear Mr. President:

You have earned a deserved reputation for leadership on the issue of open-trade policy. I am writing to urge you to use that standing to help assure that international trade agreements negotiated during the remainder of your Administration promote higher living standards and an improved quality of life for our and other countries' citizens. As we enter the next century, few matters can be more important than to pursue global economic arrangements that make life better, not worse, for the majority of people.

Open trade can contribute significantly to the expansion of wealth and opportunity. It tends to reward innovation and productivity. It delivers higher quality goods and services to many consumers at better prices. Negotiated properly, trade agreements can help bring these benefits to all trading partners in a fair way.

Our experience with trade agreements by now clearly shows, however, that achieving these goals without injuring people and communities will require the inclusion of enforceable labor and environment provisions in the core of any major future agreements. Further, legitimate domestic laws must be protected from challenge as trade barriers and from downward harmonization. The evident negative effects of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), which has now been in operation for three years, demonstrate the harm in failure to negotiate such safeguards. NAFTA's damaging results have been documented by a range of reliable observers. They include loss of jobs, suppression of wages, and attacks upon and weakening of food safety and pollution laws.

Enhancement of living standards and quality of life are as important, and as valid, as any other commercial or economic objectives sought by U.S. negotiators in trade agreements. Repeated failure to include adequate labor and environmental provisions will only condemn future trade agreements to replicate some of NAFTA's worst measurable consequences.

This week you are scheduled to announce a request for new fast track negotiating authority. It is my understanding that you intend to negotiate to expand NAFTA to include more Latin American countries, to reach an additional regional trade agreement and to conclude the Multilateral Agreement on Investment (MAI) with other OECD countries. As I am sure you know, inclusion in your fast track request of language that narrows the scope of negotiating objectives - for example by restricting fast track application to labor or environmental provisions that are "directly related" to other trade goals - would actually constitute a retreat from the weak

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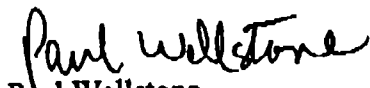
effort to make progress on labor and environmental standards in NAFTA. It would virtually foreclose the possibility of obtaining desirable results in these areas. I sincerely hope you will not doom these planned or ongoing negotiations to that fate.

I am not convinced of the need for any fast track authority to achieve beneficial trade agreements. The record of your own Administration appears to offer proof for this position. One official testified last year that negotiators had effectively concluded nearly 200 trade agreements since you took office in 1993. Only two of those utilized fast track procedures. Furthermore, I consider fast track procedures to be inherently undemocratic, shortening necessary debate and eliminating the chance for amendment by elected and accountable representatives of the public.

Nonetheless, I recognize that you will make a fast track request. I therefore earnestly hope that it will seek specific authority for negotiators to pursue enforceable labor and environmental safeguards within the text of any new agreements, and to protect against downward harmonization, including by renegotiating existing trade law. This is the only way to help ensure that trade agreements will improve, not worsen, people's lives.

Mr. President, I would like nothing better than to be able to vote for international trade agreements that represent real steps forward for a majority of Americans and for majority populations in other countries. No recent president has been in a better position than you are to oversee negotiation and conclusion of agreements that succeed in achieving that goal. I hope we can work together on this issue, which is so crucial to Americans' standard of living, environment and public health.

SUBJECT: Response to the Hispanic Caucus Regarding NAFTA
and Fast Track Authority

Purpose

To answer a letter from the Hispanic Caucus expressing reluctance to support fast track authority until NAFTA's flaws are remedied.

Background

Members of the Hispanic Caucus, citing a Latino Coalition study, allege that NAFTA has not adequately protected the interests of their constituents. They cite disproportionate job dislocation experienced by Hispanic workers, inadequate assistance under NAFTA-TAA, weak implementation of NADBank's environmental operations, and unacceptable delays in implementation of the NADBank Community Adjustment and Investment Program.

The proposed response details a number of areas where NAFTA has strengthened protections for labor and the environment. It also acknowledges improvements are necessary, especially in our community adjustment efforts. The response notes that Secretary Herman travelled to El Paso last month and Treasury will hold meetings in El Paso in November to identify improvements to the NAFTA-TAA and NAFTA community adjustment. The proposed response further notes that you are designating Gene Sperling to coordinate Administration efforts to address the concerns raised by the Hispanic Caucus.

Thank you for bringing to my attention your observations regarding implementation of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA).

The expansion of trade associated with NAFTA and other agreements has contributed significantly to the dynamism of our economy over the past several years. Your support for fast track trade negotiating authority will be critical in maintaining that dynamism by tearing down foreign barriers and helping American workers compete abroad.

It is important to recognize that increased international competition brings challenges for some workers, especially in low-wage, import-sensitive industries. That is precisely the reason we worked hard together to ensure NAFTA includes special provisions to protect the most vulnerable. In assessing the first three years of NAFTA's implementation, I believe these provisions have proven their value. However, as you point out, many challenges remain. I am committed to ensuring NAFTA fulfills its promise for all Americans.

NAFTA is building a solid record on addressing environmental challenges which are unique to the U.S.-Mexico border. Of course, many of the border environmental problems were decades in the making and will take many years to resolve. As you suggest, there are significant obstacles to financing environmental infrastructure, which the North American Development Bank (NADBank) is working to overcome. NADBank is now working closely with the Border Environment Cooperation Commission and federal and state officials on both sides of the border to identify and develop projects in the border region. NADBank is also establishing co-financing mechanisms with the Environmental Protection Agency and other grant programs to provide affordable financing for poor border communities. In addition, the NAFTA process for citizen submissions on environmental enforcement appears to be working effectively. The Commission for Environmental Cooperation has evaluated all submissions and pursued their resolution in accordance with the North American Agreement on Environmental Cooperation.

NAFTA is helping to protect the rights of trade-affected workers. The North American Agreement on Labor Cooperation breaks new ground in providing for oversight of national labor law enforcement. We have achieved a high measure of success in the review of the complaints that have been submitted. In one case, a Mexican labor tribunal granted recognition to the petitioning union, reversing an earlier decision, and afforded a new hearing for workers dismissed for union activity. In other cases, workers were permitted secret ballot elections, a practice not common in Mexico. Mexico has also made important legal advances on labor rights since NAFTA was signed.

Recognizing that some workers require assistance in adjusting to new patterns of trade and production, the NAFTA Transitional Adjustment Assistance (NAFTA-TAA) program provides expanded retraining and income support benefits. Overall, the program is proving its worth. However, concerns have been raised regarding the disproportionate impact on some communities. My Administration is committed to addressing these concerns. Secretary Herman recently travelled to El Paso, Texas to assess the economic impact on this border community. She conveyed to me her assessment that El Paso has strong economic prospects, but is in need of specialized job retraining for displaced workers.

Both the Transitional Adjustment Assistance (TAA) and NAFTA-TAA programs must be reauthorized before they expire on September 30, 1998. Secretary Herman will work closely with the Hispanic Caucus and relevant Committees to make both programs more effective for Latino trade-affected workers. In addition, it is essential that we intensify outreach to trade-affected workers, as well as affected secondary workers, to help them take advantage of existing services.

NAFTA breaks new ground in including financing through NADBank's Domestic Window for communities adversely affected by trade, reflecting concerns raised by the Hispanic Caucus. Although it has taken time to create a viable financial framework for the first U.S.-supported development bank within U.S. borders, NADBank's Domestic Window has been operating in Los Angeles since early 1996 and is now fully operational. Last month, the Department of Treasury announced the designation of 35 sites around the country as eligible for financing, and additional sites should be identified within the next month. In these areas, the NADBank, the Departments of Treasury and Agriculture, and the Small Business Administration are engaged in extensive outreach and marketing to help communities take advantage of loan guarantees, and the Los Angeles Office is working with borrowers interested in direct lending. Treasury plans to convene a public meeting of the Presidential Advisory Committee for Community

Adjustment and Investment in El Paso in November to gain greater knowledge of the problems confronting trade-affected communities.

I firmly believe the institutions created by NAFTA are strengthening labor and environmental protections in North America. However, this is a long-term process, requiring perseverance and continual improvement. It will be useful for Secretary Rubin, Secretary Herman and Ambassador Barshefsky to hear your concerns first-hand when you meet next week. I have asked my National Economic Adviser, Gene Sperling, to take the lead from the White House in coordinating Administration-wide efforts to address your concerns.

I hope you will work with me in support of future trade agreements that help America compete in the global economy and contribute to improved living standards and environmental protection.

Dear Mr. President:

As you prepare to request that Congress grant new fast track trade negotiating authority, we are writing to ask your support for future trade agreements that promote improved living standards, a cleaner environment, and the protection of human rights in the U.S. and around the globe.

There is no question that international trade is increasingly important to the American economy. The enhanced integration of the economies in this hemisphere is both inevitable and desirable for the future prosperity of our nation. However, to ensure that the benefits of expanded hemispheric trade are maximized and the harmful effects are minimized, it is imperative that we heed the lessons from existing treaties, particularly as they relate to working families and the environment. After carefully examining the impact of NAFTA, we have concluded that a number of changes must be made to the basic structure and implementation of the Agreement before we can support its expansion.

NAFTA Impact

While there is wide disagreement about the economic impact of NAFTA, it is generally accepted that the treaty has produced both winners and losers. A recent study by a coalition of Latino leaders reveals that NAFTA has produced more job loss than job gains. The study concludes that over 315,000 jobs have been lost or threatened compared to 225,000 jobs gained or supported, for a net labor market impact of 90,000 under NAFTA. Moreover, the Latino Coalition study shows that these losses have been particularly severe in certain regions, industries and segments of the workforce. Latinos, African Americans and women, who are more likely to be employed in low-wage, import-sensitive industries, are particularly vulnerable to dislocation due to trade. For example, El Paso, Texas has lost 6,000 jobs as a result of NAFTA, most of which were concentrated in one industry, contributing to an increase in its unemployment rate from 9 to almost 12 percent.

NAFTA Implementation

Unfortunately, the provisions adopted to mitigate the harmful effects of NAFTA have proven deficient and their implementation grossly negligent. The Latino Coalition study shows that, although Latinos have been disproportionately affected by NAFTA, their experience in the training programs designed to assist NAFTA-dislocated workers has led to neither increased

employment prospects nor economic well-being. Latinos displaced by NAFTA are significantly under-served by the NAFTA-TAA program and secondary workers are virtually absent. Furthermore, the typical training offered fails to meet the needs of the most vulnerable displaced Latino workers. In short, the NAFTA-TAA program is just a shadow of the program Latino leaders insisted on as a condition of support for NAFTA.

The NAFTA-TAA program clearly requires improvement in its design and structure; but the principal cause of its failure to adequately serve Latino workers is poor implementation by the Department of Labor. As the Latino Coalition study documents, the program has been plagued by the absence of clear regulations and guidance, inadequate outreach and a severe lack of focus. The implementation of the North American Development Bank's (NADBank) Domestic Window program by the Department of the Treasury has proven to be even more problematic.

The NADBank was created at the insistence of Latino leaders to mitigate the harmful effects of NAFTA on American workers and the environment. It was designed to mobilize financing for environmental infrastructure projects along the U.S.-Mexico Border, and to help create jobs in communities that suffered significant job loss as a result of NAFTA. Yet, after three and a half years, the NADBank's Domestic Window, the component designed to create jobs in communities negatively impacted by NAFTA, has failed to issue a single loan or help to create a single job, despite 315,000 jobs lost or threatened due to NAFTA. This legacy of neglect has occurred despite our consistent prodding, pressure and public criticism of the Domestic Window program.

The NADBank's border environmental infrastructure component has been slowed by limitations in the Bank's Charter and the economic characteristics of the border region. For example, only four loans have been approved to date. The Latino Coalition study reveals that many border communities are too small and too poor to afford any interest rate that is not subsidized. The NADBank's lending rates are market oriented, creating the perception that its rates are too high. Further complicating lending in these communities is the Bank's own borrowing costs, which are based on the taxable, not the tax exempt, market. Despite these problems, the NADBank can actually provide financing at lower rates than U.S. commercial banks, and at much lower rates than banks in Mexico. The economic conditions of these communities have also required extensive technical assistance from the NADBank to produce project proposals that are technically and financially feasible.

A serious lack of coordination between the NADBank and the Border Environment Cooperation Commission (BECC) has also delayed the Bank's lending activity. The Latino Coalition study found that failure to integrate the NADBank into the initial stages of the BECC's project development process has inhibited both institutions from working efficiently and effectively. This lack of coordination has resulted in the certification of projects by the BECC that did not meet the requirements of the Bank's loan and guaranty policies. Unlike the Domestic Window, however, the NADBank's environmental infrastructure component has diligently worked to overcome these obstacles and we are hopeful that the Bank's lending activity along the border will continue to accelerate.

NAFTA's Structural Limitations

Perhaps the single biggest flaw in NAFTA was its failure to incorporate labor and environmental issues as a chapter in the core agreement, rather than as side agreements. So far, the few complaints that have been brought under the labor side agreement have made little or no impact. Only five cases concerning Mexico have been brought under the labor side agreement, and none of these cases has resulted in a union being recognized or noticeable changes being made in the lives of the workers involved. Clearly, if the rights of workers are to be protected in future trade agreements there must be strong mechanisms of enforcement — a mechanism that is not available under NAFTA.

The environmental side agreement has also failed to provide adequate protection from increased production resulting from NAFTA. The increase in post-NAFTA border economic activity has increased cross-boundary population, industrial and toxic emissions and waste. In addition, the North American Commission for Environmental Cooperation (NACEC), which was designed to ensure enforcement of environmental laws under NAFTA has proven to be ineffective. Of the ten complaints filed not a single one has led to either enforcement orders or economic sanctions against any participating country. Yet, the promised improvements to the health and safety of working families along the border has not occurred. The NAFTA environmental side agreement has simply not been adequate to the task.

Conclusion

We continue to share your goal of expanding trade to Chile and ultimately the rest of Latin America. Delegating fast track trade negotiating authority, however, is a responsibility we take very seriously. Before we can support your request for such authority we must be certain that the economic, safety and health interests of our constituents are not compromised by future trade agreements. As the new Latino Coalition study so vividly illustrates, these interests have not been adequately protected under NAFTA. Therefore, until the flaws in the structure and implementation of NAFTA are addressed, we simply cannot support its extension.

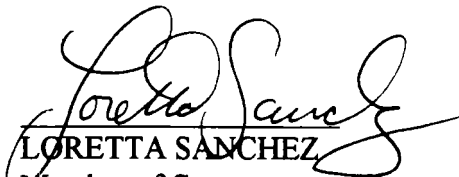

After carefully examining the impact of NAFTA, we have concluded that a number of changes must be made to the basic structure and implementation of the Agreement before we can support its expansion.

NAFTA Impact

While there is wide disagreement about the economic impact of NAFTA, it is generally accepted that the treaty has produced both winners and losers. A recent study by a coalition of Latino leaders reveals that NAFTA has produced more job loss than job gains. The study concludes that over 315,000 jobs have been lost or threatened compared to 225,000 jobs gained or supported, for a net labor market impact of 90,000 under NAFTA. Moreover, the Latino Coalition study shows that these losses have been particularly severe in certain regions, industries and segments of the workforce. Latinos, African Americans and women, who are more likely to be employed in low-wage, import-sensitive industries, are particularly vulnerable to dislocation due to trade. For example, El Paso, Texas has lost 6,000 jobs as a result of NAFTA, most of which were concentrated in one industry, contributing to an increase in its unemployment rate from 9 to almost 12 percent.

NAFTA Implementation

Unfortunately, the provisions adopted to mitigate the harmful effects of NAFTA have proven deficient and their implementation grossly negligent. The Latino Coalition study shows that, although Latinos have been disproportionately affected by NAFTA, their experience in the training programs designed to assist NAFTA-dislocated workers has led to neither increased

employment prospects nor economic well-being. Latinos displaced by NAFTA are significantly under-served by the NAFTA-TAA program and secondary workers are virtually absent. Furthermore, the typical training offered fails to meet the needs of the most vulnerable displaced Latino workers. In short, the NAFTA-TAA program is just a shadow of the program Latino leaders insisted on as a condition of support for NAFTA.

The NAFTA-TAA program clearly requires improvement in its design and structure; but the principal cause of its failure to adequately serve Latino workers is poor implementation by the Department of Labor. As the Latino Coalition study documents, the program has been plagued by the absence of clear regulations and guidance, inadequate outreach and a severe lack of focus. The implementation of the North American Development Bank's (NADBank) Domestic Window program by the Department of the Treasury has proven to be even more problematic.

The NADBank was created at the insistence of Latino leaders to mitigate the harmful effects of NAFTA on American workers and the environment. It was designed to mobilize financing for environmental infrastructure projects along the U.S.-Mexico Border, and to help create jobs in communities that suffered significant job loss as a result of NAFTA. Yet, after three and a half years, the NADBank's Domestic Window, the component designed to create jobs in communities negatively impacted by NAFTA, has failed to issue a single loan or help to create a single job, despite 315,000 jobs lost or threatened due to NAFTA. This legacy of neglect has occurred despite our consistent prodding, pressure and public criticism of the Domestic Window program.

The NADBank's border environmental infrastructure component has been slowed by limitations in the Bank's Charter and the economic characteristics of the border region. For example, only four loans have been approved to date. The Latino Coalition study reveals that many border communities are too small and too poor to afford any interest rate that is not subsidized. The NADBank's lending rates are market oriented, creating the perception that its rates are too high. Further complicating lending in these communities is the Bank's own borrowing costs, which are based on the taxable, not the tax exempt, market. Despite these problems, the NADBank can actually provide financing at lower rates than U.S. commercial banks, and at much lower rates than banks in Mexico. The economic conditions of these communities have also required extensive technical assistance from the NADBank to produce project proposals that are technically and financially feasible.

A serious lack of coordination between the NADBank and the Border Environment Cooperation Commission (BECC) has also delayed the Bank's lending activity. The Latino Coalition study found that failure to integrate the NADBank into the initial stages of the BECC's project development process has inhibited both institutions from working efficiently and effectively. This lack of coordination has resulted in the certification of projects by the BECC that did not meet the requirements of the Bank's loan and guaranty policies. Unlike the Domestic Window, however, the NADBank's environmental infrastructure component has diligently worked to overcome these obstacles and we are hopeful that the Bank's lending activity along the border will continue to accelerate.

NAFTA's Structural Limitations

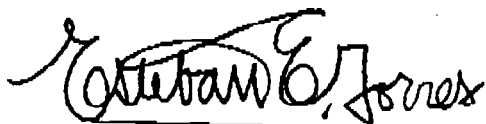
Perhaps the single biggest flaw in NAFTA was its failure to incorporate labor and environmental issues as a chapter in the core agreement, rather than as side agreements. So far, the few complaints that have been brought under the labor side agreement have made little or no impact. Only five cases concerning Mexico have been brought under the labor side agreement, and none of these cases has resulted in a union being recognized or noticeable changes being made in the lives of the workers involved. Clearly, if the rights of workers are to be protected in future trade agreements there must be strong mechanisms of enforcement — a mechanism that is not available under NAFTA.

The environmental side agreement has also failed to provide adequate protection from increased production resulting from NAFTA. The increase in post-NAFTA border economic activity has increased cross-boundary population, industrial and toxic emissions and waste. In addition, the North American Commission for Environmental Cooperation (NACEC), which was designed to ensure enforcement of environmental laws under NAFTA has proven to be ineffective. Of the ten complaints filed not a single one has led to either enforcement orders or economic sanctions against any participating country. Yet, the promised improvements to the health and safety of working families along the border has not occurred. The NAFTA environmental side agreement has simply not been adequate to the task.

Conclusion

We continue to share your goal of expanding trade to Chile and ultimately the rest of Latin America. Delegating fast track trade negotiating authority, however, is a responsibility we take very seriously. Before we can support your request for such authority we must be certain that the economic, safety and health interests of our constituents are not compromised by future trade agreements. As the new Latino Coalition study so vividly illustrates, these interests have not been adequately protected under NAFTA. Therefore, until the flaws in the structure and implementation of NAFTA are addressed, we simply cannot support its extension.

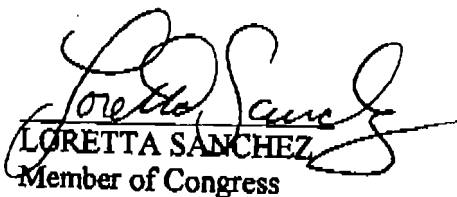

I. PURPOSE

To make our affirmative case for fast track to undecided Democratic House members, and to encourage them to keep an open mind during the August recess.

II. BACKGROUND

We continue to use the July-August period to organize our efforts for a more visible Congressional and public fast track effort in the fall. Efforts during this period include building the White House and agency team (Jay Berman is now fully on board), sharpening our message, building our coalition through outreach to business, agriculture, state/local officials and others, laying a foundation of support with the press and elites and developing a communications and legislative strategy for the fall.

We also need to ensure that we avoid attrition on the Hill during the August recess, when we expect our opponents to mount a significant communications and lobbying effort. To that end, [insert details of powder dry efforts].

This meeting is an important part of that effort. The purpose is to make the affirmative case for fast track and, at a minimum, persuade them to remain neutral until we set forth legislation (including a labor/environment approach) in the fall. We recommend your message be built around three themes:

1. Optimism/Future v. Pessimism/Past: This issue is at the center of our national debate about our future: whether we will meet the challenge to compete and win, or whether we will convince ourselves - against the evidence - that we should not move forward. Trade expansion has been a key element of a forward-looking economic strategy that has created 12 1/2 million jobs, brought core inflation to a 30-year low and created sustained economic growth.

2. American Leadership: As we enter the 21st Century, we need to be in front of world trade opening efforts, not lagging behind and losing market opportunities. The world is watching. If we don't act, others will.

3. Important Market Opening Opportunities: Fast track is the tool for eliminating foreign barriers, whether through sectoral agreements, continuing regional processes in Latin America or Asia or eliminating global barriers in the WTO. This is not a referendum on NAFTA, as some suggest. It is about a far different agenda: eliminating foreign barriers worldwide, which are much higher than ours.

Members are likely to be interested in our approach on labor and the environment. (We have separately sent you a decision memo on this subject.) However, we do not recommend you foreshadow our approach at this meeting; it likely would leak, and would make it even more difficult for Members to stay neutral during August. Instead, we suggest you reaffirm your commitment to these issues and indicate we will set forth an approach in the fall.

POINTS TO BE MADE FOR MEETING ON FAST TRACK

- I want to talk with you today about why I feel it is in our nation's interest to renew fast track trade negotiating authority. Before I begin, let me introduce Jay Berman, who I have brought into the White House to lead our effort. His presence underscores the high priority I attach to this issue. It is one of the most important votes you will cast this year. In fact, when we look back, I think it will be one of the most important decisions we will make this decade.
- This issue is at the heart of our effort to define America's future. It tests whether we will confidently meet the challenge to compete and win in the global economy, or whether we will convince ourselves - against the evidence - that we should not move forward. As President, I have tried to adopt a forward-looking economic strategy that guides our country into the 21st Century. And it is clear to me that international trade is central to that strategy:
 - Over the next decade, the global economy is expected to grow at three times the rate of the U.S. economy. Growth will be particularly powerful in the emerging markets - the fastest growing markets of the world.
 - Over the past four years, one-quarter of our economic growth came from trade - and exports created 1.4 million new jobs.
 - In a world where over 96 percent of the world's consumers live outside the U.S., we must export to sustain growth at home.
- The strategy we have pursued has made the American economy the envy of the world. We are perfectly positioned to seize these trade opportunities. We have nothing to fear.
 - We have enjoyed the longest period of sustained growth of all of our G-7 partners - seven years as of last March.. We have created 12 million net new jobs, more than all of the other G-7 countries combined. The unemployment rate was 5% in June, the lowest in over 23 years.
 - We are once again the world's largest exporter, the largest producer of semiconductors, the largest producer of automobiles. Independent studies have found America to be the most competitive economy in the world for the past five years. No country in the world is better positioned to compete.
- To continue that record, I need the authority to continue opening markets. Without it, America will not maintain its leadership position in world trade and a critical part of our economic expansion will stall. We must be in front of market opening efforts, not lagging behind and losing opportunities. Let's not kid ourselves - if we don't act, others will.

- Since 1992, in Latin America and Asia alone, other countries have reached more than 20 preferential trade agreements without us.
- Today every major economy in this hemisphere has a preferential trade deal with Chile, except the United States. Chile has an 11% across-the-board tariff that these countries are eliminating for their products. That means every time an American company competes to sell to Chile, it will face an immediate 11% cost disadvantage compared to its Canadian competitor. Canada's Northern Telecom won a \$180 million telecommunications contract over three U.S. companies in part because it could avoid paying \$20 million worth of tariffs.
- If you're worried about U.S. companies moving to Brazil or Thailand, that problem is made worse if they have eliminated the tariffs in their region but products made in the U.S.A. still face tariffs often as high as 20%.
- Ten years ago, the question was whether there would be regional market opening efforts. Today it is clear that will happen - the only question is whether we will participate, or sit on the sidelines. We talk about leveling the playing field in international trade, but these countries are already busy leveling the playing field. And they will move ahead, with or without us.
- The potential gains are great, if we seize them. If you give me the authority, we will attack foreign trade barriers on a number of fronts:
 - Sectoral Agreements: We would negotiate agreements in sectors where the U.S. is most competitive. The recent Information Technology Agreement, for example, eliminated tariffs and unshackled \$500 billion of trade in semiconductors, computers, telecommunications equipment and software, amounting to a \$5 billion tax cut in tariffs on American exports. With fast track authority, I can tear down more barriers in areas like medical equipment and environmental technology, where America leads the world.
 - Latin America/Caribbean: This area was the fastest growing market for U.S. exports in 1996. If trends continue, Latin America and the Caribbean will exceed the EU as a destination for U.S. exports by 2000 and exceed Japan and the EU combined by 2010. We remain committed to the Free Trade Area of the Americas process. Chile would be our first step in this process.
 - Asia: Contains the fastest growing economies in the world, with nearly 3 billion people. Forecasters expect real growth of 6-7% annually for the next 15 years. In APEC, we are working to reach agreements in key sectors that could open these markets to America's most competitive products.
 - Africa: Working with Congress, I recently launched an Africa trade initiative. Africa's nations are joining the march toward freedom and open markets - and we

should encourage it. Sub-Saharan Africa alone has 700 million people, but we supply only 7% of Africa's imports. We want to explore negotiations with South Africa when it is ready.

- Global: Over 50 years of persistent American leadership has helped bring down global tariffs from an average of 40% at the end of World War II to about 5% today, leading to a 90-fold increase in global trade. Upcoming WTO talks on agriculture can help us cut barriers and subsidies in the \$526 billion global farm market. We can eliminate barriers to services trade, a \$1.2 trillion global market, where U.S. firms had a surplus of \$74 billion in 1996.
- Some want to make this debate a referendum on NAFTA. I think NAFTA's been good for this country. But no matter what you think, this is not about NAFTA.
 - Our competitors would like nothing better than to have us rehash the NAFTA debate for four years, while they seize new market opportunities.
 - Inaction will simply let foreign barriers stand. When we reach these trade agreements, we give up very little, while other countries give up far more. When the Uruguay Round is phased in, our tariffs will average only 2.8%. Other countries are far higher: India (31%); Thailand and Turkey (26%); Chile and Indonesia (11%). Becoming mired in a debate about NAFTA won't level the playing field.
- I share your concerns about labor and environmental issues. We must remain committed to promoting worker rights and ensuring that economic growth is not at the expense of the environment. In the fall, I will set forth a proposal addressing these concerns. In the meantime, I ask you to keep an open mind.
 - But failing to engage these countries will not improve their worker rights or the environment. These countries will advance economically, whether or not we negotiate trade agreements with them - and other countries won't be as concerned about their labor or environmental protection. By leading the world, we have a far better opportunity to promote our values than by disengaging.
- We face a critical choice. We can recognize that the American economy is the model for the world, continue to open foreign markets and seize the initiative. Or we can convince ourselves that we are on the wrong track, that we cannot succeed and that we should not move forward. Years from now, we will either proudly recognize that we saw our opportunities and we took them. Or we will have become paralyzed by indecision, squandered our strong competitive advantage and let others seize the initiative. The choice is that clear - and that important. I ask you to support me on this critical issue.

Dear Mr. Vice-President:

It is my pleasure to inform you that on September 8-9, 1997, the Inter-American Development Bank will be holding the summit meeting of its Informatics 2000 Initiative, at the Bank's headquarters in Washington, D.C., and I have the honor of inviting you to make the keynote address at the inaugural session in the morning of Monday, September 8.

The purpose of the meeting is to bring together key private and public leaders from Latin America and the Caribbean to consider practical ways in which to bring the benefits of the Information Revolution to the peoples of the region.

For the past six months, leaders from the region and suppliers of information and communications technology have been meeting to identify what products and services should be deployed throughout Latin America and the Caribbean to lower operating costs, improve the efficiency and effectiveness of commercial and government programs, extend their outreach and improve the quality of services and outcomes. They have looked at opportunities in education, health, modernization of government, agriculture and sustainable development, banking, trade and electronic commerce, civil society and the environment. They have also explored what opportunities exist to expand affordable access to telephone and computer networks, how to attract sufficient investment to upgrade and expand the communications and information infrastructure in the region and what policy changes would be appropriate for the Information Age. We expect their recommendations will provide a roadmap for the private, public and civil sectors in Latin America and the Caribbean, and those who supply goods and services to the region.

The Informatics 2000 Initiative will be a part of the Bank's contribution to preparation for the Summit of the Americas to be held in Santiago de

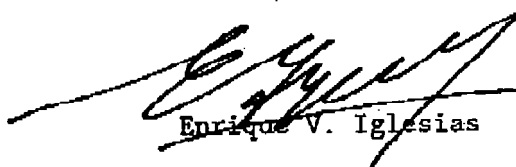
Chile next year which will be attended by the Presidents of the Hemisphere. Task Forces have been working in many of the subject areas to be addressed by the Summit Declaration, and will be able to provide substantive inputs that reflect the experience and interests of the region in making the best possible use of information technology.

The Informatics 2000 Initiative summit meeting will be held immediately prior to a meeting of the Committee of the Board of Governors of the Inter-American Development Bank and, therefore, we expect attendance by a majority of Finance Ministers representing member countries of our institution, as well as by other Ministers and senior executives from the private sector who are involved with information technology and development.

Knowing of your long interest in the issue of information as a tool for development, we believe your involvement in the Initiative's summit meeting would help forge a broad consensus regarding this important subject at leadership levels in the Hemisphere.

We very much hope that you will accept this invitation.

RE: Fast Track

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide you with a congressional strategy for the next three months, with the greatest emphasis on July and August. We will provide a more specific plan for September, October and November based upon the outcome of our activities over the summer.

The objectives of the congressional strategy over the course of the next several months should be twofold. First, we need to continue to set the foundation by providing a broader understanding on the Hill about the elements of fast track and why it is necessary. Second, on a working-level we need to be in a position to transmit a bill the first of September upon Congress' return from the August recess. While continuing to educate Members we have not yet reached, we must go back to key Members over the summer in order to prepare and negotiate our proposal.

To plan and implement these efforts, two legislative working groups have been formed, both of which will be managed by me. A small working group within the Executive Office of the President will develop strategies, consisting of representatives from the White House, NSC, USTR Congressional Affairs and the Office of the Special Envoy for the Americas (SEA). A large interagency group will focus on implementation, consisting of representatives from NSC, USTR, Treasury, State, Commerce, USDA, DOD, Labor, EPA, HHS, and SEA.

I. Congress -- Educational Efforts on Fast Track and the Trade Agenda

Ambassador Barshefsky has already met with approximately 170 Members and has honed an effective argument for the needs and uses of fast track. As part of this effort, Members have been provided with a better sense of the trade agenda, the accomplishments of the Clinton Administration and basic elements of the multilateral trading system. Members have appreciated the oral briefings and the materials we have provided, although additional requests have been made for information on the NAFTA (which will be satisfied by the NAFTA report) and basic information about trade and the history of fast track (a "primer"). Members have also requested talking points that could be used to explain the trade agenda and fast track to their constituents. These materials should be developed before Members return to their districts in August. In addition to providing materials, it should be noted that there is no substitute for Member to Member and Principal to Member contact to reinforce our message.

We should continue efforts with House Members who voted 1). yes NAFTA; 2). Freshman/Sophomores in districts where the previous member voted for NAFTA; 3). Freshman/Sophomores in district where the previous member voted against NAFTA; 4). yes on GATT, no on NAFTA.

6 p.m. 7/19/97

We will meet with Members individually as well as in small and large groups. Whenever Chairman Archer believes it is the appropriate time (probably in the fall), Cabinet Members will begin meeting with House Republicans in groups (e.g., Freshmen). We have been informed by Democratic leadership that at some point, probably in the fall, an Administration official will be asked to appear before the House Democratic Caucus. Some of the larger groups with which we will meet are as follows:

Senate Finance Committee

Senate Freshmen

House Democratic Whip Group (particularly on the NAFTA report)

House Ways and Means Democrats

Other Committees' Democrats where appropriate, such as, House Small Business and Banking Committee Democrats (who offered)

New Democrats

Blue Dogs

Democratic Study Group

State Delegations

On both public and congressional outreach, in addition to Ambassador Barshefsky who is already fully engaged, we should enlist Administration officials Albright, Daley, Rubin, Glickman, Cohen, Berger, Shalala, Herman, Browner and McLarty in the effort to meet with Members to make the case for fast track. Sub-cabinet Members will be asked to assist where appropriate. In early July, staff calls will be made to every Congressional office on an interagency basis, in order to get a very preliminary whip list developed.

There is no substitute for Presidential involvement prior to the recess, most effectively captured in a few group meetings with Members. This list would include approximately 30-50 Members, particularly those Democrats who will be targeted by labor in August. This group should include some of the Democratic whip group, such as Matsui, Moran, Dooley, McCarthy (Dooley and McCarthy are targeted); key players in the caucus who we want to be part of the whip effort such as Rangel, Fazio and Murtha; Ways and Means Democrats such as Kennelly; and freshmen such as Boswell and Kind who want to be with us but will be torn because of labor. We especially need to step up outreach to the Senate.

II. Possible Bill Progression Schedule

Generally, when we made the decision to postpone transmission of the bill until September we received indications from Leadership that they expect to be able to move the bill expeditiously

once the bill is transmitted. The House is scheduled to return from the August recess on Wednesday, September 3rd and the Senate returns on Tuesday the 2nd. The schedule will obviously be determined by the relevant Committees and Leadership, but we can assume the following:

Ways and Means Trade subcommittee markup could occur during the second week of September with full Committee markup either the third or fourth week of September. The proposed bill could reach the House floor by the first or second week in October. The Senate Finance Committee held a hearing on June 3rd and could potentially mark up during mid-September so that the Senate could act on the bill that comes over from the House in early to mid October. Senator Lott noted that the Congress intends to adjourn by November 14th and Thanksgiving at the latest. Please keep in mind the fact that this bill will not proceed under the Fast Track. It will have to pass the House and Senate, go to Conference and pass the House and Senate again. We will not be able to prevent Amendments from being added in the Senate.

It is critical that by the third week of July, we must come to decisions on key policy issues such as duration, scope, labor and environment in the legislation. Before Members leave for the August recess we should have a good sense of where they are on these issues as well so that final negotiations can take place upon their return in September. The first week of September we will finalize consultations, begun prior to recess, with a broad range of Members. The goal is to transmit a bill the first week of September, although it may be more realistic to expect transmission the second week of September, so that it could be introduced in both Houses the second week of September.

It should be noted that while the committees of primary jurisdiction are Ways and Means and Finance, depending on how the bill is written, the Rules Committees may have jurisdiction as well. In addition, because of the interest in the issue, multiple other committees will certainly hold hearings as well (which was our experience with NAFTA).

III. Bill Preparation

In order to be in a position to transmit a bill in September, we must meet again with a number of key Members, individually and in groups. From a substantive and tactical perspective, the first groups should include Democrats who will form the whip group, and the Ways and Means Democrats. Substantively, the Democratic whip group can provide an indication of what language could garner the most votes, specifically with respect to labor and environment. The Ways and Means Democrats must be consulted on the same issues (as promised), and tactically this should occur in early to mid-July. We need to identify a core group of Democrats to join the whip effort and who are willing to do so early, in the face of labor opposition; this list would include Rangel, Matsui, Berman, Murtha, Dingell, Hoyer, Fazio, Gejdenson, Hamilton, Markey, Eshoo, Roemer, Moran, McCarthy, Davis and Tauscher. There may be a few of these who the President should phone and request their assistance (Murtha) or other cabinet members should

approach (Rubin call/meet with Rangel).

Once meetings with selected Democrats have taken place, meetings with key Republican House staffers should take place so that meetings may occur with the key Republican leaders the third and fourth weeks of July. These key Members include Gingrich, Armey, Archer, Crane, Dreier, DeLay, Hastert, Boehner, Kaisich and Paxon.

At the same time, we need to have similar meetings on the Senate side -- with key Senators such as Lott, Daschle, Roth, Moynihan, Grassley, Rockefeller, Baucus and Breaux -- in close proximity to House meetings. An objective should be to ensure the creation of a Senate whip operation. It should be noted that Senate Finance Committee staffers are meeting this week to begin drafting their own language. This process can be helpful to our own and we should work closely with them.

IV. Public Agenda: Public Affairs Planning

It is important to ensure that there is a nexus between the public affairs and congressional strategies. The public affairs activities should be targeted to Members and their districts; we should create the impetus in their districts that leads Members to the conclusion that they must do the right thing and vote for the legislation.

The fast track talking points provide a more positive and aggressive cut on the trade agenda and should be distributed to all members of the Cabinet that may become involved in discussion of trade issues (see attached package); these materials have been provided to some friendly House Democrats at their request. We will refine points, and develop new ones as issues are identified, so that we can provide Q&A information to be reviewed by principals this week. During this month we will have an opportunity to begin Cabinet outreach outside Washington, and inform key reporters, editorial boards, and opinion writers about the trade agenda. We also need to begin active involvement with the business community so that they can effectively communicate with their constituencies about fast track and the trade agenda.

July and August: The Lead-Up to Fast Track Introduction

As part of the overall strategy, while Members are in town during July, our efforts should be devoted to base-building and opinion leader outreach in July. We will focus on hands-on discussions with all Members to get a baseline of support and to identify where our opportunities for support lie. During July we should devote efforts to outreach in these Members' districts through op-eds, talk-radio and satellite feeds.

In August, to solidify support among Members and offset the massive television campaign planned by the AFL-CIO, several cabinet officials should travel to key areas of the country, provide satellite feeds and do talk radio in targeted congressional districts as well. Outreach

would focus on Democratic and Republican vote-rich areas that benefit from trade; these targets may change over time as we see where Members are lining up. Several cabinet members would be involved in the trips and many will be responsive to Member interest and requests. The trips should highlight at least a couple of different sectors including agriculture, manufacturing, high-technology and services. The following is a list of potential media markets (this list will undoubtedly expand once targets are finalized):

Northeast -- New York City, Albany, Hartford, Baltimore, Boston

Midwest -- Detroit, Lansing, Akron, Indianapolis, Milwaukee, LaCrosse, Green Bay, Bismarck, Des Moines

Southeast -- Nashville, Little Rock, Memphis, Raleigh, New Orleans, Tampa, Tallahassee, Atlanta, Dallas, El Paso

West -- Los Angeles, Santa Ana, Sacramento, Seattle, Portland, Phoenix, Denver

September: Bill Introduction

As stated above, the events surrounding the introduction of the bill will be determined in conjunction with the Committee and Leadership. We will expand this section once we know more about the make-up of the bill as well as the sense of the congress once the bill is about to be introduced.

CODELs

It has been suggested by McLarty and others that a CODEL to South America would be helpful to the effort. Our recommendation is that we let the Hill know we are available but let requests come from the Hill.

RE: NAFTA and Fast Track Update

There are 42 Democrats and 99 Republicans (141) who voted for NAFTA and are still in Congress.

There are 108 Democrats and 35 Republicans (143) who voted against NAFTA and are still in Congress.

There are 34 Democrats elected to seats where the former member voted for NAFTA -- of these members, 27 received more than \$65,000 from Labor PACs (23 received more than \$100,000 -- 9 received more than \$150,000).

There are 34 Republicans elected to seats where the previous member voted against NAFTA -- of these members, 23 saw Labor PACs spend more than \$65,000 to defeat them (labor spent more than \$100,000 on 21 of these races and more than \$150,000 on 8 races).

There are 60 Republicans elected to seats where the former member voted for NAFTA -- of these 27 saw labor spend more than \$65,000 to defeat them (labor spent more than \$100,000 on 22 of these races and more than \$150,000 on 7 of the races).

In addition, there are 23 newly elected Democrats to seats where the former member voted against NAFTA.

FAST TRACK

NOW, MORE THAN EVER, THE U.S. NEEDS AUTHORITY TO OPEN NEW MARKETS AND BREAK DOWN BARRIERS TO U.S. EXPORTS.

- o **Trade negotiating authority is essential.** Every President since Ford has had fast track authority for key periods with bipartisan support. That is because Congress has consistently recognized the President must have the authority to break down foreign trade barriers and create good jobs.
- o **Fast Track authority is even more essential today.** The rapidly expanding global economy presents enormous opportunities for our companies and workers. In a world where over 95 percent of the world's consumers live outside the United States, we must export to sustain economic growth at home.
- o **Commercial competitiveness is critical to our global leadership.** Europe, China, Japan and others are forging preferential commercial alliances with emerging markets, which put American exports at a disadvantage. Those trade alliances also play a vital role in defining strategic relationships between countries and regions. Our commercial competitiveness is at stake, but so is our leadership role in the world.
- o **Exports create American jobs.** Today, more than 11 million American jobs are supported by exports, including one in five manufacturing jobs – good jobs, paying 13-16 percent more than non-trade-related jobs. Over the last four years, one-quarter of our economic growth came from trade -- and exports created 1.4 million new jobs. If we are to raise our standard of living, we must continue creating jobs through exports.
- o **The United States is the world's strongest competitor.** We have enjoyed the longest period of sustained growth of all of our G-7 partners. Over the last four years, we have created 12 million new jobs, more than all of the other G-7 countries combined.
- o **Our market is already open. Others are not.** The United States is the most open, major market in the world. When we reach trade agreements, we give up very little, while other countries give up far more.

THE POTENTIAL GAINS ARE GREAT, IF WE SEIZE THEM.

- o **Multilateral WTO "built-in agenda"** presents the opportunity to reduce trade barriers further in key sectors, such as:
 - **Agriculture:** Negotiations to cut barriers in the \$526 billion global agriculture market will attack such practices export subsidies and domestic support programs.
 - **Services:** A \$1.2 trillion global market - where U.S. firms exported more than \$220 billion in 1996 with a surplus of \$74 billion. Talks will address a wide range

of service sectors, including health care, education, entertainment, tourism and business consulting and advertising.

Global negotiations will address other key areas like intellectual property, customs and government procurement rules.

- o **Sectoral Agreements.** We would also use fast track to negotiate agreements in sectors where the U.S. is most competitive. The recent Information Technology Agreement, for example, eliminated tariffs and unshackled \$500 billion of trade in semiconductors, computers, telecommunications equipment and software, amounting to a \$5 billion tax cut in tariffs on American exports. With fast track authority, we can tear down more barriers in areas like medical equipment, environmental technology, and computer software, areas where America leads the world.
- o **Regional Free Trade Agreements.** Continuing regional initiatives present vast opportunities, although this is only one part of the trade agenda.
 - **Latin America and the Caribbean.** This area was the fastest growing market for U.S. exports in 1996. If trends continue, Latin America and the Caribbean will exceed the EU as a destination for U.S. exports by 2000 and exceed Japan and the EU combined by 2010.
 - **Asia.** Contains the fastest growing economies in the world, with nearly 3 billion people. Independent forecasters put 1996 GDP for the region at \$2.8 trillion and expect real growth of 6% to 7% annually for the next 15 years.

We will also continue efforts with Europe, Africa and other regions.

IF WE DON'T ACT, OUR COMPETITORS WILL.

- o **Other countries are breaking down barriers for their companies and workers.** We talk a lot about leveling the playing field, but our competitors are winning, while we sit on the sidelines. Since 1992, our competitors have negotiated 20 free trade pacts without us. In every region of the world, this process will continue. MERCOSUR is a developing customs union with ambitions to expand to all of South America; the EU has begun a process to reach free trade with MERCOSUR; China's "strategic priorities" include Mexico, Argentina, Brazil, Chile and Venezuela; Japan has undertaken high-level efforts in Asia and Latin America.
- o **The costs of inaction are high.** For example, Canada has reached a free trade agreement with Chile that will eliminate Canada's across-the-board 11 percent tariff for Canadian products. Every time an American company competes to sell to Chile, it will face an immediate 11 percent cost disadvantage vis-a-vis its Canadian competitors.

AS WE DEVELOP A FAST TRACK BILL, WE MUST DEVELOP A BIPARTISAN APPROACH TO THE ISSUES OF LABOR AND THE ENVIRONMENT.

- o The Clinton Administration has achieved more progress in advancing trade-related objectives concerning labor right and environmental goals than any of its predecessors.** We cannot sustain support among American people for market opening policies without also addressing concerns about the effects of these agreements on labor and the environment. Labor and environmental issues are of critical importance.
- o Sitting on the sidelines does not help workers or promote a cleaner environment.** Opening foreign markets does not mean retreating from our commitment to labor and the environment. In fact, it makes it easier to engage these countries on these issues. Denying the President authority to negotiate trade agreements with them will not help advance their labor or environmental protections. It will simply make it more likely that these countries will remain relatively poor (keeping wages low and discouraging better environmental practices), while crippling our export performance and denying job growth here at home.

Basic Fast Track Questions & Answers

Q: Isn't "fast track" just about expanding NAFTA to include Chile?

A: No, fast track is about ensuring that America speaks with a united voice as we pursue our trade agenda. The immediate agenda extends well beyond a comprehensive agreement with Chile. It includes multilateral negotiations growing out of the WTO built-in agenda, which will include, for example, negotiations to reduce barriers to agricultural trade and services, in which the U.S. is the most competitive. It also includes sectoral negotiations, like those that led to the recently-concluded ITA agreement.

More fundamentally, it is about maintaining the competitive position we have regained over the last 4 years. If we do not participate effectively in reducing trade barriers, we will relinquish opportunities for American business and workers to our competitors. Indeed, since 1992, more than 20 regional trade agreements have been negotiated which do not include the United States. Everyday strategic and preferential alliances are being forged without us. Most recently, Canada indicated an intention to form a trade alliance with the Mercosur countries.

We have no credibility with our trading partners if they do not believe we can implement the deals we negotiate. Fast track authority is essential for that reason alone.

Q: I would like to support you on fast track, but in my district fast track is about NAFTA. They say NAFTA has not been good for America, and it has done nothing to further the labor and environmental concerns that it was supposed to address. How do I respond to that criticism?

A: First, fast track is not about NAFTA. Fast track is about giving America the ability to pursue a global market opening trade agenda.

Second, NAFTA has provided many benefits, including expanded exports, creation of high wage jobs, and protection of those exports and jobs during Mexico's recession and peso crisis. (See included "Economic Benefits of NAFTA" for details.)

Third, with respect to labor and environmental, the NAFTA side agreements are working to make a bad situation better. The labor and environmental problems in Mexico are decades in the making; it is unrealistic to expect NAFTA to have remedied them in three years. There are continuing problems and they need to be addressed. The NAFTA agreements provide the vehicle for doing so, and have resulted in progress on both fronts.

On the environmental front progress is being made to identify and fund new environmental projects and in Mexico's enforcement of its environmental laws. (See included "NAFTA Environmental Concerns" for details.)

On the labor front, there is an unprecedented degree of cooperation to address the difficult labor issues and the formal process allowing the submission of complaints about continuing problems has led to solutions, change, and increased attention to these issues. (See included "NAFTA and Worker Rights" for details.)

More needs to be done and it will be. But, withholding support for fast track authority will not help workers or the environment. To the contrary, it will hurt America's competitiveness and leadership role. We will lose the ability to create new export opportunities and attendant high-wage jobs, like those resulting from increased trade over the past 4 years. If we are not involved, we cannot continue to push for progress on the important issues of labor and the environment.

Q: The NAFTA helped induce the collapse of the peso in 1995 and the decline of the Mexican economy?

A: The sharp decline in the Mexican economy in 1995 and the peso crash had its roots in Mexico's exchange rate policy in the 1980s, long before the NAFTA was envisioned. The rise in interest rates, collapse of the Mexican financial markets and the 7% decline in production and employment, undermined the Mexican economy, and these events had little to do with the NAFTA.

The NAFTA did force Mexico to meet market-opening obligations, and in spite of a recession three times worse than the U.S. recession of 1991, our exports to Mexico recovered in just 18 months. By contrast, after the peso crash of 1982, Mexico erected across-the-board trade barriers and U.S. exports took seven years to recover. U.S. exports to Mexico today stand at record levels.

From the Mexican perspective, NAFTA can, in part, be credited with helping Mexico recover more quickly from this recession than the recession in the 1980's. It took the Mexican economy 4 years to recover from its early 1980s recession. In contrast, in 1996, just one year after the recession, the Mexican economy grew by better than 5% and recovered two-thirds of its production. Mexican growth is expected to exceed 5% again in 1997. In that event, Mexico will have recovered from a worse recession twice as fast as it did from recession in the 1980s.

Q: NAFTA has not really solved the most pressing trade issues between U.S. and Mexico. Why go forward with new agreements if we are not solving existing problems?

A: While there remain trade issues to resolve with Mexico, no trading relationship is without such ongoing issues. Neither NAFTA nor any other trade agreement is a panacea; it provides increased opportunities and a process to address outstanding and emerging issues. Pursuant to the NAFTA, we are working to solve our trade issues with Mexico and with Canada.

For example, we have made it clear that trucks entering the U.S. must comply with strict safety and environmental standards. With regard to food safety, the NAFTA imposes among the highest phytosanitary requirements of any trade agreement in the world, which must be complied with before food enters our market. With respect to labor and environment issues, progress is continuing. In fact, Presidents Clinton and Zedillo agreed to redouble their efforts in this regard and have asked their labor and environment ministers to identify specific issues requiring more focused attention, particularly along the border.

Again, withholding fast track authority will not improve these problems. Issues like this arise with all trading partners, whether we have special trade relations or not. Fast track is important so that we can create economic opportunity, exercise leadership to impose disciplines that minimize the kinds of problems to which you allude and establish processes to resolve problems when they arise.

Q: You talk about creating high wage jobs. It is my impression that trading with low wage countries actually depresses wages.

A: The fact is that wages for export-related jobs pay 13-16% more than the national average. Thus, creating additional export opportunities is clearly in America's interest. Our workers are able to compete with workers in low wage countries because they are the most productive in the world. They spend far less time to produce most anything than is required of workers in low wage countries. As a result, in many areas the United States has both higher wages and lower unit labor costs than our low wage trade partners.

Even state of the art facilities in developing countries are in fact far from operating as efficiently as in countries like the United States because of low productivity and frequent quality and availability problems in the domestic goods and service supplying sectors upon which the manufacturing facility depends.

Of course, competitive pressure from low wage countries may be felt greatest in U.S. industries where labor skills and productivity are lower than average. But most such jobs are not in industries that compete with imports. Indeed, imports from non-oil developing countries account for only 4% of U.S. spending and has grown only 1.5% during past decade.

We should be concerned when any part of our labor force lacks skills necessary for well-paying jobs. It is important, therefore, to maintain our commitment to education and worker retraining so that our workers can enjoy the benefits of America's increasing demand for a higher-skilled workforce.

Q: The Administration keeps talking about its success opening foreign markets, yet our trade deficit keeps going up. How is this good for the U.S. economy as it must cost U.S. jobs?

A: There is no doubt that exports have created new, high-paying jobs. Today, more than 11 million American jobs are supported by exports, including one in five manufacturing jobs. These are good jobs; jobs supported by merchandise exports pay 13-16 percent more than the U.S. national average wage. Over the last four years, more than one-quarter of our economic growth came from exports -- and export growth has resulted in an additional 1.4 million export-supported jobs.

Trade deficits, by themselves, do not necessarily cost U.S. jobs. Trade deficits and employment both tend to rise when the economy is growing rapidly and consumers and businesses increase their spending. For example, the U.S. current account (the broadest measure of trade) was nearly in balance in 1991, during the last major U.S. recession, yet the unemployment rate peaked at well over 7% in that year. Since 1992, the U.S. economy recovered earlier and has grown faster than those of many of our major trade partners. The relative strength of U.S. growth contributed to the current account deficit expanding to \$165.1 billion in 1996; however, by the end of 1996, the unemployment rate was down to 5.4% and over 11 million net jobs had been created in the U.S. economy in just four years. Today unemployment is at its lowest level in a quarter century.

That said, the President and Congress working together over the last four years have reduced the federal budget deficit and strengthened the national saving rate. As a result, although the trade deficit has increased in dollar terms during this recovery, substantial progress has been made in that the trade deficit has been brought down substantially relative to the size of the overall economy (for goods and services, down from 3.3% of GDP at its peak in 1987 to 1.5% in 1996). In light of the budget agreement between the President and Congress, this trend should continue as we reduce the budget deficit.

ECONOMIC BENEFITS OF THE NAFTA

- **Export Expansion:** NAFTA is playing a vital role expanding markets for U.S. products in our first and third largest trade partners, Canada and Mexico. NAFTA also acts as a buffer against reduced access to these markets of 120 million consumers.
 - With the phasing in of NAFTA, U.S. goods exports have risen to historic records in the last 3 years (1993 to 1996): up 33% to Canada, reaching \$134 billion and up 37% to Mexico, reaching \$57 billion.
 - **Sectoral growth:** The strength of U.S. exports to Mexico under NAFTA, even in the face of the peso crisis, is vivid in particular product areas. For example, U.S. agricultural exports to Mexico are up by 52% in 3 years, from \$3.5 billion in 1993 to \$5.4 billion in 1996. Exports of cereal, led by corn, are up 174% to \$1.8 billion. Exports of electrical machinery are up by nearly 60% to \$11 billion, and exports of paper are by one-third to \$1.5 billion. Even the consumer goods category has shown strong growth, with exports up 34% to \$6.5 billion.
 - A recent article in the Wall Street Journal (4/21/97), in fact, cites strong growth in U.S. manufactured exports to Mexico due to NAFTA as a principal reason behind the current economic boom in the **Midwest**.
- **High Wage Job Creation:** NAFTA has also supported the expansion of high wage jobs in the United States. Goods exports to Mexico and Canada supported 2.3 million U.S. jobs last year. Such U.S. jobs supported by exports pay 13% to 16% more than the U.S. national average. These jobs have also increased since NAFTA began taking effect, up 122,000 for exports to Mexico (to an estimated 750,000 in 1996) and up 189,000 for exports to Canada.
- **Benefits During Mexican Recession:** NAFTA proved to be extremely important to the protection of U.S. jobs and interests in light of Mexico's international payments difficulties and peso crisis beginning in late 1994. In 1995, a year in which Mexico experienced its worst recession in the 20th century (production and employment down 7%), that country continued to lower its trade barriers to U.S. and Canadian products (in line with its NAFTA obligations), while raising them in certain areas against products from the E.U. and Japan. Our share of Mexico's imports actually rose from 71% in 1994 to 76% in 1996.
 - In Mexico's previous international payments and peso crisis in 1981-82, U.S. exports were cut in half and took 7 years to recover. In contrast, in 1995 U.S. exports fell by 9% and had fully recovered in 18 months, helping to protect more than 700,000 good paying U.S. jobs supported by exports to Mexico.
 - NAFTA can also be credited with helping the Mexico recover more quickly from this recession than the recession in the 1980's. It took the Mexican economy 4

years to recover from its early 1980s recession. In contrast, in 1996, just one year after the recession, the Mexican economy grew by better than 5% and recovered two-thirds of its production. Mexican growth is expected to exceed 5% again in 1997. In that event, Mexico will have recovered from a worse recession twice as fast as it did from recession in the 1980s.

- **U.S. Trade Balance with Mexico:** The peso crisis and severe Mexican recession, not NAFTA, were responsible for the widely noted shift in the U.S. trade balance with Mexico -- from a surplus of \$1.7 billion in 1993 to a deficit of \$16.2 billion in 1996. In fact, NAFTA itself, probably helped limit to some extent the size of the bilateral deficit growth.
 - A recent study published by the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas estimated that U.S. export growth to Mexico has been 7 percent higher than it otherwise would have been due to NAFTA, while U.S. import growth from Mexico was only 2 percent higher per year due to NAFTA.
 - During the Mexican recession and peso crisis, U.S. net employment rose by 4.8 million, the unemployment rate fell from 6.1% to 5.4% and U.S. industrial production rose by over 6% in real terms.

NAFTA ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS

- Q: Even though the NAFTA has been in effect for three years, the environmental situation -- particularly in the U.S.-Mexico border region -- has not improved, and may even have deteriorated. Why has the NAFTA not been more effective in addressing these problems?**
- **The NAFTA environmental side agreements** (the North American Agreement on Environmental Cooperation and the U.S.-Mexico Border Environment Cooperation Agreement) have led to new environmental initiatives along the border and increased enforcement by Mexico of relatively good environmental laws. The environmental problems that exist in the U.S.-Mexico border region precede the NAFTA and were decades in the making. To expect that after three years the environmental problems in that region would be resolved is simply unrealistic. The question is whether progress is evident; the answer to that question is yes.
 - **Environmental Initiatives:** The three environmental institutions created by NAFTA are already taking concrete steps to address the region's environmental problems. (These institutions include The Border Environment Cooperation Commission (BECC) and the North American Development Bank (NADBank), as well as the Commission for Environmental Cooperation (CEC).)
 - **Certifying and arranging financing for numerous infrastructure projects** designed to reduce pollution and improve the environment in the U.S.-Mexico border region.
 - **The BECC Board has certified twelve projects** in just two years of existence (six U.S. and six Mexican). Of these, the NADBank has approved financing for four water treatment and wastewater projects, with more in the pipeline for approval. The first project to break ground, in Brawley, California, will provide much needed clean drinking water.
 - The President during his May 5-7 visit to Mexico made effective border projects that address environmental concerns a high priority. During the visit, a grant of \$170 million was confirmed from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to the NADBank for projects to clean and preserve water along the border.
 - **The CEC has also begun work on an unprecedented list of environmental projects** in which the three NAFTA governments are cooperating to achieve such diverse objectives as protecting migratory birds, tracking hazardous wastes to ensure they are disposed of properly, and identifying sources of pollution. This work has already begun to create an entirely new and more cooperative framework to address transnational environmental questions.

- **Improved Enforcement:** Mexico has generally good environmental legislation. The NAFTA side agreement is resulting in improved enforcement of those laws.
 - **Increased the number of enforcement actions nationwide.** Enforcement actions increased from 3,119 in 1991 to between 12,000 and 13,000 annually during 1993-96; 3500 per year alone occur along the border. As a result of its inspections, in 1996, Mexico ordered 18 total facility closures, 59 partial closures, and fined 2,622 facilities.
 - **Increased the number and sophistication of its environmental inspectors.** More than 600 inspectors were trained by USG authorities in such critical areas as safeguarding against illegal CFC shipments and compliance with regulations regarding the transboundary shipment of hazardous wastes.
 - **Established environmental auditing program:** To encourage voluntary compliance by plants/factories, a new auditing program was put in place. Between 1992 and 1996, 700 companies participated in the program.
 - **Created environmental crimes unit:** The crime unit is part of the Attorney General's office and has the power to impose criminal sanctions.
 - **Results:** As a result of improved enforcement, Mexico reports the number of serious violations dropping. Mexico estimates that maquiladora industry compliance with Mexican hazardous waste laws has climbed from 25% to over 90% from 1992 to 1996. EPA data supports Mexico's estimates. The amount of maquiladora-generated hazardous waste entering the U.S. for proper disposal (as opposed to illegal disposal in Mexico or the United States) has risen from an average of 6,000 tons in 1991-1992 to 12,288 tons, reflecting maquiladora compliance with applicable laws.
- **Commitment to further progress:** Presidents Clinton and Zedillo committed to redouble efforts regarding environmental cooperation, particularly as it relates to the border, during President Clinton's May 5-7 visit to Mexico. They instructed their environment (and labor) Ministers to identify within 90 days issues requiring further attention.

NAFTA AND WORKER RIGHTS

- Q. **We hear concerns about the Mexican worker rights situation, and that the NAFTA labor cooperation agreement is of no value. How do you respond?**
- **The NAFTA labor cooperation agreement** is contributing to the progress Mexico has made in enforcing its labor laws, which are as good and comparable to labor legislation in the United States and other industrialized countries. The commitment to further progress was evident during the President's recent visit to Mexico, where Presidents Clinton and Zedillo committed to redouble efforts in this regard (and with respect to the environment, particularly along the border).
 - It is unrealistic to expect that after three years of operation, the NAFTA labor cooperation agreement would correct the historic problems associated with this emerging economy's labor practices. Progress in reversing that history, however, is evident. That progress has come notwithstanding the worst economic downturn in Mexico's modern history.
 - **Progress** has already occurred in the form of increased cooperation to address transnational labor issues and a submission process so that citizens are able to seek enforcement of the worker rights provisions in the agreement.
 - **Cooperation:** The North American Agreement on Labor Cooperation (NAALC) (the NAFTA side agreement) is the cornerstone of the most cooperative, institutionally-based relationship on worker rights issues that we have with any developing country in the world.
 - **The NAALC's specific objectives** include: improving working conditions and living standards in each party's territory; promoting basic labor law principles; encouraging cooperation to promote innovation and rising levels of productivity and quality; pursuing cooperative labor-related activities; and promoting compliance with, and effective enforcement by each party of, its "labor law" and fostering transparency in the administration of labor laws.
 - **The NAALC's new institutions are functioning effectively:** To achieve these goals, several new institutions were created. They include: a Ministerial Council and a supporting technical secretariat. They are supported by National Administrative Offices (NAO) in each party to assist, in particular, with the enforcement element of the agreement. Each party also has a National Advisory Committee made up of public, labor and business representatives.
 - **Significant Initiatives:** Initiatives are underway in educating and upgrading skills and policy implementation across North America, including in Mexico.

- **Trinational study tours to evaluate practices to improve working conditions.** The U.S. Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), in cooperation with the National Safety Congress, have conducted tours in the construction and the petrochemical industries to evaluate and make recommendations on improving conditions in order to reduce worker fatalities.
- **Sponsorship of labor law, worker rights, and industrial relations conferences and seminars.** These programs address best practices and discuss and seek to resolve issues raised in the submission process to avoid formal dispute resolution.
- **Addressing child labor issues:** The NAALC countries are hosting a conference on "Child and Youth Labor in North America" focused on eliminating inappropriate participation of children in the workplace and improving the conditions for children legally in the workplace by reducing risks to health and safety and by safeguarding educational opportunities.

● **Submission Process:** The submission process is playing a catalytic role in "spotlighting" important worker rights issues and bringing them to the attention of the public and before decision makers in Mexico (and the U.S. and Canada). This formal process has led to concrete results:

- **Registration of Union:** The NAFTA submission process recently resulted in the registration in Mexico of a newly-formed independent union in a Maxi-Switch production facility. This significant development grew out of the Communications Workers of America (CWA) complaint about Mexico's failure to enforce its obligations allowing the freedom of association and the right to organize and bargain collectively. As a result of the complaint, the registration of the Union was accepted as well as the regularization of the procedure in the request for the reinstatement of the workers. The complaint was withdrawn because the union's objectives had been achieved, which the CWA credited to the operation of the NAFTA procedures.
- **Commitment to address concerns about union registration and internal union democracy:** Six of the submissions reviewed by the U.S. NAO concerned these issues. As a result of these complaints, in August 1996, the Mexican Secretary of Labor, together with the major labor and business organizations, signed a document in front of President Zedillo committing their respective organizations to address these matters.
- **Restrictions of union organization as unconstitutional:** The Mexican Supreme Court has found that state laws that restrict union organization in the state governments are unconstitutional. The types of restrictions addressed in the decision had been reviewed and publicly reported on by the U.S. NAO in the

submission process.

- **Legislative reform:** Many of the government and party controls on unions in the private sector are now subjects for reform in a bill submitted to the Mexican Senate. These controls and restrictions have been the subject of submissions filed with the U.S. NAO.
- **Regulatory Reform -- Mexican Department of Labor Guidelines:** The Mexican Department of Labor in December, 1996 issued policy guidelines addressing a number of laws and practices restricting union registration and organization. Many of the areas targeted for reform were reported by the U.S. NAO.
 - An internal review of certain labor laws and practices, commissioned by the Mexican Department of Labor, acknowledged that some practices restrict registration of independent unions in Mexico. The review was conducted pursuant to Ministerial consultations resulting from the submission process.
- **"Phantom" unions and "phantom" collective bargaining agreements:** Mainstream Mexican labor organizations and the Secretariat of Labor are considering remedies regarding the registration of "phantom" unions and "phantom" collective bargaining agreements, essentially unions and agreements organized and negotiated without the consent, and sometimes the knowledge, of membership. These practices are the subject of a submission currently under review by the U.S. NAO and have been a significant component of previous submissions.
- **Commitment to further progress:** Presidents Clinton and Zedillo committed to redouble efforts regarding labor (and environmental) cooperation during President Clinton's May 5-7 visit to Mexico. The Presidents instructed their labor (and environment) Ministers to identify within 90 days issues requiring further attention.
