Last September, at the United Nations General Assembly, President Clinton was the first world leader to sign the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty. Russia, China, France and the United Kingdom -- the other states that have declared possession of nuclear weapons -- all followed suit, and over 140 nations of the world are now signatories. With this accord, we take a giant step toward a safer day, when no nuclear weapons will be detonated anywhere on the face of the earth.

For more than 35 years, American leaders of both parties have sought a ban on nuclear tests. Dwight Eisenhower was the first President to recognize that such a ban would put a powerful brake on the development of new nuclear weapons and clear the way to a reduction of the nuclear threat. Indeed, President Eisenhower hoped that a test ban would be "his final and most lasting gift to his country," as historian Stephen E. Ambrose has written. But this dream was dashed by the U-2 affair of 1960 and the increase in East-West tensions.

President John Kennedy took up the cause of a test ban. In 1963, his Administration negotiated the Limited Test Ban Treaty -- which prohibited nuclear tests in the atmosphere, under water and in space -- as the first step toward a comprehensive ban. The effort to conclude that ban continued under President Carter but was interrupted by another escalation of Cold War hostility.

President Clinton restarted talks on the test ban. In July 1993 he extended the moratorium on testing begun at the insistence of Congress the year before. Energized by this U.S. initiative, the Geneva Conference on Disarmament began work on a Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty. When negotiations reached impasse over the scope of the treaty's prohibition on testing, President Clinton broke the deadlock by announcing U.S. support for a true zero yield ban -- one that would forbid any nuclear weapon test explosion or any other nuclear explosion.

The President's decision turned the corner for the treaty, giving new momentum to the negotiations and signaling to the world America's resolve to achieve a truly comprehensive test ban. Last September -- 32 months after the negotiations began -- the UN General Assembly voted overwhelmingly, 158-3, to adopt the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty, with only India, Bhutan and Libya opposing. Few major international agreements have enjoyed such extraordinary support.

Indeed, few treaties have had the profound, positive impact on global security that the Comprehensive Test Ban promises. The signatures of the world's declared nuclear powers -- the United States, China, France, Russia and the United Kingdom -- along with the vast majority of nations will constrain efforts to improve existing nuclear weapons and create a formidable barrier to the development of

new generations of weapons. This quest is all the more urgent because of the efforts of rogue states and terrorists to acquire weapons of mass destruction.

For the five nuclear weapon states, there will be no way to test more advanced and more destructive devices. For states that do not possess nuclear weapons, the ban on testing will make it more difficult to develop reliable weapons and fit them for sophisticated missiles and bombers. There is no guarantee that a country determined to possess nuclear weapons will not be able to fashion a crude bomb. But the test ban makes it difficult to do more than that.

By helping prevent proliferation and future arms races, the Test Ban Treaty will increase security for the United States and the world in the 21st century. In a more stable, predictable environment prospects will improve for additional reductions in nuclear forces and further advances in nonproliferation.

The Clinton Administration recognizes, however, that the dangers posed by nuclear weapons will remain with us for years to come. That is why, as part of our national security strategy, the United States must and will retain nuclear forces sufficient to deter any future hostile foreign leadership with access to nuclear forces. The President directed in 1993 that a Science Based Stockpile Stewardship and Management Program be implemented to help maintain our nuclear deterrent under a test ban.

Along with the Stockpile Stewardship program, President Clinton announced in August 1995 the establishment of concrete safeguards that define the conditions under which the United States will enter into a test ban treaty. These safeguards will strengthen our commitments and capabilities in the areas of intelligence, monitoring and verification, maintenance of our nuclear laboratories and test readiness.

Thirty-four years ago, President Kennedy called the completion of the Limited

Test Ban Treaty "a shaft of light cut into the darkness" of the Cold War. Now, with the Comprehensive Test Ban, that light grows brighter. This treaty can bring to an end the era that began in 1945 with a mushroom cloud at Alamogordo; it heralds a new era in which the cloud of nuclear danger can finally be lifted.

Our "glossy print" CTBT fact sheets that we have been handing out on the Hill include on each page a set of quotes from Clinton, Kennedy and Ike. The Ike quote reads:

\* "[not achieving a nuclear test ban] would have to be classed as the greatest disappointment of any administration -- of any decade -- of any time and of any party...".

In addition (although less likely as a source for Ralski's interest), we have previously circulated to the press and others a broader set of quotes from Clinton, Kennedy and Ike. The Ike quotes in this two-pager were:

\* "I am of the belief that, if you could have a ban on all [nuclear] testing that everybody could have confidence in, it would be a very, very fine thing to stop this." and "With both sides of this divided world in possession of unbelievably destructive weapons, mankind approaches a state where mutual annihilation becomes a possibility. No other fact of today's world equals this in importance... We must strive to break the calamitous cycle... which, if unchecked, could spiral into nuclear disaster; the ultimate insanity... we must find somewhere to begin... Another avenue may be through the reopening... of negotiations looking to a controlled ban on the testing of nuclear weapons."

Steve Naplan might be able to provide a more specific cite (Steve -- let me know what it is, so we know what the Republicans are working with). FYI -- My suspicion here is that there are Republican staffers who will attempt to challenge whether Eisenhower was indeed a supporter of a CTBT -- or, less ambitious in terms of rewriting the historical record, make the case that Ike would not have supported a "zero yield" CTBT. It would not surprise me if Kugler et al attempt to challenge the Ike pedigree next week during the Cochran-Holum CTBT hearing.

**WASHINGTON**

(AP) Conservative billionaire Richard Mellon Scaife  
says President

Clinton is ``an embarrassment" but denies that  
Scaife money helps  
support a right-wing conspiracy out to hurt the  
president.

``I just want the truth to come out about Whitewater," the  
reclusive

Pittsburgh philanthropist told George magazine editor  
John F. Kennedy  
Jr. in a rare interview.

``I think there's been a massive cover-up  
about what Bill

Clinton's administration has been doing, and what  
he was doing when

he was governor of Arkansas," said Scaife, who  
funds many  
anti-Clinton groups.

Saying Clinton ``can order people done away with at his will," Scaife suggested that the president might be linked to the deaths of dozens of administration officials and associates, including White House aide Vince Foster, whose death was determined to be a suicide by investigators, and former Commerce Secretary Ron Brown, who died in a plane crash.

The 66-year-old heir to the Mellon oil and banking fortune, estimated at over \$1 billion, also had harsh words for Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr, whose investigation led to the Monica Lewinsky probe and the specter of impeachment now threatening Clinton's presidency.

``Four years and \$40 million later, we haven't gotten anything," Scaife said. ``Maybe Ken Starr is a mole working for the Democrats."

Scaife controls several foundations that have given millions of dollars to organizations run by critics of Clinton. That money included \$1.7 million for a project at the conservative American Spectator magazine to dig up information about Clinton's role in the Whitewater real estate deal.

A federal grand jury is probing whether some of the money was improperly diverted to Whitewater figure David Hale, an Arkansas businessman and convicted felon who testified against Clinton in the Starr investigation. Hale has denied receiving any money.

Scaife was reportedly called as a witness in the grand jury probe.

Scaife's money also helped fund a chair at Pepperdine University that was to go to Starr. The prosecutor later turned the job down.

Earlier this year Hillary Rodham Clinton said there was a ``vast right-wing conspiracy" out to destroy her husband. The comment was considered by some to be a veiled reference to a cadre of Scaife-funded anti-Clinton groups. ``If there is one, I don't know of it," Scaife said when asked if such a conspiracy exists. He said he doesn't hate Clinton and gives money to support groups ``presenting ideas that most colleges and universities and television don't promote."

I guess a conspiracy is the other guy's group....

**PRESIDENT CLINTON NAMES TEN MEMBERS TO THE  
PRESIDENT'S COMMITTEE ON MENTAL RETARDATION**

The President today announced his intent to appoint Valerie J. Bradley, Joyce A. Keller, John F. Kennedy, Jr., K. Charlie Lakin, T. J. Monroe, Elizabeth C. Pittinger, Michael L. Remus, Jacquelyn B. Victorian, Barbara Y. Wheeler, and Sheryl White-Scott as members of the President's Committee on Mental Retardation (PCMR). Ms. Bradley will continue to serve in her capacity as Chair.

Ms. Valerie J. Bradley, of Cambridge, Massachusetts, is President of Human Services Research Institute (HSRI), a non-profit organization. She has worked in the field of mental retardation for over 25 years as a researcher, policy analyst, evaluator, advocate and author. As Chief Executive Officer of HSRI, Ms. Bradley is responsible for the general management of the organization, quality control, employee recruitment, fiscal affairs, and public relations. Ms. Bradley has also directed a wide range of Federal grants and contracts in the areas of family support, quality assurance, and deinstitutionalization. Ms. Bradley holds a B.A. from Occidental College and an M.A. from Rutgers University.

Ms. Joyce A. Keller, of Southfield, Michigan, is the Executive Director of JARC, a Jewish association for residential care for persons with developmental disabilities. Previously, she was a Special Services Director for developmental disabilities for Adult Service Centers, Inc., of Detroit and a Special Education Teacher at the elementary and secondary level. Ms. Keller holds a B.S. from the University of Michigan and an M.A. from the Graduate School of Education at Harvard University.

Mr. John F. Kennedy, Jr., of New York City, New York, is the founder and President of Reaching Up, a non-profit organization that supports the higher education and career development of direct care workers in the disability field. Previously, he served for several years as an Assistant District Attorney in

Manhattan, and is a member of the Board of Directors of the Robin Hood Foundation, as well as an Associate Trustee of the Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr., Foundation. Mr. Kennedy holds a B.A. from Brown University and a J.D. from New York University Law School.

Dr. Charlie Lakin, of Minneapolis, Minnesota, is the Director of the Rehabilitation Research and Training Center on Community Living Integration at the University of Minnesota. He has been a Senior Research Associate at the University of Minnesota since 1980. He is a member of the American Association on Mental Retardation and the Association for Persons with Severe Handicaps. Dr. Lakin holds a Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota.

Mr. T.J. Monroe, of Cincinnati, Ohio, is one of two self-advocates appointed to the President's Committee on Mental Retardation. Mr. Monroe is a nationally recognized self-advocate and speaker. He also serves as a consultant to self-advocacy agencies and the government on human rights policies while also advising others in self-advocacy organizing and development. He is also a member of the American Association on Mental Retardation, the Self-Advocates Becoming Empowered Advisory Committee, and an advisor to the People First of Hamilton County.

Ms. Elizabeth C. Pittinger, of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, is an adjunct faculty member of Community College, Allegheny County and a consultant for civil rights, mental retardation and police training. Ms. Pittinger serves as the legally appointed guardian of ten incapacitated people. She is a Commissioner with the City of Pittsburgh Commission on Human Relations. Ms. Pittinger holds a B.A. from Marywood College, an M.P.A. from Carnegie Mellon University, and is a graduate of the Pittsburgh Citizens Police Academy.

Mr. Michael L. Remus, of Lawrence, Kansas, is the Executive Director of the Arc of Tennessee, which advocates for the enhanced quality of life for children and adults with mental retardation and other disabilities through research, advocacy and education. Mr. Remus was formerly the Director of Special Education for the State of Kansas, is a lifelong advocate for persons with disabilities, and is the father of two grown sons with disabilities. He has served as Adjunct Faculty at Wayne State College, teaching education graduate courses dealing with the integration of students with disabilities and Introduction to Special and

Secondary Education. He is immediate past President of the Arc-US.

Ms. Jacquelyn B. Victorian, of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is the Executive Director of Independent Living, Inc., a community-based residential agency that provides supported living services to 50 individuals with developmental disabilities and their families. She is a member of the Community and Family Support Task Force Committee on Supported Living, as well as the Louisiana Governor's Ombudsman Task Force on Developmental Disabilities. Ms. Victorian holds a Masters degree in Social Work.

Dr. Barbara Y. Wheeler, of Los Angeles, California, is Associate Professor of Clinical Pediatrics at the University of Southern California School of Medicine. She also serves as Director of Training in Nursing at the University Affiliated Program at Children's Hospital in Los Angeles, Project Director of the California Personal Assistance Services Project and the Self-Advocacy Project and as an Evaluation Consultant to the Black Infant Health Programs in the California Department of Health Services. Dr. Wheeler holds a B.S. from the University of California at San Francisco, and an M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Dr. Sheryl White-Scott, of New York City, New York, is the Director of Adult Health Services at the Westchester Institute for Human Development and an Assistant Professor in the Department of Medicine at New York Medical College. She is a Diplomat to the American Board of Internal Medicine. She is also a member of the American College of Physicians and the American Association on Mental Retardation.

The Committee advises President Clinton and Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala on programs and services relating to persons with mental retardation.

BOSTON (AP) The Kennedy family wanted to keep it relatively routine. But the search for the single-engine plane that disappeared over the Atlantic with John F. Kennedy Jr. inside was anything but that. The White House ``situation room" was alerted. Federal transportation officials swung into action, and sophisticated military equipment was brought to the waters off Martha's Vineyard. Several Clinton administration cabinet members, including the secretary of defense, were roused from their beds.

``The same amount of effort would have been expended for an average citizen," said Capt. Sandy Troeber of the Air Force's rescue coordination center in Virginia. ``Every life is as important as the next." The U.S. Coast Guard says it has ``no set protocol" no benchmark on how to react when a civilian's small plane vanishes or goes down. ``Every case is different," said Petty Officer Virginia Adams. ``I can't give you a specific."

The search for Kennedy, his wife and her sister, last seen departing New Jersey for the Vineyard on Friday night, began when the Coast Guard received a call from a family friend saying the plane was late. Coast Guard officials called the FAA and the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center at Langley Air Force Base

in Hampton, Va., the unit that coordinates searches throughout the country. The Air Force notified the White House at about 5 a.m., and some Cabinet members including the transportation and defense secretaries were alerted, said White House spokesman Jake Siewart. Within hours, a Coast Guard jet and two Coast Guard helicopters were launched and an Air Force plane was transformed into an aerial command post. Soon, 15 more small planes manned by volunteers from the Civil Air Patrol, the Air Force auxiliary organization, were dispatched to help. By mid-Saturday, more than a dozen Coast Guard vessels had joined the search, along with Civil Air Patrols from six states. Several sophisticated federal research vessels capable of undersea searches sailed to the scene from Montauk, N.Y., including one that surveys the ocean floor for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

After night fell Saturday, Air National Guard helicopters equipped with infrared temperature sensors continued searching in the dark.

President Clinton called a Boston Coast Guard command center Saturday night and was "very concerned," said Coast Guard Rear Adm. Richard Larrabee, who spoke Sunday to Massachusetts Gov. Paul Cellucci about the search. The family is communicating with government officials through Housing and Urban Affairs Secretary Andrew Cuomo, who is married to Kerry Kennedy, JFK Jr.'s cousin.

On Sunday, the head of the National Transportation Safety Board

was flown to Massachusetts to set up a headquarters for the investigation and a command post was set up at Otis Air Force Base on Cape Cod to coordinate activities by the Coast Guard, Navy, NTSB, NOAA, Federal Aviation Administration and state agencies. Concerned about receiving preferential treatment, the Kennedy family had asked the government to keep its reaction relatively routine, government sources told The Associated Press. Some involved in the search bristled at the suggestion that the Kennedys were getting extra attention. ``People have been asking me that all day," said Lt. Col. Don Desfosse, an Air Force auxiliary pilot who spent Sunday patrolling the air west of the Vineyard. ``I'm out there to find somebody, and hopefully to find them and save them." It is difficult to find a similar situation to use as a benchmark. In June 1997, when a helicopter carrying four Coast Guard crewmen crashed off the California coast, an around-the-clock search was called off after four days. The search involved four cutters, a helicopter and a plane.
