SUBJECT: Background Information: Massachusetts

MAJOR ISSUES

Mount Wachusett Community College. The Department has assessed approximately \$2.5 million against Mount Wachusett Community College based on a review conducted by the student financial assistance program due to the school's use of an improper cost of attendance when calculating Pell Grant awards for incarcerated students enrolled in the school's prison programs. The college has requested a meeting with our student financial assistance officials. We have received some informal questions from Capitol Hill regarding this matter, and we understand that Senator Kennedy's office is interested in this issue.

Boston Schools Superintendent. The four-year contract of Boston Schools Superintendent Lois Harrison-Jones, the first African-American female superintendent, will expire June 30, 1995. Signals from the mayor and school commissioner indicate the likelihood that the contract will not be extended, and the termination of Harrison-Jones could result in racial strife.

State Proficiency Exam. Republican Governor William Weld has proposed to deny a driver's license to high school students who do not pass the State's proficiency exam. Massachusetts' 1993 education reform law requires high school students to pass proficiency tests in the 10th grade beginning in 1996.

Curriculum. Governor Weld interjected himself into the area of curriculum standards over objections from the State Department of Education when he approved adding a competency test in foreign languages to the list of academic subjects in which students must demonstrate mastery before receiving their high school diplomas. The requirement will take effect in the 1997 academic year. Chief State School Officer Robert Antonucci believes this move is too hasty and a plan is needed to assist the 20% of Massachusetts' high schools which do not currently offer language courses.

Instruction Time. The State Board of Education recently approved a plan, which will be phased in over two years, to extend instruction time for math, English, and other core academic subjects. The new plan was created in reaction to the "Prisoners of Time" report of the National Education Commission on Time and Learning released in April of 1994.

The core academic plan requires 990 hours (previously 774 hours) of academic instructional time for high school students and 900 hours (formerly 864 hours) for elementary school students. Teacher union leaders and students have voiced concern about these new changes.

#### GRANTS

**Direct Lending.** Forty-eight Massachusetts schools have been selected to participate in the second year of the William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program with a total loan volume of nearly \$170 million. Some of the selected schools include Harvard University, Amherst College, Williams College, the University of Massachusetts, Boston University, and MIT.

**Special Education.** Massachusetts received \$12.9 million in Part H (infants and toddlers) and Section 619 (preschoolers) funds under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) in FY 1994. The State has also been allocated \$57 million under Part B (assistance to States for the Education of Individuals with Disabilities Program) of IDEA for FY 1995.

The Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services' Office of Special Education Programs is currently funding 63 discretionary grants in Massachusetts at a total funding level of \$12.9 million.

**Goals 2000.** The Secretary announced the award of Massachusetts' \$1.8 million first-year Goals 2000 grant at an event in Boston with Senator Kennedy on September 12, 1994. The State is already using its State planning funds to support the creation of 14 charter schools.

**Work Local Partnerships.** Boston received funding for its School-to-Work initiatives totalling \$1.2 million.

**Work Opportunities Grant.** The State received a \$5.5 million School-to-Work State Grant.

**Overall Grant Information.** The State has received more than \$117 million in FY discretionary and formula grants to date. Total grant obligations to Massachusetts in FY 1994 totalled almost \$303 million, including over \$133 million in Chapter 1 funds.

#### TRAVEL

On October 20, 1994, Deputy Secretary Kunin joined the President in Framingham as he signed the Improving America's Schools Act into law.

MAJOR ISSUES

Philadelphia School Desegregation. Judge Doris A. Smith, Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania, ruled in February of 1994 that the Philadelphia school district had not done enough to desegregate its schools. The Judge appointed a team of education experts to develop and implement a desegregation plan. The district claims this is impossible since 75% of its students are African American or Hispanic. The Committee submitted its report last fall, which paints a bleak picture of the Philadelphia School System and recommends substantial increases in State education funding to the school system. In November of 1994, Smith ruled that the school district provided unequal and inadequate educational opportunities for Hispanic and African-American students, and she directed school officials to adopt various reforms and to devise a comprehensive plan to improve teaching and learning. Last month, the Philadelphia school district declared that it lacked the resources to comply with Judge Smith's order without cutting other programs. The district has appealed to the State Supreme Court, asking the high court to release it from carrying out Smith's costliest recommendations or to order Smith to bring the State into the case as a defendant.

School Choice. Republican Governor Tom Ridge has expressed support of tuition vouchers for private and parochial schools.

GRANTS

Direct Loans. The Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Association (PHEAA) continues to discourage schools from applying to the William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program, which has resulted in relatively small numbers of schools participating in the first and second years of the program. The Department is currently discussing options with PHEAA about servicing some of the direct consolidated loans, which may be problematic; we are working in sorting through this situation. Nonetheless, a total of 75 Pennsylvania schools have been accepted into the program with a total of \$188 million committed in loan volume.

Vocational Education. The Department's Office of Vocational and Adult Education has an outstanding claim for recovery of \$3.1 million against the State of Pennsylvania, which

is currently before our Office of Administrative Law Judges. This claim is based on Pennsylvania's failure to maintain its fiscal effort for vocational education for FY 1989 and FY 1991. The Department is conducting an on-site investigation this week to monitor Pennsylvania's performance under the most recent reauthorization of the Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Applied Technology Education Act.

Goals 2000. The State was awarded its Goals 2000 first-year planning grant on August 3 for \$3.9 million.

Special Education. Pennsylvania has received \$20.5 million in Part H (infants and toddlers with disabilities) and Section 619 (preschoolers) funds under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) in FY 1994. The State has been allocated \$77.3 million under Part B (assistance to States for the Education of Individuals with Disabilities Program) of IDEA for FY 1995.

The Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services' Office of Special Education Programs is currently funding 61 grants in Pennsylvania at a total funding level of \$8.6 million.

Overall Grant Information. Pennsylvania has received \$87.7 million in FY 1995 discretionary and formula grants to date. Total grant obligations to Pennsylvania in FY 1994 totalled over \$670 million, including nearly \$312 million in Chapter 1 funds.

The requirement will take effect in

the 1997 academic year. Chief State School Officer Robert Antonucci believes this move is too hasty and a plan is needed to assist the 20% of Massachusetts' high schools which do not currently offer language courses. Instruction Time. The State Board of Education recently approved a plan, which will be phased in over two years, to extend instruction time for math, English, and other core academic subjects. The new plan was created in reaction to the "Prisoners of Time" report of the National Education Commission on Time and Learning released in April of 1994.

1996 Appropriations. Today, the House Appropriations Committee is marking up the Department's primary FY 1996 appropriations bill. Following the markup, the Department will issue statements as well as state

-level data to explain the effects of the anticipated budget cuts. House floor action is expected next week. On July 18, the Senate Appropriations Committee announced the allocations for its subcommittees. The Committee has allocated \$62.7 billion in budget authority and \$68.7 billion in outlays for the Departments of Education, Labor, and HHS. This amount provides \$1.5 billion more in budget authority and \$0.6 billion more in outlays than the House Appropriations Committee's allocation.

Indian Education Appropriations. On July 18, the House completed debate on the FY 1996 Interior appropriations bill, which includes funding for the Department's Indian Education programs. The House adopted an amendment by Congressman Tom Coburn to restore \$52.5 million for the programs. The House Appropriations Committee had voted to provide only enough funding to close out the Department's Office of Indian Education.

Compromise Rescission Bill. Senate consideration of the compromise rescission bill is still pending. This bill would cut \$503 million from the Department's FY 1995 appropriations. The Department has not obligated funds affected by the rescissions, in accordance with Alice Rivlin's July 3 memorandum.

Travel to Florida. On July 23, I will travel to Tallahassee to meet with the Florida leadership of the National Education Association and American Federation of Teachers. On July 24, I will celebrate the 5th anniversary of the ADA with Governor Chiles in Tallahassee and address the National Urban League in Miami.

Joint Session of Congress. On July 26, I will attend a joint session of Congress for the President of Korea.

National Governors' Association (NGA). The Deputy Secretary will attend the NGA conference which begins on July 30 in Burlington, Vermont.

Back to School. On September 12, I will deliver a speech at the National Press Club to highlight family involvement in education and the importance of families going "back to school." During the week of September 11, Cabinet members and celebrities will participate in back

-to

-school activities to encourage parent and community involvement in education.

#### AGENCY WORK ON PRESIDENTIAL INITIATIVES

Empowerment Zones. On July 26, I will join the Vice President at the White House for the empowerment zones conference.

American Federation of Teachers (AFT). On July 28, I will join the President as he addresses the AFT conference.

#### CONGRESS

Hearing on Reorganization. On July 25, the House Economic and Educational Opportunities Committee is scheduled to hold another hearing on the reorganization of the Department.

Congressional Women's Caucus. On July 25, the Deputy Secretary is scheduled to meet with the Congressional Women's Caucus.

House Markup on Direct Loans. The House Economic and Educational Opportunities Committee has tentatively scheduled a markup of student loan legislation on July 26. The Chairman's bill to limit direct lending to 40% of student loan volume is presumably the bill to be marked up. However, no hearings have been held on the bill, and minority objections may result in a cancellation of the markup.

Hearing on School Choice. On July 28, the House Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations is planning a field hearing in Milwaukee on the city's school choice program.

Senator Reid. On July 31, I will join Senator Harry Reid to tape a half

-hour television show on education issues.

Upcoming Floor Action. In August, the House may consider the

CAREERS job training bill as well as H.R. 1720 which would privatize Sallie Mae and Connie Lee. Next week, the Senate may consider the Workforce Development Act, the companion bill to the CAREERS bill.

Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. On August 2, the House Subcommittee on Early Childhood, Youth, and Families is expected to mark up the IDEA reauthorization and an education reform block grant proposal (not yet introduced).

Legislative Proposal to Congress. On July 18, the Secretary of the Treasury and I forwarded to Congress our joint proposal to accelerate the phase

-in of the William D. Ford Federal Direct

Loan Program, to recall at least \$1.1 billion in guarantee agency reserves, and to privatize Sallie Mae.

Speech on Affirmative Action. On July 19, I joined the President as he announced the results of the Administration's review of affirmative action programs.

Youth Development Block Grant. On July 19, the Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources marked up S. 673, a bill that would eliminate several separate programs and create a single block grant for youth development.
