I. PURPOSE

This meeting provides an opportunity for you to reinforce your K-12 education reforms announced in the State of the Union and to learn from Georgia education leaders, practitioners, and students.

II. BACKGROUND

Georgia has made a sustained commitment to primary and secondary education reform over the past decade. Under the leadership of former Governor Joe Frank Harris, the legislature unanimously passed reform legislation in 1985, the Quality Basic Education Act (QBE). The legislation established mandatory, state-financed full-day kindergarten, the development of a more rigorous and uniform curriculum across the state, annual state and national-referenced tests in grades 1-10, higher teacher standards and greater accountability for school systems. It also raised teacher pay.

Under Governor Miller's leadership, the state has built on these reforms. Voters approved a lottery in 1992 and earmarked the proceeds for education programs, including a pre-kindergarten program for at-risk children, technology upgrades for schools, and the HOPE Scholarships. Under Governor Miller, the state has provided high school students the option of enrolling in state-funded post-secondary courses; set aside \$50 million for a telecommunications network linking rural schools to colleges and universities; provided teachers financial incentives to seek national certification and meet teaching goals; and created school safety zones.

The private sector has also provided leadership. For example, business leaders from the Georgia Chamber of Commerce, the Georgia Economic Developers Association, and the Georgia Alliance for Public Education established the Georgia Partnership for Excellence in Education after identifying education as a pressing economic concern. The Partnership's mission is to be "Georgia's foremost change agent and a significant leader in the journey to higher standards and increasing academic achievement for all students." The Georgia Partnership has worked to form "community based collaboratives" focused on meeting national and state educational goals, and

has worked to establish 30 "Next Generation Schools" that incorporate "best practices" in education. (Mr. Carl Swearingen, the current Chair of the Georgia Partnership, will moderate the roundtable discussion.)

Georgia's commitment to public education has produced results. Although Georgia students still score below the national average on both math and reading sections of the National Assessment of Educational Progress, they have shown significant progress. Between 1980 and 1990, SAT scores increased 26 points even as the percent of the population taking the exam increased by 20%, and the number of 16-19 year olds who had dropped out of school or not received a high school diploma declined from 17% to 14%. Overall, Georgia students do better than expected given their parents' education and other socioeconomic factors that influence school performance.

In his January 16 legislative budget address, Governor Miller stated his continued commitment to HOPE Scholarships, increasing teacher salaries, and other existing reforms, and advocated for new initiatives, including a pilot dropout prevention program, increasing funding to reduce class size from 23 to 20 students, and making InterNet access available to every K-12 school.

Mr. Carl Swearingen -- President, Georgia BellSouth Telecommunications (BST), and Chairman, Georgia Partnership for Excellence in Education. Mr. Swearingen will discuss the Partnership's activities.

Benjamin Stalcup (Ben) -- Student, 18, A.R. Johnson Health, Science and Engineering High School, Augusta. Ben is a senior engineering student at this magnet school. He plans to attend a Florida naval academy next Fall. Since he is attending an out-of-state school, he will not benefit from Georgia's HOPE Scholarship program, but would from the President's plan. Ben plans to talk about the importance of high expectations for students, and the benefits of his magnet school.

Dr. Barbara Christmas -- Vice Chair, Georgia School Improvement Panel (Goals 2000 Panel), and Executive VP of the Professional Association of Georgia Educators (PAGE), the largest teachers union in Georgia (unaffiliated with NEA or AFT). She was formerly a teacher and elementary school principal in Tattnell County public schools. She plans to talk about how Goals 2000 school improvement grants have helped schools strengthen academic standards and about the importance of high academic standards.

U.S. Senator Paul Coverdell

Ms. Janice Cox -- President, Georgia PTA. Mrs. Cox is also on the National PTA Board, Early Childhood Education Committee. Mrs. Cox has worked as an accounting manager and bookkeeper. She has two children, ages 23 and 20, both at the University of Georgia. She plans to discuss the PTA's efforts to improve parents' and children's literacy skills -- a PTA priority for the past four years.

Mr. Robert Cresswell -- Principal, Salem High School, Conyers, GA (suburb of Atlanta). Salem is a Next Generation School. Mr. Cresswell has received numerous awards in the state for his leadership at the school, including Georgia Association of Educational Leaders Principal of the Year (1990). He plans to discuss the school's emphasis on teaching problem solving, team work, and technology skills.

U.S. Senator Max Cleland

Kimberli T. Darden (Kim) -- Student, 17, Westside High School, Augusta. Kimberli plans to use a HOPE Scholarship to attend a Georgia university next year. She plans to be a veterinarian. She will talk about a new technology class at her school and about the importance of the Georgia HOPE Scholarship program.

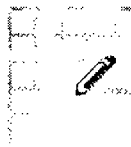

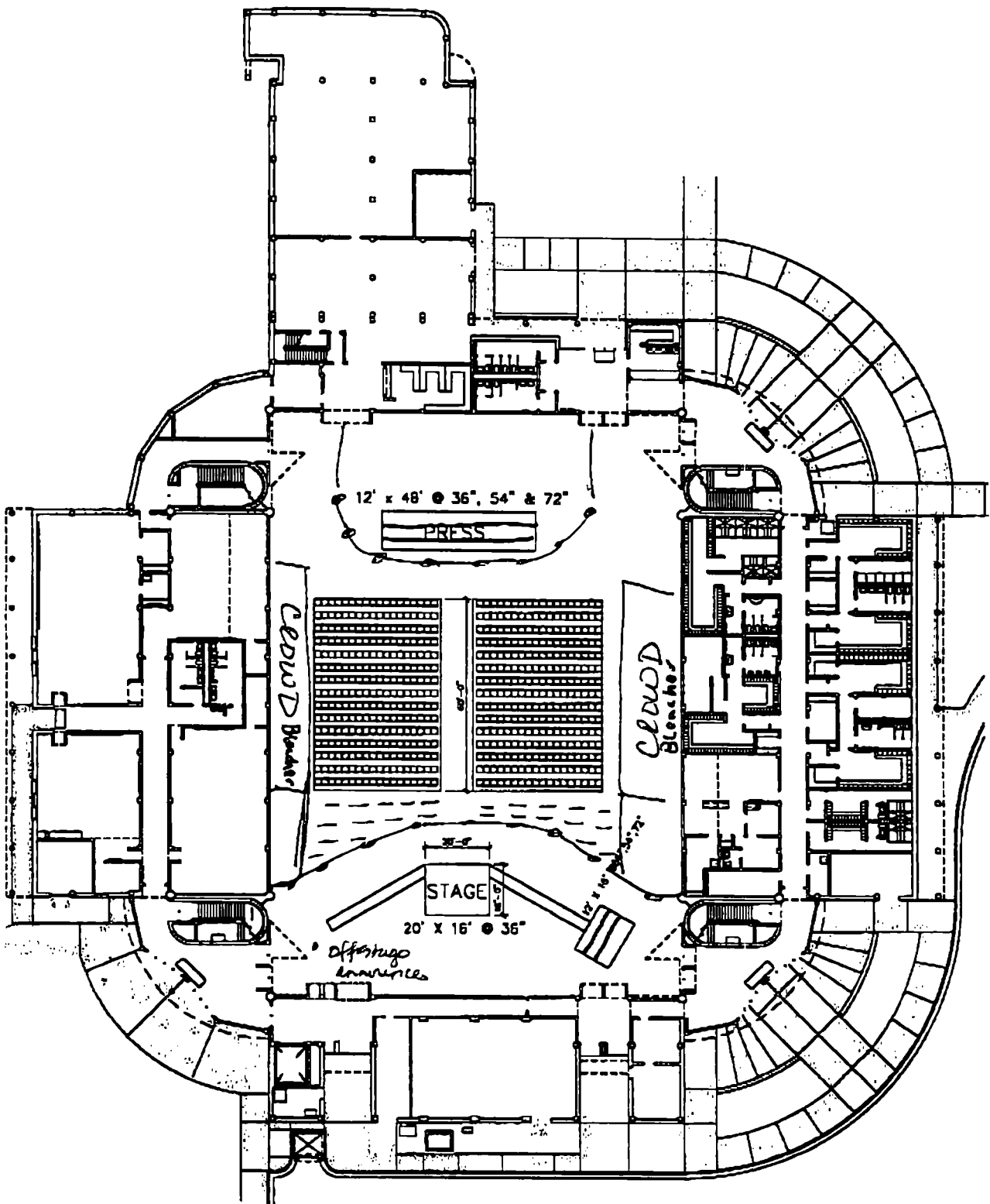

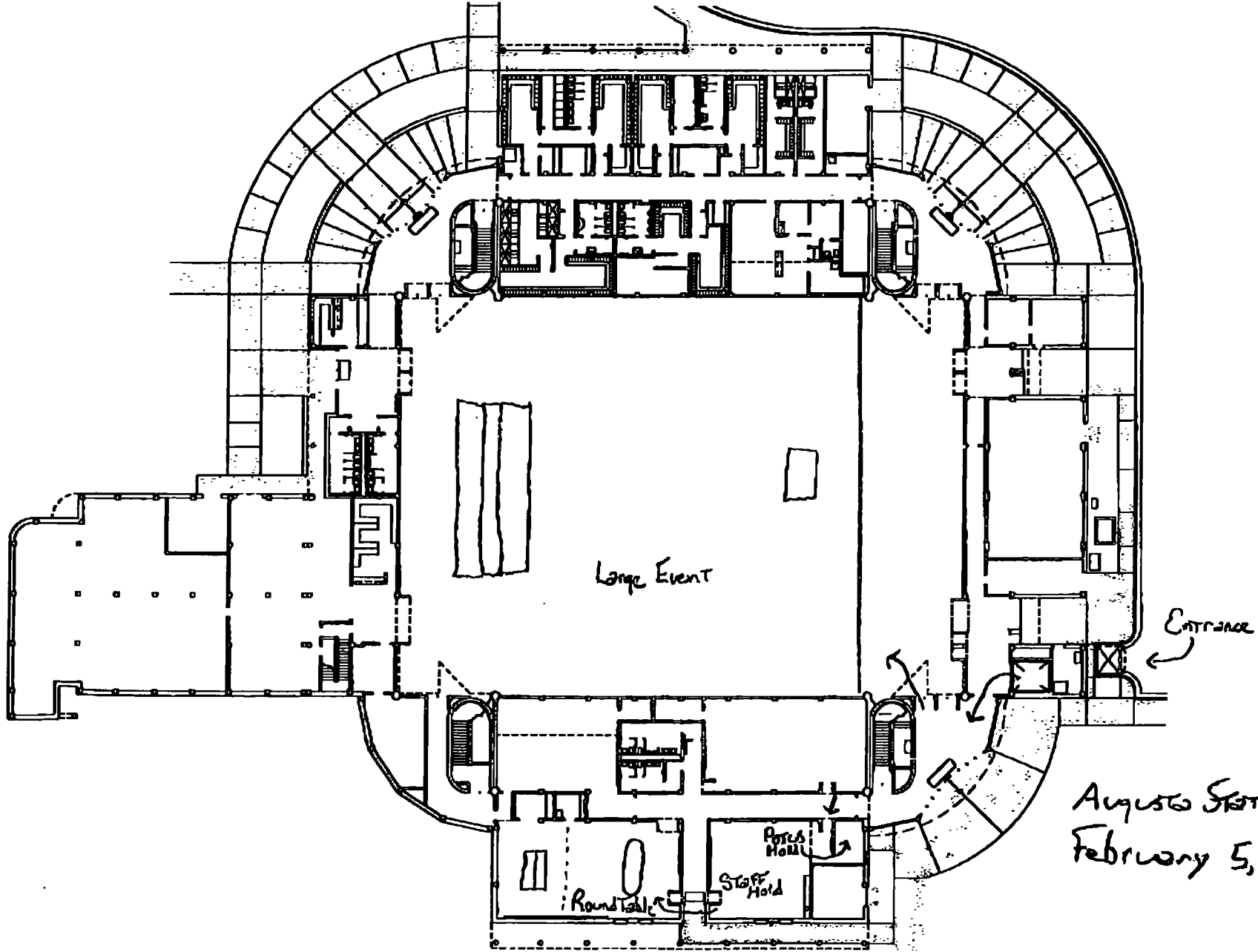

I. PURPOSE

This meeting provides an opportunity for you to reinforce your K-12 education reforms announced in the State of the Union and to learn from Georgia education leaders and students.

II. BACKGROUND

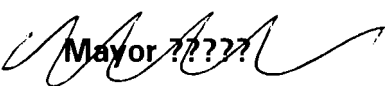
Georgia has made a sustained commitment to primary and secondary education reform over the past decade. Under the leadership of former Governor Joe Frank Harris, the legislature unanimously passed reform legislation in 1985. The Quality Basic Education Act (QBE) reforms included mandatory, state-financed full-day kindergarten, an annual testing program, higher teacher standards and greater accountability for school systems. It also raised teacher pay.

Under Governor Miller's leadership, the state has made adjustments to and built on these reforms. In addition to launching the HOPE Scholarship program, the state has provided high school students the option of enrolling in state-funded post-secondary courses; set aside \$50 million for a telecommunications network linking rural schools to colleges and universities; provided teachers financial incentives to seek national certification and meet teaching goals, and created school safety zones.

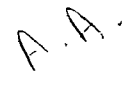

 **Benjamin Stalcup** -- Student, A.R. Johnson Health, Science and Engineering High School, Augusta. Ben is a senior and engineering student at this magnet school. He plans to attend a Florida naval academy (need name) next Fall. Since he is attending an out-of-state school, he will not benefit from Georgia's Hope Scholarship program, but would from the President's plan (one of his 4 siblings has a GA Hope Scholarship). He will talk about the importance of setting high expectations for students, and the benefits of his magnet schools.

Dr. Barbara Christmas -- Vice Chair, Georgia School Improvement Panel (Goals Panel), and Executive VP of the Professional Association of Georgia Educators (PAGE), the largest teachers union in Georgia. She will talk about how Goals 2000 school improvement grants have helped schools strengthen academic standards and about the importance of high academic standards. Dr. Christmas [participated in Palisades meeting on Standards]. She was formerly a teacher and elementary school principal in Tattnell County public schools. St. Marys Elementary was named a National School of Excellence for 1992 under her leadership.

Ms. Janice Cox -- President, Georgia PTA. Mrs. Cox is also on the National PTA Board, Early Childhood Education Committee. Mrs. Cox has worked as a secretary, accounting manager, and bookkeeper. She has two children, ages 23 and 20, both at the University of Georgia. She will discuss the PTA's efforts to improve parents' and children's literacy skills -- a PTA priority for the past four years.

GAE Teacher (TBD)

 **Mr. Carl Swearingen** -- President, Georgia Bellsouth Telecommunications (BST), and Chairman, Georgia Partnership for Excellence in Education. Mr. Swearingen will discuss the activities of the public-private Partnership, including its efforts to create 30 "Next Generation Schools."

Mr. Robert Cresswell (tentative) -- Principal, Salem High School, Conyers, GA (metro Atlanta). Salem is a Next Generation School. Mr. Cresswell has received numerous awards in the state for his leadership. He will talk about his school's innovations [need more detail].

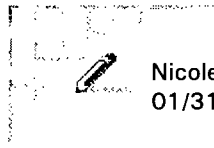

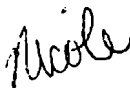

The staff recommendation is that the President travel to Georgia to deliver a speech focused on the HOPE Scholarship fund. This trip will enable the President to bring his State of the Union call for increased college accessibility for all Americans outside the beltway.

Governor Zell Miller recommends the President travel to **Augusta**, with **Columbus** being a very close second choice.

- * Each city is the home of a State University campus.
- * Neither city has a community college.
- * Each city is represented by a democrat and a republican in the House.
Columbus - Rep. Sanford Bishop (D) , Rep. Mac Collins (R)
Augusta - Rep. Cynthia McKinney (D), Rep. Charles Norwood (R)
- * The HOPE scholarship fund is equally demonstrated in each city.
- * The mayor of each city is a democrat.

The education department is vetting both universities. The NSC is vetting both military bases.

With all other factors being equal and because Augusta State University has a larger facility (a gym that seats 3,000 people), it is the recommendation that the President go to **Augusta**.

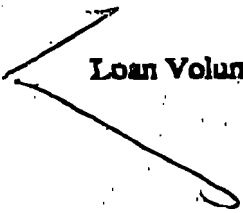
