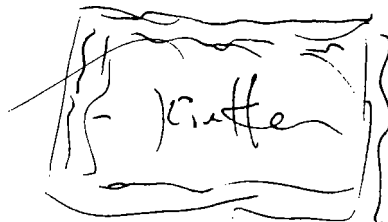
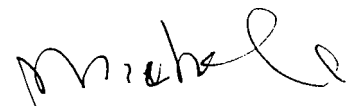

Dear Senator Hagel:

I am writing to provide information that is responsive to a question in your September 9 letter to Under Secretary of State Eizenstat regarding the economic assumptions the Administration used during the Kyoto Protocol negotiations. Because you have asked specific and technical questions about economic analysis conducted by Council of Economic Advisers (CEA) staff, the State Department forwarded your request to CEA to provide answers.

In your September 9 letter, you asked for the model or analysis used during the negotiations in Kyoto. During the Kyoto Conference, CEA staff worked with Treasury staff in providing economic analysis used by the U.S. delegation.

In conducting this analysis, CEA drew from modeling results derived from the Second Generation Model (SGM). CEA developed cost curves for Annex I countries and five developing country regions from SGM model outputs for carbon dioxide and assessed the marginal cost of compliance based on required emissions targets necessary to comply with various targets under consideration. (The approach used is comparable to the methodology used for the illustrative modeling analysis in the Administration Economic Analysis.)

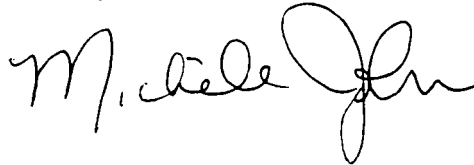
Most analyses focused on the economic effects of various trading regimes. For example, we assessed the permit prices and efficiency losses associated with constraints on purchasing permits as well as with constraints on selling permits. These analyses provided results for the United States, and in most cases, results for all other Annex I countries (or regions) represented in SGM. Further, we assessed the economic implications of an umbrella trading group, with and without developing country participation through "joint implementation" (as CEA termed it during Kyoto). We considered permutations that included both trading constraints and variations of umbrella trading that provided more information on the economic effects of these proposals. Finally, there were some analyses that considered various trading arrangements with different emissions targets.

CEA staff have compiled the memoranda, tables, and modeling data produced by CEA staff for use by the U.S. delegation during the Kyoto negotiations. Given your specific interest in the economic assumptions used at the Kyoto negotiations and your important role as a member of the Senate Observer Group on climate change, we are willing to make these materials available to you or your staff. In the event that these materials reflect internal policy

deliberations or ongoing international negotiations, we are willing to make appropriate accommodations for you to review the materials while protecting the Executive Branch's interest in maintaining confidentiality in the policymaking process.

Dear Erskine:

First of all, it was meaningful to visit with you in my office. Bud Nance and I need your help in obtaining some information from the White House. Other than the President himself, you are the best man to ensure that the Foreign Relations Committee obtains this information.

On April 3, I asked the State Department to provide the Committee with the date each nominee, to be considered by the Foreign Relations Committee, was first pending in the White House. Yet, months later this information hasn't been forthcoming and staff tells me that the State Department says the hold-up is at the White House.

In fact, White House staff apparently refused even to discuss this issue with my people. Yet, when Claiborne Pell was chairman, the Bush White House provided this detailed paperwork to the Committee on every nominee.

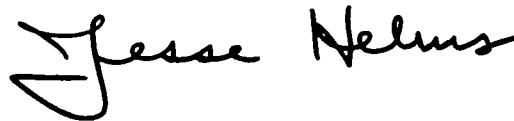
So, Erskine, this request is hardly unprecedented. (I have attached a copy of the Bush Administration-provided information). I strongly suggest that before the nomination of John Shattuck can go forward, the Committee must be provided with the paperwork for the 1998 nominees.

The second issue relates to the questions and documents Chuck Hagel and I requested involving Climate Change. We're looking for the economic analysis -- not just results of the analysis -- used to negotiate the Global Warming Treaty in Kyoto, data on the treaty's impact on U.S. national security, and precisely what the Administration means when it uses the term "meaningful participation of developing countries" in the context of the Kyoto Protocol.

Our request was made in relation to the nomination of Frank Loy to be the Under Secretary of State for Global Affairs (That's Tim Wirth's old job). The State Department has made a token effort in its response to our request, but the people at State claim that they can't share this economic analysis, and other information, because it belongs to the White House, the Treasury Department, and DOD, which have refused to make it available.

In any case, Erskine, I hope you can assist in making this information available to the Committee. It would be a shame if the cordial relationship this Committee enjoys with the Administration were disrupted over the White House's refusal to respond to these simple requests.

RE: Annex I Trading without EU Participation

If the EU does not participate in an Annex I permit trading market, the total cost for Annex I countries to comply with a target and timetable increases, but the U.S., Japan, Australia, and Canada are all better off without EU participation. The EU and Eastern European and Former Soviet Union countries are all made worse off by EU non-participation. The cost for the EU increases if it does not participate because it must achieve all of its emissions reductions at home, instead of in lower cost countries such as Russia. Eastern European and Former Soviet Union countries are worse off because the EU would be the second largest buyer of permits under full Annex I-wide trading. Losing a major buyer decreases total demand for their permits, resulting in EEFSU countries selling fewer permits at lower prices. All other Annex I countries benefit, because as buyers of permits, the loss of a major competitor means they can buy more emissions reductions in EEFSU at lower permit prices.

To illustrate the effects of EU non-participation, I assessed country-specific marginal abatement cost curves derived from SGM outputs for the 1990 in 2010 target and timetable. The first chart illustrates the difference in the total economic effects of these two trading regimes. The two charts that follow show permit prices, domestic emissions abatement, purchases and transfers of permits on the Annex I market, and total costs of Annex I trading with EU participation and a trading regime without EU participation.
