"Japan's New Growth Industry: Schoolgirl Prostitution"

A growing number of schoolgirls in Japan are turning to prostitution so they can afford such expensive designer items as a \$500 Prada purse or \$350 Louis Vuitton wallet. This materialistic reason forms a sharp contrast to a similar rise in countries such as Thailand, where the growth is born of poverty. Japanese police have called the increase an epidemic--last year they picked up 5,481 girls under 18 for prostitution and related activities, a 38 percent jump since 1995. Yoshikatsu Nakamura, Tokyo Metropolitan Police's deputy director of the juvenile division, said, "It seems that prostitution is the fashion for kids. Kids want brand-name clothes like Chanel; their friends have them, and their parents don't give them the money," and they turn to prostitution. Tokyo Metropolitan University sociologist Shinji Miyadi predicted that 8 percent of schoolgirls across Japan, and one-third of all girls not headed for college, have joined the sex industry. Furthermore, men are turning increasingly to younger girls. One factor related to the increase in schoolgirl prostitution in Japan is that health officials there do not express much concern about the rates of AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases among this population. The number of cases of AIDS, HIV, and venereal disease in Japan are admittedly fairly low, but some health officials believe that the diseases could be underreported because many people are not tested for them. "There is a possibility that many more teenagers are carriers and aren't reflected in the statistics," said Taku Kato, director of an AIDS research team at the Ministry of Health.

"High Court to Say If the Dying Have a Right to Suicide"

The Supreme Court agreed Tuesday to rule on whether the Constitution allows terminally ill patients the right to doctor-assisted suicide. The case was brought through appeals by the states of New York and Washington, which both recently decided that mentally competent people who were terminally ill had a constitutional right to doctor-assisted suicide. In its acceptance of the appeals, the Supreme Court has placed itself in the center of a debate that has deeply divided the country. The Supreme Court ruled six years ago that a Missouri woman in a vegetative state that was being kept alive had the right to die, but its decision was a tentative one. It acknowledged only a mild "liberty interest" in preventing unwanted treatment, based on the 14th Amendment's statement against depriving "any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law." Based on the decision in that case, as well as different constitutional

extrapolations, the two appeals courts said that there was no real difference between ending medical treatment that is artificially prolonging life and taking steps to hurry the moment of death. The challenge to the New York law against assisted suicide, which dates from the 19th century, was brought in Federal District Court in 1994 by three physicians and three terminally ill patients, two of whom were in the final stages of AIDS.

"Haitian Radio Program Claims AIDS Doesn't Exist"

At least four Haitian AIDS patients have reportedly stopped seeing their doctors after a popular Miami-based Haitian radio talk show panel told listeners that AIDS does not exist. Psychologist Henri-Claude Saint-Fleur; Haitian physician Francelot Moise, who is not licensed to practice in Florida; and talk show host Claude Aubry argued that AIDS was created by U.S. pharmaceutical companies bent on boosting business and stifling Haitian population growth, and that therefore, people should discontinue their use of both medication and condoms. The show has been airing on Miami's WLQY-AM for the past three years.

"Animal Study Points to HIV Risk With Progesterone Contraceptives"
Reuters (10/01/96)

New research reported in the October issue of Nature Medicine indicates that progesterone treatment increased the risk of vaginal transmission of SIV in monkeys by thinning the vaginal epithelium. "Progesterone treatment also increased the number of SIV DNA-positive cells in the vaginal lamina propria," the researchers report, noting that the findings suggest that "women may be at greater risk of HIV infection from vaginal intercourse when exposed to high levels of endogenous or exogenous progesterone." The actual amount of increased potential risk, however, cannot be determined.

"HHV-6 a Possible Cofactor in AIDS Retinitis, Maybe in AIDS Itself"

Two new studies provide evidence that human herpes virus 6 (HHV-6) plays a role in AIDS-associated retinitis, and may even be a cofactor with HIV in the pathogenesis of AIDS. Anne-Marie Fillet and her colleagues in Paris suspected the presence of "an etiological link between HHV-6 and AIDS-associated retinitis" because of the "ubiquitous nature of HHV-6 and its genomic relationship with cytomegalovirus." They report in the Journal of Medical Virology that HHV-6 was found to be present in three cases of AIDS-associated retinitis, but not in a control group and concluded that "HHV-6 infects the retina but ... does not have an exclusive causative role in AIDS-associated retinitis. Meanwhile, another group of researchers, led by Donald R. Carrigan, report in the Journal of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndromes and Human Retrovirology that their research shows that "at the time of autopsy every patient with AIDS has an active infection with HHV-6 in essentially every tissue." The

researchers conclude, therefore, that HHV-6A, a particular strain of the virus, is a necessary, but not sufficient, component in the pathogenesis of AIDS.

"Lafepe Produces Anti-AIDS Drug"

Lafepe has initiated production of ganciclovir, a drug for the treatment of AIDS. The laboratory, which is owned by the government of Pernambuco state, is also a supplier of another anti-AIDS drug, AZT, to the Brazilian drugs agency Ceme. About \$600,000 was provided by Ceme for research and development of ganciclovir. The domestic drug will cost almost half the amount of the imported version.

"Glaxo Wellcome Foresees Twenty New Drug Launches"

As part of its strategy to offset declining sales of the anti-ulcer drug Zantac, Glaxo Wellcome plans to introduce 20 new drugs onto the market by the end of the century, reports Glaxo CEO Richard Sykes. He added that the six main areas where the company aimed to strengthen its leadership were in HIV/AIDS, herpes, asthma, viral, migraine and epilepsy drugs. Sykes noted that while Glaxo products for the treatment of asthma already have a 25 percent share of the worldwide market, the drug maker still sees room for growth in that area. "We are still underrepresented in the U.S. market, which we split with Schering-Plough." New drugs to treat herpes also have potential, said Sykes, since a large number of herpes patients are still treated with OTC drugs.

"Perinatal HIV Transmission Declines"

AIDS Alert (09/96) Vol. 11, No. 9, P. 108

Perinatal transmission of HIV has decreased in the past two years, but improvements in prenatal care may be necessary for further progress, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Research shows that such transmission dropped from 21 percent to 10 percent after the agency developed guidelines for treating HIV-positive mothers with AZT. About 1,600 infants are infected with HIV each year in the United States. To lower the rates of perinatal transmission further, more prenatal care early in pregnancy will be necessary, says CDC Director of the National Center for HIV, STD, and TB Prevention Helene Gayle. The use of AZT therapy varies among doctors and hospitals, although it is readily available at many hospitals, the CDC said.

"Ballot Propositions: Medical Marijuana"

California Journal (09/96) Vol. 27, No. 9, P. 13; Bathen, Sigrid

Proposition 215, a ballot initiative that would provide seriously ill patients with access to marijuana, will be decided by California voters in November. Advocates say the drug benefits patients suffering from cancer, anorexia, AIDS, chronic pain, spasticity, glaucoma, and other illnesses. Patients would be able to use the drug only if they have approval from a

licensed physician. Californians for Medical Rights, a group that includes doctors and nurses, has organized a media campaign to win support for the measure. One registered nurse who supports the measure gave her dying husband marijuana to ease the nausea he was experiencing as a result of chemotherapy. The measure is opposed by Gov. Pete Wilson and law enforcement groups, who contend that it would lead to the legalization of the drug.

"Sweet Charity"

Movieline (09/96) Vol. 13, No. 1, P. 46; Campbell, Virginia

Actress Sharon Stone, the new spokesperson for the American Foundation for AIDS Research (AmFAR), says she is using the position to remind people of their commitment to ending AIDS. She was chosen as the organization's Chair of the Campaign for AIDS Research after delivering a speech at an AmFAR event at the Cannes film festival in 1995. Stone says she tries to persuade people to support AIDS research by telling them that the disease should not be a legacy for the next generation. Since last fall, Stone has helped raise almost a third of her three-year goal of \$76 million for AmFAR. The foundation funded some of the early work that led to the development of protease inhibitors, and it continues to support research on the use of the drugs.

"Japan's New Growth Industry: Schoolgirl Prostitution"
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"HIV/AIDS Prevention for Teens-- Video Satellite Broadcast"

"Japan's New Growth Industry: Schoolgirl Prostitution"
Wall Street Journal (10/02/96) P. A14; Reitman, Valerie
A growing number of schoolgirls in Japan are turning to prostitution so they can afford such expensive designer items as a \$500 Prada purse or \$350 Louis Vuitton wallet. This materialistic reason forms a sharp contrast to a similar rise in countries such as Thailand, where the growth is born of poverty. Japanese police have called the increase an epidemic--last year they picked up 5,481 girls under 18 for prostitution and related activities, a 38 percent jump since 1995. Yoshikatsu Nakamura, Tokyo Metropolitan Police's deputy director of the juvenile division, said, "It seems that prostitution is the fashion for

kids. Kids want brand-name clothes like Chanel; their friends have them, and their parents don't give them the money," and they turn to prostitution. Tokyo Metropolitan University sociologist Shinji Miyadi predicted that 8 percent of schoolgirls across Japan, and one-third of all girls not headed for college, have joined the sex industry. Furthermore, men are turning increasingly to younger girls. One factor related to the increase in schoolgirl prostitution in Japan is that health officials there do not express much concern about the rates of AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases among this population. The number of cases of AIDS, HIV, and venereal disease in Japan are admittedly fairly low, but some health officials believe that the diseases could be underreported because many people are not tested for them. "There is a possibility that many more teenagers are carriers and aren't reflected in the statistics," said Taku Kato, director of an AIDS research team at the Ministry of Health.

"High Court to Say If the Dying Have a Right to Suicide"

The Supreme Court agreed Tuesday to rule on whether the Constitution allows terminally ill patients the right to doctor-assisted suicide. The case was brought through appeals by the states of New York and Washington, which both recently decided that mentally competent people who were terminally ill had a constitutional right to doctor-assisted suicide. In its acceptance of the appeals, the Supreme Court has placed itself in the center of a debate that has deeply divided the country. The Supreme Court ruled six years ago that a Missouri woman in a vegetative state that was being kept alive had the right to die, but its decision was a tentative one. It acknowledged only a mild "liberty interest" in preventing unwanted treatment, based on the 14th Amendment's statement against depriving "any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law." Based on the decision in that case, as well as different constitutional extrapolations, the two appeals courts said that there was no real difference between ending medical treatment that is artificially prolonging life and taking steps to hurry the moment of death. The challenge to the New York law against assisted suicide, which dates from the 19th century, was brought in Federal District Court in 1994 by three physicians and three terminally ill patients, two of whom were in the final stages of AIDS.

"Haitian Radio Program Claims AIDS Doesn't Exist"
Richmond Times-Dispatch (10/02/96) P. A2

At least four Haitian AIDS patients have reportedly stopped seeing their doctors after a popular Miami-based Haitian radio talk show panel told listeners that AIDS does not exist. Psychologist Henri-Claude Saint-Fleur; Haitian physician Francelot Moise, who is not licensed to practice in Florida; and talk show host Claude Aubry argued that AIDS was created by U.S. pharmaceutical companies bent on boosting business and stifling Haitian population growth, and that therefore, people should discontinue their use of both medication and condoms. The show

has been airing on Miami's WLQY-AM for the past three years.

"Animal Study Points to HIV Risk With Progesterone Contraceptives"

New research reported in the October issue of Nature Medicine indicates that progesterone treatment increased the risk of vaginal transmission of SIV in monkeys by thinning the vaginal epithelium. "Progesterone treatment also increased the number of SIV DNA-positive cells in the vaginal lamina propria," the researchers report, noting that the findings suggest that "women may be at greater risk of HIV infection from vaginal intercourse when exposed to high levels of endogenous or exogenous progesterone." The actual amount of increased potential risk, however, cannot be determined.

"HHV-6 a Possible Cofactor in AIDS Retinitis, Maybe in AIDS Itself"

Two new studies provide evidence that human herpes virus 6 (HHV-6) plays a role in AIDS-associated retinitis, and may even be a cofactor with HIV in the pathogenesis of AIDS. Anne-Marie Fillet and her colleagues in Paris suspected the presence of "an etiological link between HHV-6 and AIDS-associated retinitis" because of the "ubiquitous nature of HHV-6 and its genomic relationship with cytomegalovirus." They report in the Journal of Medical Virology that HHV-6 was found to be present in three cases of AIDS-associated retinitis, but not in a control group and concluded that "HHV-6 infects the retina but ... does not have an exclusive causative role in AIDS-associated retinitis. Meanwhile, another group of researchers, led by Donald R. Carrigan, report in the Journal of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndromes and Human Retrovirology that their research shows that "at the time of autopsy every patient with AIDS has an active infection with HHV-6 in essentially every tissue." The researchers conclude, therefore, that HHV-6A, a particular strain of the virus, is a necessary, but not sufficient, component in the pathogenesis of AIDS.

"Lafépe Produces Anti-AIDS Drug"

SABI Wire Service (10/01/96)

Lafépe has initiated production of ganciclovir, a drug for the treatment of AIDS. The laboratory, which is owned by the government of Pernambuco state, is also a supplier of another anti-AIDS drug, AZT, to the Brazilian drugs agency Ceme. About \$600,000 was provided by Ceme for research and development of ganciclovir. The domestic drug will cost almost half the amount of the imported version.

"Glaxo Wellcome Foresees Twenty New Drug Launches"

Reuters (09/30/96)

As part of its strategy to offset declining sales of the anti-ulcer drug Zantac, Glaxo Wellcome plans to introduce 20 new drugs onto the market by the end of the century, reports Glaxo

CEO Richard Sykes. He added that the six main areas where the company aimed to strengthen its leadership were in HIV/AIDS, herpes, asthma, viral, migraine and epilepsy drugs. Sykes noted that while Glaxo products for the treatment of asthma already have a 25 percent share of the worldwide market, the drug maker still sees room for growth in that area. "We are still underrepresented in the U.S. market, which we split with Schering-Plough." New drugs to treat herpes also have potential, said Sykes, since a large number of herpes patients are still treated with OTC drugs.

"Perinatal HIV Transmission Declines"

AIDS Alert (09/96) Vol. 11, No. 9, P. 108

Perinatal transmission of HIV has decreased in the past two years, but improvements in prenatal care may be necessary for further progress, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Research shows that such transmission dropped from 21 percent to 10 percent after the agency developed guidelines for treating HIV-positive mothers with AZT. About 1,600 infants are infected with HIV each year in the United States. To lower the rates of perinatal transmission further, more prenatal care early in pregnancy will be necessary, says CDC Director of the National Center for HIV, STD, and TB Prevention Helene Gayle. The use of AZT therapy varies among doctors and hospitals, although it is readily available at many hospitals, the CDC said.

"Ballot Propositions: Medical Marijuana"

California Journal (09/96) Vol. 27, No. 9, P. 13; Bathen, Sigrid

Proposition 215, a ballot initiative that would provide seriously ill patients with access to marijuana, will be decided by California voters in November. Advocates say the drug benefits patients suffering from cancer, anorexia, AIDS, chronic pain, spasticity, glaucoma, and other illnesses. Patients would be able to use the drug only if they have approval from a licensed physician. Californians for Medical Rights, a group that includes doctors and nurses, has organized a media campaign to win support for the measure. One registered nurse who supports the measure gave her dying husband marijuana to ease the nausea he was experiencing as a result of chemotherapy. The measure is opposed by Gov. Pete Wilson and law enforcement groups, who contend that it would lead to the legalization of the drug.

"Sweet Charity"

Actress Sharon Stone, the new spokesperson for the American Foundation for AIDS Research (AmFAR), says she is using the position to remind people of their commitment to ending AIDS. She was chosen as the organization's Chair of the Campaign for AIDS Research after delivering a speech at an AmFAR event at the Cannes film festival in 1995. Stone says she tries to persuade people to support AIDS research by telling them that the disease should not be a legacy for the next generation. Since last fall,

Stone has helped raise almost a third of her three-year goal of \$76 million for AmFAR. The foundation funded some of the early work that led to the development of protease inhibitors, and it continues to support research on the use of the drugs.

Thank you for your message about the AIDS epidemic. I'm glad you took the time to let me know your views.

This past year has brought new reason for hope and optimism. New drugs are showing very promising results in halting the progress of HIV disease. But too many of our friends and loved ones are dying of this terrible disease and there is a great deal of work to do. I am committed to building on our work and strengthening our national leadership in the war against AIDS.

That is why I am so pleased by the recent enactment of the Omnibus Appropriations and Immigration Act of 1996. That new law includes substantial, across

"California Law Chief Takes Drug Fight to 'Doonesbury'"

California Attorney General Dan Lungren, who was identified on Tuesday in a "Doonesbury" cartoon as the man who organized a raid of San Francisco's Cannabis Buyers' Club, called a press conference on Wednesday to criticize the strip. The club claimed to provide marijuana only for medical relief, to people suffering from illnesses like cancer and AIDS. A upcoming proposition on the California ballot will ask voters to decide whether marijuana should be legalized for medical use or not. The "Doonesbury" strip, written by Gary Trudeau, has taken up the issue, generating complaints from Lungren.

"Letter Writer Finally Gets White House Attention"

Stephanie Honore, a 17-year-old from Columbus, Ohio, threatened to blow up the White House after four letters she wrote to the president were not answered. The letters concerned AIDS, education, animal rights, and the environment. Her fifth letter, which also wished President Clinton dead and directed an obscenity at him, got Stephanie a visit by Secret Service agents, but no charges will be filed since no criminal intent was apparent, the Secret Service said.

"Protein May Aid HIV Treatment Without Side-Effects"

Scientists at the University of Bern, Switzerland, announced Wednesday that they have found a protein that can help treat HIV. Marco Baggiolini and colleagues wrote in a letter to the journal *Nature* that they found that a modified form of a natural chemokine known as RANTES blocks HIV's entry into certain white blood cells without the side effect similar treatments cause. Chemokines bind to cell-surface receptors, which HIV needs to infect a cell.

"Feature: Senegal--The Spectre of AIDS"

In the town of Ourossogui, Senegal, the number of HIV infections is increasing--a trend attributed to men who travel for long periods and bring the virus home with them. Among the cases recorded for 1996, two-thirds of the carriers were men. Prospective blood donors are often found to be infected, including one man who was to give blood to his wife who was giving birth. An education program has been launched, but is ineffective due to a language barrier and a lack of teaching materials.

"Baltimore May Head AIDS Vaccine Panel"

Science (09/20/96) Vol. 273, No. 5282, P. 1647

David Baltimore, of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, may be named director of the new AIDS Vaccine Research Committee, an organization being set up to take over the U.S. government's AIDS vaccine research effort. The new group is being created at the suggestion of a panel of scientists who conducted a review last spring of AIDS research at the National Institutes of Health. The panel recommended that the NIH's \$125 million AIDS vaccine research engine be restructured and operated by a committee directed by "a distinguished, non-government scientist." Baltimore said he has been discussing the position with government officials, but noted that he has not made a decision yet and that he does not have a deadline.

"Adultery: A New Furor Over an Old Sin"

Newsweek (09/30/96) Vol. 128, No. 14, P. 54; Adler, Jerry

Americans' attitudes about adultery have changed over the last two decades, as have their views of marriage and fidelity. A 1974 survey found that, while a majority of every age group said that adultery was "always wrong," the smallest percentage, 59 percent, was among those aged 18 to 29. Now in their 40s, 74 percent of this same group condemned adultery. People in their 20s now have the most conservative sexual values, the survey found. Other results of a Newsweek poll indicated that half of those surveyed said adultery was wrong because it is immoral, 25 percent disapproved because it can end a marriage, while 17 percent said it was wrong because of the risk of AIDS and other diseases.

Thank you for your recent letter regarding provision of care to Native Americans living with HIV/AIDS.

The Clinton Administration is firmly committed to assisting Native Americans who are living with HIV/AIDS in obtaining high

-quality medical care while we work together to protect all Native Americans from HIV infection.

On September 27, the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) announced the award of 19 Special Project of National Significance (SPNS) grants under the Ryan White CARE Act totaling \$7.1 million. Included in those grants is an award of \$200,000 to the Navajo Nation as part of a five

-year \$1 million project to provide care to Native Americans who are members of that nation. While the National Native American AIDS Prevention Center did not receive a SPNS grant this year, HRSA will work with NNAAPC and its partners to assure the continuity of care being provided to Native Americans across the country. HRSA also will provide NNAAPC and other Native American organizations with technical assistance to help identify sources of support. Finally, in a collaboration with the Indian Health Service, HRSA's AIDS Education and Training Center program will help train health care professionals to provide AIDS care at IHS facilities.

"Protein May Aid HIV Treatment Without Side-Effects"

Scientists at the University of Bern, Switzerland, announced Wednesday that they have found a protein that can help treat HIV. Marco Baggiolini and colleagues wrote in a letter to the journal Nature that they found that a modified form of a natural chemokine known as RANTES blocks HIV's entry into certain white blood cells without the side effect similar treatments cause. Chemokines bind to cell-surface receptors, which HIV needs to infect a cell.

"Feature: Senegal--The Spectre of AIDS"

In the town of Ourossogui, Senegal, the number of HIV infections is increasing--a trend attributed to men who travel for long periods and bring the virus home with them. Among the cases recorded for 1996, two-thirds of the carriers were men. Prospective blood donors are often found to be infected, including one man who was to give blood to his wife who was giving birth. An education program has been launched, but is ineffective due to a language barrier and a lack of teaching materials.

"Baltimore May Head AIDS Vaccine Panel"

David Baltimore, of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, may be named director of the new AIDS Vaccine Research Committee, an organization being set up to take over the U.S. government's AIDS vaccine research effort. The new group is being created at the suggestion of a panel of scientists who conducted a review last spring of AIDS research at the National Institutes of Health. The panel recommended that the NIH's \$125 million AIDS vaccine research engine be restructured and operated by a committee directed by "a distinguished, non-government scientist." Baltimore said he has been discussing the position

with government officials, but noted that he has not made a decision yet and that he does not have a deadline.

"Adultery: A New Furor Over an Old Sin"

Newsweek (09/30/96) Vol. 128, No. 14, P. 54; Adler, Jerry

Americans' attitudes about adultery have changed over the last two decades, as have their views of marriage and fidelity. A 1974 survey found that, while a majority of every age group said that adultery was "always wrong," the smallest percentage, 59 percent, was among those aged 18 to 29. Now in their 40s, 74 percent of this same group condemned adultery. People in their 20s now have the most conservative sexual values, the survey found. Other results of a Newsweek poll indicated that half of those surveyed said adultery was wrong because it is immoral, 25 percent disapproved because it can end a marriage, while 17 percent said it was wrong because of the risk of AIDS and other diseases.

U.S. pharmaceutical firm Merck is planning to give its new AIDS drug Crixivan (indinavir) a single price across the European Union as part of an effort to stop the practice of traders purchasing drugs in low-cost Southern Europe and re-selling them in higher-priced northern markets. The drug will be one of the first products to be priced according to the Ecu, a weighted average of European currencies. Merck notes that the Ecu pricing decision is also in anticipation of the eventual launch of a single currency in Europe. Crixivan will cost Ecu9.64, or about \$12.24 in U.S. currency, for a one-day supply.

"Pataki Signs Bill on Managed Care for Poor"

New York Gov. George E. Pataki signed a bill Thursday that will put over 2 million Medicaid recipients into managed care networks by early 1997. The exceptions will be those people who are in nursing homes and other institutions. The law will also allow the state to certify "special needs" managed care plans for recipients who are infected with HIV or who require psychiatric care. Officials anticipate that the law will save \$1.5 billion in medical costs over the coming five years. New York's current Medicaid expenditures total about \$25 billion a year in federal, state, and local funds. To ease concerns of consumer groups, the legislation requires that all participants must be counseled on how a managed care plan works before they sign up, and they must also be offered a choice of at least two plans.

"HMOs May Not Always Be Best for Long-Term Ills"

A new study from New England Medical Center professor John E. Ware Jr. and his associates highlights issues concerning how well elderly and poor people with chronic illnesses are served by health maintenance organizations (HMOs). The report suggests that HMOs may not be the best choice for senior citizens and others with long-term health problems because HMOs are often not eager to assume the costly and complicated problems of those with long-term, progressive conditions that may require multiple visits to specialists and intensive daily management. Ware and his associates concluded that over a four-year period, "elderly and poor chronically ill patients had worse physical health outcomes in HMOs than in FFS [fee-for-service] systems."

"Doctor's AIDS Infection Was Labor Accident"

Xinhua News Agency (10/03/96)

A French court decided on Thursday that the HIV infection of a doctor while he was conducting a surgery in 1983 should be described as "a labor accident," a designation that had previously been reached by a committee of experts. The Tribunal of Social Security Affairs, under the Versaille Tribunal, said,

"The recognition of the professional disease today has been made without objection." Three weeks after cutting his finger during an operation in May 1983, Doctor Patrick Cohen began to suffer from mono-nucleus infection, which is now recognized as one of the preliminary syndromes in AIDS patients. Cohen has filed a lawsuit against the French government and the hospital for failing to take proper precautions to prevent the transmission of the virus.

"Japan Arrests Health Official in HIV Scandal"

Akihito Matsumura, former head of the Japanese Health Ministry's Biologics and Antibiotics Division, was arrested on Friday on charges of professional negligence that resulted in two deaths from HIV-contaminated blood products. Matsumura is the first government official to be arrested in the country's tainted blood scandal. He is accused of failing to order the recall of untreated blood products even though he understood that such products could be contaminated with the virus that causes AIDS. Three current and former presidents of Green Cross Corp., as well as the former head of a Health Ministry AIDS research team, have also been arrested on charges relating to the scandal.

"Tanzania: Quality Control Needed for Condoms"

Africa Information Afrique (10/03/96); Kasumuni, Ludger

Medical and social workers are expressing concerns about the quality of condoms sold in Tanzania, because most condoms on the market there have passed their expiration date, making them prone to lost elasticity and increased breakage. Expired condoms that do not carry expiration dates, manufactured in 1992 by U.S. company Aladan Corp., have been discovered at the Centre for Education Development in Health, Arusha and the Municipal Council headquarters, raising fears that there may be a nationwide rash of unwanted pregnancies and sexually transmitted diseases. Timothy Manchester, Director of Tanzania AIDS Project (TAP), notes that his organization does not sell expired condoms, adding that every lot of condoms in any consignment is tested by the Tanzanian Bureau of Standard. TAP, which imports and buys condoms from the South African company Suitex and the Malaysian company Sagami, has sold more than 20 million condoms over the past three years. According to the National AIDS Control Program, recent data has determined that at least 800,000 people have been infected with HIV in Tanzania, which has a population of 30 million.

"Malawi: Family Planning and Sex Education Not [Effective]"

Africa Information Afrique (10/03/96); Livuza, Anthony

New statistics on teenage pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases in Malawi have raised concerns about the efficacy of government and Family Life education efforts. In the country, which has 11 million citizens, the rate of child mortality is 234 per 1000, and the maternal mortality rate stands at 6.2 per 1000. Moreover, in the past two years alone, sexually transmitted diseases among both men and women have increased about 20 percent

a year. One million residents are thought to be infected with HIV, and some 200,000 have already died of AIDS. The trends are attributed in large part to government neglect, including the fact that sex education is still not taught in primary and secondary schools. In Malawi, only about 7 percent of the women employ family planning methods. An additional 6 percent use traditional contraceptive methods--tying a medicinal string around a woman's waist or abstinence for periods of up to a year--but health officials note that the efficacy of these techniques is not even one percent.

"Or Is it the Host, Sir?"

Journal of the International Association of Physicians in AIDS Care (09/96) Vol. 2, No. 9, P. 8; Mascolini, Mark

Recent research suggests that the immune system's initial response to HIV infection can predict the rate of disease progression. Drs. Timothy Schacker and Lawrence Corey, from the University of Washington in Seattle, have reported that the viral set point, the level of virus reached after the immune system's initial reaction, is established about six months after infection. In addition, Dr. Giuseppe Panteleo, of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, has provided some clues about what happens during those first six months. At the Ninth International Symposium on Infections in the Immunocompromised Host, Pantaleo reported that disease progression in 21 newly-infected patients was linked to the patients' initial immune response. He divided the patients into three groups, depending on their immune reaction. Patients with only one kind of CD8 T cells were found to lose their CD4 T cells more quickly than patients with more diverse sets of immune cells. Other research reported at the conference included advances in using thalidomide to control levels of tumor necrosis factor alpha in people with HIV, tuberculosis (TB) or both. A study on the link between HIV and TB was also presented, as well as research on prophylaxis for Mycobacterium avium complex and other opportunistic infections.

"AIDS Update"

American Health (09/96) Vol. 15, No. 7, P. 14; Beim, Amy

Intravenous drug use is responsible for most HIV infections in women and heterosexuals in the United States, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The agency reported that 85 percent of AIDS cases among heterosexual men and 66 percent of cases among women reported last year were transmitted either by shared needles or through sexual contact with a drug user. The CDC also reported that, since 1991, the number of infants born in the United States infected with HIV has declined. The number peaked at 1,760 that year, and dropped to 1,630 in 1993. CDC researchers predict the number will fall even more next year, due to new guidelines that recommend HIV testing and counseling for all pregnant women.

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New York Gov. George E. Pataki signed a bill Thursday that

will put over 2 million Medicaid recipients into managed care networks by early 1997. The exceptions will be those people who are in nursing homes and other institutions. The law will also allow the state to certify "special needs" managed care plans for recipients who are infected with HIV or who require psychiatric care. Officials anticipate that the law will save \$1.5 billion in medical costs over the coming five years. New York's current Medicaid expenditures total about \$25 billion a year in federal, state, and local funds. To ease concerns of consumer groups, the legislation requires that all participants must be counseled on how a managed care plan works before they sign up, and they must also be offered a choice of at least two plans.

"HMOs May Not Always Be Best for Long-Term Ills"

Wall Street Journal (10/04/96) P. C1; Jeffrey, Nancy Ann

A new study from New England Medical Center professor John E. Ware Jr. and his associates highlights issues concerning how well elderly and poor people with chronic illnesses are served by health maintenance organizations (HMOs). The report suggests that HMOs may not be the best choice for senior citizens and others with long-term health problems because HMOs are often not eager to assume the costly and complicated problems of those with long-term, progressive conditions that may require multiple visits to specialists and intensive daily management. Ware and his associates concluded that over a four-year period, "elderly and poor chronically ill patients had worse physical health outcomes in HMOs than in FFS [fee-for-service] systems."

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"Japan Arrests Health Official in HIV Scandal"

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Akihito Matsumura, former head of the Japanese Health Ministry's Biologics and Antibiotics Division, was arrested on Friday on charges of professional negligence that resulted in two deaths from HIV-contaminated blood products. Matsumura is the first government official to be arrested in the country's tainted blood scandal. He is accused of failing to order the recall of untreated blood products even though he understood that such products could be contaminated with the virus that causes AIDS.

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"Tanzania: Quality Control Needed for Condoms"

Africa Information Afrique (10/03/96); Kasumuni, Ludger

Medical and social workers are expressing concerns about the quality of condoms sold in Tanzania, because most condoms on the market there have passed their expiration date, making them prone to lost elasticity and increased breakage. Expired condoms that do not carry expiration dates, manufactured in 1992 by U.S. company Aladan Corp., have been discovered at the Centre for Education Development in Health, Arusha and the Municipal Council headquarters, raising fears that there may be a nationwide rash of unwanted pregnancies and sexually transmitted diseases. Timothy Manchester, Director of Tanzania AIDS Project (TAP), notes that his organization does not sell expired condoms, adding that every lot of condoms in any consignment is tested by the Tanzanian Bureau of Standard. TAP, which imports and buys condoms from the South African company Suitex and the Malaysian company Sagami, has sold more than 20 million condoms over the past three years. According to the National AIDS Control Program, recent data has determined that at least 800,000 people have been infected with HIV in Tanzania, which has a population of 30 million.

"Malawi: Family Planning and Sex Education Not [Effective]"

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New statistics on teenage pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases in Malawi have raised concerns about the efficacy of government and Family Life education efforts. In the country, which has 11 million citizens, the rate of child mortality is 234 per 1000, and the maternal mortality rate stands at 6.2 per 1000. Moreover, in the past two years alone, sexually transmitted diseases among both men and women have increased about 20 percent a year. One million residents are thought to be infected with HIV, and some 200,000 have already died of AIDS. The trends are attributed in large part to government neglect, including the fact that sex education is still not taught in primary and secondary schools. In Malawi, only about 7 percent of the women employ family planning methods. An additional 6 percent use traditional contraceptive methods--tying a medicinal string around a woman's waist or abstinence for periods of up to a year--but health officials note that the efficacy of these techniques is not even one percent.

"Or Is it the Host, Sir?"

Journal of the International Association of Physicians in AIDS Care (09/96) Vol. 2, No. 9, P. 8; Mascolini, Mark

Recent research suggests that the immune system's initial response to HIV infection can predict the rate of disease progression. Drs. Timothy Schacker and Lawrence Corey, from the University of Washington in Seattle, have reported that the viral set point, the level of virus reached after the immune system's

initial reaction, is established about six months after infection. In addition, Dr. Giuseppe Panteleo, of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, has provided some clues about what happens during those first six months. At the Ninth International Symposium on Infections in the Immunocompromised Host, Pantaleo reported that disease progression in 21 newly-infected patients was linked to the patients' initial immune response. He divided the patients into three groups, depending on their immune reaction. Patients with only one kind of CD8 T cells were found to lose their CD4 T cells more quickly than patients with more diverse sets of immune cells. Other research reported at the conference included advances in using thalidomide to control levels of tumor necrosis factor alpha in people with HIV, tuberculosis (TB) or both. A study on the link between HIV and TB was also presented, as well as research on prophylaxis for Mycobacterium avium complex and other opportunistic infections.

"AIDS Update"

American Health (09/96) Vol. 15, No. 7, P. 14; Beim, Amy

Intravenous drug use is responsible for most HIV infections in women and heterosexuals in the United States, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The agency reported that 85 percent of AIDS cases among heterosexual men and 66 percent of cases among women reported last year were transmitted either by shared needles or through sexual contact with a drug user. The CDC also reported that, since 1991, the number of infants born in the United States infected with HIV has declined. The number peaked at 1,760 that year, and dropped to 1,630 in 1993. CDC researchers predict the number will fall even more next year, due to new guidelines that recommend HIV testing and counseling for all pregnant women.

Here's my stab at pulling our conversation together -- along with some opinions, of course. If you get me comments by COB Tuesday, I will try to do another iteration of this before we meet again on Thursday.

Problem: There is an apparent disparity between the quality of health care offered by managed care programs and fee

-for

-service

plans. (Note: we do not need to be bashing managed care in order to see this as a problem -- we can cite the litany of examples of problems -- that reflect a real problem and have created a level of public concern that need not apply to the concept of managed care, just to its implementation in some settings. This can be kept in mind as we choose a solution -- one that does not penalize those managed care plans that may be effective.)

Audience for analysis: Either the chair of the House health subcommittee or the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

Who we are: Either the professional staff of the subcommittee or the professional staff in the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation at HHS.

Background: Trend toward managed care, in both public and private settings as a cost

-saving device and an approach that might offer more coordinated, comprehensive care; the government has

encouraged this trend; at the same time there are a number of studies suggesting problems in quality of care delivered through HMOs (JAMA study is the most recent in a litany) -- which has led to a call for a governmental response to assure quality in these settings. Some states have responded by considering managed care bills of rights for consumers (NY passed; CA initiative, etc.); others have passed specific requirements for delivery of medical care (federal example -- 48 hour rule for childbirth); most have expressed concern but done nothing.

Options:

(1) Let the marketplace resolve this problem. If consumers are unhappy, they will force change. (Major problem: when employers don't give consumers options, or states require Medicaid managed care -- there is not a true marketplace to resolve this.)

(2) This is a simple matter of economics: where reimbursement or per capita rates are high enough, quality of care follows. Potential solution: mandate higher rates for providers. (Major problems: cost to public sector with higher Medicaid and Medicare costs; unprecedented intrusion in private marketplace if this were to cover private plans.)

(3) This is a medical practice problem. Legislate the solution, as in the 48 hour childbirth requirement. (Major problems: where do you stop? Should Congress or state legislatures be making these medical decisions? It's easy on the 48 hour rule; but there are many more complex issues involved.)

(4) This is a consumer protection issue. We can:

(a) leave it to the states;

(b) have the federal government play a role by:

(i) legislating requirements for the public and private sectors

(ii) legislating requirements for the public sector only

(iii) imposing administrative requirements on Medicare and Medicaid

(Note: Recommending this option does not require defining what would be in that bill of rights -- it might list the kinds of protections that this usually encompasses, but being the good policy analysts that we are -- we would not proceed down the path of defining what this would look like until the political decision makers ruled on whether this is the right way to go.)

Criteria for evaluation of options:

(1) Equity (In this case it will focus mostly on the reach of our solution -- for example, if we only do Medicaid and Medicare, are we leaving lots of people out of the solution -- or can we say these are the most vulnerable populations and therefore we are satisfying an equity criterion? This can also mean not penalizing those plans that are offering quality care -- thus, for example, why impose reimbursement rates on plans that are offering cheaper but good quality care? Instead, try to adopt strategies that focus on those who are a problem without unduly burdening others.)

(2) Cost effectiveness

(3) Practical feasibility (can it work? will it solve all or a

significant part of the problem?)
(4) Political feasibility

The AIDSWALK Washington, held on Sunday, raised \$2.1 million for the Whitman-Walker Clinic, the largest provider of health care and legal services for AIDS patients. The number of participants in the event has grown over the past ten years, from 400 or 500 the first year to 20,000 this year. Homosexuals and heterosexuals, whites and blacks, city residents and suburbanites participated in the 10-kilometer walk. In his speech to the crowd, Washington, D.C. Mayor Marion Barry emphasized the toll AIDS has taken on the black community, and urged black churches to help fight the disease. In the city, 60 percent of AIDS patients are African-Americans.

"Arrest in Japan's AIDS Scandal"

Wall Street Journal (10/07/96) P. A18

A former official in Japan's Ministry of Health was arrested on reported charges of professional negligence for his role in the tainted blood scandal. Akihito Matsummura was responsible for ensuring the safety of plasma blood products in 1985, when the government approved heat-treated blood products for sale. Several Japanese pharmaceutical companies are accused of continuing to distribute unheated products until their stocks were depleted.

"Editorial: Some Hope on Third-World AIDS"

New York Times (10/07/96) P. A16

Campaigns to curb the spread of HIV should be embraced by governments, especially in developing countries, a New York Times editorial says. It holds up a government program in Thailand that requires all sex workers in brothels to demand that clients use condoms as a good example of such a campaign. This program, enforced by the country's network of clinics, is reinforced by the promotion of condoms in schools, military bases, workplaces, and the media. A recent study showed that the campaign has resulted in more condom use and a lower incidence of HIV among newly drafted Thai soldiers. A government condom campaign in Uganda has also resulted in a lower incidence of HIV, but, the editorial says, most governments are reluctant to speak openly about sex and the threat of AIDS.

"Teens, Unwed Women Having Fewer Babies"

USA Today (10/07/96) P. 6D

The birth rate for unmarried women fell in 1995 for the first time in nearly 20 years, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported. The agency also reported that the number of AIDS-related deaths in 1995 held steady for the first time at 42,506.

"Mike Smith's Life Is Woven Into the Fabric of AIDS Quilt"

USA Today (10/07/96) P. 8D; Wilson, Craig

Mike Smith, co-founder of the NAMES Project Foundation, coordinated the first display of the AIDS quilt in 1987 and says this year's display, to open on Friday in Washington, D.C., will be his last. The quilt now has almost 40,000 panels, and covers 24 acres. It will be spread out from the U.S. Capitol to the Washington Monument. The first AIDS quilt was 1,920 panels, and began growing as family and friends of AIDS patients made panels to add to the project.

"Nationline: Grove Uses Life to Memorialize AIDS"

USA Today (10/07/96) P. 3A; Bacon, John

The 15-acre AIDS National Memorial Grove in San Francisco's Golden Gate Park will most likely be designated by legislation, expected to be signed by President Clinton, as the country's living memorial to AIDS losses.

"Inside the Beltway: Too Busy for Bill"

Washington Times (10/07/96) P. A8; McCaslin, John

After criticizing President Clinton for his "lack of compassion" for AIDS patients at an AIDS conference earlier this year, actress Elizabeth Taylor refused to take phone calls from Clinton, according to San Francisco's Bay Area Reporter. The newspaper reported that Clinton called Taylor twice at her home a few days after the speech, but that she would not take his calls.

"First HIV Baby in Indonesia Reported"

Xinhua News Agency (10/06/96)

The first case of an HIV-infected baby being born in Indonesia was reported Saturday. The government's tally of HIV cases now stands at 449. Indonesia has 108 confirmed AIDS cases, but experts estimate that up to 2.5 million people in the country could be infected with HIV by the year 2000 if precautions are not taken.

"HIV-1 Tat Protein as a Potential AIDS Vaccine"

Nature Medicine (09/96) Vol. 1, No. 9, P. 960; Goldstein, Gideon

The Tat protein is critical to HIV-1's ability to infect and destroy the immune system, and New York University Medical School's Gideon Goldstein suggests that an AIDS vaccine could be developed to take advantage of this factor. Goldstein notes that because HIV-1 is able to mutate rapidly, the conventional approach to vaccine development is not useful. Curbing the rapid viral proliferation during initial infection is important to protecting the immune system from damage. Vaccination with Tat protein, made by HIV-1's tat gene, provides a novel approach for protection because it targets a critical product of the virus rather than the virus itself. A Tat vaccine could be used for protective immunization in uninfected people as well as for the reduction of viral load in asymptomatic HIV-infected patients. The efficacy of such a vaccine in reducing in vivo viral replication and disease progression is currently being studied in preliminary clinical trials in primates.

"We're Here! We're Queer! Let's Get Coffee!"

New York (09/30/96) Vol. 29, No. 38, P. 25; Mendelsohn, Daniel

The mainstreaming of gay culture over the last ten years is illustrated by the taming of ACT UP's activist tactics. The AIDS cause was embraced by the gay activist community in the late 1980s and provided a forum for the gay culture to display its attention-grabbing style. ACT UP's political demonstrations in 1987 and 1988 had theatrical qualities, using such props as fake blood to create outrageous scenes. ACT UP has lately faded from the public eye, however, and a demonstration at July's International AIDS Conference was given little notice. The group's decline can be attributed to its success. It has met many of its goals, including representation on committees and changes at the Food and Drug Administration and the National Institutes of Health. "Once we were pariahs at the gate, and now we're inside. There was once a time to fling epithets and homilies, but that's changed," explained Jay Blotcher, director of media relations at the American Foundation for AIDS Research and a former ACT UP member. Today's AIDS activist groups do not have the ACT UP-type edge that existed in the late 1980s, when it was clear who was supposed to be offended by the outrageous tactics.

Two scientists have been awarded the 1996 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine for their discovery of how the immune system recognizes cells that are infected with viruses. Peter C. Doherty, of St. Jude's Medical Center in Memphis, and Rolf M. Zinkernagel, of the University of Zurich in Switzerland, discovered that the immune system's white blood cells must recognize two signals before attacking an infected cell. Their discovery could help scientists develop therapies for viral diseases, including AIDS; as well as autoimmune diseases like diabetes and rheumatoid arthritis.

"A Fusion of Love, Logistics"

Washington Post (10/08/96) P. C1; Wheeler, Linda

The three-day display of the AIDS Memorial Quilt in Washington, D.C., to start on Friday, will employ 10,000 volunteers and cost \$1 million. The Names Project, the San Francisco group that maintains and displays the quilt, is preparing for the event from a downtown office. The quilt has 37,856 panels, representing about 70,000 people who have died of AIDS. It first appeared in Washington in 1988, and covered the space of a city block. This year it will cover the entire Mall as well as some bordering areas.

"Rare AIDS Strains Stir Concerns"

Richmond Times-Dispatch (10/08/96) P. A14

The discovery of rare strains of HIV in the United States has led scientists to search globally for strains so that tests may be developed to detect every type. The first U.S. case of the rare Group O was found in July, and a second case was discovered this month. Additionally, another type of HIV new to the United States was found in a small group of New Yorkers. The HIV test usually used in this country does not detect Group O once in every five cases. Abbott Laboratories, however, has submitted a test to the Food and Drug Administration that is designed to better detect Group O infections. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that the patients infected with Group O contracted the virus in their native country of West Africa. The agency is now trying to determine whether the New Yorkers were infected here or abroad.

"South Africa Scandal Over 'Sarafina' Spotlights Corruption in the A.N.C."

New York Times (10/08/96) P. A6; Daley, Suzanne

The scandal surrounding the musical "Sarafina 2," sponsored by South Africa's national health department to bring an anti-AIDS message to the illiterate, is said by some to exemplify the corruption within the African National Congress (ANC). When

the musical opened last spring, AIDS experts criticized its message as unclear, and its high cost was also brought into question. Although the play closed quickly, it led many South Africans to doubt the ANC's practices and Health Commissioner Dr. Nkosazana Zuma's position. Zuma has been accused of lying to Parliament about the procedure used to fund the musical, but she has been defended by the ANC.

"AIDS Tests Join At-Home Diagnostics"

Chicago Tribune (10/07/96) P. 4-1; Hutchcraft, Chuck

The two home AIDS tests now available, Johnson & Johnson's Confide and Home Access Health's Home Access, may soon be joined by a test that uses a person's saliva rather than a blood sample to test for HIV antibodies. SmithKline Beecham's OraSure, now only available through doctors' offices and clinics, may later be introduced in the home-testing market. The home AIDS test is the most controversial home test available, and has been opposed by the American Medical Association since 1989. The organization will likely reconsider its position this year, however, an official said.

"Red Cross Urges Compensation"

Toronto Globe and Mail (10/07/96) P. A1; McIlroy, Anne

The leader of the Canadian Red Cross has urged federal and provincial health ministers to offer financial compensation to the 12,000 Canadians who contracted hepatitis C through tainted blood products in the 1980s. Secretary-General Douglas Lindores said the Red Cross would contribute to the compensation fund, which he says is necessary for the reform of the blood system. Hepatitis C, which causes liver damage, is fatal in one of five cases. Canadians infected with HIV through the blood system have already been offered financial assistance.

"Elders Says Record as Surgeon General Requires No Regrets"

Washington Times (10/08/96) P. A6; Price, Joyce

Former Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders says she does not regret any of her actions during her tenure, and that she is not disturbed that she has become a campaign issue. She confirmed a report that the Clinton administration was prepared to lift a ban on federal funding for needle-exchange programs in 1994 but reversed the decision when the Congress became dominated by Republicans. The proposed lifting of the ban was in response to five studies that showed needle exchanges reduced the spread of HIV but did not result in increased drug use.

Police in California confiscated brownies from a booth set up by the activist group ACT UP to promote Proposition 215, which would legalize medical uses of marijuana. The police say they will return the brownies if no drugs are found in them.

"Japan's HIV Blood Scandal Broadens Out"

Nature (09/26/96) Vol. 383, No. 6598, P. 291; Swinbanks, David

Three arrests were made recently in Japan's tainted blood scandal, and others are expected as more attention is given to non-hemophiliacs who contracted HIV from contaminated blood products. The president and two former presidents of Green Cross Corp. were arrested in a case involving the death of a non-hemophiliac who was treated with blood products supplied by the company. A memo confiscated from the company, reportedly written by then-president Renzo Matsushita and sent to employees, claimed that the company's non-heat-treated products were safer than heat-treated products because they were made from domestic blood plasma, rather than plasma imported from the U.S. In fact, however, nearly all of the firm's blood products were made from plasma imported from the United States. The executives are suspected of overlooking the risk of HIV in their promotion of non-heat-treated products in 1986. The company did not stop distributing its non-heat-treated products until 1988, two years after it reported to the government that the withdrawal had been completed. Just this year, it has become known that thousands of non-hemophiliacs had been treated with the non-heat-treated products, and that most of the patients cannot be located.

"Editorial: AIDS Clinic Deserves Support"

Crain's Chicago Business (09/23/96) Vol. 19, No. 39, P. 12

Businesses in the Chicago area are urged, in an editorial in Crain's Chicago Business, to contribute to a proposed \$25 million project that will provide outpatient care for people with HIV and AIDS-related health problems. The joint project by Cook County Hospital and Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center would provide less costly care in a more effective manner than a hospital setting would. The project has received \$15.8 million from state and federal sources, and \$5 million from a corporate fundraising campaign led by Playboy Enterprises, Inc. The hospitals, which in any one night provide inpatient care to nearly 100 HIV-positive people, agree that an outpatient center could reduce inpatient days for HIV-related illnesses by 30 percent.

Private School Voucher Issue Talking Points

from Secretary Richard W. Riley

October 7, 1996

I talked with the President about an hour ago about the debate.

We discussed this private school voucher issue, since we had some inquiries on this question. He told me that, regarding private school vouchers, there is nothing new in his position as presented last night.

The President supports giving families and students more choices in public education, and the best example of that is funding for charter schools (3000 in his balanced budget over 7 years).

But the President opposes the use of Federal funds for private school vouchers.

For other than Federal funds, these are state and local decisions; but the President said he personally would not support a voucher plan that either was unconstitutional or that would shift funds from public schools to private schools. In 1993 in California, he said: "...if I were a citizen of the state of California, I would not vote for Proposition 174, The Private Voucher Initiative."

That was his position before the debate, during the debate, and that is his position after the debate.

I might add that the Federal government helps poor children regardless of where they go to school -- in such programs as Title I and the school lunch program. We stood up against the Republican Congress when they tried to take funds away from those programs.

The President has been a leader in support of education and has made it a national priority at every level.

Problem: There is an apparent disparity between the quality of health care offered by managed care programs and fee-for-service plans. probably due to: 1. incentives for cost containment provided by HMO 2. Large organizational structure of HMO which delivers economies of scale but diffuses personal responsibility, something important in health care 3. restriction of market outlet, e.g. no choice among plans or doctors to counteract faulty service

Audience for analysis: Either the chair of the House health subcommittee or the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

Who we are: Either the professional staff of the subcommittee or the professional staff in the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation at HHS.

Background: Trend toward managed care, in both public and private settings as a cost-saving device and an approach that might offer more coordinated, comprehensive care; the government has encouraged this trend; at the same time there are a number of studies suggesting problems in quality of care delivered through HMOs (JAMA study is the most recent in a litany) -- which has led to a call for a governmental response to assure quality in these settings. Some states have responded by considering managed care bills of rights for consumers (NY passed; CA initiative, etc.); others have passed specific requirements for delivery of medical care (federal example -- 48 hour rule for childbirth); actually 33 states passed HMO legislation of some kind last year - so this is legislation whose time may well have arrived. Many

predicted fragmentation in the health care market with the fall of National Health Reform and we may be seeing this unfold. (reminds me of exit, voice, and loyalty)

In addition to anecdotal evidence, can cite the JAMA article, 1994 Commonwealth Fund Managed Care Survey, and others that cite dissatisfaction among sicker and poorer subpopulations as well as insignificant difference between Managed Care and FFS in regulated Minnesota Market. As well as movement to managed care by Medicare and most state Medicaid programs.

Options:

(1) Status Quo: Let the marketplace resolve this problem. If consumers are unhappy, they will force change. (Major problem: when employers don't give consumers options, or states require Medicaid managed care -- there is not a true marketplace to resolve this.)

(2) This is a simple matter of economics: where reimbursement or per capita rates are high enough, quality of care follows. Potential solution: mandate higher rates for providers. (Major problems: cost to public sector with higher Medicaid and Medicare costs; unprecedented intrusion in private marketplace if this were to cover private plans.) Addresses (1.) cost incentive problem

(3) FOIA and monitoring for HMO quality (legislated or brokered): require report of HEDIS information, require accreditation, report cards, in general, make more information available to the consumer. This would help individuals choose between plans (3.), when possible, and might help to improve organization responsiveness (2.)

(4) This is a medical practice problem. Legislate the solution, as in the 48 hour childbirth requirement. (Major problems: where do you stop? Should Congress or state legislatures be making these medical decisions? It's easy on the 48 hour rule; but there are many more complex issues involved.) Addresses all three problems by eliminating cost or organization considerations.. as everyone agrees, its not good medicine

(5) Provide Independent Review Authority by the State: An ombudsman or independent authority under the Insurance Commissioner to appeal any and all HMO decisions. This would provide a counter incentive to (1.) cost-cutting incentives and (2.) organizational inefficiency and (3.) would provide a "voice" where there is no market exit.

(6) This is a consumer protection issue. We can: Legislating consumer protections would provide a counter influence to (1.) cost-cutting incentives and might encourage better (2.) organization

(a) leave it to the states greater flexibility to meet the needs of individual markets, however, this isn't compelling for basic consumer protections which have usually been federal; On the other hand, we are making a federal recommendation and states always can continue to pass more

restrictive legislation for non ERISA employees.

(b) have the federal government play a role by:

Arguments for federal standards include uniform rules for both managed care and businesses to plan by, rather than programmatic change for each state, and Federal legislation captures individuals under ERISA who are exempt from State legislation.

(i) legislating requirements for the public and private sectors

(ii) legislating requirements for the public sector only

(iii) imposing administrative requirements on Medicare and Medicaid (I think this is about the same as ii)

(iv) Legislate package of basic standards (like HR2400)

(v) Address the program piecemeal - legislating different consumer protections as they become necessary

I think that we should list the possible options considered to date, We can list the components from the Families USA piece which is the most comprehensive list I have seen. We can say that this is hardly an exhaustive list, but provides insight into complexity of such a proposition.

Criteria for evaluation of options: I have to think about these more - but I can't imagine that we wouldn't use the ones listed below

(1) Equity (In this case it will focus mostly on the reach of our solution -- for example, if we only do Medicaid and Medicare, are we leaving lots of people out of the solution -- or can we say these are the most vulnerable populations and therefore we are satisfying an equity criterion? This can also mean not penalizing those plans that are offering quality care -- thus, for example, why impose reimbursement rates on plans that are offering cheaper but good quality care? Instead, try to adopt strategies that focus on those who are a problem without unduly burdening others.)

(2) Cost effectiveness

(3) Practical feasibility (can it work? will it solve all or a significant part of the problem?)

(4) Political feasibility

Two scientists have been awarded the 1996 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine for their discovery of how the immune system recognizes cells that are infected with viruses. Peter C. Doherty, of St. Jude's Medical Center in Memphis, and Rolf M. Zinkernagel, of the University of Zurich in Switzerland, discovered that the immune system's white blood cells must recognize two signals before attacking an infected cell. Their discovery could help scientists develop therapies for viral diseases, including AIDS; as well as autoimmune diseases like diabetes and rheumatoid arthritis.

"A Fusion of Love, Logistics"

Washington Post (10/08/96) P. C1; Wheeler, Linda

The three-day display of the AIDS Memorial Quilt in Washington, D.C, to start on Friday, will employ 10,000 volunteers and cost \$1 million. The Names Project, the San Francisco group that maintains and displays the quilt, is preparing for the event from a downtown office. The quilt has 37,856 panels, representing about 70,000 people who have died of AIDS. It first appeared in Washington in 1988, and covered the space of a city block. This year it will cover the entire Mall as well as some bordering areas.

"Rare AIDS Strains Stir Concerns"

Richmond Times-Dispatch (10/08/96) P. A14

The discovery of rare strains of HIV in the United States has led scientists to search globally for strains so that tests may be developed to detect every type. The first U.S. case of the rare Group O was found in July, and a second case was discovered this month. Additionally, another type of HIV new to the United States was found in a small group of New Yorkers. The HIV test usually used in this country does not detect Group O once in every five cases. Abbott Laboratories, however, has submitted a test to the Food and Drug Administration that is designed to better detect Group O infections. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that the patients infected with Group O contracted the virus in their native country of West Africa. The agency is now trying to determine whether the New Yorkers were infected here or abroad.

"South Africa Scandal Over 'Sarafina' Spotlights Corruption in the A.N.C."

New York Times (10/08/96) P. A6; Daley, Suzanne

The scandal surrounding the musical "Sarafina 2," sponsored by South Africa's national health department to bring an anti-AIDS message to the illiterate, is said by some to exemplify the corruption within the African National Congress (ANC). When the musical opened last spring, AIDS experts criticized its message as unclear, and its high cost was also brought into question. Although the play closed quickly, it led many South Africans to doubt the ANC's practices and Health Commissioner Dr. Nkosazana Zuma's position. Zuma has been accused of lying to Parliament about the procedure used to fund the musical, but she has been defended by the ANC.

"AIDS Tests Join At-Home Diagnostics"

Chicago Tribune (10/07/96) P. 4-1; Hutchcraft, Chuck

The two home AIDS tests now available, Johnson & Johnson's Confide and Home Access Health's Home Access, may soon be joined by a test that uses a person's saliva rather than a blood sample to test for HIV antibodies. SmithKline Beecham's OraSure, now only available through doctors' offices and clinics, may later be introduced in the home-testing market. The home AIDS test is the most controversial home test available, and has been opposed by the American Medical Association since 1989. The organization will likely reconsider its position this year, however, an

official said.

"Red Cross Urges Compensation"

Toronto Globe and Mail (10/07/96) P. A1; McIlroy, Anne

The leader of the Canadian Red Cross has urged federal and provincial health ministers to offer financial compensation to the 12,000 Canadians who contracted hepatitis C through tainted blood products in the 1980s. Secretary-General Douglas Lindores said the Red Cross would contribute to the compensation fund, which he says is necessary for the reform of the blood system. Hepatitis C, which causes liver damage, is fatal in one of five cases. Canadians infected with HIV through the blood system have already been offered financial assistance.

"Elders Says Record as Surgeon General Requires No Regrets"

Washington Times (10/08/96) P. A6; Price, Joyce

Former Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders says she does not regret any of her actions during her tenure, and that she is not disturbed that she has become a campaign issue. She confirmed a report that the Clinton administration was prepared to lift a ban on federal funding for needle-exchange programs in 1994 but reversed the decision when the Congress became dominated by Republicans. The proposed lifting of the ban was in response to five studies that showed needle exchanges reduced the spread of HIV but did not result in increased drug use.

"Across the USA: California"

USA Today (10/08/96) P. 7A

Police in California confiscated brownies from a booth set up by the activist group ACT UP to promote Proposition 215, which would legalize medical uses of marijuana. The police say they will return the brownies if no drugs are found in them.

"Japan's HIV Blood Scandal Broadens Out"

Nature (09/26/96) Vol. 383, No. 6598, P. 291; Swinbanks, David

Three arrests were made recently in Japan's tainted blood scandal, and others are expected as more attention is given to non-hemophiliacs who contracted HIV from contaminated blood products. The president and two former presidents of Green Cross Corp. were arrested in a case involving the death of a non-hemophiliac who was treated with blood products supplied by the company. A memo confiscated from the company, reportedly written by then-president Renzo Matsushita and sent to employees, claimed that the company's non-heat-treated products were safer than heat-treated products because they were made from domestic blood plasma, rather than plasma imported from the U.S. In fact, however, nearly all of the firm's blood products were made from plasma imported from the United States. The executives are suspected of overlooking the risk of HIV in their promotion of non-heat-treated products in 1986. The company did not stop distributing its non-heat-treated products until 1988, two years after it reported to the government that the withdrawal had been completed. Just this year, it has become known that thousands of non-hemophiliacs had been treated with the non-heat-treated

products, and that most of the patients cannot be located.

"Editorial: AIDS Clinic Deserves Support"

Crain's Chicago Business (09/23/96) Vol. 19, No. 39, P. 12

Businesses in the Chicago area are urged, in an editorial in Crain's Chicago Business, to contribute to a proposed \$25 million project that will provide outpatient care for people with HIV and AIDS-related health problems. The joint project by Cook County Hospital and Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center would provide less costly care in a more effective manner than a hospital setting would. The project has received \$15.8 million from state and federal sources, and \$5 million from a corporate fundraising campaign led by Playboy Enterprises, Inc. The hospitals, which in any one night provide inpatient care to nearly 100 HIV-positive people, agree that an outpatient center could reduce inpatient days for HIV-related illnesses by 30 percent.

Although U.S. drug companies had safe, heat-treated blood products available between 1983 and 1985, the Japanese government did not allow them to be imported in order to protect domestic companies. During that time, more than 1,800 Japanese hemophiliacs contracted HIV. Some 400 have already died. Many Japanese see the scandal as an example of the conflicts-of-interest that link bureaucrats and industry executives, and often put business interests before public safety. A former government official, two former drug industry executives, and one leading hemophilia researcher have been arrested on charges related to the tainted-blood scandal.

Earlier this year, current Health Minister Naoto Kan forced the government to both investigate the scandal and to reveal incriminating internal documents.

"Morrison Receives Offers to Fight"

George Foreman has said he will fight heavyweight Tommy Morrison, who announced that he wants to return to the ring despite the fact that he has HIV. Foreman is scheduled to fight Crawford Grimsley this November and has invited Morrison to fight on that undercard and reiterated his offer to fight Morrison next year. Morrison's manager Tony Holden said a Morrison may meet Foreman, but not in November.

"Prisoner's Cry of 'Rape' Is Heard"

New York Times (10/09/96) P. B1; Lorch, Donatella

Maurice J. Mathie was awaiting trial in a Suffolk County jail in New York when he claims he was raped by the chief of security. While serving 10 to 15 years in a state prison on manslaughter charges, Mathie told his story to legislators, judges, and prisoners rights groups through hundreds of letters. In August, he was awarded \$750,000 by a federal judge. The security guard, Sgt. Roy Fries, is now retired with a full pension, and he is appealing the decision. While rape is widely known to be part of prison life, there are no national statistics on sexual assault in prisons, and most inmates do not speak publicly about it. AIDS is a serious threat in prisons, where condoms are not available and the rate of HIV infection is high. One activist, Stephen Donaldson, a former president of Stop Prisoner Rape, said he was gang-raped while incarcerated and contracted HIV as a result. Donaldson recently died of AIDS.

"No Stone Turns Up"

Despite publicity that Sharon Stone would appear in Washington, D.C., this weekend for events related to the displaying of the AIDS memorial quilt, she will not be involved. Fellow AIDS activist and AmFAR founder Elizabeth Taylor will be present and will lead a candlelight march on Saturday night. Taylor founded the American Foundation for AIDS Research, which Stone serves as fund-raising chairman.

"Seven Office-Mates at a Dying Bank Ask: Who Will Survive?"

With Wells Fargo's recent takeover of First Interstate Bank, seven people at the bank's Los Angeles headquarters' Corporate Insurance Department were left wondering if their jobs would survive the expected layoffs. The office consisted of three vice presidents, three administrative assistants, and their boss. One of the administrative assistants, Mark Clotfelter, is infected with HIV and was worried about retaining his health benefits. Although his position was terminated, Clotfelter later was employed at Wells Fargo's capital-markets operation.

"Digest: Digene and Cytoc"

Biotechnology companies Digene, based in Maryland, and Cytoc, of Massachusetts, have agreed to cooperate on the development and sale of tests to detect and monitor cervical cancer and certain sexually transmitted diseases.

"Blood Banks Look at New Draws as Donations Dry Up"

USA Today (10/09/96) P. 4A; Norman-Culp, Sheila

Blood donations in the United States have been dwindling for more than the past decade, due to the fear of AIDS, the aging of reliable donors, and the rise in body-piercing, tattooing, and other short-term factors that prevent willing donors to give blood. In 1982, a Montclair, N.J. blood bank collected 1,816 pints of blood a year. By 1989, donations had declined to 1,447 pints. Last year, only 831 pints were collected at that site. People with new tattoos or body piercings, and those who have spent more than 72 hours in jail, cannot give blood for a year. People who have had surgery, dental work, or any immunization, been diagnosed with gonorrhea, or been exposed to hepatitis, measles, mumps, or chicken pox must also wait. Members of the American Association of Blood Banks will discuss new ways to attract donors at the group's annual meeting this weekend in Orlando, Fla.

"Health: World Health Group Details Progress on 10 [Killer Diseases]"

IPS Wire (10/07/96)

The World Health Organization notes in its latest report on the State of the World's Vaccines and Immunization that significant progress is being made in the development of vaccines against 10 major deadly diseases, comprising HIV/AIDS, malaria, pneumococcal disease, meningococcal meningitis, rotavirus, respiratory syncytial virus, dysentery, enterotoxigenic Escherichia coli, schistosomiasis, and dengue. According to the WHO, the drive for profit in the developed world's pharmaceutical industries is behind the improvement, even if those companies have Western tourists and soldiers in mind rather than residents of developing countries when pursuing their research. "Ironically," said the report, "a vaccine against pneumococcal pneumonia and meningitis--diseases which kill over a million children a year in developing countries--was developed largely to prevent the incidences of inner ear infections among children in the United States." The report noted, however, that some drug makers have halted vaccine research vital to developing countries--into the virus that causes AIDS for instance--because the need for such products has declined in the industrialized world.

"Genetic Restriction of HIV-1 Infection and Progression to AIDS by a Deletion Allele of the CKR5 Structural Gene"

Science (09/27/96) Vol. 273, No. 5283, P. 1856; Dean, Michael; Carrington, Mary; Winkler, Cheryl; et al.

Recent research has shown that the chemokine receptor CKR5 serves as a critical co-receptor for certain strains of HIV-1. Further

studies have suggested that a defect in co-receptors may protect some individuals from HIV-1 infection. Stephen J. O'Brien, of the National Cancer Institute, and colleagues, mapped the location of the CKR5 structural gene and determined the frequency of the defect in the population. From a total of 1,955 patients at high risk for HIV, who were involved in large AIDS studies, 17 people, who had all been exposed to HIV-1 but tested negative for viral antibodies, were found to have two copies of the defective gene. In individuals who had survived with HIV for more than 10 years, the presence of one copy of the defective gene was much more common. An analysis of the frequency of the defect and survival time showed that disease progression is slower in people with one copy of the defective gene than in individuals without the defect.

"Pharmaceutical Industry Sues to Stop Discount Pricing to Clinics"

AIDS Treatment News (10/04/96) No. 256, P. 4; James, John S.

The Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers Association (PhRMA), an organization representing drug companies, filed a lawsuit in July to protest a federal law that requires pharmaceutical companies to offer discounts to certain government-supported medical programs for the poor. Most public medical clinics and AIDS-drug assistance programs are eligible for the discount, while Medicaid and other programs large enough to have their own pharmacies are not. The PhMRA lawsuit is an attempt to stop the government-funded programs from contracting with outside pharmacies. This would limit the discount program, and increase the financial hardship of many poor and uninsured patients. Only about 12 of the state ADAP programs currently use the discount, but many are eligible for the program. If successful, the PhRMA lawsuit would prevent most ADAP's from getting the discounted rates. Several AIDS organizations are sponsoring a demonstration on October 11 to protest PhRMA's action.
