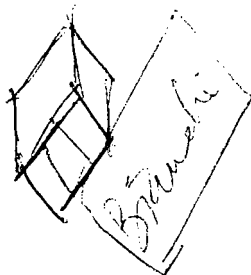

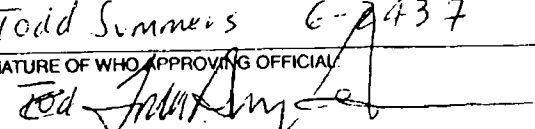

This card will enable you to access the EOPDC and your voice mail box on the EOP Telecommunications System from a remote location. Before your card can be issued however, you must read this agreement and sign below.

By signing this agreement, I agree to the following:

1. Violation of any of the following conditions and related security statutes could subject me to revocation of my dial-in access card, termination of my employment, a fine, and/or imprisonment.
2. I have received, read and understand the attached portions of the United States Code concerning "Fraud and Related Activity in Connection with Computers (U.S.C. 1030)" and how it applies to dial-in access.
3. I will establish a personal identification number that I will never share with anyone, keep near where I store the card, nor write on the card.
4. The access telephone number is sensitive, critical information that I will not share with anyone.
5. I will not enter classified information into the EOP Data Center computer systems.
6. I will log off my terminal or personal computer when it is unattended.
7. I will immediately return the dial-in access card when access is no longer required, employment is terminated or upon request by the EOP/OA Information Security Officer, or designee.
8. I will immediately call the OA Customer Support Help Desk 202-395-7370 if any of the following events occur:
 - my dial-in access card is lost, stolen, damaged or broken;
 - a change in my employment status;
 - suspected or actual unauthorized use of my card.
9. If my dial-in access card is lost or broken, I am personally responsible for repaying the approximate \$70 replacement cost for the card.

I have read and understand the conditions described herein and will adhere to them at all times when using my dial-in access card.

Introduction

The incumbent of this position serves as Executive Director of the Presidential Advisory Council on HIV and AIDS, established by Executive order with the Secretary of Health and Human Services as chair. The Executive Director serves as a policy adviser to the Secretary of Health and Human Services and to the Director of the Office of National AIDS Policy (ONAP) in matters relating to HIV/AIDS. The Office of National AIDS Policy was created in 1993 by President Clinton to provide the Federal government with a greater focus on the issues related to the epidemic of HIV/AIDS. The office provides a broad direction for Federal AIDS policy and fosters interdepartmental communication on HIV/AIDS. The Office also works closely with the Presidential Advisory Council on HIV and AIDS and with the AIDS community both in the United States and around the world.

The Presidential Advisory Council on HIV and AIDS staff provides general staff support for a Presidential-level advisory body, the Presidential Advisory Council on HIV and AIDS. It coordinates all meetings and hearing arrangements; provides such advice and assistance in the areas of HIV/AIDS as the President, Secretary or Director may request; coordinates with the Director an annual report to the President concerning HIV/AIDS and such additional reports or recommendations as the President may require or as the Secretary or Director may deem appropriate; and evaluates the national effort to combat HIV/AIDS. It works with other Federal, state, and local government and private sector organizations to achieve Presidential goals in HIV/AIDS, provide advice, information and recommendations regarding programs and policies to promote effective prevention of HIV disease, advance research on HIV and AIDS, and promote quality services to persons living with HIV disease and AIDS. .

Duties and Responsibilities

The Executive Director acts as a liaison between the Presidential Advisory Council on HIV and AIDS and the Secretary of HHS, the Director of Office of National AIDS Policy and Federal agencies and Departments, and State agencies, public and private community organizations and associations for continuing exchange of information and expertise in matters relating to HIV/AIDS.

The Latino in the Fight Against AIDS

I traveled to Washington in order to interview Daniel C. Montoya, Executive Director of the Presidential Advisory Council on HIV and AIDS (PACHA), and one of the most important Latinos in the Clinton Administration in the fight against this epidemic that is causing considerable harm in the Latino community in the United States.

PACHA is comprised of 31 members, drawn from academics, health care professionals, community and religious leaders. This council is of great importance, given that it has access to President William Clinton through the Director of the Office of National AIDS Policy. It makes recommendations to the White House, proposing measures the government should take; and these recommendations are taken seriously. The Council meets two or three times a year for two days, dividing themselves into different committees that are responsible for diverse areas.

I am leafing through a magazine in the waiting room of the Office of National AIDS Policy when a tall, young man dressed in a dark suit, white shirt and an elegant black and white striped tie enters. He has chestnut hair, honey colored eyes and a cinnamon complexion. When he extends his hand, I can't help but be surprised that this man who seems more like a model from a magazine is a government official. The second impression that Daniel Montoya gives me is marked by his amiability, cordiality and his gentleness. He informs me that he has bought copies of my books and has already read the first chapter of my most recent novel.

When we arrive at the cafeteria where we were thinking about eating, we decide to take the sandwiches back to his office, where we find a small empty conference room. We close the door and, after eating rapidly, begin the question and answer session.

Daniel Montoya was born in El Paso, Texas 34 years ago. His father died when he was still a child. Daniel's mother, Murillo, a Spanish and Music teacher, and second-generation Latina, was left with three children: two boys and a girl. Mrs. Montoya knew the value of education, so there was never a doubt that Daniel and his siblings, David and Deborah, would make it out of school. Eight years after the death of her husband, Murillo married Ruben Tallant, whom Daniel considers as a father. Daniel graduated from Ysleta High School, an institution of some 2,500 students, the majority of them Hispanic.

Daniel says: "When I was a boy in El Paso, a predominantly Hispanic city, I didn't know that I was 'Latino' because everybody around me was Latino. I only became aware of being Latino when I attended the University of Texas. At this university, in spite of being a public institution, there were very few Latino students". Daniel subsequently graduated with a bachelor's degree in Business Administration in Finance and later with a master's degree in Public Affairs.

Daniel knew he was gay as a youth. This was a period of confusion, given that he felt normal even though society did not perceive gay people as such. His first sexual experiences with other men occurred when he was twenty years old. In his own words, it was "a period of experimentation".

After his break-up with José, his first companion, Daniel confessed to his mother that he was gay. He found a way to tell her without being too explicit. One night he told her "José was more than a friend". She understood immediately. Daniel never had been afraid that his mother would reject him, although he was worried that it would hurt her. "But I had to tell her

everything. I don't have any secrets with her. She knows everything about me." His mother responded by saying she loved him unconditionally, as they were a family. His brother, nonetheless, was concerned.

Even more difficult was the step he took at the age of 23, when he found out that he was HIV-positive. Conscientious that his father had died young, it was difficult for Daniel to have to tell his mother that her son could also die very young; that the possibility existed that after already having lost her husband she could also lose her son. He told her by telephone. Both wept.

At that time, 1986, people, especially heterosexuals, didn't really understand how HIV was transmitted. "There wasn't much attention given to it" Daniel told me. "It wasn't an important part of the world".

Telling his younger sister was even more difficult given that, for Deborah, Daniel also represented a father-figure.

"Reflecting back, what would have helped you to not contract HIV?"

"I was a college student", he tells me. "I lived alone. I didn't have any responsibility outside of going to classes. It was my moment of coming out of the closet. I did everything associated with that process, including exploring my sexuality. In those years we didn't even understand that intravenous drug users and hemophiliacs also ran a great risk of becoming infected. Little was known about safe sex."

When he found out that he was HIV-positive, Daniel took stock of the value of his life. He had always been interested in public service as a way of changing things. His first activities in political activism centered around environmental affairs, how to reduce air pollution in El Paso, Texas, his birth city. Little by little his public career became more and more involved in environmental problems. This interest would lead to his concern with "the impact of pollution on society, but especially on Latinos".

During those years, Daniel Montoya had been a visible presence in the AIDS community of Austin. So it was in 1996 that he was asked by the Office of National AIDS Policy through a recommendation by B. Thomas Henderson, a political advisor in Texas who is HIV-positive and a member of the Council, to take a leave of absence from his work in Texas to help on a project.

Ultimately, that was the road that brought him to Washington to work in the agency that forms part of the Office of President Clinton. PACHA came to the conclusion that they needed a staff person that could keep them informed about the new advances in research and discrimination against people with AIDS, as well as other concerns of people living with HIV/AIDS. So it was then that he was made the Executive Director of PACHA.

While Daniel Montoya tells me about his personal life, he expresses himself with a moved honesty and eloquence. On beginning the discussion about his work, I note a change from the private individual to the public figure. His responses are more reserved, less revealing.

"Well, you are already here. Tell us then what you are thinking about doing in order that HIV doesn't grow in the Latin community with more voracity than in other communities. What is the theme of your mandate? For what is it you want to fight? What is your strategy of communication?"

"It is the same for all communities of color, or whatever you choose to name them. There is no doubt that Latinos are unique given certain cultural aspects that at times only affect Latinos, such as the barriers created by illegal immigration, religion, and language. PACHA consults

with many committees regarding issues of prevention within the Latin community, as well as committees regarding African-Americans and women, because if we want them to receive the message of prevention, we have to do it taking into account these differences.”

We touch upon a sensitive and controversial subject: the lifting of the prohibition of federal funding for needle exchange programs for intravenous drug users. Daniel C. Montoya reminds me that he allowed this interview in order to tell us what he is doing, and not as the spokesperson for PACHA. He adds that the Council’s position is public and that only the Secretary of Health and Human Services, Donna Shalala, has the authority to lift the prohibition on federal funding for the distribution of [clean] syringes. “Yet it is necessary to do a lot of work to educate and prepare the communities, given that the mere mention of the lifting of the prohibition can invoke fear among people”.

“What are you doing, specifically, in order to change the actual state of things?”

“Getting involved is the only way to have an impact.” This is the philosophy of Daniel, who sees himself as a link between the different communities that spread the message of prevention, assuring that there exists good communication in spite of the cultural differences. According to him, the first thing that is necessary is to determine what are the particular needs of each community and work to ensure that no duplication exists between government agencies. “Also, the necessity exists for counseling those who take the HIV test. Whether they are positive or negative, we should establish a dialog in order to know which practices they consider dangerous: if they are negative, what are their concerns; what exactly does it mean to have sexual relations with other men, and other issues. This is especially important in the Latino community, where a man that has a relationship with another man may not consider himself gay, and, as such, is in danger of getting infected”.

Latinos, in particular, have other serious concerns. Many do not speak English; in addition, publications with new information regarding prevention, therapies and services are not translated in a timely manner. Daniel assures me that this has already changed and currently materials are distributed simultaneously in both languages.

“In the fight against this deadly virus, silence is synonymous with death. Many Latinos try to hide their condition, which means, among other things, that many of them don’t receive the medical attention they need that could save their lives. Given this aspect, we Latinos don’t always have the same options as that of the rest of the population. For instance, there still exists an immigration law that prohibits the immigration of HIV-positive persons to the United States, and many Latinos are afraid that if they go see a doctor and it is discovered that they carry the virus they could be deported from this country”.

“The great majority of the newly arrived Latino immigrants work in businesses that don’t offer them health insurance, so at times they can neither rely on their economic resources to combat the progression of the virus nor can they pay for a visit to a doctor.”

“No less important is the ‘machismo’ in our culture, where the women in many situations are silenced by the men. Many of them accept having unprotected sex because they are afraid of being abandoned”.

“Many gays and many Latinos feel betrayed by President Clinton. Do you think he wants to improve the situation of Latinos in the United States? How can you work for a President that

has said that he doesn't consider it normal nor is in agreement with gay marriages? Is Clinton homophobic?"

"I would not be here if the President thought that", responds Daniel with a certain vehemence. President Clinton is a compassionate man. He grew up among humble people, he saw them struggling; he belongs to a generation that is directly affected by AIDS. The president is a genuine man. I am not familiar with the statement to which you refer, but Clinton is not homophobic. He has gay friends. What perhaps is necessary to take into account is that he was raised in the Baptist Church. Regarding the fight against AIDS, the President supports science towards finding a solution. Something that we are studying is women who use microbicides that neutralize the virus and/or a condom in their sexual practices. We are working to bring attention to Latino prisoners with AIDS in this country. The rate of infection among prisoners is rising. The majority of the population still refuses to believe that prisoners are having sex or using drugs."

We pass on to another subject.

I ask this meticulous man, of clear mind and great intelligence: *"Are we the invisible Latinos of the United States? I know many people who think that in this society we are treated like third-class citizens."*

"No one Latino can speak for all Latinos. There are Latinos who are first, second and/or third generation. There exist disparities in education and economic status. Perhaps it is true that we don't have access to the same opportunities and that we have to work harder in order that they give us a place at the discussion table. As far as language, many Latinos can not secure good jobs. I decided to get involved because I did not want to be invisible."

"Do you consider yourself a politician?"

"I am not interested in running as a candidate for any position. I see myself as someone that implements change, someone that has a place at the table where decisions are made. I am the person behind the scenes: a creator of strategy."

We have been speaking for several hours. As I don't want to abuse his kindness, I decide to finish the interview requesting that Daniel talk to us about his HIV-positive condition.

"For over a year I have been in a clinical trial with a drug that could or could not be beneficial. After seeing many people deteriorating with AZT and observing the number of my T-cells diminishing, I decided to undergo this clinical trial. Additionally, I feel very grateful that, thanks to my job, I have access to good medical services". It has been a reflective time and after which, without any trace of sadness or self-pity, he tells me with great serenity: "My condition has made me develop my spirituality. It has brought me to accept the place in which I find myself in life. I know that I don't have control over things, but that gives me the freedom to explore different areas of my life. I am Catholic; I feel an affinity with the contemplative life; I like the rituals of the church; I like to pray. Mass comforts me and gives me inner peace in those times of darkness and desperation when I ask myself why am I going through all of this".

When I say goodbye to Daniel, I feel that I have been spending time with one of the most extraordinary people that I have ever met in my life: a special human being dedicated to the service of humanity; a profound, compassionate man. With Daniel as our friend, we Latinos are in good hands.
