Re: Ratification of Nuclear Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty

It is for me a great pleasure to take this opportunity to manifest my statement related with the ratification of Nuclear Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty. Beside the elements related with humanitarian, biological, and environmental reasons, my perception is founded on the following rudiments.

1. The United States has already accumulated sufficient stockpile of nuclear warheads through more than 1,000 nuclear tests during the cold war era. The quantity of those warheads is far incomparable with other recognized nuclear powers, and is considered to be secured their reliability through simulation-tests controlled by super-computer, which is recommended by the most intelligent US nuclear scientists. This latest security-operation will even be unnecessary in coming decades, if the nuclear powers conclude the Nuclear CTBT right now, to let all the stock piles be either eliminated or converted to lower enriched uranium. Under the direction of President Putin, the Russian State of Duma has already ratified the CTBT last summer, which makes the US Senatorial Republicans' argument against ratification frail, as it means the Russians do not need anymore, the nuclear testing even for the security of the ever existing nuclear war-heads.
2. Hiroshima, Nagasaki scale nuclear bombs have never been utilized since 1945, besides the reports related with the utilization of less destructive bombs with nuclear substance used by US Military in the occasion of the Persian Gulf War, which attracted international criticism, in spite of the denial of the Pentagon. In any case, there is no reason-of-existence in nuclear weapons, contending huge capacity of genetically destructive attribute, which is not necessary, if the purpose of strategy is just to destroy the arsenals.
3. On the other hand, isn't it time to reconsider about the elevated US military budget, which might have been, otherwise, alternated in other domestic affairs, or pacifically directed foreign operations consisted with non-military tasks such as Peace Corps? (The US military budget is still more than the whole of that of the EU.) Nuclear warheads are both extremely dangerous and expensive in manufacturing, maintaining, and dismantling, even if they are converted to

civilian use, it is not economically efficient. In a word, no reason is observed in continuing manufacturing the nuclear weapons.

4. The United States has already provided to Russia more than \$3 billion for the dismantlement of accumulated nuclear war heads in former Soviet Union, including Belarus, Ukraine, Kazakhstan, the safe-guard of nuclear institutions, and prevention of Russian brains to former rogue countries. The United States will not be able to get rid of this unnecessary offering of subsidiary, as far as it does not initiate to abstain itself from propelling nuclear arms race. For example, novel Nuclear powers as India and Pakistan, as well as former unfriendly powers, will take an excuse not to ratify the CTBT, in trailing the country to be paradigm as the United States. Furthermore, the defense policy in coming century should be founded on diplomatic efforts, in erasing the wall of racism, segregations, and isolationism.

Thus, I strongly support President Clinton's initiative in Nuclear disarmament. I believe that one of the reasons of the failure in ratifying the Nuclear Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty last autumn by the at most intelligent US Senate, was the lack of the diffusion of the authentically visual consequence of the atrocity caused by the A-bomb. In entering the new period of international relationship, it is time to recognize the strong necessity of the US initiative in abandoning the destructive Nuclear strategy, and in taking the constructive one by banning testing and bring to an end the arms-competition.

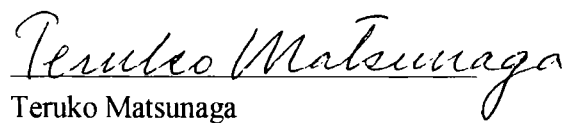

Dear Sherryl,

I would like to thank you for returning my call.

As an independent consultant I am advising President Omar Bongo of Gabon, Africa in two main fields : AIDS and humanitarian response in post war situations in Central Africa.

I am a specialist of Public Health programs in French speaking Africa. Since 1976, I have worked on different issues and countries on the Continent.

I am based in Bethesda. I am an US citizen, French by birth. I was married to Ambassador Wilson IV.

Last May, President Bongo decided to support the efforts of President Clinton on his AIDS Policy. This initiative was the subject of the attached letter.

The key point of this letter is to underline the possibilities to extend the programs of research with the "Centre International de Recherche de Franceville" (CIRMF).

This medical research center could be an important tool to find a cure for HIV/AIDS and to develop specific programs for Africa.

In June, I had different meetings with the scientific and technical Gabonese Departments or organizations to prepare more detailed propositions to the American authorities.

I was again in Gabon in August for the National Day and for the first time President Bongo mentioned in his speech the AIDS issue and did not hesitate to give some statistics. For an African President to talk about the sensitive question is courageous. It means a willingness to do something to fight AIDS.

But as he did not have any answer from your office the second letter was still not sent.

Encouraging African leaders to take concrete action on AIDS policy and to talk about the disease is important.

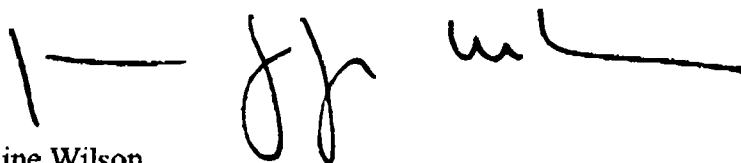
In September I traveled with Albina de Boisrouvray who encouraged me to pursue the effort and to contact you.

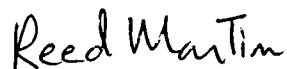

Disturbing precisely because it is so believable, *Kids* goes well beyond any previous American film in frankly describing the lives of at least a certain group of modern teenagers. Celebrated photographer Larry Clark's first feature is bluntly about sex, drugs and irresponsibility, and in an extremely upfront way that viewers will have to admit is convincing, whether they like it or not.

On an aesthetic level, *Kids* is remarkable as a first film by a man in his 50s who indelibly captures the attitudes, speech patterns, rhythms, desires and lack of perspective of his teenage characters.

Covering 24 hours in the lives of a bunch of Manhattan kids on a hot summer day, pic begins with its nominal protagonist deflowering a very young girl, follows with the numbing discovery by another girl that she's HIV-positive thanks to that same boy, and pushes on to document endless sexual bragging, drug-taking, gay-baiting, black-bashing and, ultimately, a debauched party during which another virgin is unknowingly victimized by the thoughtless seducer.

From the opening scene, which unflinchingly observes the cocky Telly (Leo Fitzpatrick) talking a sweet blonde (Sarah Henderson) into surrendering her virginity to him, the film takes a direct, non-judgmental view of what it's presenting. As soon as he accomplishes his morning conquest, an exuberant Telly hits the streets to boast to his buddy Casper (Justin Pierce) about it.

It would seem that Clark and young screenwriter Harmony Korine intend the film as a truthful depiction of urban kids today, with an overlay of a cautionary attitude about the wages of blatant disregard for the need for safe sex. More of a gray area is the extent to which the picture seems voyeuristic and exploitative of its young subjects.

Dear Ms. Thurman,

I am writing to you today after reading several recent articles in *The New York Times* about an increase of HIV infection rates among teenagers in the United States and Africa. It is tragic that the course of AIDS seems to be accelerating, especially in teenage and young adult populations. I wanted to do something to help the in the fight and that is why I am writing to you today.

My name is Reed Martin and I am Director of Marketing at Independent Pictures, the low-budget film company that produced the swing-dance comedy "Swingers," the original horror classic "Scream," and a number of other successful films for Miramax. My boss Cary Woods also produced the football drama "Rudy" and the crime thriller "Cop Land" starring Robert DeNiro. (These days, our film output deal is with New Line Cinema.)

In 1995, Independent Pictures produced a movie entitled "KIDS" which is still one of the most compelling films about the dangers of teenage drug use and sex. "KIDS" succeeds in delivering its message because it is not patronizing to adolescents. It presents their lives in a stark, realistic fashion.

Indeed, "KIDS" speaks to teenagers in their own language and draws them in with its characters, New York setting, and realism, before giving them a powerful *jolt* of a warning about HIV. (Many films of this nature are preachy or too "on-the-nose" to be effective. Others, like "Trainspotting" are far too enthusiastic about glamorizing drug use to provide much of a warning about AIDS.)

"KIDS" however, is a powerful, compelling and well-made drama with a message that teenagers respond to and understand. My goal in sending a dub of this film to you is to possibly get this video included in part of the Office on AIDS Policy's arsenal against HIV. Or perhaps an organization you may know of would want to acquire VHS copies of the movie in bulk at "cost," (which is probably around \$8 to \$10) to use in areas where traditional awareness efforts have failed. We would donate them certainly, but we are a very low-budget film production company. Actually, we can look into getting them for far less than \$8, since this is a noble project. (My goal is *not* to sell tapes but to educate young people about potentially risky behavior.)

I think it would be a great idea to distribute this gripping film to impressionable teenagers to help fight the rampant spread of HIV. Please tell me what you think. All my best wishes.

Global AIDS Leadership Alliance

Background

The greatest obstacle to effective action against HIV/AIDS around the world is the absence of sufficient effective leadership. In country after country, political, spiritual and civil leaders are either silent concerning the epidemic, or, if speaking, are doing so in extremely low-key ways.

In most African countries HIV/AIDS is already killing far more people than any war could possibly kill. This is also rapidly becoming the situation in India, China, and many other countries. In the face of any war which was threatening so much destruction, national leadership would be exerted to mobilize the citizens of the country in collective action against the common enemy. No such leadership is apparent in the case of HIV/AIDS.

Although the situation has improved slightly over the last several years, the typical situation is one of a leadership vacuum. Countries, like Uganda, where political leadership is more apparent and effective, receive high praise. This is not because the President of that country and others are doing more than we should expect them to do; it is because everyone else is doing so little.

In the absence of effective leadership, none of the programs that can slow the epidemic and provide therapy to those already infected can be effectively launched or implemented. Those dedicated public servants and NGO leaders who are struggling to combat the epidemic are fighting uphill in the absence of an environment which supports and rewards their efforts.

The Proposal

It is proposed to create GALA; the Global AIDS Leadership Alliance. **The purpose of GALA is to encourage, support, and reward political, civil and spiritual leaders who stand up and provide dynamic and effective leadership against the ravages of HIV/AIDS.** Many leaders shrink back from this role at present because it is too exposed, both politically and personally. To come forward, they need to be a part of a network of internationally respected individuals all of whom are showing courage and initiative and providing leadership, both nationally, regionally, and internationally. The core of GALA will be a group of 12 wise men and women, all of whom are extremely well-known and highly respected around the world. They are a dozen "household names". They should be a diverse group in terms of gender, nationality, and sphere of influence. They should represent politics, business, religion, sport, and the arts. They should each bring with them a substantial worldwide constituency of people who respect them and will take heed of their words and deeds.

The Secretariat and Expert Panel

GALA will be supported by a secretariat and an expert panel. The purpose of the secretariat is to help plan and execute the activities of GALA. The role of the expert panel is to provide GALA with the most authoritative and up-to-date intelligence concerning the HIV/AIDS pandemic and approaches to its control. Particularly following the Mbeki fiasco, some leaders are apprehensive about making strong statements about the nature of the epidemic and the appropriate responses to it. The expert panel would provide cover for such leaders, ensuring them of the latest and most credible information.

Method of Work

The first step will be to find a core member of GALA who will take the lead in establishing the 12 person core team. The ideal person for this role is President Bill Clinton. Under his chairmanship, the other 11 core members of GALA would be approached and recruited to the task. Possible candidates include the Dalai Lama, Nelson Mandela, Bill Gates, and Madonna.

With the help of the secretariat, GALA members will then decide upon a group of leaders worldwide who will be targeted for their early efforts. Targeted leaders will be individuals with considerable ability to make a difference to the fight against HIV/AIDS, but not currently effective in this work.

Through visits, meetings, briefings and other interactions GALA will seek to energize the targeted leaders to play a prominent role in combating the HIV/AIDS epidemic. As these individuals are recruited to the cause, they themselves will become members of GALA and will help in winning over the next round of targeted leaders.

Getting Started

The ideal first step is to obtain a commitment from President Clinton that he would be willing to chair GALA and to work with us to get it up and running. The demands on his time would be minor over the first few months; essentially a few conversations to get his inputs into the selection of the other core GALA members and his approval for letters which would go out in his name.

Following this, the 12 core members of GALA would need to meet over a couple of days to get to know each other, to gain greater ownership of the idea, and to make substantive inputs into the program of activities to which GALA will commit. All this of course will be greatly facilitated by the secretariat and by bilateral discussions between the secretariat and individual GALA members.

Following the first meeting of GALA, a two year program of action will be specified in detail and budgeted. Most GALA activities will not involve all GALA members, but rather small groups of GALA members acting together to influence, support, and work with the targeted leaders. In addition, every opportunity will be taken to make use of other events which a number of GALA members would likely attend in any case; for example, the annual meetings of the World Economic Forum in Davos.

Financing

The simplest approach to financing GALA would be to have a single sponsor. The obvious choice is the Gates Foundation, linked to the agreement by Bill Gates, Jr., to serve as a core member of GALA. I believe there is every likelihood that he would accept, if approached by President Clinton.

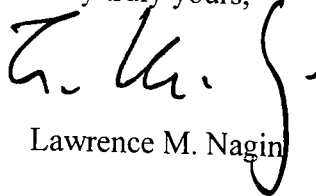

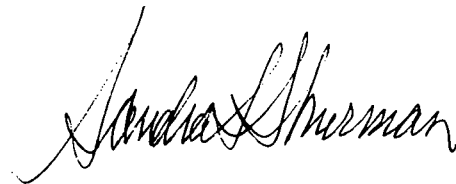

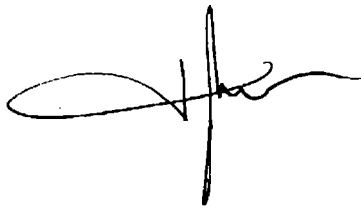
