THE HIV/AIDS EPIDEMIC IN SOUTHERN AFRICA: THE SCOPE OF THE PROBLEM AND A DISCUSSION OF POSSIBLE SOLUTIONS

In 1998, 70% of all new HIV infections and 80% of all AIDS-related deaths in the world occurred in sub-Saharan Africa. Of these, women comprise over 50% of all infected adults and an even higher percentage of teen-age girls.

In this session, experts from various sectors involved in confronting the African AIDS epidemic will discuss:

1. Epidemiology: What are the real numbers of people infected and affected by HIV in Southern Africa? What are the challenges posed by the small percentage of people who are aware of their infections;
2. Barriers to Accessing Care in the Region: What is the nature of these barriers? What are the capacities and limitations of the present community health infrastructure? How does the stigmatization of HIV-infection affect the problem?
3. Status of Ongoing Activities? A description of programs presently being conducted by public health officials in Southern Africa, by USAID, UNAIDS and by Bristol-Myers Squibb's Secure the Future program.
4. Proposed Initiatives: A discussion of new programs and the expansion of current programs that have the potential to curb the epidemic. Discussion areas will include workplace programs conducted by international companies to destigmatize HIV and provide support for affected employees, mobilization of the international business community, etc.

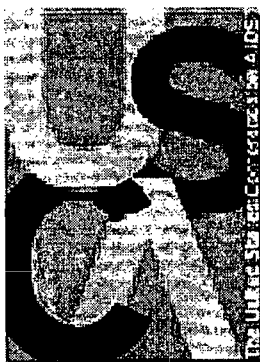

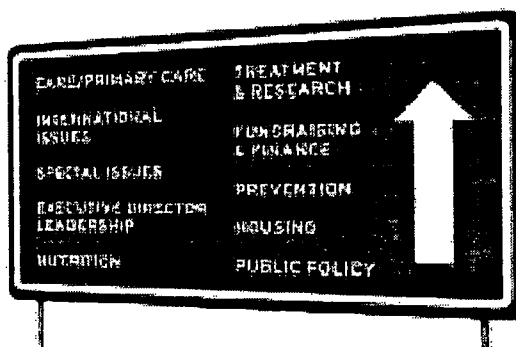

Dr. Peter Piot to give a global view on AIDS at the Friday, November 5 Opening Plenary Breakfast

Peter Piot was appointed Executive Director of the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) and



Assistant-Secretary-General of the United Nations on December 12, 1994. Dr. Piot joined UNAIDS from a position as Director of the Division of Research and Intervention Development at the Global Programme on

AIDS of the World Health Organization. He had previously served from 1980 to 1992 as Professor of Microbiology and Head of the Department of Infection and Immunity at the Institute of Tropical Medicine in Antwerp, Belgium. In 1978-1979, he was Senior Fellow in infectious diseases at the University of Washington. During an investigation into an outbreak of hemorrhagic fever in northern Zaire in 1976, he became co-discoverer of the Ebola virus. He served as President of the International AIDS Society from 1991 to 1994. Prior to joining UNAIDS, he was editor of *AIDS*, the leading scientific journal in its field. He has received many awards for scientific achievement and public service, and has published over 500 articles and 15 books, mostly on issues related to AIDS, sexually transmitted diseases and women's reproductive health.

Surgeon General David Satcher is featured speaker at Plenary Session on Friday, November 5

Join David Satcher, M.D., Ph.D., for an inspiring speech at the Friday, November 5 plenary session. Prior to his Surgeon-General of the



United States appointment in 1998, Dr. Satcher served four years as Director for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Administrator for the Toxic Substances and Disease Registry

from 1993 to 1997. In that role, he successfully spearheaded initiatives that markedly increased childhood immunization rates from 55 percent in 1992 to 78 percent in 1996. He also upgraded the nation's capability for responding to emerging infectious diseases and laid the groundwork for a new early warning system to detect and prevent food-borne illnesses. Under Satcher's direction, the CDC's comprehensive breast and cervical screening program increased from 18 to all 50 states, five territories, and 15 American Indian reservations, and the agency highlighted the importance of physical activity with the landmark Surgeon General's Report on Physical Activity and Health.

Born in Anniston, Alabama in 1941, Dr. Satcher graduated from Morehouse College in Atlanta in 1963 and was elected Phi Beta Kappa. He received his M.D. and Ph.D. from Case Western Reserve University in 1970 with election to the Alpha Omega Alpha Honor Society.

Nnenna Frelon to give jazz performance at Saturday night event

Born Chinyere Nnenna Pierce in Cambridge, Massachusetts, Nnenna sang in church choirs throughout her childhood. Drawn into the world of jazz by singers like Ella Fitzgerald and Sarah Vaughan along with great vocal groups like the Chi-Lites and the Spinners, Nnenna sang occasional club gigs while pursuing a career



in health care and formed powerful, lasting relationships with Dr. Billy Taylor, Yusef Lateef, and Toshiko Akiohi. In 1990, she met pianist, educator and jazz patriarch Ellis Marsalis, who along with Jazzmobile's David Bailey, championed the young singer's blossoming career. She has also opened tours for internationally acclaimed musicians Ray Charles and Al Jarreau.

"Maiden Voyage," Nnenna's newest recording is a project the singer describes as a "joyous celebration of feminine spirit and passion...stories both new and familiar." "Maiden Voyage" honors the tradition of feminine spirit with music from some of the most powerful women songwriters and storytellers of today. According to Nnenna, "the image of voyage, water and passion are definitely elements of what this project is all about."

USCA presents Nashville singer Victoria Shaw at Saturday night event

It is said that a dream can come true to one who owns that vision, long before it blossoms into reality. For Victoria Shaw becoming an acclaimed songwriter and recording artist wasn't an option. "There was never a doubt in my mind that this was what I wanted to do - ever! There was never any veering," remarks Shaw.

After a childhood spent in California as the daughter of entertainers, Victoria decided to return to her birthplace, New York, to further pursue her musical dreams. She began fine-tuning her craft as a singer and immediately found a captive audience.
