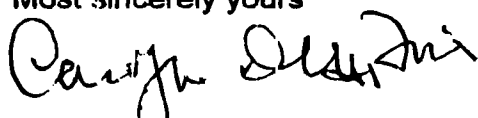

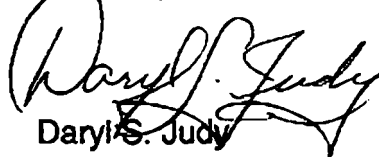

—Bill Clinton, in a speech at a gay fund-raiser in Los Angeles, May 1992.

There is no doubting the sincerity of the man, or of his emotions, at least when he is speaking. Compared to his predecessors, who found it hard to mention AIDS, and who avoided visiting the AIDS Memorial Quilt even when it was spread out in front of the White House South Lawn, our current president and his wife have been avatars of raised consciousness. And yet, how easy a statement it was. Of course he wanted to make HIV go away by waving his arm. Who wouldn't? But when it has come to doing something harder than arm-waving—when it has come to paying a political price for attacking AIDS, or raising difficult moral issues in defense of people with HIV, or even spending serious money on ending the deadliest plague in modern times—the president has been his usual, frustrating self.

All these virtues and failings are on display again. The president's call last week for an HIV vaccine within ten years is on the face of it unobjectionable enough. True, most scientists are deeply skeptical of the possibility of an HIV vaccine—HIV is a complex, multi-strained retrovirus that's in a constant ferment of mutation, exceedingly difficult to vaccinate against. But that doesn't mean that basic research into a vaccine couldn't bear fruit—even for those already infected—by opening up areas for bold, basic investigation. And the president can play a role in this—in demanding new standards and new expectations.

But there is something so merely arm-waving about calling for a vaccine. It is a laudable goal, but there are many more pressing concerns that Clinton could address. Given the recent astonishing success with protease inhibitors, wouldn't it make more sense to intensify the effort along these proven lines rather than along dubious and unproven ones? Why not demand a realistic cure within five years rather than an elusive vaccine within ten? The two goals, in fact, are not exclusive. The apparent success of the new therapies in reducing the amount of virus in a person's blood and semen makes HIV-infected people less infectious. So the treatments

become a means of prevention as well as a cure—a de facto vaccine if not an actual one. Yes, they're expensive, but in an accelerated race toward better and less debilitating regimens, the costs will inevitably fall and the pay-offs increase. It seems odd that, at the moment these treatments have the potential to end AIDS as we know it, the president should start talking up a goal most scientists now view as pie in the sky.

Even odder, the president didn't mention those many poor people with HIV who can't access the drugs now because Medicaid doesn't cover those who aren't already disabled. Thanks to an insane bureaucratic rule, many HIV-positive people must have full-blown AIDS in order to qualify for Medicaid-funded combination therapy. This doesn't make any economic sense. However costly the new drugs are, they are far cheaper than treatments for AIDS infections down the line: the whole point is that the drug combinations are able to prevent those infections in the first place. The president recently apologized for the Tuskegee experiment. But, in 1997, poor HIV-positive people are being denied drugs we know work because they are not yet sick enough. Go figure.

Here are some other suggestions for a real AIDS bully pulpit: federally fund needle exchange programs that have been proven to save lives but that the administration refuses to advance. Confront one of the newest incubators of the virus—our prison system—and develop means to prevent HIV transmission among inmates. Push drug companies to develop speedier, earlier trials for children with HIV, many of whom are now denied the new drugs because there is no reliable data on their toxicity in the very young. And push the companies to accelerate the next generation of protease and reverse transcriptase inhibitors, drugs that could save the lives of those patients who are now failing on the current drug regimens.

We could go on. The president knows he could do things that would really matter, but he also knows that such things would have costs. Waxing lyrical about a vaccine ten years from now does not. Clinton's legacy on AIDS will be marked not by a vaccine seven years after he has left the stage, but by the actions he did not take when the stage was his. •

Summary of Accomplishments as Director of the AIDS Institute, New York State Department of Health

I. Strategic Vision and Coordination

The strategic vision for the Institute is the development of a full continuum of HIV prevention and care services with HIV infection in all communities in the state of New York. My approach to fair share funding for the distribution and redistribution of dollars involved an analysis of factors which include:

1. the local and regional health care and social services infrastructure;
2. socio-economic profiles of communities affected;
3. political-ideological dimensions to the support and development of specific models;
4. specific population demands (e.g. racial/ ethnic communities, gender based approaches);
5. the need for the revision of models based on rapidly changing epidemiological trends. Since 1990, there has been a sharp rise in the proportion of new AIDS cases among African American and Latinos. Currently, 75% of the new cases are from these two groups and substance abuse is the leading risk behavior associated with new AIDS cases.

Interagency work was essential for a successful strategic planning effort. The Institute had lead responsibility for integration of programs housed within the Office of Alcohol and Substance Abuse Services, the Office of Mental Health, the Department of Corrections, the Division of Parole, the Division for Youth, the Department of Education and the Division of Human Rights.

The director develops the guiding principles for allocation of state, CDC Cooperative Agreement and Ryan White Care Act funds and coordinates program development with CDC and HRSA. Since multiple funding sources for single initiatives has been the strategy of the Institute to create a stable funding base for successful programs, coordination between the federal, state and local levels was essential.

The following serve as examples:

- The ADAP Plus Program was developed in conjunction with New York City. Title I and II funds were combined to develop a comprehensive insurance program for primary care, diagnostic studies, mental health services and home care. It currently provides these services to approximately 14,000 uninsured people and 70% are racial/ethnic minorities.
- Title I and II (NYC and NYS) combine funds for ADAP.
- Title I and II combine funds for the Primary Care Development Initiative to develop health and support services to CHCs and drug treatment programs in underserved areas of high seroprevalence (e.g. South Bronx, Brownsville), targeted through an analysis conducted by the NYC Health Systems Agency.
- Title I, II and HOPWA are combined for a scatter site housing program for homeless persons with HIV and TB.
- Title II funds were combined with SPNS grant funds to support the provider and patient cohort studies, which will follow HIV positive patients under fee-for-service into managed care plans; service utilization and cost specific data are being collected for use in the development of capitated rates of reimbursement for HIV disease.
- Title II funds were combined with State funds to support activities associated with the planning and development of the HIV Special Needs Plan, the concept for HIV care organization in the Mandatory Medicaid Managed Care Program.

CDC prevention and state funding is used to provide the outreach, education, peer support and case finding through counseling and testing with Ryan White funds supporting the provision of comprehensive health and support services for infected persons.

I participated in the creation of the Multiple Service Agency Initiative in 1991. This is a \$10.4 million project to develop comprehensive HIV prevention, medical care and support services in traditional multi-service agencies in minority communities. There are currently 34 agencies providing comprehensive AIDS specific services through these grants.

I participated in the creation of the Community Development Initiative in 1992. This project funds minority communities (African-American, Hispanic, Native American, Asian-Pacific Islander, Haitian and African immigrants) to establish broad community-based support for the education, awareness and development of HIV services. There are 13 such organizations. (1992)

I participated in the creation of the Ryan White Care Networks as conceptualized in New York State. This model creates community ownership of HIV service development and coordination in 16 communities in New York. They include Central Harlem, South Bronx, East Harlem, Central Brooklyn, Williamsburg/Bushwick, and regional networks covering all counties outside of New York City.

As medical director, I coordinated the development of guidelines for care and treatment through a broad committee structure involving clinical, social service, legal advocacy, individual community representation and persons with HIV disease. Vehicles such as these were instrumental in the broad acceptance of the Guidelines for the Use of AZT during Pregnancy, issued in October of 1994. I personally directed the process of negotiation with clinicians, community activists and women with HIV infection. New York State was first in issuing such guidelines.

I was a member of the National Association of State and Territorial AIDS Directors.

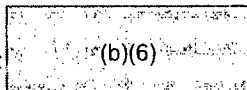
