Dear Chairmen Stevens and Young:

On behalf of AIDS Action, the national voice on AIDS, representing all Americans affected by HIV/AIDS and 3,200 community-based organizations that serve them, **I commend you for providing increases to key HIV/AIDS programs such as care, research, and substance abuse prevention and treatment. However, I am regrettably disappointed that HIV prevention was again flat-funded at FY99 levels.** AIDS Action supports your efforts to maintain Fiscal Year 2000 increases for programs serving people with HIV/AIDS and to find meaningful increases for HIV prevention.

You have demonstrated leadership in not decimating critical public health programs in the Labor, Health and Human Services and Education Appropriations FY2000 bill and finding a way to address and fund many of the needs of people living with HIV/AIDS or at risk for HIV. As you know, the current funding levels do not meet the growing need for HIV/AIDS prevention, care, substance abuse treatment, research and housing programs. Therefore, your efforts to increase the FY2000 federal AIDS budget are very important. However, neglecting support for efforts to slow epidemic crisis spots, particularly rising HIV infections, takes away from a community's ability to fully respond to the epidemic.

For HIV prevention funding at the CDC and substance abuse treatment, the two areas in most need of additional investment, **we urge you to build upon the Senate's "mark."** While the House flat-funded prevention and SAMHSA funding, the Senate increased prevention funding by only \$5 million and SAMHSA by \$131 million. These programs are critical to the fight against HIV in some of the hardest hit communities. I believe the starkest example of where we are failing to address the HIV epidemic among African Americans is the fact that national HIV prevention funding has been flat for four years, while the rate of infection has increased among communities of color.

For the Ryan White CARE Act, the House subcommittee on September 23 passed a \$108 million increase over FY99 for a total of \$1.519 billion. On September 27, Senate appropriators passed an approximately \$199 million increase for Ryan White. That figure is about \$100 million more than requested by the President. For comprehensive research at the National Institutes of Health, the

House passed a 9% increase and the Senate passed a \$2 billion increase. **We urge you to maintain the Senate funding levels for the CARE and research accounts.**

There are also two separate accounts in the FY2000 bill that are of concern to us. The Senate appropriators fully funded the Administration's recently announced \$100 million global AIDS initiative. In addition, there was an allocation of \$50 million for relief of families of hemophiliacs with HIV. **We recognize the hardship of funding new initiatives and are encouraged that you have funded these programs.**

In the context of the Veterans Affairs, Housing and Urban Development FY2000 bill, the Senate bill provides a \$7 million increase over FY99 for the Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS (HOPWA). The Senate increase falls short of the President's request of \$15 million, and **we urge you to provide an increase that more closely reflects the need for this critical housing program.**

And as you proceed with a different version of the DC Appropriations bill, **we request that you keep this bill free of legislative riders.** In particular, the needle exchange prohibition is unnecessary and harmful. As you know, no federal funds are currently used for operating needle exchange programs. The rider is gratuitous and further encroaches on a jurisdiction's ability to implement life-saving programs supported by its community.

Throughout the appropriations cycle, AIDS Action will continue to press for reinvigorated prevention spending as well as maintenance of needed increases for Ryan White, research, substance abuse prevention and treatment, and international AIDS funding. We remain anxious that public health programs not be pitted against each other or against other vital programs within the Labor, HHS appropriations bill. The HIV/AIDS epidemic continues to demand strong federal leadership and AIDS Action applauds your efforts to give the highest priority to meeting this continuing emergency.

Dear Chairmen Stevens and Young:

On behalf of AIDS Action, the national voice on AIDS, representing all Americans affected by HIV/AIDS and 3,200 community-based organizations that serve them, **I urge you to you to fund key HIV/AIDS programs such as prevention, care, research, substance abuse prevention and treatment, and the minority AIDS and Africa initiatives at the highest possible level.** AIDS Action supports your efforts to provide needed Fiscal Year 2000 increases for programs serving people with HIV/AIDS and to find meaningful increases for HIV prevention.

As you know, the current funding levels do not meet the growing demand for HIV/AIDS programs. If the Labor, Health and Human Services Appropriations conference bill is vetoed by the President, we encourage you to take this opportunity to provide greater increases for these programs. The current bill addresses some of our concerns but in other areas – mainly HIV prevention and the minority AIDS initiative – the bill was inadequate.

For HIV prevention funding at the CDC and substance abuse treatment, the two areas in most need of additional investment, **we urge you to build upon the Senate's "mark."** While the House flat-funded prevention and SAMHSA funding, the Senate increased prevention funding by only \$5 million and SAMHSA by \$131 million. These programs are critical to the fight against HIV in some of the hardest hit communities. I believe the starkest example of where we are failing to address the HIV epidemic among African Americans is the fact that national HIV prevention funding has been flat for four years, while the rate of infection has increased among communities of color.

For the Ryan White CARE Act, the House subcommittee on September 23 passed a \$108 million increase over FY99 for a total of \$1.519 billion. On September 27, Senate appropriators passed an approximately \$199 million increase for Ryan White including a much needed \$4 million increase for the AIDS Education Training Centers (AETC's). That figure is about \$100 million more than the President's request. The current bill provides a nearly 15% increase for research at the National Institutes of Health. **We urge you to maintain the Senate funding levels for all CARE Act Titles and provide an appropriate funding increase for the research account.**

In addition, there are other separate accounts in the FY2000 bill that are of concern to us. The Senate appropriators funded the Administration's recently announced \$100 million global AIDS initiative with \$50 million coming from this bill. There is also a need for increases to the minority AIDS initiative over FY99 as the epidemic continues to disproportionately affect communities of color. And there was an allocation of \$50 million for relief of families of hemophiliacs with HIV. **We recognize the hardship of funding new initiatives and are encouraged that you have funded these programs. We also encourage you to fully fund the minority AIDS initiative.**

And as you proceed with a different version of the DC Appropriations bill, **we request that you keep this bill free of legislative riders.** Barring a rider-free bill, the conference language includes a modest compromise that bans public funds but allows private dollars to be used for needle exchange programs. **At the very least, we urge you to maintain this compromise as you draft a new bill.** As you know, no federal funds are currently used for operating needle exchange programs, rendering a needle exchange prohibition as unnecessary and harmful.

As you near completion of the appropriations cycle, AIDS Action praises your work and urges to press for reinvigorated prevention spending and a minority AIDS initiative as well as maintenance of needed increases for Ryan White, research, substance abuse prevention and treatment, and international AIDS funding. We remain anxious that public health programs not be pitted against each other or against other vital programs within the Labor, HHS appropriations bill. The HIV/AIDS epidemic continues to demand strong federal leadership and AIDS Action applauds your efforts to give the highest priority to meeting this continuing emergency.

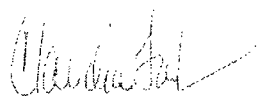

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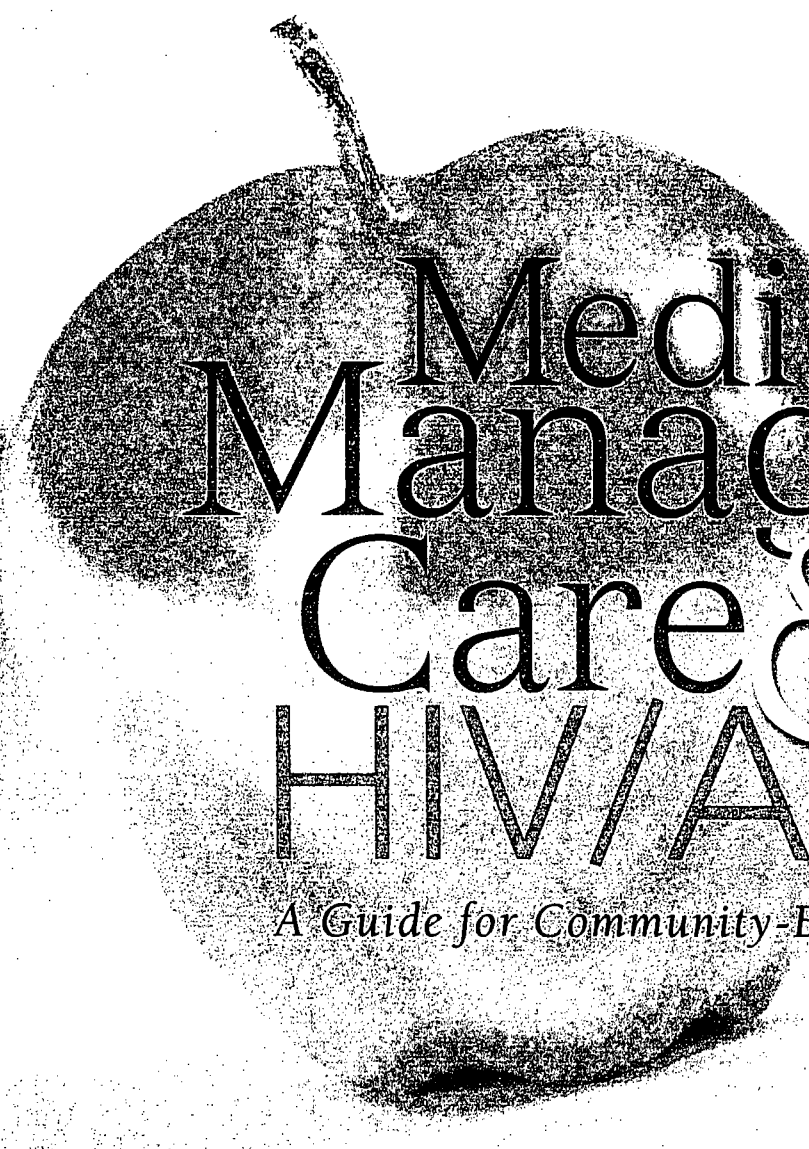
