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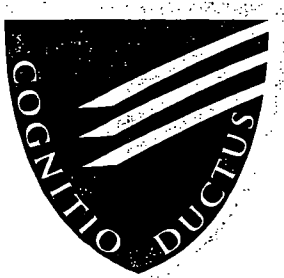

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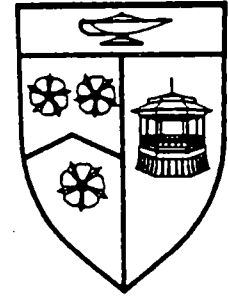
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THE WINCHESTER ACADEMY presents FALL PROGRAM - 1999



The Winchester Academy of Waupaca presents a series of ten Monday evening public lectures beginning at 7:15 pm. in the downstairs meeting rooms of the Waupaca Area Public Library. Programs are free of charge and open to everyone, young and old. They last about an hour and are followed by discussion and refreshments. Should a late cancellation be necessary for any reason, it will be announced on radio station WDUX (FM 92.7) and Waupaca cable TV, Ch. 6.

The world at large became a focal point as this fall series evolved. Two program's bring personal experience and perspective on life in developing countries, and the effects of modern trade practices on the people of those countries; another considers the ramifications of continued growth of the world's population; and four programs, from very different starting points, lead to consideration of the fragility of our planet earth. Interspersed are a world-class art exhibition, a philosophical look at today's American political climate, and a "mystery" topic, a parting shot from a venerated and now retired Lawrence U. history professor.

SEPT. 27 - THE RISE OF THE DUMPLING QUEEN: Recent Changes in China - Jane Parish Yang, Chair of East Asian Languages and Cultures at Lawrence University, will describe how changes in world trade and commerce have affected the Chinese economy and society over the past 20 years.

OCT. 4 - THE MAKING OF BIRDS IN ART - Kathy Foley, Director of the Leigh Yawkey Woodson Art Museum in Wausau, will explain how their world-famous exhibition is put together each year, from contacting artists around the world, to jurying and selecting, to bringing their work safely sometimes thousands of miles - the difficulties, the surprises, the disasters, and the joys.

OCT. 9 - BUS TRIP TO LEIGH YAWKEY WOODSON ART MUSEUM IN WAUSAU FOR "BIRDS IN ART."

OCT. 11 - WHY GREAT MEN (sic) ARE NOT CHOSEN PRESIDENT - Dr. John Milton Cooper, UW-Madison, Department of History. The title is taken from a book called "American Commonwealth," published in 1888 - an era known as the "Gilded Age." Are we living in another "gilded age"?

OCT. 18 - THE WORLD POPULATION - 6 billion and still growing! Dr. Hugh Iltis, retired UW-Madison Professor of Botany, will explore the "urgent need to reduce both the world's human population and its unsustainable trashing of the environment," "...to become good ancestors"..."with a new ethic."

OCT. 25 - LIFE IN THE FORMER EAST GERMANY SINCE REUNIFICATION - A Native East German's Personal Perspective. Lawrence University German Professor Brigit Tautz describes how capitalism and modern trade practices have affected life for friends, family, colleagues and communities in her homeland.

NOV. 1 - "LAST WORDS" - William A. Chaney, the longest-serving professor in the 150-year history of Lawrence University, was asked, just before retiring this past year, "If you were to give one final message to students, what would it be?" In the Department of History, Dr. Chaney is the (emeritus) George McKendree Steele Professor of Western Culture.

NOV. 8 - BETWEEN LAND AND WATER: WETLANDS, THE DELICATE FRINGE - Charles (Charlie) Luthin, Executive Director of Wisconsin Wetlands Association, describes the vital importance of Wisconsin's wetlands, once considered junk land, mosquito haven, good only for filling. His slide-presentation will illustrate both the beauty and the many essential functions of our bogs, marshes, swamps, fens and floodplains, over half of which are now permanently lost.

NOV. 15 - GAIA: THE PHYSIOLOGY OF PLANET EARTH - Lawrence University
Geology Professor Dr. Marcia Bjornerud offers a way of looking at our fragile planet as if it were a living organism, a superorganism, in order to understand its development and change and to influence its health and longevity.

NOV. 22 - THE LASTING AFTERMATH OF CHERNOBYL - Dr. Michael Patrick, UW-Madison medical geneticist, and Norma Berkowitz, professional social worker and retired UW-Madison professor, will examine the social, economic, geopolitical and energy policy issues of "Chernobyl," the place, and the catastrophe of science and technology gone awry with irresponsible government policies, as well as the people who continue to suffer.

NOV. 29 - NOT IN MY BACK YARD! Another "Last Words" lecture, this time by Dr. Ted Ross, newly retired Professor of Geology at Lawrence University. He will examine the public reaction to proposals for mines, landfills, nuclear reactors, etc. and raise questions considering the present role of materials and minerals in our lives.

old resting place by the slow, horizontal cutting of sand and water. All honor to Alexander's name, he did not suggest—as a lesser man might have—that we cut the granite into pieces.

Those slabs finally arrived in Washington, D.C., after a two-week journey stretching from Minnesota to Florida on seven different railroads. Trucked at night over D.C. bridges, the two great blocks of granite were put in place. Standing up well under the student demonstrations in Washington as hordes of young people happily bathed in the tall spray, dancing and rejoicing in the two shallow basins, the great blocks seemed to belong there.*

Economics is a process reinforced by mythology and symbols. Banks are designed as emblems of security and stability. The system, we are told, works on trust. In Washington the Federal Reserve is the very Valhalla of the dollar: fostering confidence in the dollar is the chief objective of its monetary policy.

When the building was designed, the Commission of Fine Arts prescribed that its esthetic appeal should be "through dignity of conception" and "purity of line, proportion and scale." The result—in harmonious scale with its neighbors along Constitution Avenue—is an edifice of conspicuous dignity, genuinely grand in effect, its starkness modified by refinement of detail. The deliberate effect is more than human in scale. The facade is set back almost 200 feet from the avenue. People look small climbing the marble steps. There is a bold central bronze door capped by a marble pediment set back in a central opening bracketed by four severe pilasters supporting a plain architrave surmounted by a stylized marble eagle with half-spread wings.

In November 1978 that front door of the central bank of the richest nation on earth was "permanently closed for budgetary reasons." The money changers were not driven from the temple; they just locked themselves in. The governors of the Federal Reserve System were advised that not enough people used the main entrance to justify maintaining a guard. You may enter through the back door on C Street, but be prepared to state your business to the security guard and sign in his logbook. The governors themselves drive, or are driven, uncere- moniously into the basement garage.

The Federal Reserve System headquarters is not a bank and it has no money.

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Clinton Signs Disability Law

Allows Work Needed Government Benefits

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 — Saying work is “at the heart of the American dream,” President Clinton today signed into law a bill that allows millions of disabled Americans to keep their government-funded health coverage when they take a job.

Clinton signed the bill in the shadow of the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial, a tribute to a president who himself struggled with a disability. The memorial has a statue of Roosevelt in a wheelchair that is mostly hidden by a cloak.

“In his time, Roosevelt felt he needed to keep his wheelchair from public view,” Clinton said. “Most people believed being disabled meant being unable. He proved them wrong every day. Today, in the spirit of his leadership, we move further along on our nation’s marvelous journey of equal opportunity for all.”

Charles Riley, editor-in-chief of *We*, a bimonthly national magazine for people with disabilities, said the new law would give disabled Americans a benefit that has little to do with economics.

Simple Pleasure of Work

“What’s the first thing you’re asked at dinner party: What do you do?” Riley said. “Imagine what a tremendous lift it’s going to give to 54 million Americans to say, ‘I just got home from work.’”

House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill., said the new law means a greater number of disabled Americans will become taxpayers and make even more meaningful contributions to society than they can now.

“Its benefits are obvious and long overdue,” Hastert said. “It’s time our government made it easier, not harder, for the disabled to find work.”

Sen. William Roth, R-Del., who chairs the Senate Finance Committee, called the new law a "gift of independence" for disabled people this holiday season. "We will all benefit from the unleashed creativity and enthusiasm of talented individuals joining the work force," Roth said.

Benefits or Work

Fear of losing Medicare and Medicaid benefits is one of the major barriers keeping disabled people from seeking employment. Clinton said that put disabled people in "a different kind of double bind" because the only way they could get the health benefits was if they had a severe condition — which meant they couldn't give up the coverage to go to work.

"This defies common sense and economic logic," Clinton said. "This is about more than jobs and paychecks. It is fundamentally about the dignity of each human being, ... about recognizing that work is at the heart of the American dream."

The law provides \$150 million in grants to encourage states to allow disabled workers to buy into Medicaid, the state-federal health program for the poor. It also creates a \$250 million Medicaid buy-in demonstration for people who are not so severely disabled that they can't work. It extends, for 4½ years, Medicare coverage for those in the disability insurance system who return to work.

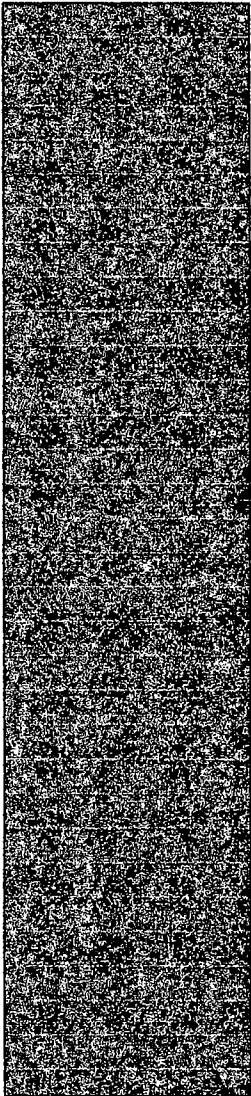
Gives Beneficiaries a Choice

Disability beneficiaries with a "ticket" that can be used to purchase services to enter the work force, with the option of choosing between government and privately run rehabilitation programs.

James Sullivan, 38, of Hudson, N.H., who was paralyzed in a diving accident 20 years ago, said he is eager to go to work in the telecommunications industry. A quadriplegic with limited use of his arms, Sullivan said he would willingly give up his disability check if he could keep federally funded coverage for the attendant services he needs.

"This system, which basically makes people stay at home and punishes them when they work, is a crazy one," Sullivan said. "There is an untapped population of Americans with disabilities who are dying to get back to work."

New Source of Workers



Fewer than 1 percent of people who enter government disability rolls ever leave. Under the new law, many of the estimated 9 million disabled adults will be able to join the work force.

It also increases to 550,000 the number of disabled people who will receive rehabilitation and training services over the next 10 years.

Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., a sponsor of the bill, said disabled people will no longer "be consigned to the shadows of American life."

"Now, when we say equal opportunity for all, it will be clear that we mean all," Kennedy said.

His co-sponsor, Sen. James Jeffords, R-Vt., also cited Roosevelt's legacy, saying "what President Roosevelt felt obliged to keep private can now be celebrated in public."

BLOOD SAFETY – A Call for Healthy Donors

HFA, United Blood Services Unite to Launch Louisiana Blood Safety Task Force

LAFAYETTE, La. – A statewide initiative to increase the number of new volunteer healthy blood donors was the topic of discussion at a breakfast held at Edie's Restaurant on Sept. 22. The 7:30 a.m. breakfast was sponsored by the Hemophilia Federation of America (HFA) and United Blood Services of Acadiana.

Representatives from the HFA and United Blood Services were on hand to promote the creation of a Louisiana Blood Safety Task Force. The purpose of the task force will be to recruit community support for a blood safety awareness campaign.

More than 50 local physicians, community leaders, city government officials, media representatives, and consumers gathered to hear topics on local blood donation, and blood safety, including a special presentation by Captain Larry McMurtry, Deputy Executive Secretary of the Advisory Committee on Blood Safety and Availability.

The breakfast began with a prayer led by HFA member Leo Dixon followed by opening remarks from HFA Executive Director Jan Hamilton. Jan addressed the early morning crowd stressing the need for community involvement in the effort to increase the number of volunteer healthy blood donors in Louisiana.

One of the important topics covered at the breakfast was the safety of the blood supply – an important topic for the bleeding disorder

community. Captain McMurtry was on hand to answer questions regarding the government's role in protecting the nation's blood supply.

He addressed such issues as the Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) recent decision to prevent anyone from donating blood that has spent more than six months in Britain between 1980 and 1996. The policy is a precaution to screen out people who have unknowingly contracted Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease (CJD).

"We are not sure if CJD is transmitted by blood, but we will not make the same mistakes as HIV and hepatitis C," said McMurtry. The deferral of British donors, cautioned McMurtry, causes a 2.2 percent reduction in the available blood supply.

McMurtry also informed the attendees about nucleic acid testing (NAT); a test that checks donated blood for DNA belonging to HIV and the hepatitis C virus. The NAT test significantly reduces the window for the detection of HIV and hepatitis C, thereby reducing the number of infections from donated blood.

The breakfast ended with remarks from Dwight Sledge and Susan Begnaud, of United Blood Services, who spoke on the local blood donor market within Louisiana. Their remarks were followed by a question and answer session.

Hundreds Gather in Washington for COTT Ricky Ray Rally

HFA Vice-President Rich Vogel was one of several community members who traveled to Washington September 7-9 to participate in the Ricky Ray Rally sponsored by the Committee of Ten Thousand (COTT). He shares his experiences with us here.

"WHAT DO WE WANT?"

"FULL FUNDING FOR RICKY RAY!"

"WHEN DO WE WANT IT?"

"NOW!"

These words echoed in the halls of the capitol as more than 100 Ricky Ray supporters rallied around the east steps of the capitol building September 7-9, 1999 to bring our message to Washington.

The three-day rally began with a ceremony on Wednesday, Sept. 8 that began and ended with the sound of bagpipes, played by Richard Scott Blair, Ph.D. Prayers, including a Native American poem offered by Checole Acuna, were said for our friends and family who have died.

After stirring speeches by Committee of Ten Thousand (COTT) members John Rider, Dana Kuhn, Dave Cavanaugh, and Corey Dubin, U.S. Sen. Mike DeWine, R-Ohio, addressed the crowd. DeWine offered his words of support and urged us to see our members of Congress and demand full funding for the Ricky Ray Hemophilia Trust Fund Act this year. And that's just what we did!

Fueled by words from a town meeting hosted by COTT the evening before, we all took to the halls of Congress. Jackie Otis, president of the Hemophilia Federation of America (HFA), and I teamed up to represent the Federation as well as ourselves. HFA board members Peter Bayer, Bob Marks, Kay Selby, and Trudy Stringer also took their own personal messages to their representatives.

Although we only had a few confirmed appointments, Jackie and I stopped in on as many congressional offices as we could. We left each office a letter explaining the Ricky Ray Hemophilia Trust Fund Act and stressing the fact that we want full funding this year. We also left our angel pins, which symbolize everyone in our

community living with HIV/AIDS, and a white glove, to remember the ones we've lost.

Each office we visited was very receptive. Everyone said they fully supported the Ricky Ray Act and funding, but cautioned that the act might be hard to fund this year. President Clinton did not include the act in this year's budget and current budget caps might prevent the Ricky Ray Act from being fully funded.

Undaunted, we met that evening for another COTT town meeting to plan our strategy for the Justice Department rally the next day. Our plan was to ask Attorney General Janet Reno for an investigation into the Hemophilia Holocaust.

On Thursday, Sept. 9, we rallied the Justice Department. Armed with information, Corey Dubin and Dana Kuhn spoke to the media urging a complete investigation into the government's knowledge of the tainted blood supply. Michael McCarthy, an advocate for the Canadian hemophiliacs, was also on hand to ask for an investigation into the "Blood Trail" that led from an Arkansas prison blood program (sanctified by then Governor Clinton's administration) to the death of thousands of Canadians.

Friday, Sept. 9, we hit the "Hill" again to get our message of FULL FUNDING across to the people who can make it happen. Although we made our presence known, we still need a big push from our community if we want full funding this year.

PLEASE, write your U.S. senators and representatives. DEMAND full funding this year. Not only is full funding "The right thing to do," it is TOO long overdue. As John Lennon once said, "POWER TO THE PEOPLE." Let's make it happen.

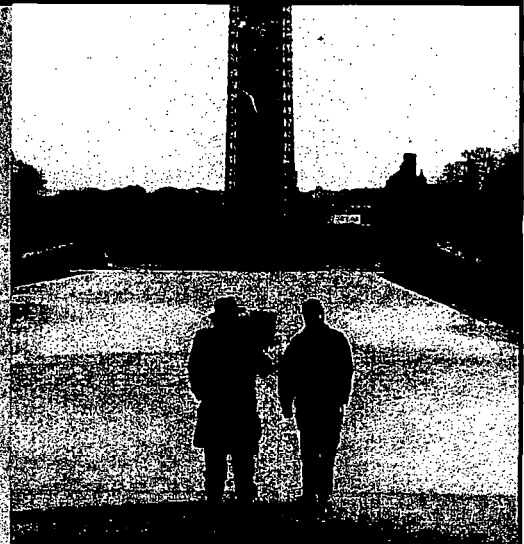

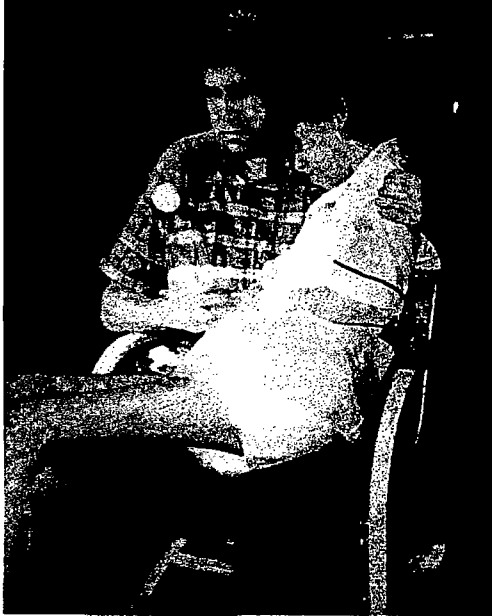

Medical mistakes hurting veterans

NEW YORK (AP) — Federal investigators have documented almost 3,000 medical mistakes and mishaps in less than two years at veterans hospitals around the country, and more than 700 patients have died in those cases, The New York Times reported.

The Department of Veterans Affairs says in a new report the

accidents and deaths occurred from June 1997 to December 1998, in the first 19 months of a new policy that requires employees to report medical errors and "adverse events."

The problems include medication errors, like prescribing or dispensing the wrong drugs, the failure of medical devices, abuse of

patients, errors in blood transfusions and surgery on the wrong body part or the wrong patient, the Times reported Saturday on its Web site.

The comprehensive self-examination by the department is believed to be the first of its kind by any health care system in the nation.

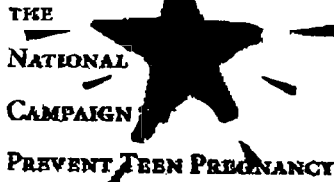
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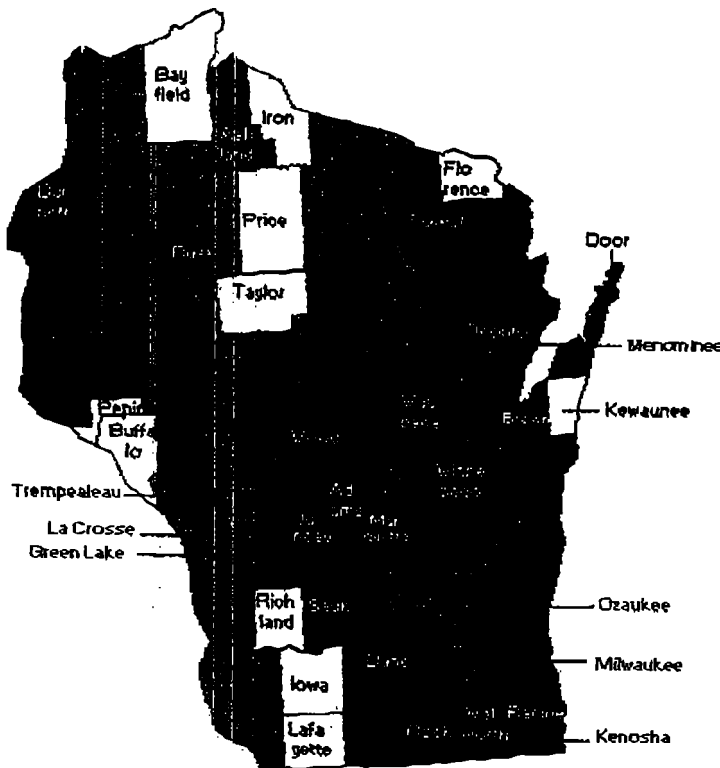
