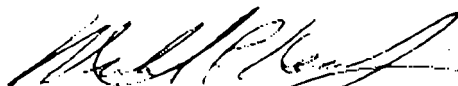

SUBJECT: Request for Documents

We have received a document request for records relating to the Department of Interior's decision to deny an application to place a 55 acre parcel of land located in Hudson, Wisconsin in trust for gaming purposes. Accordingly, please conduct a thorough and complete search of all your records -- whether in hard copy, computer form or any other form -- for any of the material described below.

Every employee is responsible for searching his or her own files and records to ensure a comprehensive search. Each office head or Assistant to the President must certify that his or her staff has done a complete and thorough search.

If responsive documents are maintained in a file folder, please include a copy of the file label. Similarly, if there is an index of the documents contained in the file, please provide a copy of the index.

In addition, if you believe that files from your office that have been sent to the Office of Records Management may contain responsive information, please advise us so that we may ensure that all responsive documents have been located.

I. Definitions

1. **"Hudson casino proposal"** refers to the proposal by the Red Cliff Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians, the Lac Courte Oreilles Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians, and the Sokaogon Chippewa Community (Mole Lake Band of Lake Superior Chippewa) to conduct gaming at the St. Croix Meadows Greyhound Racing Park in Hudson, Wisconsin (also known as the Hudson Dog Track). or the application by those groups requesting that the Department of the Interior take that property into trust and permit gaming on those premises, as well as any other proposal by any American Indian group or other group to conduct gaming at that particular location.

2. **“American Indian Group”** refers to any organization composed of or representing American Indians, specifically including but not limited to any nation, tribe, band or community or any corporate or political subdivision or entity within its authority, direction or control (such as political action committees, economic development committees, business councils, executive committees, and gaming divisions or partnerships), or any American Indian association, affinity group or advocacy group, and all employees of such entities (see attached Schedule A).

II. **Requested Materials**

Please provide all records referring or relating to the following:

1. The Hudson casino proposal, including all communications involving any of the following individuals or entities:
 - a. any elected or appointed official of a local, state or federal government, including representatives of DOI or the White House;
 - b. the DNC, Clinton/Gore or Democratic State Parties;
 - c. any individual purporting to act on behalf of any American Indian group (including their members, employees, representatives, lawyers and lobbyists) (see attached Schedule A); or,
 - d. any individual purporting to act on behalf of an individual or entity with a financial interest in the outcome of the Hudson casino proposal (including gaming or gambling company representatives).
2. Fundraising by or on behalf of Clinton/Gore, the White House, Democratic State Parties, DSCC, DCCC or the DNC that relates to the contributions or possible contributions from:
 - a. any American Indian group known or believed to have opposed, supported or inquired about the Hudson casino proposal including specifically, but not limited to, the following American Indian groups:
 - (1) St. Croix Band of Chippewa Indians of Wisconsin;
 - (2) Oneida Tribe of Wisconsin;
 - (3) Ho-Chunk Nation of Wisconsin;
 - (4) Mille Lacs Band of Chippewa Indians;
 - (5) Upper Sioux Community of Minnesota;
 - (6) Lower Sioux Community of Minnesota;
 - (7) Shakopee Mdewakanton Dakota Community of Sioux Indians of

Minnesota;

- (8) Prairie Island Dakota Community of Sioux Indians of Minnesota;
- (9) Red Lake Band of Chippewa Indians;
- (10) Leech Lake Band of Chippewa Indians;
- (11) Bois Forte Band of Chippewa Indians;
- (12) the Minnesota Gaming Association (MIGA);
- (13) Red Cliff Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians;
- (14) the Lac Courte Oreilles Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians;
- (15) the Sokaogon Chippewa Community (Mole Lake Band of Lake Superior Chippewa);
- (16) Fon du Lac Chippewa;
- (17) Grand Portage Reservation (Chippewa);
- (18) White Earth Band of Chippewa; or
- (19) Minnesota Chippewa Tribe.

- b. Persons known or believed to be members, employees or representatives (including lawyers and lobbyists) of any American Indian group included in the listing provided above in 2.a.; or
 - c. Persons or entities known or believed to be engaged in gaming or gambling partnerships or ventures with any American Indian group included in the listing provided above at item 2.a.
3. Legal guidance or instructions to White House entities or employees concerning Native American issues and:
- a. fundraising;
 - b. contacts with lawyers and lobbyists for parties appearing before the U.S. government; or
 - c. contacts with federal agencies concerning matters pending before those agencies.

Last summer I wrote to Mrs. Clinton inviting her to be our featured speaker at the "Numbers Too Big To Ignore" luncheon in November 1998. You responded that it was too soon to make a commitment. It may still be too soon, but I wanted to let you know where we are in our planning and see if you could give me any indication if she could join us.

This past November we held the inaugural luncheon featuring Jane Fonda and Gloria Steinem. The event attracted 1,600 people and raised \$370,000 for grants to organizations changing the lives of women and girls in Atlanta. We made the front page of the *Atlanta Journal and Constitution* the next day and attracted the attention of most major media outlets in Atlanta that day and for many days thereafter. I am enclosing a program book from that event and our most recent annual report so you will have an idea of who we are and what we stand for. I am also sending along an editorial and a Letter to the Editor which I think exhibits our support for the First Lady over the trials she has had to bear these last several months.

Mrs. Clinton was in Atlanta recently on behalf of the Democratic Women's Leadership Forum and several of my Board members spoke to her about coming back to Atlanta in November to speak to a large public gathering on behalf of the Atlanta Women's Fund. We have reserved Friday, **November 13** as the tentative date when we would like to produce this luncheon at the Georgia World Congress Center. Please let me know if you think her schedule will allow this visit and if she would be amenable to considering it. I cannot tell you how much we would welcome her, embrace her, and be strengthened by her presence.

Dear Friend:

As a colleague in the fight to ensure that all people living with life-threatening diseases, including HIV, can obtain the healthcare they require to stay alive and healthy, you know well the enormous obstacles that lie ahead to bolster overburdened healthcare infrastructures so that they are able to keep pace with increased healthcare needs. I am writing to invite you and other like-minded individuals to attend a conference whose sole focus is arriving at these types of solutions: the 2nd International Conference on Healthcare Resource Allocation for HIV/AIDS and Other Life-Threatening Illnesses, November 15-18, 1998, in Cancún, Mexico.

Enclosed is a conference registration brochures which includes an agenda for the four-day conference, a list of our distinguished international faculty, and conference registration information. You will note from the agenda that faculty and conference participants will cover much ground during this conference. Our aim is to re-define the burgeoning crisis in access to healthcare services, life-saving and -prolonging drugs, and diagnostic technologies, and discover new directions in addressing the factors that relegate up to 90 percent of the human population into a "Fourth World" of poverty, disease, and isolation.

The conference is sponsored by the International Association of Physicians in AIDS Care (IAPAC), in association with the Consejo Nacional para la Prevención y Control del SIDA, Harvard AIDS Institute, Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS, Pan American Health Organization/World Health Organization, and the World Bank. As with last year's conference in Washington, D.C., IAPAC's hope—a hope shared by those organizations joining us in this ambitious venture—is to attract the best and brightest from the health policy arena to propose short- and long-term solutions to the healthcare resource allocation crises faced by both industrialized and less-industrialized nations.

**Tutu honorary chair of international conference
set for November 15-18, 1998 in Mexico**

CHICAGO – The advent of more effective antiviral drugs has brought hope back into the lives of those few people with HIV/AIDS who can obtain them. There is a pressing need to re-examine healthcare delivery systems worldwide so that HIV disease and death do not continue to be as synonymous as they now are for the 95 percent of people worldwide who lack access to healthcare. The International Association of Physicians in AIDS Care (IAPAC) today announced plans for its Second International Conference on Healthcare Resource Allocation for HIV/AIDS and Other Life-Threatening Illnesses, which aims to examine the economic, ethical, and human rights issues that underlie healthcare resource allocation. Chaired by The Most Rev. Desmond Tutu and prominent Mexican pediatrician Patricia Uribe Zuniga, the conference is scheduled for November 15-18, 1998, at the Marriott CasaMagna Hotel in Cancún, Mexico.

“The world of darkness is a world in which decisions about the future of tens of millions of people are often made in the darkness of political and economic expedience,” said Tutu. “The light which will be nourished at this important conference is the incandescent spark of the divine dignity of human life.”

Is healthcare a human right?

Should clinical guidelines be based on economic realities?

What will be the challenges to women's/children's health in the 21st century?

Is there a viable US healthcare safety net?

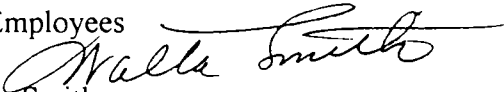
The focus of the report will be on the employee and his occupation and some others who are living with HIV. The Department of Parks and Recreation will likely be mentioned as his employer.

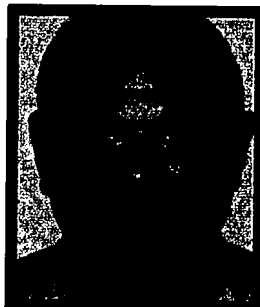

How I'm Beating AIDS Wasting

Having AIDS-related wasting syndrome is like going to hell. If you get a chance to escape it, you'll do whatever is necessary to avoid going back.

Unfortunately, though, it takes more than determination for a person with HIV to maintain good health. That is a lesson I've learned over the last seven years. I've tried everything from aerobics to acupuncture to avoid wasting syndrome and other AIDS-related disorders. It is only in the last two years, with the help of my doctor and my nutrition/fitness consultant that I have achieved a healthy, if not a "normal", life.

My battle against wasting syndrome started in 1990, almost immediately after I first tested HIV-positive. I began wasting, losing 50 pounds in a matter of weeks. To complicate the situation, I developed pneumonia and a bad case of shingles all over my body. I was so weak that I was barely cognizant of the world around me. I felt almost certain I would die.

My physician put me on anabolic steroid therapy, 200 mg testosterone and 200 mg nandrolone weekly, and I bounced back dramatically. My weight returned to normal. I had been given a fresh start, and was set on maintaining my health. In 1992, though, I developed a case of chronic peripheral neuropathy, which resulted from taking an antiretroviral.

When I recovered from the neuropathy, I started physical therapy to build up my strength and begin walking again. I used exercise machines, chiropractic adjustments, ultrasound therapy and even mild electroshock therapy. The latter consisted of having electrodes sent down the backs of my legs—from my calves to the tips of my toes—for stimulation.

Physical therapy played a huge role in my fight against neuropathy, as the prescription medications I took to control the condition gave me chronic diarrhea, and led to my needing emergency surgery for hemorrhoids in 1994.

Around that time, the ebb and flow of my health was beginning to take its toll. From 1993 to 1995, I would have a few good months on my medications, and then a few bad.

I decided to expand my health care beyond merely taking the traditional antiretrovirals.

I went to the Emperor College in Santa Monica, CA, to try a 30-day purifying technique of a strict diet and herbal regimen, with no meat or traditional medication therapy—including my AZT—allowed. The results were disastrous. By the time I dropped out of the program, I had lost 20 pounds and felt terrible.

I decided from doing my own research to investigate a complete fitness/nutrition program. Again, I went through a period of trial and error. One trainer I hired wanted me as lean as a Hollywood aerobic queen. That approach didn't cut it; I lost too much weight. I also met with nutritionists who treated me the same as all of their other patients, not taking into account my special nutritional needs as a person with HIV. To me, that's a waste of money.

I became convinced antiretrovirals alone weren't going to keep me healthy, but I still didn't have the perfect strategy. Then, in early 1996, still fighting to avoid the hell of wasting, two angels came into my life: my doctor, and my fitness/nutrition consultant. Working closely with them, I've gained control of my life. Every two weeks they faxed each other my lab work between them and talked on the phone about my condition. This gives me confidence and makes me feel like I'm in good hands.

My diet consists of 7,000 calories daily over the course of eight or nine meals. This is no small task. I started with five small meals a day, and gradually trained my stomach and my mind to consume, even hunger for, a whopping seven to nine daily meals.

I've also had to eliminate greasy foods from my diet. My body has gotten so accustomed to healthy foods that I risk a bad case of diarrhea if I have a McDonald's burger or a Taco Bell entree loaded with cheese that's been sitting out on the counter all day.

My workouts emphasize heavy weights instead of aerobics. I try and build muscle mass instead of trying to make myself lean. HIV consumes my fat reserves, anyway, so losing fat is the least of my concerns.

I can't stray from my regimen—and I hope to be following it for the next 10, 20, even 40 years. I am determined not to waste away. I am determined not to look like my neighbor who died recently, or my cousin who is in the hospital seriously ill, all skin and bones. I'm determined not to die like that.

But I have more than determination on my side. I have a knowledge of exercise, nutrition and medicine, plus the help of health care professionals who monitor my status. That may not be salvation, but it's allowing me to plan for an active life far into the future. **N**

Congratulations on your recent mission to the continent of Africa. I realize that as a political leader your time is extremely limited. But, please, allow me to borrow just a moment from your busy schedule to briefly introduce a community organization, Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc., which is extremely desirous of your support. "Rafiki", Swahili, pronounced ra-fee-kee, meaning "friend", is a non-profit 501c3 organization whose mission is to provide care-giver services for children infected with the HIV/AIDS virus and/or orphaned by parent(s) who have died of AIDS related complications. "Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc." was founded by myself, Reverend John Nganga, Dmin, BCC, a native of Kenya, Africa, now residing in Columbus, Ohio. During it's first two years of operation, "Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc." recruited and successfully trained 67 volunteer care-givers.

The success of "Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc." in Columbus, Ohio, has inspired plans to replicate the program in Kenya. "Rafiki Kenya" will be implemented in and around Kenya's largest city, Nairobi. The World Health Organization (WHO) estimates that AIDS related deaths in Kenya have left over 150,000 children orphaned and homeless. There are an estimated 60,000 of these innocent children living on the streets of Nairobi and surrounding communities. In 1997, in the suburbs of Nairobi, "Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc." successfully recruited foster families for 7 orphaned children. Each foster family is provided a monthly stipend of \$25.00 (1,500 Shillings) per child.

"Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc." is presently preparing Grant Solicitation Requests for 20 Rafiki board members and care-givers to make a September, 1998, trip to Nairobi, Kenya. The volunteers will train care-givers, recruit foster families for 30 additional children and establish an active Community Coalition of ministers, health care officials and local community leaders. To assist with this effort, "Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc." is graciously requesting a personal letter of support from your office. Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc.

Rafiki, Swahili, pronounced ra-fee-kee, meaning "friend". Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc., a non-profit 501c3 organization, consists of a group of volunteers who have come together for a common mission, to do *holy work*. The *holy work* done by Rafiki AIDS Ministry is totally and completely non-sectarian. Rafiki AIDS Ministry is not affiliated with any church, organization or religious sect. *Holy work*, as defined by Rafiki AIDS Ministry, is humanitarian work. *Holy work* is helping to ease the tears of a crying child. *Holy work* is giving someone who is suffering a great hardship someone to talk to, someone to lean on. *Holy work* is being there for someone whom the rest of the world has turned its back on. Rafiki AIDS Ministry volunteers give their time and efforts to be care givers to children, and parents of children, infected and/or affected by the HIV/AIDS virus. Rafiki AIDS Ministry volunteers do *holy work*.

Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc. was founded by its Executive Director, Reverend John Nganga, DMin, BCC a native of Kenya now residing in Columbus, Ohio. Reverend Nganga encountered his first AIDS patient in 1989 while serving as a minister in Kenya. The patient was a young lady, in the final stages of the AIDS virus, who was dying in an isolated room alone in a local hospital. Reverend Nganga painfully remembers how no one in her family, whom he believed loved her very much, was willing to go near her. She was yearning for love, companionship and comfort. Unfortunately, no one was available for her to share that love with or provide the companionship she so desperately desired.

As a minister, Reverend Nganga understood all too well why the family feared to go near the young lady. Many Kenyan churches preach that HIV/AIDS is a curse from God, and those infected are being punished by God. Because of this message, the final days of this young lady's life were full of severe condemnation. She was judged, hated, feared and treated as an outcast by the very society in which she had lived her entire life.

Like the majority of Kenyans, Reverend Nganga also believed that anyone with the disease was cursed by God. This message hung heavy on Reverend Nganga's mind the day he received the telephone call from the family asking him to come to the hospital and pray with the young lady. His ignorance regarding HIV/AIDS made confronting this young lady extremely difficult. Reverend Nganga's faith was challenged as never before as he was forced to come face to face with his fears. Upon praying, Reverend Nganga found strength in the words of the prophet Isaiah, which states, "Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" It was that experience which motivated Reverend Nganga to devote his ministry to assisting the most innocent victims of this deadly virus, the children. Out of that passion was born the vision of Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc.

Thanks to a 1996 grant from The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's, Faith in Action Program, in collaboration with Children's Hospital Foundation and Family Aids Clinic & Educational Service (FACES) in Columbus, Ohio, Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc. established a successful program. Funding from The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation afforded Rafiki AIDS Ministry the opportunity to develop and initiate a community coalition between Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc., Children's Hospital, the Columbus Health Department, Children's Home care Services, AIDS Services Connection, Columbus AIDS Task Force, Metropolitan Residential Services, Project Open Hand, Ohio AIDS Coalition, several local churches, and the local populace of central Ohio.

Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc., for its first two years, 1996 to 1998, operated exclusively out of Children's Hospital, Columbus, Ohio. During that 2 year period, Rafiki AIDS Ministry recruited and successfully trained a crew of approximately 67 volunteer care givers. Rafiki AIDS Ministry care givers assist the near death AIDS patient, and/or recovering patient's family, by assisting the HIV patient with taking their medication, or assisting the family with planning funeral arrangements and/or memorial services. In addition, Rafiki AIDS Ministry care givers also transport the patient to their treatment center(s), school and/or house of worship, as well as, assist parent(s) with preparing meals, feeding the patient or ensuring feeding arrangements have been made. Rafiki AIDS Ministry care givers also assist the parent(s) with cleaning the patient's room, doing the patient's laundry, grocery shopping or by simply providing a listening ear or a shoulder to cry upon. For those whom desire, Rafiki AIDS Ministry care givers also provide support and spiritual uplifting to the child afflicted with HIV/AIDS, or the parent(s) of the child, by reinforcing the presence of God during the entire dying process through prayer.

The success of Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc., in Columbus, Ohio, has inspired Reverend John to initiate a plan to replicate the program in Kenya, Africa. The project has been dubbed Rafiki Kenya and will be initiated in Kenya's largest city, Nairobi. According to a 1996 report from the World Health Organization there are an estimated 20,000,000 AIDS cases worldwide, 18,500,000 adults and 1,500,000 children. Of the 20,000,000 AIDS cases worldwide, an estimated 1,000,000 cases are found in Kenya alone. This makes Kenya the hardest hit single country in the world. Kenya newspaper reports indicate increased drug use and ignorance about AIDS prevention has quadrupled the number of HIV infections registered in Kenya since January, 1996.

Many Kenya health officials estimate the number of people infected with the virus that causes AIDS, (HIV), is probably 10 times greater than the number of cases registered. Recent Kenya statistics indicate that EVERYDAY an estimated:

35	Kenyans adults contract the HIV/AIDS virus;
110	Kenyan adults die of AIDS and/or AIDS related complications, and
1,600	Kenyan children are potentially infected with HIV.

In 1997, in just one year, 40,150 Kenyan adults died of AIDS or AIDS related complications, and an estimated 548,000 children became infected with the HIV virus. In the country of Kenya from 1981, when the first case of AIDS was reported, thru June 30, 1996, a 15 year time span, an estimated 650,000 adults have died of AIDS and an unknown number of children were orphaned, infected by HIV or also died of AIDS related complications. By contrast, in the United States, during that same 15 year time span, the cumulative total number of HIV/AIDS deaths, as reported by (CDC), totaled 343,000, (338,831 adults and adolescents and 4,129 children). The country of Kenya, Africa, a country the size of the state of Texas, has suffered more AIDS related deaths then the entire country of the United States.

The large number of AIDS related deaths has left the streets of Nairobi and the surrounding communities full of an estimated 60,000 orphaned children. Many of whom are infants and toddlers fighting a daily battle of survival. Orphaned infants are often found dead of starvation in the homes of recently deceased parents. Despite medical advances and worldwide educational efforts, the HIV/AIDS epidemic continues to flourish in Kenya at an alarming rate. Sadly, the increase can be traced directly to the curse from God message the majority of churches in Kenya continue preaching to this very day.

The primary mission of Rafiki Kenya will be to establish a Community Coalition designed to bring the Kenya church, local citizens, medical community and community task forces together and begin the education process regarding the prevention and treatment of HIV/AIDS. Like most African countries, the church is the pillar of the Kenya community. It has a major influence on the behavior of the Kenyan people. This widespread influence makes successful recruitment of as many church leaders as possible crucial to the success of the Rafiki Kenya mission. The curse from God message has created an atmosphere of ignorance, fear and denial by a significant majority of the Kenyan people. Obviously, the people's fears and denials can only be successfully altered by educating the masses and spreading a message of hope. The Kenyan churches, in collaboration with the medical community, are the most viable vehicles for successfully accomplishing this task.

During its first year of operation, with the assistance of the Community Coalition, Rafiki Kenya will recruit, educate and train Kenyan volunteers as HIV/AIDS care givers, assist and support existing foster families, and aggressively encourage other parents to become foster parents. During subsequent years, Rafiki Kenya is desirous of constructing a building, and/or leasing and modifying an existing building, which will provide temporary housing to many of the orphaned children living on the streets of Nairobi and surrounding communities. In addition, Rafiki Kenya also desires to provide medical, counseling, educational and spiritual services.

Currently, Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc., under the Rafiki Kenya mission, has found homes for 7 Kenyan children orphaned by parents who have died of AIDS related complications. Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc. provides financial support for each of the 7 children through monthly monetary gifts of \$25.00 per child, donated clothing, over-the-counter medicines and personal hygiene items. One of the placement families already has 4 children of their own. Yet, they still found room in their home and hearts to take in an additional 5 orphaned children with no where to go. These courageous families know the parents of these orphaned children died of AIDS or AIDS related illnesses. They also know there is a possibility that the orphaned child may also suffer from the AIDS virus. Yet, despite the curse from God message, the probability of being ostracized by the entire community, concern for the health of their own children, and their own personal fears, these families have opened their doors to these needy children.

It is because of families like these that the Executive Board of Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc. aggressively supports the Rafiki Kenya mission. A group of approximately 20 Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc. Executive Board members and volunteer care givers will be visiting Nairobi, Kenya, Africa, in September, 1998, to establish a presence and initiate the Rafiki Kenya mission.

Reverend Nganga, who was born in a village outside the city of Nairobi, Kenya, was ordained in the Priesthood in 1989 shortly after securing a Bachelor of Divinity degree from St. Paul's United Theological College, Limuru, Kenya. Reverend Nganga served as a Curate at St. Peter's Church in Kabete, Kenya from 1989 to 1991. In 1991 he was awarded the position of Parish Priest at St. Andrew's Church in Thika, Kenya. He was at St. Andrew's for less than a year before being awarded the position of Associate Priest at St. Barnabas Church in St. Louis, Missouri, USA. Reverend Nganga remained with St. Barnabas Church from 1991 to 1993, when he was awarded the position of Associate Pastor at Trinity & Ascension Church also in St. Louis, Missouri. Reverend Nganga remained with Trinity & Ascension Church from 1993 to 1994, when he was awarded the position of Staff Resident Chaplain at Children's Hospital, Columbus, Ohio. Upon seeing numerous innocent children suffering and dying of HIV/AIDS, Reverend Nganga realized his vision and Rafiki AIDS Ministry, Inc. was initiated.

I am pleased to share with you an advance copy of IAVI's *Scientific Blueprint for AIDS Vaccine Development*, which we will be releasing at a press conference on June 28, the opening day of the 12th World AIDS Conference, in Geneva. At that time, we will also be announcing new financial commitments to IAVI that will allow us to begin implementing the plan.

We believe the plan outlined in this *Blueprint* offers the best hope of identifying an effective AIDS vaccine in the shortest time possible. It lays out a unique strategy of accelerated product development and human testing through international collaborations, as well as a tight set of time lines and milestones and a realistic budget to achieve success. This strategy is meant to complement, not compete with, existing vaccine programs.

The *Blueprint* calls for the rapid, definitive testing of safe, promising vaccine candidates in humans, an approach we call "thoughtful empiricism." We also propose the creation of new entities called International Product Development Teams to foster true partnerships between industrialized and developing countries in vaccine R & D. IAVI plans to begin identifying and funding the first Product Development Team immediately. We are continuing to encourage others to join us in implementing this bold, but necessary global plan.

I hope you will find the *Blueprint* useful. As always, we welcome your comments. After Geneva, we will be sending you a final color printed copy.

I look forward to seeing you in Geneva.

I am writing to request your support of the Fourth National HIV Testing Day.

Voluntary HIV antibody testing and counseling is a critical step that each person can play in our nation's HIV prevention efforts and to effectively take control of his or her own health by seeking appropriate health care options.

For the fourth year, the National Association of People with AIDS is conducting the National HIV Testing Day Campaign as part of our ongoing efforts to improve the health of people living with HIV through health education and advocacy and to raise public awareness of the risk brought by this terrible virus. The National HIV Testing Day campaign brings the "Take the Test, Take Control" message to a diverse group of people nationwide with a special focus on African-American and Latino communities, sexually active women, adolescents, and young gay men.

Currently, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates that there are over 250,000 Americans living with HIV who do not know their HIV status. Many do not even know they are at risk. Without medical care and support these individuals will progress to AIDS quicker and may pass the virus to others unknowingly. The medical and social advances of the past decade have greatly enhanced the value of HIV testing. Today, those who are found to be HIV positive have the potential for a longer, healthier life through medical care and the use of potent treatment therapies.

Major sponsors of the campaign are the CDC, Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), the National Alliance of State and Territorial AIDS Directors (NASTAD), the National Lesbian and Gay Health Association (NLGHA) and the Whitman-Walker Clinic. Additional partnerships have been formed with Abbott Laboratories, the AIDS Policy Center for Children, Youth and Families, Aguron Pharmaceuticals, Inc., Elizabeth Glasser Pediatric AIDS Foundation, Planned Parenthood Federation, and Smithkline Beecham Consumer Healthcare. Over 10,000 community based organizations, primary health care sites, sexually transmitted disease clinics and medical offices are participating in this year's campaign.

In the coming weeks, I hope that you will find ways in which to demonstrate your support of the Campaign and to encourage Americans, especially those at increased risk, to seek voluntary HIV testing and appropriate counseling through the following:

- o committing your radio address on June 20 or 27 to the importance of voluntary HIV testing to nation's prevention and treatment efforts
- o issuing a letter or proclamation similar to your effort in 1997

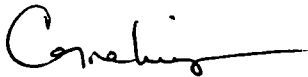

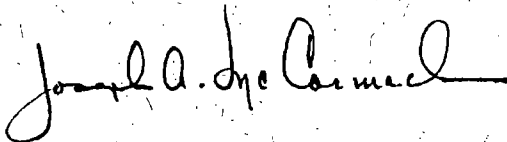

6. Agency Program/Plan:

The Corporation for National Service places a priority on addressing unmet human, educational, environmental, and public safety needs. Working to help prevent the transmission of HIV fits well into our mission. The Corporation's primary focus is its programs, and Evaluation and Effective Practices provides supportive services, including training, to the programs of the Corporation. In these programs, the Corporation strongly encourages HIV/AIDS prevention training for all service members, program and project staff.

A. Services (Prevention and Care/Treatment): We have provided HIV/AIDS prevention education and training, through State Commissions or AmeriCorps*National grantees to the AmeriCorps*State/National programs. From early 1995 through January 1998, the American Medical Student Association operated the Preventive Health Skills Center, under an agreement with the Corporation, and provided education, training, information and materials on a

variety of preventive health categories – including HIV/AIDS prevention. This training was provided to project staff, who would then train the AmeriCorps Members.

While most AmeriCorps Members are over 21 years of age, many of them provide services to adolescents. We believe many AmeriCorps Members provide HIV/AIDS training to others, including adolescents, and indeed, this occurs frequently. However, we have no information on how often this occurs or how many AmeriCorps Members or AmeriCorps*State/National programs have this as part of their regular activity.

HIV/AIDS prevention training was identified by the Corporation, from the outset, as an area in which all Members should be trained. As a result, State Commissions and AmeriCorps*National grantees and programs sought ways to effect this training. Many turned to the Preventive Health Skills Center. Many grantees use local providers, paid for by Program Development and Training funds at the state level (these funds are part of the grant to the State Commissions from the Corporation), or individual programs used their own limited training funds.

To facilitate access to both local and national resources, the Preventive Health Skills Center developed and distributed the *Community Health Resource Guide in 1997*. This *Guide* is available on-line through the National Service Resource Center, operated by ETR Associates under agreement to the Corporation. Further, the National Service Resource Center makes materials on HIV/AIDS prevention available to Corporation programs through a lending library. A directory of the Resource Center's publications is available on-line.

Although the Corporation no longer funds a Preventive Health Skills Center, we have identified consultants with expertise in HIV/AIDS prevention who are available to programs. HIV/AIDS prevention continues to be a strongly suggested training area for Corporation grantees.

B. Number of Adolescents Currently Served (FY98 and FY99): We have no information on the number of adolescents served.

7. Program Funding (FY98 and FY99):

Program funding for FY 98 included continuation of the Preventive Health Skills Center for a short period of time to allow for completion of the *Community Health Resource Guide* and funding of the National Service Resource Center. Further, Program Development and Training Funds continue to be made available to State Commissions. For FY99, we expect to continue to fund the National Service Resource Center and to continue to make training funds available to State Commissions.

We have received several document requests for all records referring or relating to the individuals, entities, and subject matters *listed below*. As many of you know, we have been working for the past several weeks to identify and gather documents from those sources most likely to contain responsive information. We are circulating this memorandum to all EOP staff to ensure that all relevant records are identified and that all responsive material is gathered.

Pursuant to this request, please provide copies of all records, documents (whether in hard copy, computer, or any other form), or any other materials of any kind relating or referring in any way to any of these subjects, entities, or individuals **from February 16, 1990 to May 26, 1998**.

Every employee is responsible for searching his or her own files and records to ensure a comprehensive search. Each office head or Assistant to the President must certify that his or her staff has done a complete and thorough search. In addition, if you believe that files that have been sent to the Office of Records Management may contain responsive information, please advise us so that we may ensure that all responsive documents have been located.

All materials must be provided to Michael X. Imbroscio, OEOB 488, by noon on Tuesday, June 16, 1998. If you anticipate any difficulty in meeting this deadline, please call Michael Imbroscio at 456-6243. If your production includes any classified information or documents, please call Michael Imbroscio to arrange secure delivery of these materials.

Please provide all records referring or relating in any manner to the following:

- (1) **The export of satellites for launch in the People's Republic of China (PRC), including the following:**
 - (A) **All Presidential waivers, or denial of waivers, for satellites or related technology to the PRC, including (but not limited to) all license applications, review of such applications, end-use assessments, technical assistance agreements, and other technical data;**

- (B) The launch of U.S. satellites on Chinese vehicles; or
 - (C) The unauthorized transfer of technology or technical data related to Chinese satellite launches, including the possible legal or national security implications of such transfer.
- (2) The transfer of export licensing authority for communications satellites or related equipment and technology from the State Department to the Commerce Department, including:
 - (A) The removal of communications satellites or related equipment or technology from the United States Munitions List; or
 - (B) The implementation of the decision to transfer satellites or related equipment and technology from the Munitions List to the Commerce Control List, including all documents related or referring to the decision process, monitoring of such items, and licensing of technical data.
- (3) The January 1994 National Security Council decision that satellites under Commerce Department jurisdiction could be licensed under standard Commerce Department procedures or the January 1994 U.S. Government decision that satellites under Commerce control were not subject to Missile Technology Control Regime (MCTR) Category II sanctions.

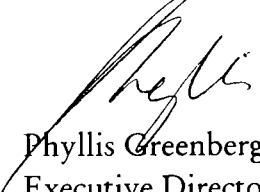
