ATTENTION VETERANS

If you are a veteran, have a family member who is a veteran or know somebody who is, this news may be of some interest to you or them. Please feel free to pass it along.

The President of the U.S. has recently signed into Law a bill that affects all veterans. This law states, in effect, that if a veteran has not registered at a Veteran Affairs Hospital since Oct. 1, 1996, then on Oct. 1, 1998, he or she will lose all medical benefits for life.

To make it worse, the V.A. cannot notify veterans about it. That information must be disseminated via word of mouth or by letter. We called the local V.A. office and found out this information is true. They recommend that everyone eligible for benefits come by their office, and sign up prior to the October 1st deadline, regardless of whether they received treatment at a V.A. Hospital since Oct. 1, 1996. This way, no one will slip through the cracks. You will need to bring your DD-214 to your local V.A. Office and it will only take about five minutes to complete the form. This will maintain your Veterans Benefits. If you cannot locate your DD-214, go to the V.A. office and they can help you obtain a copy

VA HEALTH CARE AND ENROLLMENT

Congress has required that after October 1, 1998, most veterans must be enrolled to receive VA health care services. Congress has also expanded the range of medical services that enrolled veterans may receive. Letters will be mailed to veterans from late June through September 1998 to inform them of their initial enrollment in the VA health care system. Veterans may continue to apply for enrollment any time, even after October 1, 1998. Here are some common questions about enrollment and benefits:

If I am enrolled with VA, what benefits will I receive? Veterans enrolled in the VA health care system will be eligible to receive inpatient and outpatient services, including preventive and primary care. These include: diagnostic and treatment services; rehabilitation; mental health and substance abuse treatment; home health, respite and hospice care; and drugs in conjunction with VA treatment.

If I am enrolled, what cost will there be for me? There is no monthly premium for VA care. When you use services, the requirement for co-payments is based on your VA eligibility rating. If you are a veteran with a condition rated 50 percent service connected or more, or are being treated for a specific service connected condition, you will be provided treatment at no cost. All other co-payment responsibilities are set by law and are dependent on your individual or family's income if you have dependents.

Is this an insurance policy or an HMO? It is neither. VA health benefits are established by Federal law and regulations and funded through appropriations. They are not the same as an insurance contract. Also, veterans do not pay monthly premiums to receive VA health care. In addition, you are not required to use VA as your exclusive health care provider. If you have health insurance, or eligibility for other programs such as Medicare, Medicaid, or CHAMPUS, you may continue to use services under those programs. We recommend that, if you have other insurance or HMO coverage, you should keep that coverage to provide you with options and flexibility in the future.

Do enrolled veterans have to pay the deductibles that their insurance carrier requires when treated at VA? No. VA does not require veterans to pay those charges. In addition many insurance companies will apply VA co-payment charges toward satisfaction of their annual deductible.

Are there any restrictions on getting care in private facilities? Yes. Care in private facilities at VA expense is provided only under certain circumstances, namely, when VA has a contract arrangement for certain services or when a veteran who is service disabled is too far from a VA facility to receive care.

What is the coverage for emergency services? Emergency care is provided in VA facilities, in certain non-VA facilities with which VA has a specific contract arrangement, or in private facilities if you are service-connected 50% or greater, or require emergency medical care for a service-connected disability. In the last case, you or your representative should contact the nearest VA medical facility within 72 hours of receiving non-VA medical care to obtain authorization.

What if I get sick while on travel? You may receive care at any VA facility in the country. To minimize any "out of pocket expenses", while traveling you should familiarize yourself with the location of any VA medical care facilities in the area. VA requires all veterans who seek care at VA expense to obtain care in VA facilities. If a VA medical facility does not exist in the area you are traveling, you should seek medical care from the closest non-VA medical care facility. While there, have an official at the facility contact the closest VA medical care facility to determine your eligibility for non-VA medical care at VA expense.

If enrolled, can I get dental care? In general, dental benefits are limited to service-connected dental conditions or to veterans who are permanently and totally disabled. For specifics, contact the VA health benefits advisor at your local VA facility.

Will VA take care of my nursing home needs? Nursing home care in VA or private nursing homes may be provided, as space and resources permit, to certain veterans who are acutely ill or incapacitated but not in need of hospital care. To determine if you are eligible for VA nursing home care, you will need to contact the nearest VA medical facility.

Will VA provide hearing aids and eyeglasses? Yes, if you are service-disabled with a disability rating of 10% or greater. Otherwise, hearing aids and eyeglasses will only be provided in special circumstances, and not for generally occurring hearing or vision loss.

What kind of maternity services are available? VA provides maternity benefits only for pregnancies complicated by a pathological condition, usually service-connected. VA has no legal authority to care for a newborn infant. VA is considering asking Congress to remove the restriction on care of newborns so that it can offer maternity services as part of the benefits package.

Are there any limits on days of care or outpatient visits VA will provide? No, your treating physician will determine what is considered appropriate and necessary hospital care or outpatient services and will provide such care consistent with current medical care practices.

Can I enroll my wife and children? Non-veterans are not eligible to enroll in the VA health care system. A veteran's spouse or dependent may be eligible for VA medical benefits under the Civilian Health and Medical Program commonly referred to as "CHAMPVA" or if it is determined that child of a Vietnam veteran is suffering from spina bifida. Eligibility for CHAMPVA benefits or VA medical care resulting from spina bifida may be verified by the VA Toll Free Customer Service Center at 1-877-222-VETS.

Once enrolled, do I have to re-enroll each year? Your enrollment will be automatically renewed each year unless you notify VA that you do not want to re-enroll; you do not provide VA with information necessary to determine your enrollment priority; or VA resources limit the number of veterans VA can enroll. The last enrollment information you provided will be mailed to you to be updated.

I thought I have been enrolled in the VA Healthcare system since I applied at my VA Hospital last January. Why am I now receiving a confirmation letter telling me that I have just been enrolled? The VA had established an interim process to begin taking applications for enrollment. Until we reviewed the application and determined your eligibility and enrollment status, you were not technically enrolled. That process has begun and this letter confirms your enrollment in the VA's health care system.

Are all veterans being notified of their enrollment confirmation at the same time? The VA will be sending out confirmation letters by priority group therefore veterans will be notified at different times during the June through September 1998 timeframe.

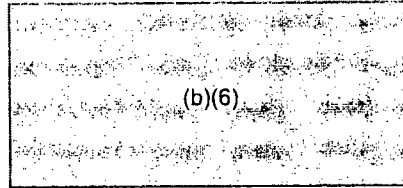

Dear Pat:

I am writing you concerning the treatment of P.W.A.'s at the A.S.O. or AIDS Foundation Miami Valley in Dayton, Ohio. I am really concerned about the drive-away tactics and retaliation of staff regarding P.W.A.'s.

As a P.W.A., I have observed numerous clients being provoked while having abusive language used towards them. Furthermore, I have also observed case managers lying to clients regarding Ryan White Funding. It is sad to say that P.W.A.'s with mental and chemical dependence problems are receiving differential treatment. These situations need to be addressed by the Ohio Department of Health immediately. I am enclosing statements from P.W.A.'s with mental issues and chemical dependence, which are homeless, been threatened with non enrollment They will not accept the A.S.O. service plan regarding mental medication or treatment programs. It is Ohio Public Law that these individuals may not be refused medication and the treatment program. Due to the refusal of treatment programs; they are threatened with non-enrollment and pulling of benefits. The benefits that are being withheld are food vouchers and rent.

On August 14, 1998 at approximately 10:00 A.M. (b)(6) was refused emergency food help and the case managers refused to speak with him. At that time (b)(6) talked with Richard Aleshire who referred him to Columbus A.S.O., Cincinnati A.S.O., or the Lima A.S.O.. The Lima A.S.O. was the only A.S.O. that responded or would offer any assistance. At that time I had to take (b)(6) to the S.C.L.C. for travel assistance in reaching Lima A.S.O.

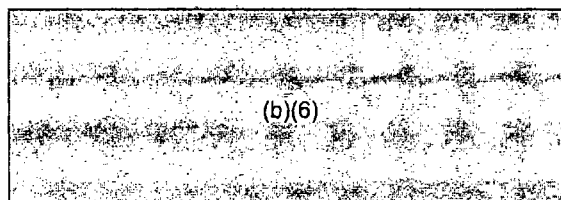
Pat I do not understand why (b)(6) had to journey all the way to Lima, Ohio from Dayton. It is 95 miles one-way. (b)(6) is full-blown AIDS. The stress of these occurrences did not help his condition or contribute to his well-being or quality of life.

This is an example the drive-away tactics and retaliation attempts that P.W.A.'s are facing in Montgomery County for writing statements against the AIDS Foundation Miami Valley. African-Americans and poor whites are continually being retaliated against in these types of scenario's.

Also on August 14, 1998 I called the A.S.O. requesting a food voucher to be mailed to me because I would be out of town and wouldn't be available to pick it up at the office. I spoke with Laurie, the case manager at A.S.O. she stated that it would be mailed late Monday on the 17th of August. I realized on this weekend that I had over committed myself to other concerns and canceled out all of my appointments for that Monday. On August 17th at approximately 9:30 A.M. Dave Ford, a volunteer coordinator called me regarding a P.W.A. needing a ride to a doctor's appointment. At that time I called Linda Thomas, my case manager, stating not to mail the food voucher that I would stop by and pick it up. Upon arrival at the A.S.O. I met with my case manager and she stated that it was mailed on Friday, August 14th. If I did not receive it; it could

not be replaced. To this date, I have still not received the food voucher. This is a flagrant lie and retaliation against me due to the fact that I filed a complaint against them. This is continuous racism against African-American's and poor white's. This is also part of their drive-away tactics and not addressing our issues.

Pat, with these situations and occurrences are the Federal Funds being withdrawn from the Miami Valley? I have also included numerous statements about bias, indecision making by case managers. I would hope that the Ohio Department of Health will come up with a tool to stop the retaliation and drive-away tactics; it's racial attitudes and it's blatant lying to innocent P.W.A.'s. In hardship cases emotional stress needs to be kept at an absolute minimum. The inappropriate behavior by the case management team needs to cease immediately! The restriction of Freedom of Speech needs to be lifted promptly. The P.W.A.'s have to deal with the egostic's and control issue's of case managers. Enclosed you will find documentation of these issue's and situations. Please accept our signatures of your helping in this endeavor.

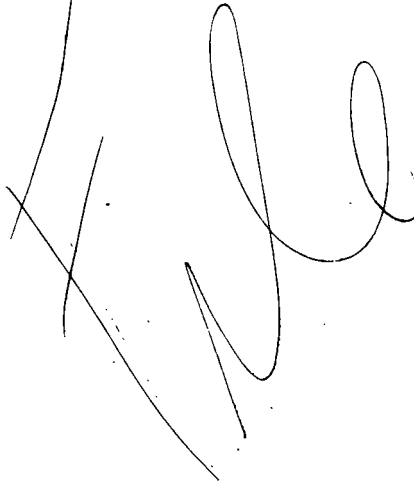

HARSHBARGER ISSUES ADVISORY TO DENTAL COMMUNITY
ON TREATMENT OF HIV/AIDS PATIENTS

Explains impact of recent U.S. Supreme Court decision.

Attorney General Scott Harshbarger today issued an advisory to dentists and dental hygienists in Massachusetts reminding them that they cannot refuse to treat or otherwise discriminate against an HIV-positive person.

The two-page advisory follows a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision, Bragdon v. Abbott, which stated that HIV-positive individuals are protected under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), regardless of the stage of the condition.

"Any practice or policy of denying treatment, providing disparate treatment or assessing a surcharge to any patient who is HIV-positive -- regardless of whether that person shows symptoms -- is a violation of state and federal law," Harshbarger said. "Most dentists and health care providers in Massachusetts are committed to providing quality dental care and other health services in a non-discriminatory manner and use universal precautions when treating all patients. This advisory simply reinforces that obligation in light of the recent U.S. Supreme Court decision."

To comply with the ADA's legal mandates and state law, health care providers cannot refuse to provide dental services to an HIV-positive person or impose additional burdens or costs on the provision of those services. Such refusal or other discriminatory treatment would constitute violations of the state constitution, the state public accommodations law and the ADA.

According to Harshbarger's advisory, Massachusetts dentists and dental hygienists must also pledge compliance with the Centers for Disease Control Guidelines for Infection Control as a precondition to their licensing renewal with the state Board of Registration in Dentistry. The Guidelines advise that dentists use universal precautions and treat all patients as if they have HIV. Scientific, medical and public health authorities agree that it is safe to treat people with HIV/AIDS using universal precautions, and non-compliance with the Guidelines could result in suspension of the dentist or dental hygienist's license to practice or other disciplinary action.

The advisory is being distributed by Harshbarger's Disability Rights Project, which he established in 1993 to increase the public's understanding of and compliance with state and federal disability rights laws. The Project works to ensure non-discriminatory access to people with disabilities, including the issuance of advisories addressing particular legal issues.

The advisory was written by Assistant Attorney General Stanley J. Eichner, Director of Harshbarger's Disability Rights Project and Assistant Attorney General Richard I. Gordon and Special Assistant Attorney General Jennifer Lawrence of Harshbarger's Public Protection Bureau.

Dear Dentist or Dental Hygienist,

Attorney General Scott Harshbarger established the Disability Rights Project in June of 1993 to increase the public's understanding of and compliance with state and federal disability rights laws. The Project works to ensure non-discriminatory access for people with disabilities. As part of that effort, the Project conducts community education, including the issuance of advisories which address particular legal issues. The Office of the Attorney General is issuing this advisory to apprise all dentists and dental hygienists of their obligations under state and federal disability rights law not to discriminate against individuals infected with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV).

We believe that most dentists and dental hygienists employ universal precautions and are committed to providing quality dental care and other health services in a non-discriminatory manner. This advisory is intended to reinforce that obligation and to emphasize the Office of the Attorney General's dedication to protecting the rights of HIV-positive individuals.

Any practice or policy of denying treatment, providing disparate treatment (such as offering services in a separate setting), and/or assessing a surcharge to any patient who is HIV-positive — regardless of whether that person is symptomatic for HIV/AIDS — is a violation of state and federal law. Therefore, all individuals who have tested positive for HIV are protected by Massachusetts law and, as recently clarified by the United States Supreme Court, the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

In June of this year, the U.S. Supreme Court concluded in the case of Bragdon v. Abbott that a person's HIV infection constitutes a "disability" within the meaning of the ADA, even though her condition may not have progressed to the so-called "symptomatic phase." Accordingly, the ADA affords HIV-positive individuals its full protection regardless of the stage of the disease's progression. As a broad non-discrimination mandate, the ADA covers several areas, including employment, public services and places of public accommodation (including a dental or medical office). Although the Supreme Court's decision specifically involved a provider of dental care, the same principle of non-discrimination also applies to other providers of medical care and related health care services.

To comply with the ADA's legal mandates and state law, health care providers may not refuse to provide dental services to an HIV-positive person or impose additional burdens or costs on the provision of those services. Doing so would violate Amendment Article 114 of the Massachusetts Constitution; G.L. c. 272, §§ 92A and 98 (the Massachusetts public accommodations laws) and the ADA. Remedies for a violation of these constitutional and statutory provisions may include damages, injunctive relief and attorney's fees.

In addition, dentists and dental hygienists must pledge compliance with the Centers for Disease Control Guidelines for Infection Control as a precondition to their licensing renewal with the state Board of Registration in Dentistry. Non-compliance could result in suspension of the dentist or dental hygienist's license to practice or other disciplinary action. The Guidelines advise that dentists use universal precautions and treat all patients as if they have HIV. Scientific, medical and public health authorities agree that it is safe to treat people with HIV/AIDS using universal precautions, which ensure safety for both patients and providers.

You may wish to consult with your attorney if you have questions or concerns as to how these laws may affect you in individual circumstances. MINUTES: BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S MEETING

June 6, 1998

The Board of Directors of the National Episcopal AIDS Coalition (NEAC) met at All Saints Episcopal Church, Indianapolis, Indiana at 9:00 a.m., following a Eucharist in All Saints Church. The meeting had been preceded on June 5 by hearings held by the HIV/AIDS Commission of the Episcopal Church on the impact of Racism upon HIV/AIDS. These hearings had also been held in All Saints Church. Also on the evening of June 5, those present gathered at the home of Gordon Chastain for dinner and a "catch-up" on each other's lives.

Board members present were Elizabeth Payne, Richard Younge, Bruce Garner, Peter Lee, Mary Ellen Honsaker, Hart Roussel, Bill Frampton, Gordon Chastain, Harriet Langfeldt, Richard Brewer, Tony Hinds.

Absent board members were Jesse Milan, Sandy Thurman, Dru Ferguson, Sue Scott, John deLashmet, Rodney Michel.

Also present were R.P.M. Bowden (Liaison from Executive Council to HIV/AIDS Commission, Anthony Turney (Grace Cathedral, San Francisco), Cricket Park (Conference Coordinator), Anne Grant (Planning Works), Larry Biddle (Planning Works).

Bill Frampton, Co-Chair, presided.

Peter Lee reported on the upcoming Kanuga Retreat, which is to be led by Jesse Milan. About 250 are registered already. 14 dioceses are co-sponsoring.

Conference:

Cricket Park reported on hotel arrangements for the 2000 Conference in San Francisco, March 22-26, 2000. The Holiday Inn Golden Gateway is holding 100 rooms at \$119. Meeting rooms will be extra. (Plenary session rooms, \$1500.) The following tentative schedule was discussed.

Thursday, Evensong at Grace Cathedral

Friday, Sessions begin

Lunch banquet at hotel

Saturday, Sessions continue

Box lunch at hotel

Concluding Eucharist at Grace Cathedral.

Cricket is to fax hotel contract to Bill and Harriet who are authorized to sign.

Registrants are to book own rooms without direct billing to NEAC.

Sponsorships and grants to support the conference need to be sought. Bruce Garner suggested the Faith Communities Respond to AIDS program of CDC. Hart and Larry are to develop a package for soliciting sponsorships and grants.

The following persons were appointed to a Conference Working Group (with the understanding that the entire board is the Conference Committee): Harriet Langfeldt, Peter Lee, Richard Younge, Hart Roussel, Elizabeth Payne. Cricket Park is the contractual coordinator. Anthony Turney is the local liaison.

An attempt will be made to identify attendees at the first San Francisco Conference for special invitation and recognition.

Financial Report:

The following reports as of June 3, 1998 were distributed by Hart Roussel: NEAC FY Budget Report, Income and Expense (NationsBank Account), Transaction Detail for Office Operations Account. A board pledge report is to be circulated later. There is no immediate need for budget revision. Hart was thanked for his work and his leadership in transferring accounts, setting up the new systems, and dealing with unexpected hassles.

Lambeth Prayer Cards:

Consensus was reached to print two prayers on one side (for Healing in the Time of AIDS and for a Cure) and global epidemic statistics on the other. Harriet is to arrange for printing of 2000. Bishop Michel will distribute at Lambeth.

Co-Chairs Reports:

Harriet distributed a Job Description of Co-Chairs. She also reminded members of their personal pledges and urge communication about expected dates of payment.

Bill now has computer access (Revbillfr@aol.com). The Executive Committee has averaged a conference call about once every four weeks this year to date. We are progressing well in working into our new relationship with Planning Works. Bill attended AIDS National Interfaith Network (ANIN) to represent NEAC. ANIN is holding a Conference in November on AIDS and Media for judicatory heads and media coordinators. ANIN's umbrella grant request to CDC has been submitted. (NEAC's portion is to fund TAP training.)

The board adjourned for lunch at the Dayspring Center (a homeless shelter attached to All Saints Church). At 1 p.m., the board reconvened in Executive Session.

Planning Works:

Reconvening at 2 p.m., the board made some suggestions to refine our working relationship with Planning Works. Harriet and Bill will develop a decision tree or flow chart for response to inquiries and requests (telephone, internet, etc.) A request was made to include AIDS resolutions passed by the 97 convention on the web site. Also requested (both on the web site and to be made

available to the board) was information on how to access materials formerly available at Episcopal Parish Services.

Larry discussed problems with the membership/contributions data base. There have been equipment problems and problems with the limitations of the software. These have been time consuming, but are being dealt with.

Ann would like to work on monographs or manuals of practical use in the field - e.g. "How to do a Retreat" based on the experience of Peter Lee. She is also looking into possible foundation sources to assist with funding of the Commission's work and/or TAP.

Next Meetings:

October 8-9, Atlanta - following Commission hearings

February 12,13, 1999, Denver - following Interim Bodies meeting.

June 4-5, 1999, Seattle - following Commission hearings

October 8-9, 1999, Wyoming - following Commission hearings

Bruce Garner reported that the October meeting in Atlanta will use the Renaissance Hotel, convenient to All Saints Church and to a MARTA stop with airport access. The Commission hearings on Friday will be at the Holiday Inn in Decatur, GA, which is also on MARTA. The Commission will meet on Friday a.m. and have lunch with the Georgia State AIDS Task Force. At that time we will present a program on how a faith community can respond to HIV/AIDS: nationally (the NEAC model), regionally (the Kanuga retreat model), locally (Atlanta model). Commission hearings will follow from 2-5 p.m. On Friday evening there will be dinner at All Saints Church and an evening session which will allow for Commission debriefing and personal catch up. On Saturday morning, the Commission will begin with Eucharist and meet at All Saints Church (including lunch at the church). Sunday services at All Saints are at 9 and 11:15. On that Sunday, there will be a Healing Service at St. Philips Cathedral at 4 p.m. Bruce suggested that clergy wanting or willing to preach on that weekend could be used in the Atlanta area.

TAP:

Elizabethe explained that two tiers of training: 1) master classes or training of trainers and 2) training in local areas provided by those who have been through the master level. Our objectives are to provide two pilot trainings in minority communities. An African-American training in South Carolina is a possible way to meet a portion of the objective. Culturally appropriate training in Hispanic and Native America communities needs to be addressed.

Policy Statements:

It was moved, seconded and passed that the Board of Directors of the National Episcopal AIDS Coalition re-affirm the resolutions of General Convention supporting needle exchange programs.

There was general discussion of the issues of Name Reporting versus Anonymous Testing and Confidentiality in the absence of civil protections for persons who are HIV positive and with a need for surveillance data. Hart Roussel is to bring a draft statement for consideration at the October meeting.

Presiding Bishop's Day of Prayer:

Bishop Michel had written the Presiding Bishop on behalf of the Commission requesting a day (either Sunday closest to St. Luke or Sunday closest to Constance and Companions) and offering draft materials for preachers and liturgical planners. The Presiding Bishop's response requested expansion to "all those with terminal diseases" and epidemics. Richard Brewer was instructed to work with Bishop Michel in writing a response stating that our request was based on General Convention Resolution and that there are other non-health related issues in HIV/AIDS for which the Church can be educated and motivated to respond in a Day of Prayer.

Richard Younge distributed materials he had prepared for preaching and liturgical planning around the two suggested days. These materials are to be forwarded to the Presiding Bishop along with the letter from Bishop Michel conveying our message.

Other Issues:

Hart announced that there is a possibility of a Conference on Integrating HIV Services for Native American communities. Tentative plans are for a date in the fall and the place to be New Mexico. If the conference takes place, it was suggested that at least a few members attend and that data be included in the Commission's work on racism and AIDS. Mary Ellen Honsaker expressed interest.

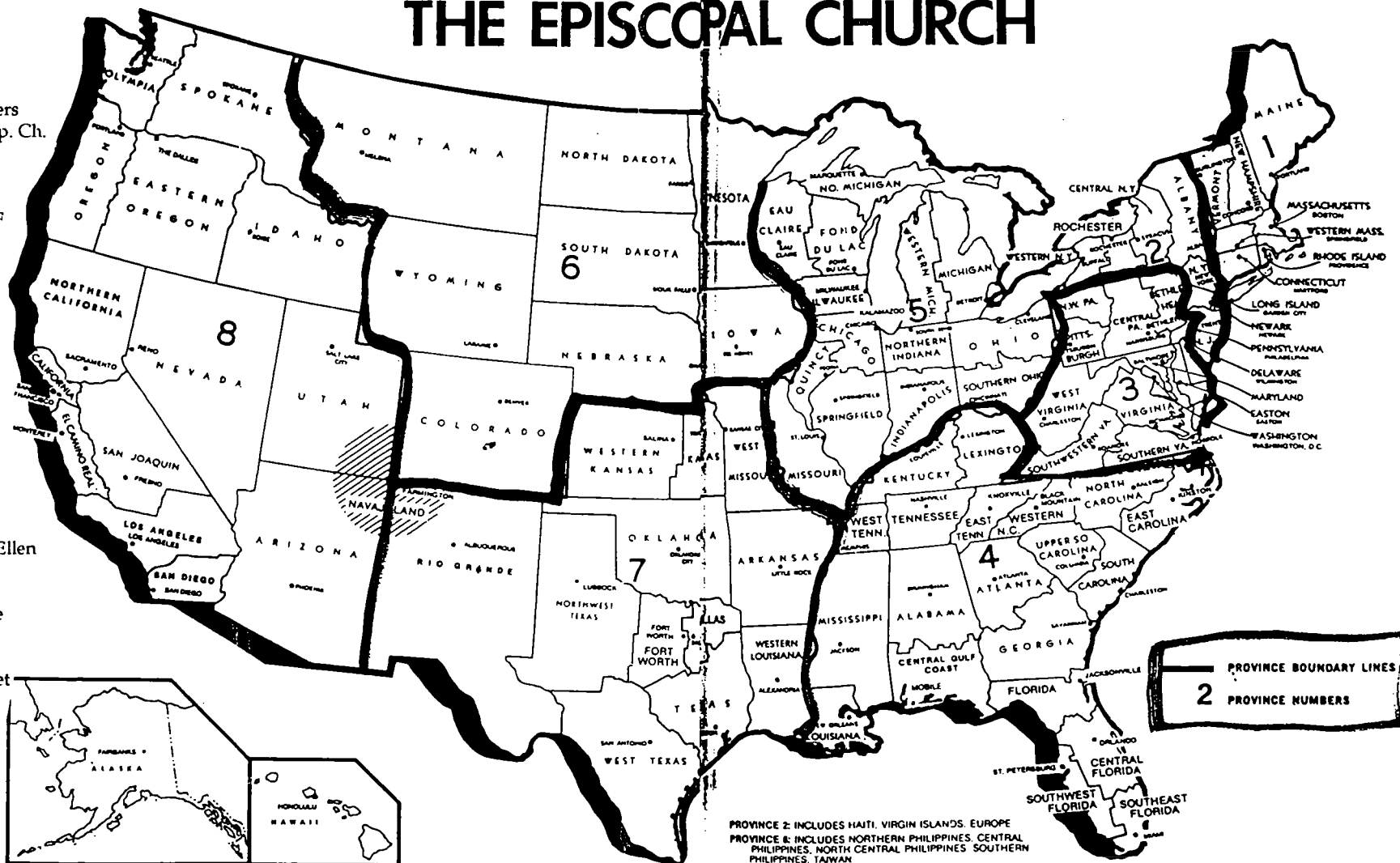

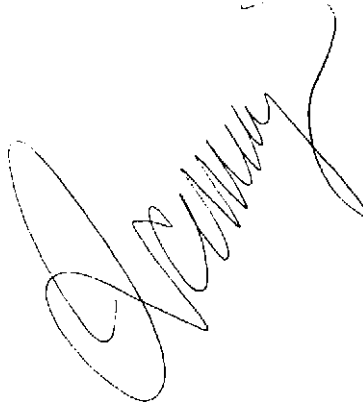

Dear President Clinton, I am a person living with the AIDS virus. I have been on disability for several years now. Several years ago my situation was very serious. However, with the new AID's drugs I'm doing much better. Not better enough to go back to a 40-50hr work week...but better enough that some days I need something to occupy my mind as well as some time. If I were to go off disability and try to do some part time work....I would lose my healthcare...I could not

afford the doctor bills or the medication that I take every day to keep me alive. I still spend several days a week in bed because of extreme fatigue. Other days I have doctor appt.'s. But there is something missing in my life. I don't feel productive anymore. And what I receive from disability barely covers necessities. My family has tried to help me....but they are in no position to do so for a long period of time. They are retired and should be enjoying themselves. I don't know if there is anything you can do to help people in my situation.

I would greatly appreciate anything that would make things easier for those of us who are caught up in this type of situation.

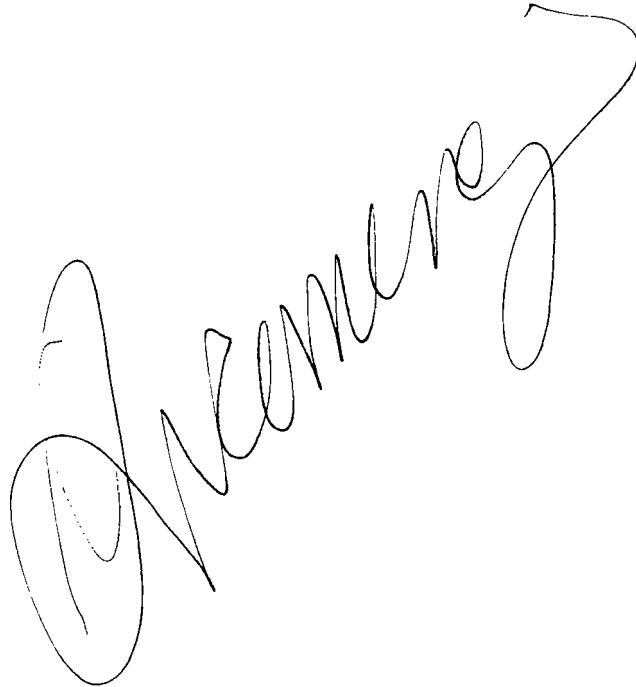

At some point, I'd love to talk with you about the specifics of where you went, what you saw, and what you think might offer some dramatic storytelling opportunities. I want to find some way to bring the enormity of what must seem like a distant problem home to detached, preoccupied America. It's a tall order, and I'll need the help of anyone willing to take the time to talk with me.

I'd also like to talk with you about HIV prevention – and what isn't being done that should be. I'll be in Atlanta for the CDC's conference on adolescent health next week. If you have time, perhaps we can speak then. Let me know when you're available and where to meet. I'll be there.

It was wonderful seeing you the other day. It's reassuring to know that AIDS policy in this country has an overseer with a conscience, Bill Foege for a mentor and a lifetime of political savvy. I hope we can work together again soon.
