OVERVIEW OF PATENT 5,922,013 "MICROWAVE BODY HEATING SYSTEM"

The "Microwave Body Heating System" is designed to kill Viruses, Bacteria and other Destructive Micro-organisms of the human body, using Segmented Directed Heat. The Directed Heat is applied by the world's first Computer Controlled, Wide Area (Moving), Microwave Array.

Background of the invention:

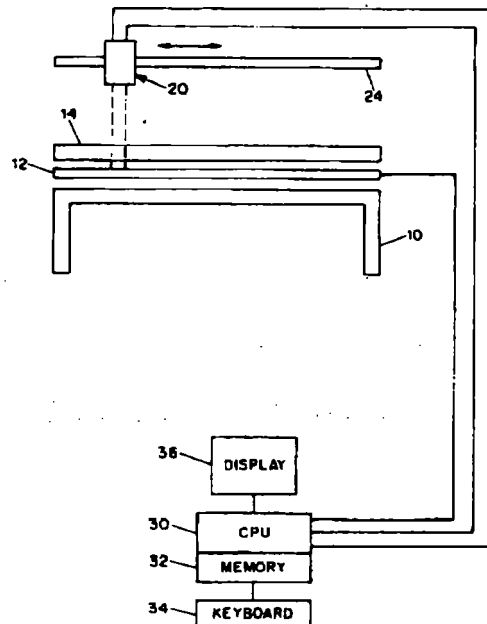

[57] ABSTRACT

A microwave body heating system uses one or more focused beams of microwave energy. A fan beam or transversely scanned beam is directed to a narrow transverse section of a subject's body. The transversely scanned or fan beam is moved longitudinally down the body in a controlled sequential incremental manner. Scanning times, patterns and radiated power levels are controlled in experimentally predetermined or monitored formats to achieve desired levels of heating of an entire body or localized area. Microwave frequency energy is provided by one or more magnetron type devices in a variably positionable microwave power assembly which is longitudinally scanned under control of a motor device.

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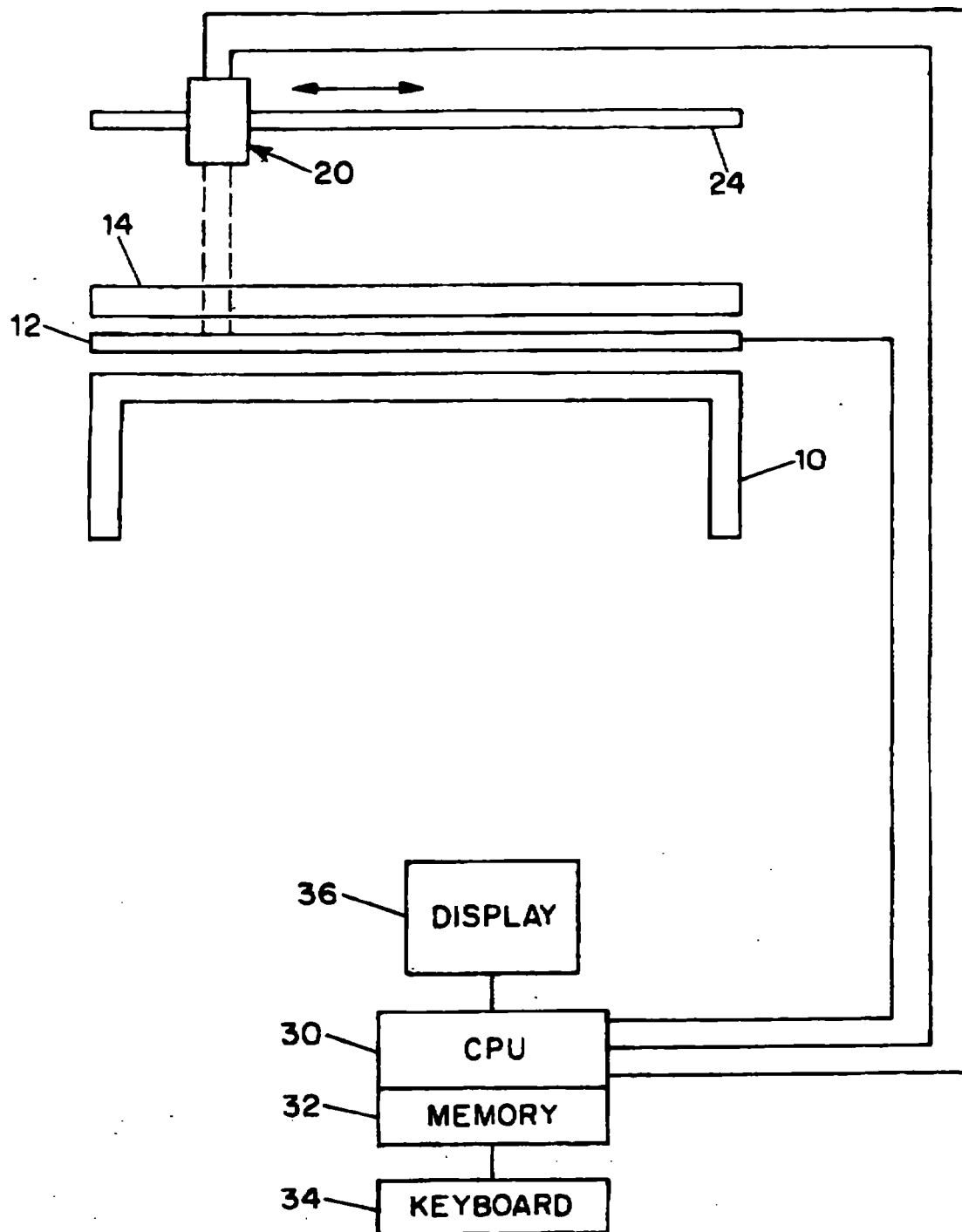

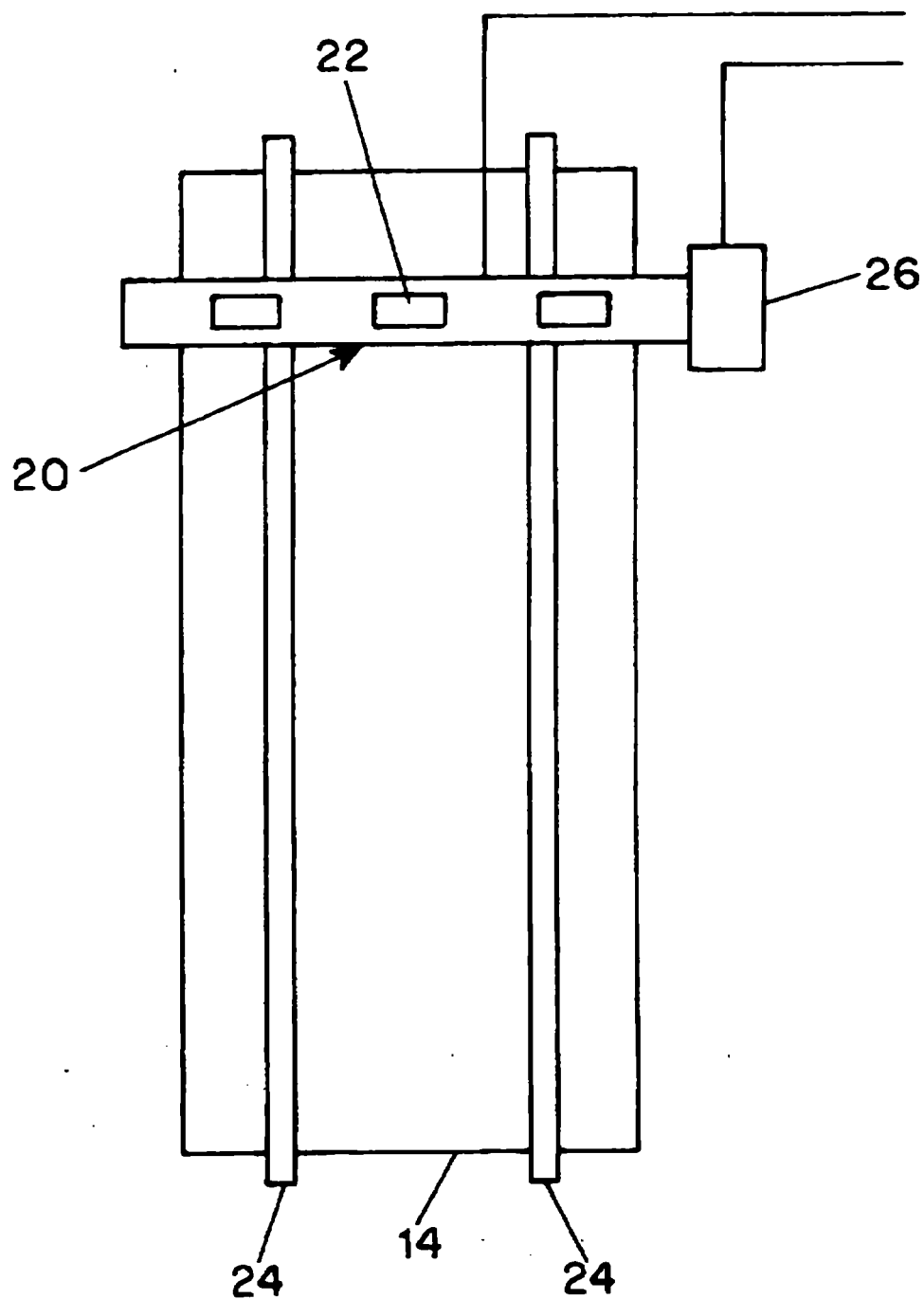

BACKGROUND OF THE INVENTION

In various situations it may become desirable to warm or heat a body portion of a subject on a relatively rapid, but controlled basis, in order to achieve a predetermined level of warming. While various methods and approaches have been available for such purposes, they have tended to be slow, ineffective or not readily controllable as to the degree of warming or heating achieved. It has also been difficult to control the positional application and effects to selected areas, relative to other body portions. Certain other mediums, such as x-rays, are difficult to contain and potentially injurious to equipment operators. Also, many potential approaches and mediums capable of providing body heating are not amenable to heating of a subject's entire or substantially entire body on a readily controllable basis.

It is therefore an object of the present invention to provide new and improved systems and methods for heating body portions, and such systems utilizing controlled application of microwave energy, which may be applied on an incremental sequential basis under computer control.

SUMMARY OF THE INVENTION

In accordance with the invention, a system, to heat body portions using controlled microwave energy, includes a support unit arranged to support a subject body portion and having transverse and longitudinal dimensions. A microwave power assembly is arranged to be variably positionable relative to the support unit and to radiate at least one focused directional beam of microwave frequency energy at a controllable power level to irradiate a section transverse to the support unit. A position adjustment element is arranged to controllably relatively position the microwave power assembly and the support unit longitudinally. The system also includes a central processor unit coupled to the position adjustment element, arranged to control longitudinal positioning of the microwave power assembly and also arranged to control at least one of the following: the power level, the beam focus and the beam direction of a beam of microwave frequency energy radiated by the microwave power assembly.

Also in accordance with the invention, a method, to heat body portions using controlled microwave energy, comprises the steps of:

- (a) positioning a subject body portion on a support unit having transverse and longitudinal dimensions;
- (b) irradiating a section transverse to the support unit by a focused directional beam of microwave frequency energy at a controllable power level radiated by a variably positionable microwave power assembly;
- (c) controllably relatively positioning the microwave power assembly and the support unit longitudinally; and
- (d) controlling at least one of the power level, the beam focus and the beam direction of the beam of microwave frequency energy radiated by the microwave power assembly.

DESCRIPTION OF THE INVENTION

FIG. 1 illustrates an embodiment of a microwave heating system, arranged to use controlled microwave energy to heat one or more body portions of a subject on a controlled basis, in accordance with the invention. For present purposes, a subject's blood is defined as a body portion. The FIG. 1 system includes a support unit 10, arranged to support the body of a human subject in a prone position. Support unit 10 may typically take the form a table-type structure of suitable dimensions of non-metallic or other appropriate construction. Support unit 10 may be arranged to directly support a sensor array 12 arranged to absorb all or a portion of incident microwave energy while providing a positional indication subject to interpretation as to the level of microwave energy incident upon discrete areas of the array. Sensor array 12 may comprise sections of energy absorptive material with associated thermocouple or other temperature sensing elements arranged to sense power levels on the basis of temperature rise, or other appropriate sensor devices. A suitable form of mattress or other body support element 14 is also provided to meet stability, comfort, sanitary and other direct body support considerations. Support element 14 is desirably of a construction substantially transparent to microwave energy. Straps or other body retention or restraint elements may also be provided.

The FIG. 1 system also includes a microwave power assembly 20, which is variably positionable relative to the support unit 10. The word "microwave" is nominally defined with reference to wavelengths from one to one hundred centimeters. Microwave power assembly 20 typically includes a transverse linear array of magnetron or other suitable microwave power supply devices 22 with appropriate local control circuitry, a single such device arranged for controlled scanning transversely across the surface of support element 14, or a combination thereof. As illustrated, the power assembly 20 is supported via longitudinal structural members 24 and includes a position adjustment element, shown as motor unit 26. Structural members 24 may be elongated steel rails held up by supports (not shown) extending from the ceiling, floor or support unit 10. The motor unit 26 is arranged to move the power assembly along members 22 to preselected positions or continuously or incrementally in a controlled manner.

As illustrated, the FIG. 1 system further includes a central processor unit (CPU) 30 coupled to the microwave power assembly 20. As shown, associated with CPU 30 are memory unit 32, keyboard unit 34 and display unit 36, together with such additional computer components and programming as may suitably be provided by skilled persons. CPU 30 is arranged to control at least one of (a) the power level of the microwave frequency radiated energy, (b) the focus of the beam or beams of microwave frequency radiated energy and (c) the direction of radiation of the beam of microwave frequency energy provided by microwave power assembly 20. In other embodiments, the frequency or one or more additional characteristics of the microwave frequency energy may also be controlled.

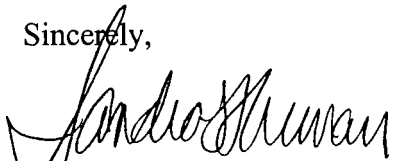

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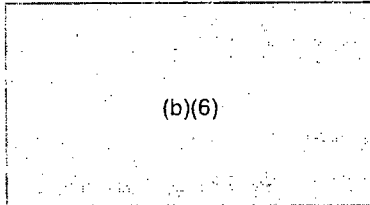

Dear Dir. of AIDS Policy, Sandy Thurman,

Our federal government plans to cut our nation's drug problem in half by the year 2007. This would mean just 3% of the U.S. household population 12 and over using illegal drugs. In 1979 the rate was 15%, and in 1998 about 6.4%.

Despite the federal government's war on drugs, which cost about \$18 billion in 1998, Drug Czar Barry McCaffrey said that drugs cost America 14,000 lives annually.¹

Surgeon General David Satcher explained that one of the most important things a Surgeon General does is to communicate directly to the American people based on the "best available science — not politics, not personal opinions, and not religion." Since 1964, there have been 50 Surgeon General Reports. Twenty-eight deal with smoking alone, but there has never been a report on alcohol — not one — with the exception of a 1988 report on drunk driving.² (After which Surgeon General C. Everett Koop abruptly resigned !)

In USA Today, April 5, 1999, Surgeon General Satcher proclaimed, "Alcohol abuse kills and injures more of our young people than all the illegal drugs put together."³

A recent U.S. Government Tabulation of Drug-Related-Deaths related 105,095 deaths with Alcohol and 3,509 deaths with Alcohol in Combination with Other Drugs. There were 4,462 deaths related with Cocaine, 3979 with Heroin, 1204 with Codeine, 808 with Methamphetamine (Speed), 752 with Valium, and only 721 deaths related with Marijuana.

The war on drugs entered a new, more serious phase when, for the first time, the U.S. Congress appropriated public tax money for an all-out media campaign aimed at teenagers. There was great hope that the new tax-payer effort would include alcohol, America's No.1 drug of abuse among teenagers and adults! When the proposal came up for a vote in Congress to allow alcohol in anti-drug media messages, the alcohol lobby managed to defeat the bill.⁴

Senator Strom Thurmond witnessed the defeat of project SMART, (Stop Marketing Alcohol on Radio and Television) by The Hospitality Industry at the Alcohol Advertising Hearing before the Subcommittee On Children, Family, Drugs, and Alcoholism of the Committee on Labor and Human Resources, February 7, 1985.⁵

The National Education Association believes that alcoholic beverages and their use should not be advertised. (Resolution C-44, 1999 - 2000)⁶

Senator Thurmond continues to oppose The Hospitality Industry's efforts to place supposed health benefit labels on alcoholic beverage containers. Strom continues fighting to transfer the authority to regulate alcoholic beverage labels from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms to the Department of Health and Human Services.⁷

The U.S. Medical Association Guidelines state that, "Any potential benefits from alcohol are limited to men past 50 and women after menopause.." It is more effective and less risky to urge patients to quit smoking, exercise more, and have a balanced diet. The older a person becomes, the less tolerance their body has for alcohol.⁸

One reason why more heart attacks occur on a Monday is that many people binge drink during the weekend, pushing their hearts to the limit.⁹

Disregarding the drug laws, about 54% of eighth graders, 72% of 10th graders, and 82% of 12th graders consume alcohol.¹⁰

Girls tend to drink in order to fit in and gain acceptance, while boys more often drink to become a real man and get drunk.¹¹

Two out of five college students engage in high risk binge drinking. This has been fairly consistent for the last 20 years. However, studies now show dramatic increases in the number of times per month students are getting wasted and are getting more out of hand. When the states raised the legal drinking age to 21, the courts started to hold the colleges responsible when student drinking turns deadly.¹²

African Americans make up 13% of this country's population, but nearly 50% of our prison population. They use 14% of the illegal drugs sold in the United States, while the whites consume 74%. The war on drugs has been a war on poor African American and Hispanic men.¹³

Over the past 20 years, the number of American inmates has tripled to 1.8 million. California and Texas prison populations increased eight-fold. We now spend \$24 billion to care for and feed 1.2 million prisoners serving sentences for nonviolent and not particularly serious crimes.¹⁴

Attorney General Janet Reno is concerned that today's swelling prison population inevitably means that in the next few years unprecedented numbers of ex cons will be moving back into their neighborhoods and may foment a new wave of crime and violence.

Rev. Winton of Stanford remarked that prison chaplains often become mentors to inmates. "They could hook inmates up with ministers in their neighborhoods so that the same kind of counseling continues."¹⁵

Over 60% of those in state prisons are there because of drug abuse, but only about 13% were in drug treatment in 1996. Men come out of prison and, because they lack education and drug treatment, are trapped in a cycle that affects their families and children.¹⁶

Carl Anderson, himself a recovering alcoholic, is the Director of the Texas Tech University Center for Addiction Studies. Texas Tech gives scholarships for staying clean, getting good grades, and attending recovery meetings.¹⁷

Senator Strom Thurmond urges a much higher tax on alcoholic beverages, dedicating the additional revenue to the Alcohol Prevention and Treatment Fund and to medical research on alcohol induced diseases.¹⁸

Over 40% of Americans now identify themselves as abstainers, up from 29% in 1978.¹⁹

Millions of Alcoholics Anonymous Members are winning the war on drugs. They have learned, the hard way, to always "just say no" to that first drink. They encourage others to do the same.

Americans often fail to fully comprehend that alcohol is just another illegal drug for everyone under 21, and that other drugs are much easier to conceal at playgrounds and at school. School lockers are being removed. Dogs trained to sniff out gunpowder and drugs are being brought, unannounced, to our schools. Gunshots are now the leading cause of death for teenage boys.

Politicians and parents who try to impress others with a mug of beer or a glass of champagne, will also impress their children and grandchildren, placing them at high risk for substance abuse and violence.

Congressmen joke about The Hospitality Industry's skill in knowing how and when to carry "Buckets of Gold" to Washington, D.C. Washington, D.C. has become perhaps the worst major city in our nation for children and teenagers.

You can fool all the people some of the time, and some of people all of the time, but you can not fool your own children and teenagers.

Clinton urges U.N. to do more to prevent genocide

UNITED NATIONS — President Clinton challenged the United Nations and countries in Africa, Asia and elsewhere on Tuesday to strengthen their ability to stop mass killings like those in Kosovo and East Timor.

The United States "cannot respond to every humanitarian catastrophe in the world," he told the General Assembly. "We cannot do everything everywhere."

Clinton also urged the world body to engage in an all-out battle against poverty for the 21st century and to "assure that weapons of mass destruction will never be used on our children."

"Let us resolve in the bright dawn of this new millennium to bring an era in which our desire to create will overwhelm our capacity to destroy," Clinton told the 188-member body.

Clinton suggested the United Nations play an expanded role in preventing mass slaughter and dislocation.

"When we are faced with the deliberate organized campaigns to murder whole peoples or expel them from their land, the care of victims is important, but not enough. We should work to end the violence," he said.

Among other things, Clinton said, "we need international forces with the training to fill the gap between local police and military peacekeepers."

"Our response in every case cannot or should not be the same," he said. "Sometimes col-

lective military force is both appropriate and feasible. Sometimes concerted economic and political pressure combined with diplomacy is a better answer," he said.

Later Wednesday, Clinton authorized up to \$55 million in U.S. military assistance to help countries participating in the East Timor peacekeeping force.

Clinton touched lightly on a

contentious issue: Iraq.

The Clinton administration is willing to ease the sanctions only if Iraq agrees to allow U.N. weapons inspectors back into the country.

But the Security Council remains deadlocked. Russia, China and France — each wielding veto powers — have expressed sympathy with Baghdad's call for an immediate eas-

ing of the sanctions that have been in place since the Persian Gulf War in 1991.

In nearly three hours of talks Monday night, Secretary of State Madeleine Albright failed to budge Russian Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov, a U.S. official said. That clouded the prospect for the Security Council adopting a renewal of the inspections that were halted in December.

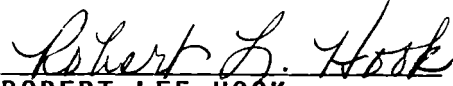
Dear Director Thurman:

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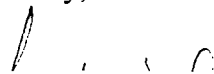
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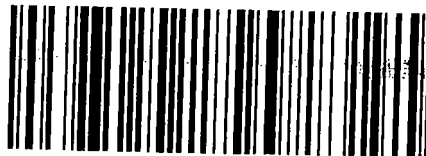

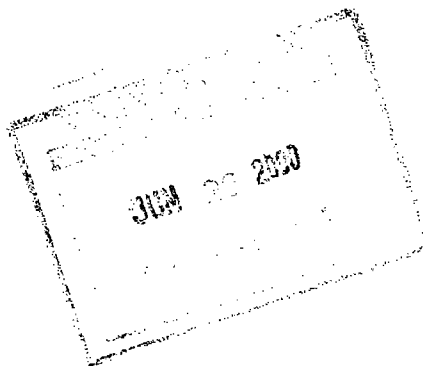
