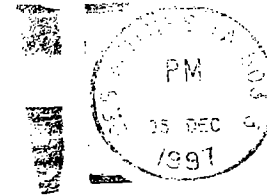

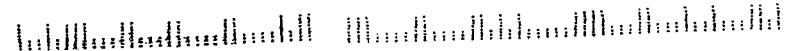

You are invited to submit an abstract on any of the topic areas listed on the reverse side of this form. All abstracts received by June 27, 1997, will be considered for poster presentation and will be published in the abstract book. Abstracts concerning late-breaking research may be submitted after June 27 and before August 15, 1997, for distribution during the meeting.

Please adhere to the following guidelines when preparing your abstract:

- 1 You must complete and submit two different forms for each abstract. The Abstract Submission Form must include the primary author's name, address, and signature and a complete list of coauthors for poster presentation. A Blinded Abstract Submission Form, which will be used by the review committee during the abstract selection process, must also be submitted for each abstract and **should not** include information on the authors.
- 2 A listing of the 16 topic areas is printed on the back of this form. You must select the topic area that best describes the subject of your abstract. The number of the selected topic area should be typed in the box at the top of the standard and blinded submission forms.
- 3 Abstracts must be written in English.
- 4 Please adhere to the following typing instructions:
 - ▶ In box 1, type the abstract title using all CAPITAL letters and 10 point Times Roman or similar font. The title should be bold-faced.
 - ▶ In box 2, type the authors' names. The primary author's name should be listed first (last name followed by first name) and underlined. The coauthors should be listed with last name followed by first initial. Following the names, each affiliation should be listed only once using asterisks after the respective authors' names to indicate their affiliations. **NOTE: None of this information should be included on the blinded abstract submission form.**
 - ▶ In box 3, type the text of the abstract using 10 point Times Roman or similar font. The abstract should be typed single-spaced with one line of space between paragraphs. Do not indent paragraphs. The text must fit in the space provided. Use standard abbreviations and symbols and define each abbreviation when it is used for the first time. Tables and graphs, either computer-generated or neatly drawn in black ink, may be included if they fit within the space provided.
 - ▶ In box 4, type the name, address, telephone and fax numbers, and e-mail address of the primary author. Use 9 or 10 point Times Roman or similar font. **NOTE: None of this information should be included on the blinded abstract submission form.**

- ▶ The primary author's signature and printed name must be included in box 5. Submission of a signed form indicates acceptance of and compliance with the abstract submission rules. 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HOW LONG SHOULD TREATMENT BE GIVEN IF WE HAD AN ANTIRETROVIRAL REGIMEN THAT COMPLETELY BLOCKS HIV REPLICATION?

After the administration of potent antiretroviral agents to inhibit de novo infection, the plasma levels of HIV-1 drop ~100-fold in the first two weeks due to the fast clearance of free virions and the rapid loss of productively infected cells. This initial acute decrease is then followed by a slower second-phase decay of plasma viremia. Two new mathematical models were developed and used to analyze viral load data collected from 8 drug-naïve patients following the combined administration of zidovudine, zalcitabine, and didanosine. Fitting the data to either model, we conclude that persistent viral production in long-lived cells (e.g., macrophages) infected before the initiation of antiviral therapy can explain the second-phase decay. Alternatively, the second-phase decay can also be modeled by the gradual activation of cells that latently carry infectious HIV. In either model, such cells have, on average, a life span of 13.3 days. Interestingly, the life span of either cellular compartment is directly correlated with the baseline CD4 count. Studies are now in progress to discriminate between these two models. Nevertheless, given the above life span plus available estimates of the pool sizes of infected macrophages and latently infected CD4 lymphocytes, we conclude that a completely inhibitory treatment regimen would need to be administered for ~1.5-3.0 years before each compartment burns out. This estimated duration of treatment does not consider an unforeseen slower third-phase decay or the possibility of a sanctuary site. If latently infected cells are the principal compartment contributing to the second-phase decay, it may be possible to accelerate this process by immune stimulation.
