I am writing to invite Sandra Thurman to speak on June 10, 1999, at a breakfast meeting of local community leaders, corporate representatives, HIV service providers and members of our HIV community when we commemorate the 10th anniversary of KCARC's founding. The Kansas City AIDS Research Consortium is a not-for-profit (501-c-3) agency that conducts HIV clinical trials at nine clinics in greater Kansas City and at the AIDS Project of the Ozarks in Springfield, MO. We are also the Western Missouri sites for the AIDS Education and Training Center program (MATEC-WM), which provides HIV training to medical professionals and PLWA/H.

Last spring Sandy planned to speak at our annual HIV update conference on May 1. In conjunction with that engagement, we arranged a day of meetings with HIV clients and service providers from across Missouri and Kansas so she could hear their concerns. Circumstances forced Sandy to cut her visit short and return to Washington before she could speak at our conference, however, as she departed, she asked me to invite her back at a later date, and said, "I owe you one!"

I have enclosed a copy of the layout for our invitation, which needs to go to the printer ASAP. I would like to include Sandy on the invitation, if possible. If you can confirm Sandy will be able to join us, I will also form a local planning committee to arrange a "Welcome Sandy Thurman Day" so she can visit with regional folks again.

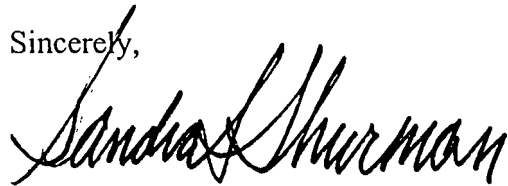

Dear Ms. Pelosi,

I am writing you in relation to the further prospects of Russia-US collaboration in science. For several years I work in the field of Russian science policy as a Deputy Chairman of the Committee on Education and Science, State Duma (Russian Parliament) and presently as a Chairman of the Committee on Natural Resources and President of the Union of Scientific Societies of Russia.

I think, it is difficult to overestimate the importance of Russia-US collaboration in science, in particular in such areas as defence conversion and HIV vaccine development. In 1997 the Russian Parliament approved a Russian HIV vaccine project. In the same year the Denver G8 made a decision on international collaboration in HIV vaccine development. Since then an essential work has been done to establish active Russia-US collaboration in this field. There was a number of meetings of Russian and American scientists as well as scientific exchanges. Last year Mrs Sandra Thurman, Director of the Office of National AIDS Policy, visited Russia to discuss prospects of collaboration with the Russian Ministry of Science and Technology. On the 2nd March this year I had an interesting meeting with Mrs. Anne Harrington, Senior Coordinator, Nonproliferation/Science Cooperation Programs, the Department of State, and Dr. Andrei Kozlov, Coordinator of Russian HIV Vaccine Project. During this meeting some ideas have been suggested to support Russian-US collaboration in the field of HIV vaccine development and other areas through the Democracy Support Act.

May I suggest to organize a meeting of American Congressmen and Russian MPs to discuss approaches to the most efficient collaboration in this and other areas? We are ready to organize the first meeting in Russia in any time convenient to you and your colleagues.

WASHINGTON, DC – Sandra Thurman, Director of the White House Office of National AIDS Policy, announced that she will be meeting with foreign journalists on Friday, March 26, 1999 to discuss the upcoming Presidential Mission to southern Africa. She will be joined by Dr. Paul DeLay, Director of AIDS Programs at the US Agency for International Development.

According to the US Agency for International Development, by the year 2010 more than 40 million children will be orphaned by AIDS--more than 90% of these will live in sub-Saharan Africa. This growing tragedy challenges African nations and their international partners to join together in a much needed response.

This past World AIDS Day, December 1, 1998, President Clinton announced a new \$10 million emergency initiative to address this issue. He also directed Ms. Thurman to lead a delegation of Congressional members and administration officials to visit southern Africa and report back with their observations and recommendations on the crisis of children orphaned by AIDS.

Joining Ms. Thurman on this trip will be Representatives Barbara Lee, Sheila Jackson Lee, and Carolyn Kilpatrick. In addition, key staff from the offices of Representative Pelosi and Senators Hatch, Helms, and Kennedy will be participating.
