On June 19, 1998, the Federal Legislation Clinic (FLC) will convene a small number of public health officials, legal and policy experts, and AIDS advocates to participate in a roundtable entitled, **After Bragdon v. Abbott: Issues and Options in Public Health Policy**. The roundtable will focus on the potential effects of the Abbott decision on HIV/AIDS public health policy and will serve as a timely opportunity to examine the issues that may arise from the Court's first-ever ADA, first-ever HIV/AIDS decision. I am writing to invite you to participate in this full-day program of discussion and presentations.

To lay the groundwork for our discussion, the roundtable will begin with a paper on the public health issues raised by the Abbott case. Three other papers are being prepared for the roundtable: a review of federal disability discrimination law from the '73 Rehab Act to the present, with a particular focus on the definition of "disability"; a review of federal insurance protection for people with HIV/AIDS; and a survey of state disability discrimination laws. Following these presentations, roundtable participants will consider the range of issues presented by the various potential outcomes in Abbott and develop policy options to address those outcomes. After the roundtable, we at FLC will produce a policy brief on the issues covered.

The roundtable is part of a one-year HIV Law and Policy (HLP) Study at the Federal Legislation Clinic being funded by the Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation. HLP Study activities commenced with two media briefings in March 1998 on the Abbott case (held in conjunction with oral arguments in the case.) Other HLP Study activities will include a roundtable for legal and policy experts on disability and HIV/AIDS issues in May, and a forum on benefits programs in the autumn. Your participation in the June roundtable would be a valuable part of this work.

ANDREW PODGER

Mr. Podger has been Secretary, Australian Department of Health and Family Services since 1996. He was formerly Secretary of the Department of Housing and Regional Development and the Department of Administrative Services and Deputy Secretary, Department of Defense. He has a breadth of experience across a number of other Commonwealth agencies including the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet, Department of Finance and the Department of Social Security.

In the 1970's and 1980's, Mr. Podger's work mainly concerned social policy and research in areas such as income security, tax issues, superannuation, the labor market and family policy. Over the last ten years he has had more responsibility for financial management, particularly in the fields of labor market programs and major defense capital acquisition.

Currently Mr. Podger is Secretary, Australian Department of Health and Family Services which has expenditure around \$A20 billion each year and employs about 5,000 staff. The Department is responsible for implementing Australia's universal health insurance scheme, Medicare, pharmaceutical benefits, public health and medical research, health promotion and disease prevention and services for families. Specific health services include primary health care for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island people, the national drug strategy and regulation of quality of therapeutic goods.

During his tenure as Secretary, Mr. Podger has led the Department through the development of a new corporate strategy designed to address a fundamental restructuring of the portfolio and included major budgetary reductions across all areas of the portfolio. Mr. Podger initiated a systemic review of health and health financing policies including private health insurance and public health, the rationalization of Federal-State relations and the commercialization of major service areas including the Commonwealth Rehabilitation Services and the Australian Government Health Services.

Greetings and congratulations on all of your accomplishments and hard work in your national fight for the multitude of issues faced by persons living with HIV/AIDS in our country. We thank you for your investment of enthusiasm, energy, and fighting spirit.

This letter requests a visit from you to Alabama. As you know from our various encounters in my role with the National AIDS Housing Coalition, in Alabama it is my fortune to serve as the Director of the AIDS Task Force of Alabama (ATFA). We are a statewide organization serving all of Alabama's 67 counties through a network of ten AIDS Service Organizations including prevention and care services. Annually, we present an Awards Dinner as a time to stop, to remind ourselves that our work is hard and we honor each other.

Each year we have a keynote speaker - this year I hope it will be you. We have had Mary Fisher, Dr. Don Francis, and Dr. Earl Fox as keynoters in the past. This year's dinner is on Thursday, October 9th, 1998 in Montgomery. However, I would of course want to maximize your experience here in Alabama, so it is my hope you could arrive on October 8th in Birmingham for two days of activities.

Alabama is poor and rural. We have over 10,000 persons living with HIV; 50% of whom are in rural sections of our state. A visit from you would bring a much needed boost. At the same time as the Awards Dinner, a region-wide AIDS Symposium sponsored by the Alabama Department of Public Health is held. Typically there are over 1,000 participants who receive CEUs for their attendance in learning about HIV.

Your visit could include the following elements:

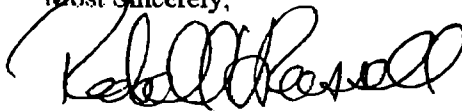
- Visit to the 1917 Clinic, an AIDS Clinical Trial Group (ACTG) site and the UAB AIDS Center where vaccine research is underway;

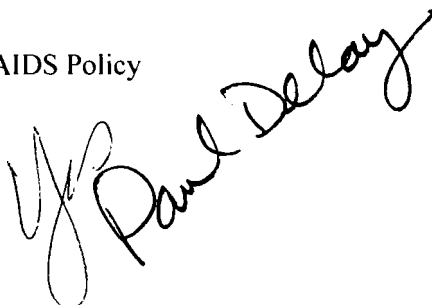

In September 1997, the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) awarded a \$150 M grant to Family Health International. This cooperative agreement, now known as IMPACT, the Implementing AIDS Prevention and Care Project, was awarded to respond to USAID's Strategic Objective 4 (SO4), to promote "the increased use of improved, effective and sustainable responses to reduce HIV transmission and to mitigate the impact of the HIV/AIDS pandemic." As you can see from the attached comprehensive description, IMPACT has a broad prevention and care mandate.

IMPACT follows AIDSCAP, the AIDS Control and Prevention Project, which also was managed by FHI in collaboration with our project partners and was the largest international HIV/AIDS/STI prevention program ever undertaken. The six-year-long effort, which ended on December 31, 1997, encompassed more than 750 HIV/AIDS prevention projects in 50 countries. Prior to AIDSCAP, FHI managed AIDSTECH, which assisted the design and implementation of 185 projects in 35 countries.

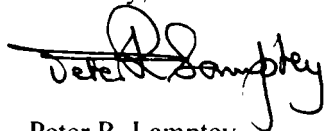

IMPACT has developed technical strategies to support initiatives reducing sexual risk; improving STI services; minimizing contextual constraints; strengthening the private sector response; and improving monitoring and evaluation.
